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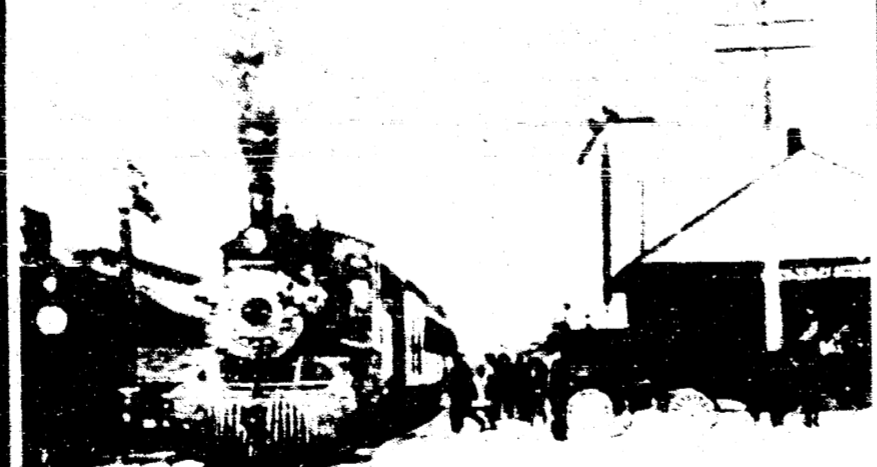

Gene Bentschneider, Manchester's Chicken Broil General Chairman, announces pre sale tickets for the 25th Annual Broil are now available for purchase from any of the 550 volunteers and at 35 business establishments and banks in Manchester and surrounding communities.

Pre sale tickets are priced at \$9.00. The price at the gate on the day of the Broil, Thursday, July 20, will be \$3.50.

Bentschneider asks "Where else can you get a complete chicken dinner, charcoal broiled to perfection, and enjoy the special entertainment and meet old friends?" Over six ton of fresh chicken, twelve thousand rolls, four hundred pounds of butter, half ton of radishes, a ton of cabbage and a truck load of bagged potato chips, along with all other necessary ingredients have been ordered in preparation for this year's festivities. Elaborate plans are underway to assure that this 25th Annual Broil will be bigger and better than ever. The committee will be prepared to serve 12,000 guests surpassing last year's record 10,800.

To celebrate the 25th anniversary of the Broil 25 valuable gifts will be given away and Luke Schaible's Band will entertain during the serving hours.

Since 1954 all profits from the 24 Annual Broils have been allocated for community betterments. Bentschneider points out that over \$70,000.00 has been expended for improvements to the athletic field including fencing, poles and lights, score board, announcer's booth, bleachers and track development and shelters; playground equipment, pavilions, rest rooms and other improvements at Carr Park; a filing system and shelving for the Manchester Township Library, and the purchase of Kirk Park and Char-Bro Park.

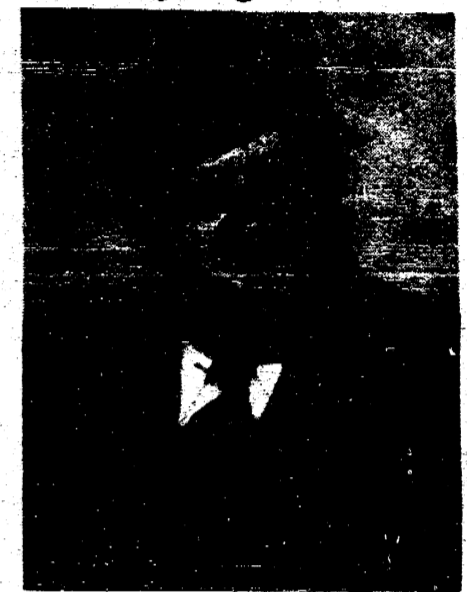

Receives Doctor Of Ministry Degree



Rev. Michael Peterlin, Pastor of the First United Methodist Church of Manistique has received the Doctor of Ministry degree in recent ceremonies held at the Methodist Theological School in Ohio. Work on the degree has spanned much of the last three years.

The subject of the work toward the degree was loss and grief. The dissertation was entitled "Ministering to Those Suffering Loss: A Plan for Training." "Loss in the Family: Equipping a Local Congregation to Respond. A Model for Training Small Groups." This is a subject of vital concern in our society which is lacking in roots and security and in which people are afraid to commit themselves to any true form of permanence. Rev. Peterlin served as the Pastor of the Sharon United Methodist Church from 1970 - 1976 and began his work on the doctoral program while here.

Candidate For Probate Juvenile Judge



Today, Jerome D. Farmer, II, Chief Assistant Prosecuting Attorney for Washtenaw County, announced his candidacy for Probate-Juvenile Court Judge. Farmer said, "Many adult criminals begin as juvenile offenders and one major role of the Juvenile Court is to alter or prevent this path of human development. We must teach our youthful offenders that their actions can and will have disastrous consequences for themselves and others, if continued. If I am elected Juvenile Court Judge, a major portion of my efforts will be directed toward establishing programs for the reeducation and reorientation of these offenders."

Farmer continued, "A central problem of the reeducation of young offenders, is the lack of insight into how harmful some of the acts can be for themselves as well as society. Often the youthful offender has a lifestyle which centers upon seeking immediately gratification without consideration of the potential long run consequences of their actions. These people must be taught that improper actions bring undesirable consequences and that desirable actions result in desirable consequences, therefore, leading people toward a constructive way of behaving. Education to resist the temptation for instant gratification is a must."

"Since the Court and its personnel

have this role as educators, models and mentors, they can not also play the role of "buddies" to the offenders. The climate of the proceedings can not be harsh or authoritarian, yet the dignity of the court and seriousness of the proceedings must be maintained."

"While helping those that come before the Juvenile Court is the primary responsibility of the Juvenile Court, it is also important that the interest of the whole community and the protection of society must be considered. A victim of a serious crime such as armed robbery, does not care whether the person holding the gun is a 16 year old or is a 17 year old who is legally declared an adult. Serious offenders will have to be treated in a serious fashion." While the Michigan Juvenile Code emphasizes concern for rehabilitation of youthful offenders, the Court must also be concerned with the following: 1) Making the juvenile offender accountable for his or her behavior. 2) Protect citizenry from criminal behavior. 3) Provide sentencing commensurate with the age, crime, and criminal history of the offender.

"Any educational program which seeks to have major impact on the life time development of the child, must include both the demonstration of the consequences of undesirable actions and direction towards constructive behavior. If we do these things effectively, the investment of society in these young people will yield all of us benefits over the long run."

Farmer, 38, and his wife, Carolyn, have two children, Jerome, age 9 and Scott, age 7. He has been Chief Assistant Prosecuting Attorney, since 1973 and in the Prosecutor's Office since 1969. He came to the Prosecutor's Office after two years in private practice and two years service as Assistant City Attorney for the City of Ann Arbor. Farmer has three degrees from the University of Michigan, holding an undergraduate degree in Economics as well as a masters in Business Administration and a Juris Doctor degree. He is a former school teacher and has worked in Juvenile Court, District Courts, Probate Courts, Circuit Courts and the Appellate Courts for the State of Michigan. Farmer has brought administrative responsibility in the Prosecutor's Office as he is in charge of the Circuit Courts and also the Probate-Juvenile Courts. He supervises a staff of over 40 and has a day to day responsibility for relations between the Prosecutor's Office and the Courts. Farmer has a working knowledge of the budget

drafting and grant writing for the Prosecutor's Office having drafted the grant for the highly successful Career Criminal Unit.

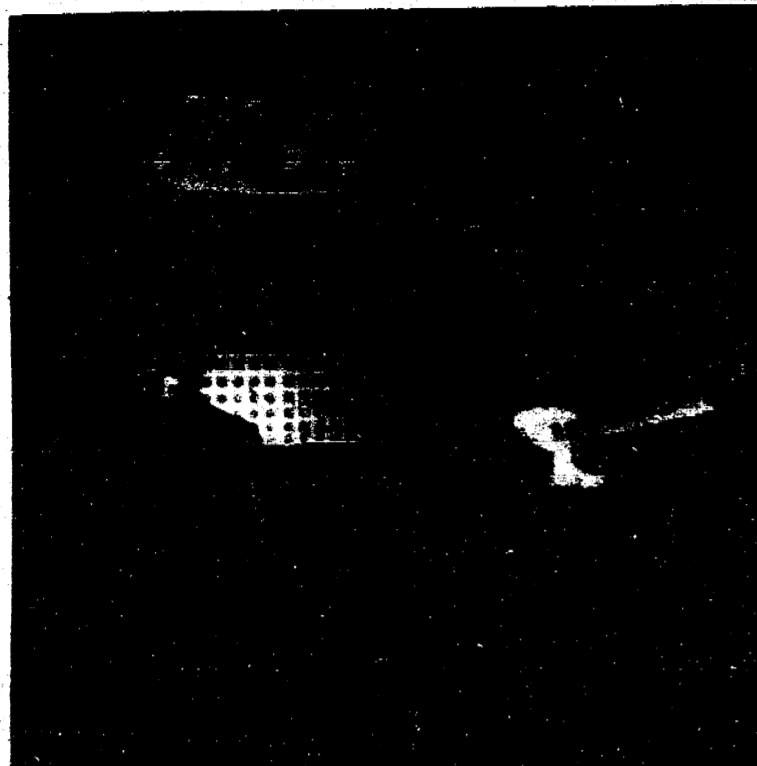

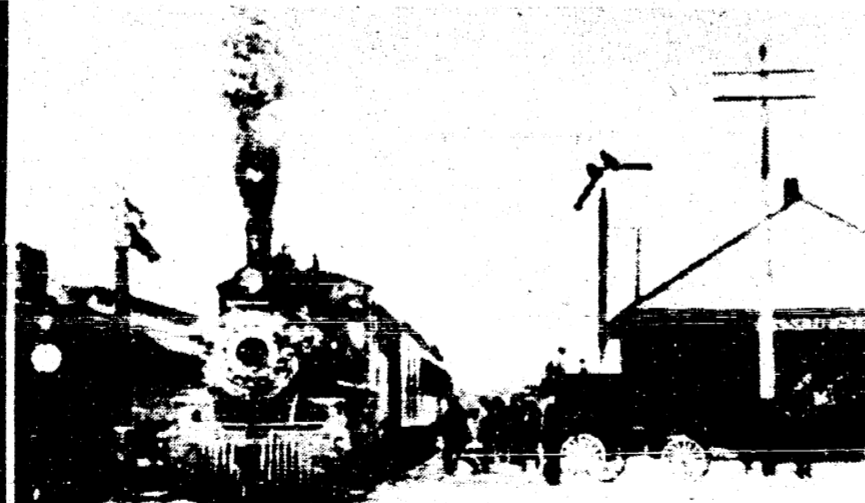

UNCERTAINTY IS CERTAIN

Those folks down at the Agriculture Department in Washington, D.C., have once again dusted off their old crystal ball--but they're finding the viewing cloudier than usual.

As they put it--in what must be con-

sidered an understatement--"much uncertainty surrounds the early-season outlook for 1978 crops."

The Agriculture Department economists have issued their latest farm supply and demand report. They say the growing conditions, economic developments, and producers' response to government farm programs over the next few months will influence U.S. crop production and use.

Nothing much new there...That's usually the way it goes. Only this year, it seems to be more so.

The economists' estimate of the situation turns out to be an "either-or" report. If crop conditions are generally favorable around the world, increases in agricultural output could result in more supply than demand, a buildup of stocks, and downward pressure on farm prices.

But...if weather patterns in the United States and other major farming areas of the world lead to smaller crops, then output could tighten and fail to keep up with demand, leading to a drop in stocks, and significantly higher prices.

Economic forecasting--with or without a crystal ball--is not a precise science. But one thing is certain--there's uncertainty in the farm picture today.

CROP REPORTING DEADLINE

Harlan G. Stull, District Director, of the Federal Crop Insurance Corporation, USDA, reminds farmers carrying insurance to report acreage promptly after planting is completed but no later than June 30, 1978.

before or after the hottest part of the day.

Since some cooking can't always wait, you may want to consider a microwave oven as a cool, clean alternative. In microwave cooking, microwaves heat the food--not the oven itself--your kitchen will stay cooler and more comfortable. It's clean cooking, too. Spillovers don't cook on to the oven, and dishes are easier to clean because food isn't "baked" on.

Air Conditioning

If you haven't already bought an air conditioner, start out right by buying the right size. One that is too large will pull the room temperature down too quickly, causing the room to feel clammy and uncomfortable. One that's too small won't cool the room adequately. Before you buy, make sure you know the dimensions of the room or rooms you want to cool.



Don't block the unit's air flow

with drapes or furniture, and keep the air filter clean. Check to see that fireplace flues are closed--when open, they can draw cool air out of the room.

Save On Electricity

If you are home all day, turn your air conditioner on in the morning, before the heat of the day reaches its peak. If no one is home during the day, you may want to buy a timer which can be set to automatically turn the unit on and off at the time you pre-select.

Keep drapes or shutters closed on the sunny side of the house, and open windows and doors as little as possible when the air conditioner is on.

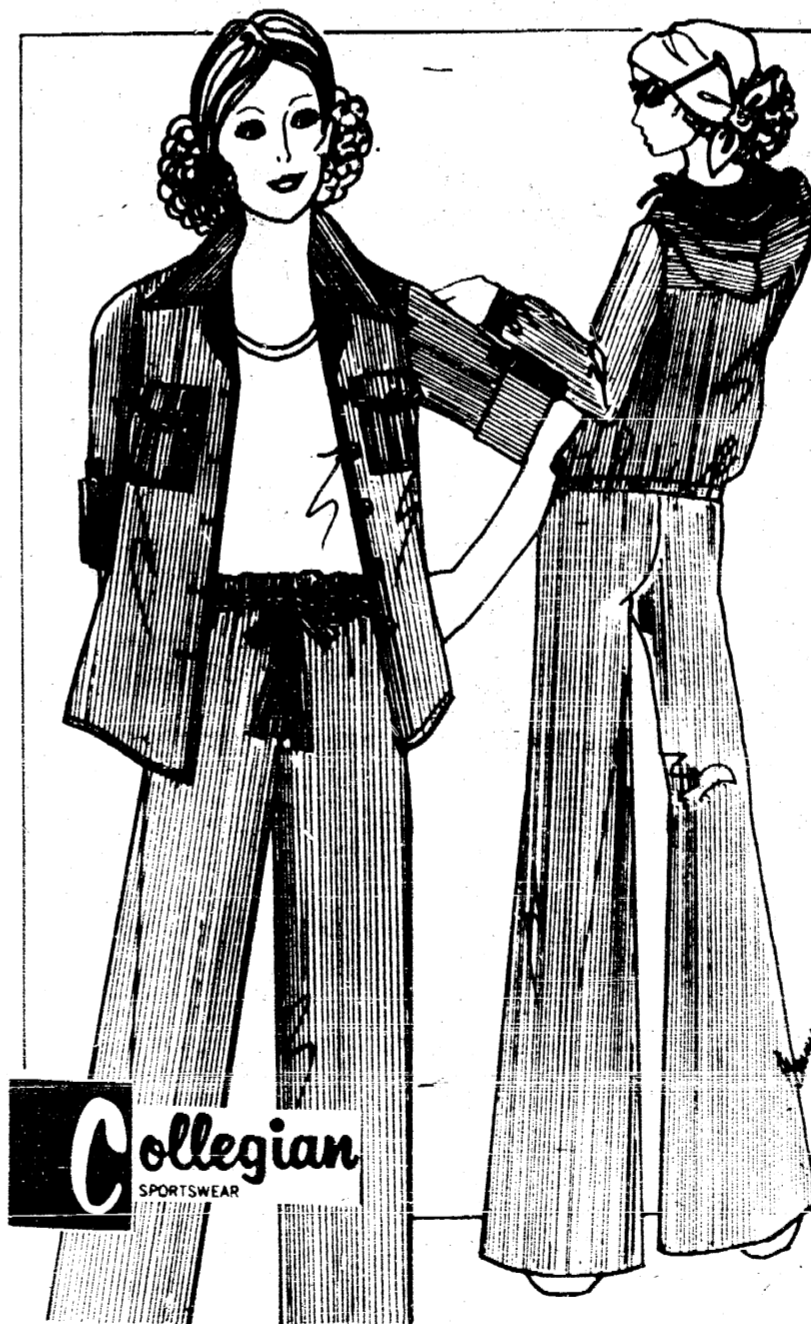

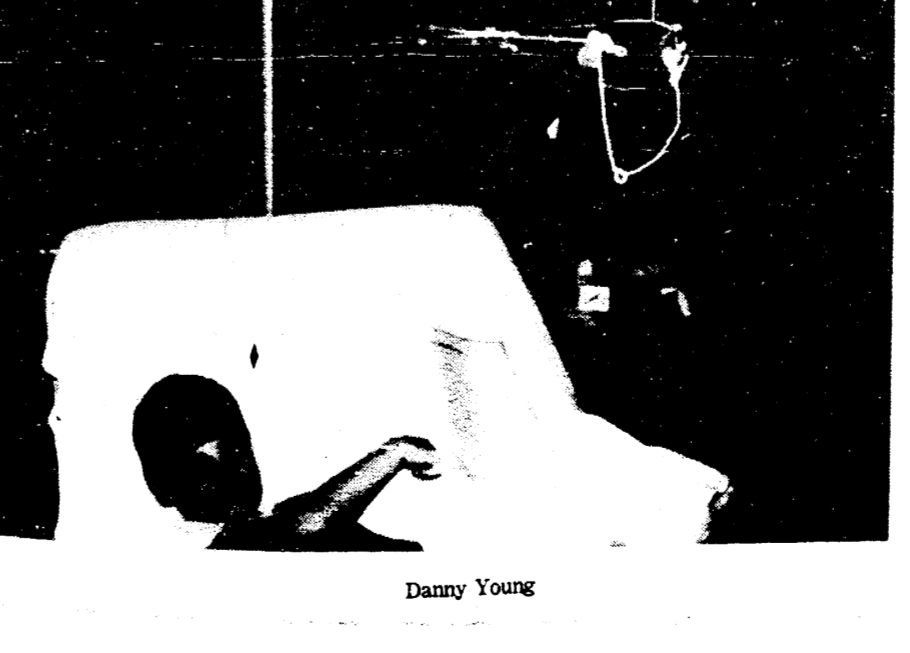

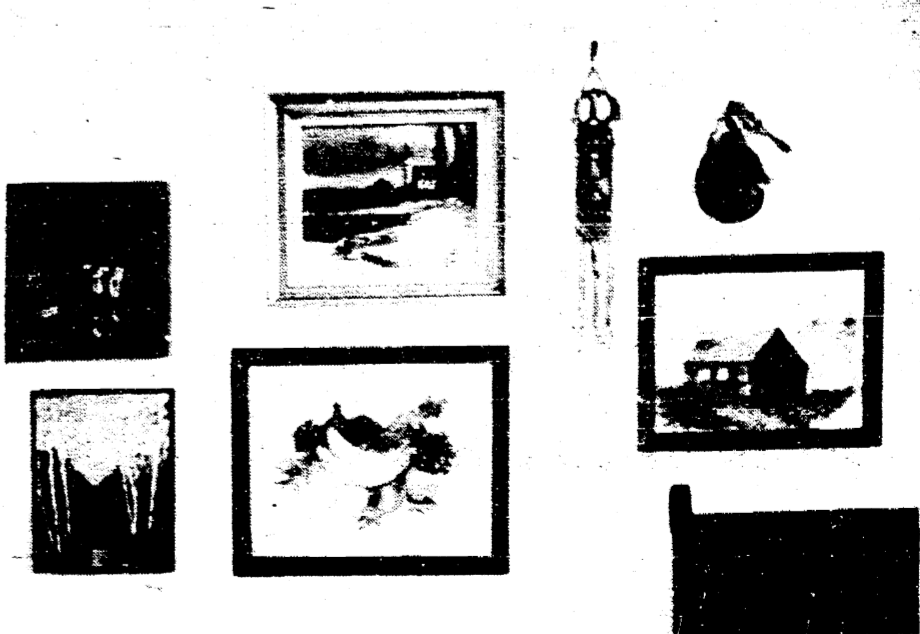
