"EARL'S PEARLS" BACK AGAIN

Former Secretary of Agriculture Earl Butz never did mince words when it came to defending the farmer and the profit system. It was back in 1973 that he said anyone who would place price controls on meat was a "damn fool." Later on, Nixon earned the title by doing just that, and the livestock industry suffered through some tough years as a result.

Cattlemen were just beginning to recover from those tough years when the Carter Administration took action to increase beef imports in an effort to bring down consumer prices. The fiery Butz had something to say about that action, too.

"I know something about what cattlemen have had to do to stay afloat--and all of them didn't stay afloat," he said recently. "I know something about the increased mortgages on their land and I admire them. When things got tough the past three or four years--they didn't come to Washington with a tin cup hollering 'ball us out.' They said 'let us alone; this thing will correct itself, and when it gets good--let us alone then, too!'"

Well, Washington left the cattlemen alone when times were tough--but when they started getting better--enter the Ad-

ministration to "save" the consumer. This was a mistake, Butz says, because the cattle industry needs profits in order to expand and assure the American people of an adequate supply of beef in the future.

"And the only way to accomplish that in our society is to make it profitable," Butz said. "You can jawbone out of Washington until you're blue in the face--if there's not a little prospect of profit. I don't think our cattlemen are going to build their herds back up."

That profit is not a "4-letter word" is a theory Butz has always preached. Profit is important if you want a full flow of food and fibre in this country, he maintains, and farmers are in business to make money just like any other businessman.

Butz often illustrated the profit system by telling how an American hog farmer gets up out of his warm bed at 2 a.m. on a sub-zero February night to sit with a sow who is having pigs. It is HIS sow and HIS pigs, to save and to market. Imagine a Russian farmer, Butz said, leaving his warm bed on a bitter cold Siberian night to watch the STATE'S sow have the STATE'S pigs! No way! He'd stay in his warm bed because he had invested nothing, risked nothing, and would realize nothing from the saving of those baby pigs.

Butz's stories weren't always well-received, but this is one with which the American farmer can really relate--and one which consumers should understand.

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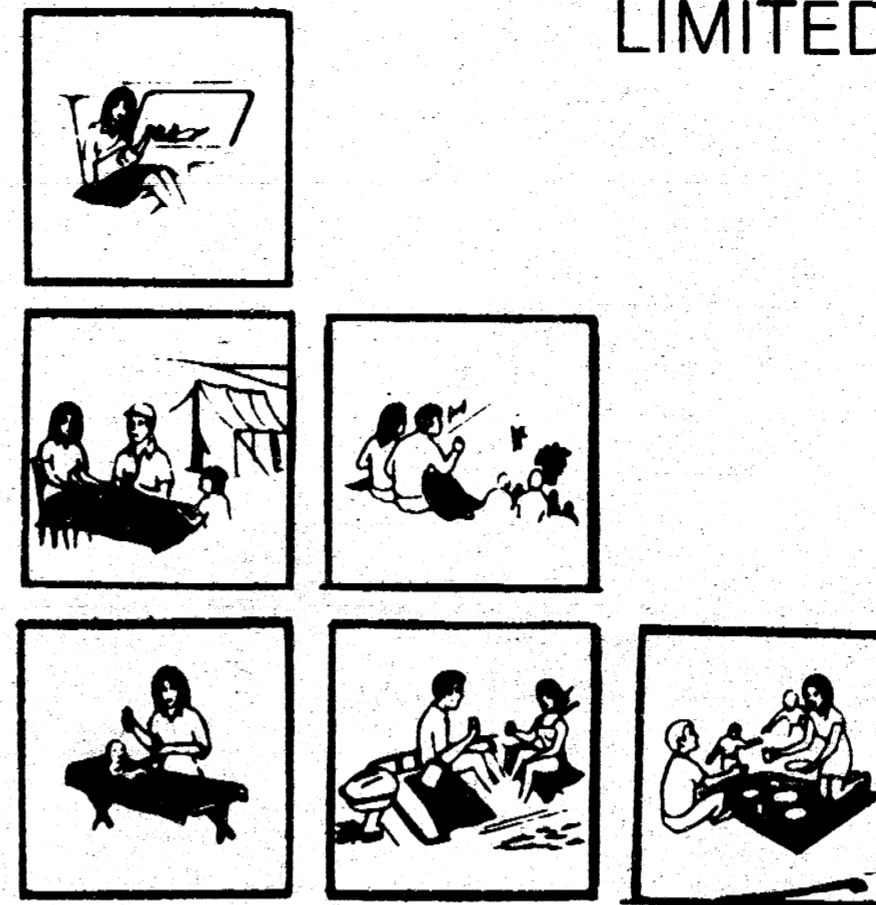
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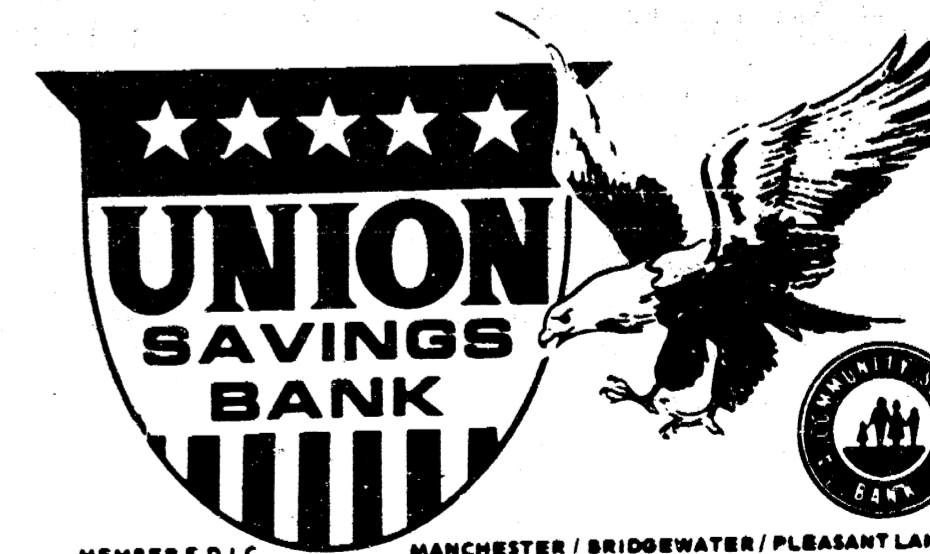
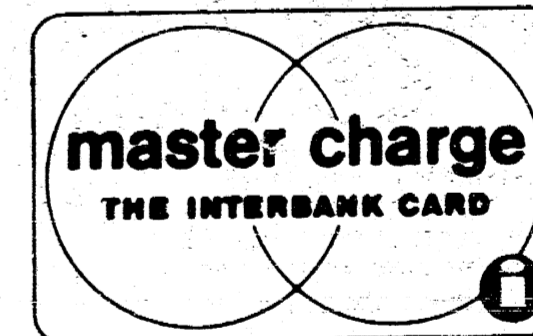

Traveling in Michigan can be as off-beat as floating in a hot air balloon, a trip by chairlift, hang gliding or riding a driverless people mover, reports Automobile Club of Michigan.

For a journey into the past, take a paddle wheel boat cruise or try a ride on a steam engine, horse-drawn carriage, Model T or old-fashioned trolley car.

To explore the world of hot air ballooning, contact one of three Southeast Michigan firms. Trips covering about eight miles and lasting up to two hours cost between \$75 and \$150 for one person. If the pilot carries two passengers in the wicker basket, the cost varies from \$50 to \$87.50 each.

Reservations can be made by calling Balloon Corp. of America, Flint (313-767-2120); Cameron Balloons US, Ann Arbor (313-995-0111), or HighAmerica Ballooncenter, Rochester (313-852-0666).

A ride on the 810 foot chairlift to the summit of Copper Peak, the ski flying hill near Ironwood, offers a view of Michigan, Wisconsin and Minnesota forests contrasted against the blue water of Lake Superior. For information, call (906) 932-3500.

For a different view of Lake Michigan, take hang gliding lessons at Warren Dunes State Park near Bridgman. A day's lesson from the Midwest School of Hang Gliding (616-426-3100) costs \$50 and entails being strapped into a harness attached to a 30-foot-wide sail, then being coaxed off a 20-foot training slope for a try at soaring.

The computer-controlled electric people mover linking Dearborn's Fairlane Town Center shopping complex and the Hyatt Regency Hotel glides over 2,600 feet of elevated guideway in less than two minutes. There is no charge to ride the orange and white cars, which operate daily year-around.

Dearborn's Greenfield Village (313-271-1620) offers several rides from the past. They include a 10-minute spin in a chauffeured Model T car, a 45-minute horse-drawn carriage tour, a ride on a train pulled by an 1873 steam engine and a cruise aboard the Suwanee, a restored 1888 paddle wheel riverboat.

Other paddle wheel boat rides include the Westwood River Queen (616-363-5104), which makes two-hour cruises on the Grand River at Grand Rapids, and the Au Sable River Queen Boats (517-728-9871 or 739-7351), west of Oscoda at Foote and Five Channels dams.

The Huron - Clinton Metropolitan Authority (313-961-5865) can supply information about its paddle wheelers—the Dixie Belle at Metro Beach Metropark near Mount Clemens and the Island Queen at Kensington Metropark near Milford.

On Mackinac Island, where motor vehicles are banned, visitors can take a 1 1/2-hour circle tour by horse-drawn carriage.

Other Michigan railroad attractions include the Boyne Valley Railroad (616-582-2232), which makes a 7.2-mile run between Boyne City and Boyne Falls, and the steam-fired Huckleberry Railroad (313-785-7803 or 736-7100), which passengers board at the Davison Depot in Historical Crossroads Village near Flint for a 9.5-mile round trip through Genesee Recreation Area.

Passengers on the Soo Locks Tour Trains (906-635-5912) ride into Canada across the International Bridge. A close-up view of the Locks is provided by the Soo Locks Boat Tours (906-632-6301 or 632-2512), which pass right through the world's busiest and longest locks.

Another way to Canada is by excursion boat from Detroit to Bob-Lo Island in the Detroit River. Boats to the Canadian recreation island sail several times daily from Memorial Day weekend through Labor Day.

Passengers and autos can travel by ferry across the St. Clair River to Canada or across Lake Michigan to Wisconsin.

CHILD CARE CENTER

Children enrolled in the Chelsea Community Hospital's Child Care Center are enjoying summer together with their friends and teachers. They are spending more time outside in the warm sun. Gardening has become an important aspect of each day as the children observe the growth of their tomato plants, lettuce, zucchini, peas and cucumbers. They are learning about how seeds grow and the importance of water and the sun to plants.

Twice a week the children walk through the Chelsea Fitness Trail to Pierce Park, where they play on the playground equipment, enjoy a picnic lunch and participate in a group story time. During the trip to and from the park, the children have an opportunity to discover the wonders of nature. Often interesting objects found on the trail provide the materials for collages at the art table.

The children are very excited about the new wading pool at the center. On hot days the pool will provide a cool relief to the weather.

Also during the summer, the children

will be learning about birds. They will learn the various parts of a bird's body such as, wings, feathers, etc. Questions such as: where birds live, what they eat and how they move will be explored with the children. Through songs, books and creative movement the children will begin to appreciate the special wonders of birds.

Community workers will be the next unit of study. During this period the children will visit the Chelsea Community Hospital and observe various workers in the health field. A special visit will be made to the Children's parents that work at the hospital. Plans are also being made for a police officer, a firefighter and a letter carrier to visit the center and explain to the children about their occupations.

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

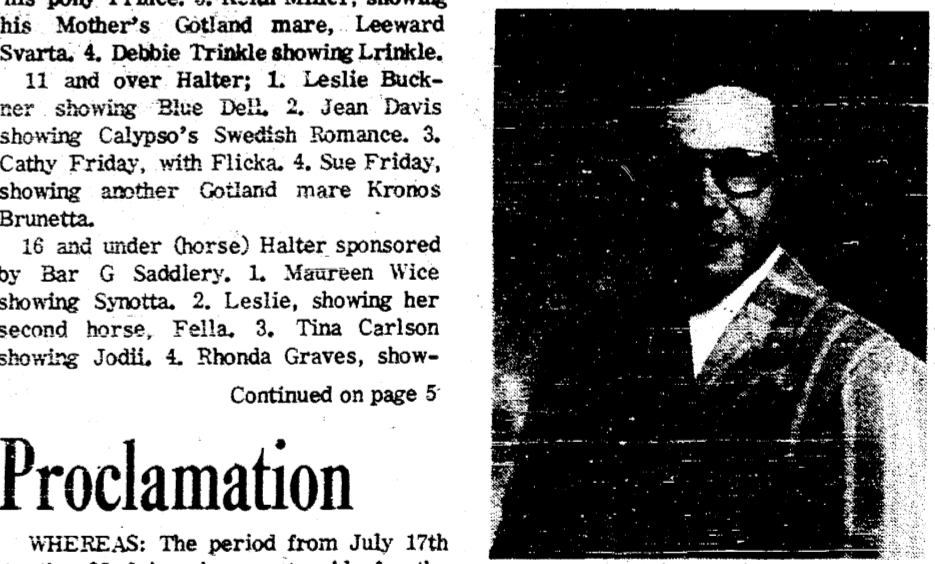
