### The Growth of A Company

(Continued from last week's Enterprise on the growth of the Double A Products in Manchester.)

During this development period and even today the largest competitor which Double A faced was Vickers, Inc. Vickers was large enough and had enough of the hydraulic market that it was able to set the price of all of the various models which were being produced. About the best Double A could do was to match these prices. Also Vickers had excellent quality and Double A had no way to beat them in that field. The only competitive field open to Double A was in the field

of service and at that they worked very hard. Vickers had long deliveries and we could beat that, and over the years we managed to steal several Vickers customers and became a second source to the larger machine tool builders.

Double A adopted the same method of marketing their valves thru distributors and still does at the present time, although there have been quite a few changes in distributors. In fact there are only two of the original distributors still handling valves and pumps manufactured by Double A. Upton's original objective was to achieve sales of \$25,000 per month. When we achieved this we were amazed to discover that his new goal was to be \$50,000 per month, only to discover that when this was achieved his new goal was yet higher. Needless to say the business grew until in 1957 it had reached better than 3.5 million in gross sales, with employment around 225.

One of the problems which the company faced was that it did not manufacture pumps and hydraulic motors which are the source of power in any circuit. It did establish, however, a good relationship with a company that manufactured these items and needed valves to go with them. This was the Rosaen Co. of Detroit which consisted of a father and two sons. The father was a genius with pumps as were his two sons, Borge and Nils. Through their cooperation and design of circuits Double A was to land large contracts with Allis Chalmers and Bowen, McLaughlin York Corp. for the production of tank retrievers and later the Bomarc and Tital missiles.

In order to fill some of these contracts Double A became the sole distributor for Chamberlain Industries of London, England, manufacturers of large hydraulic motors. These motors were exceptionally rugged and dependable. They had low

speed and were capable of producing continuous torque of 16,000 ft.-lbs. They were designed for use on winches, conveyors, plasters, mobile equipment, tunneling equipment, lifts, steering gears, and cable winders.

In 1957 the Rosaen Co. was sold to New York Airbrake who moved the plant to Galesburg, Michigan and who also started negotiations to purchase Double A. The main objection which Mr. Upton had to this move was that he could not get a definite commitment from New York Airbrake that the plant would not be moved. Another company that was interested in buying Double A was Brown & Sharpe Mfg. Co. of Providence R.I. They definitely had no intention of moving the plant and the sale was consummated on December 17, 1957. The sale was strictly on a stock transfer basis where six Double A shares were traded for one Brown & Sharpe share. Early in 1958 Mr. Upton heard that the Gerotor May Corp. of Baltimore was for sale. This company made a series of hydraulic pumps and Mr. Upton convinced Brown & Sharpe that this company would be a good addition to Double A. This sale was completed and a new building was built to accommodate the manufacturing capabilities of this company. A short time later Mr. Upton was able to purchase a new Rosaen Co. which was started by the brothers of the old company and was manufacturing power units for the hydraulic industries. Thus by the end of 1958 Double A could offer its customers all the required components for a complete hydraulic circuit

with the exception of cylinders.

All the additions of these new companies brought about several changes in the management group. The old Board of Directors was abolished. Mr. Upton became President of Double A. John Pippenger was Chief engineer, and Borge Rosaen became Sales Manager. George Diefenderfer was the Purchasing Agent, and Gladys Koopman was Head Bookkeeper. During the years of 1947 and 1957 Double A had spent considerable time trying to organize and help with the establishment of a code for this new hydraulic industry. They had to establish symbols for each valve which was offered so that the salesman or engineer of any company could draw diagrams of circuits which would be understood by each member of the industry. Furthermore sales people had to be trained to understand hydraulic applications so that they could make the correct suggestions to users and manufacturers of original equipment. To do this properly meetings and seminars had to be set up all over the country as well as in Manchester. They even established a Fluid Power Society of which each manufacturer of hydraulic components was a member to establish specifications regarding performance, leakage, and special characteristics to be found in each type of valves and pumps produced. Thus they established a unified code under which items could be manufactured.

In January 1962 Mr. H.H. Upton retired from the company and on January 25 of that same year was given a testimonial

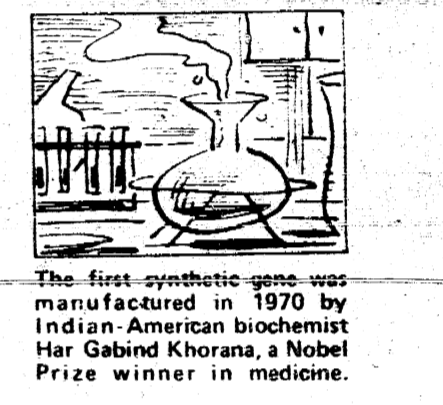
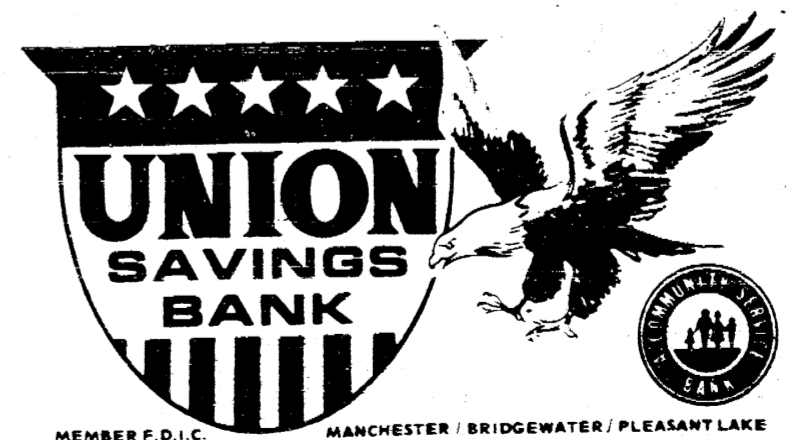

dinner at the Civic Auditorium where 250 people attended. In attendance were such men as James C. Hendley, Harry Sutton as Master of Ceremonies, Henry D. Sharpe, Jr., President of Brown & Sharpe Mfg. Co., and many others. Mr. Upton was presented with a Silver Tray which was presented by Dan J. Boutell, Spokesman for the Business men of Manchester and a Gold Letter Opener, presented by Harry Sutton, in behalf of the Village Council. Mr. Upton was acclaimed as the man that put MAN into Manchester and for his never tiring interest in the community.

His place was taken by his son H.H. Upton, Jr. Jabe as he was commonly known had come to Double A in 1948. He was a graduate in engineering and Business Administration of the University of Michigan and had been working in sales and engineering of the company since that time. He stayed in the position as President until the middle of 1966 when he purchased Malloy Lithoprinting in Ann Arbor and is still running that organization today.

In the middle of 1964 Double A became interested in establishing sales organizations in Europe and other places of the world. It built an assembly plant in High Wycombe, England, just north east of London. To run this plant they sent to England their Controller, Paul Traumbach, a task for, and was pleasantly surprised to receive the position of Export Manager and spent the next three years working with Paul establishing companies in Germany, Italy, France, and the Netherlands.

Essentially the basic reason for entering into the World market is because you can produce a product cheaper than it

can be produced in the country to which you export. Added to the cost of the product, however, must be the cost of freight and the cost of duty to be paid on imports. Both of these items vary a great deal due to the mode of transport which is open to you due to the method used by which the product is imported. The duty on parts is much lower than the duty on the complete unit and thus Double A shipped only fully machined parts and let the plant in England assemble them into complete units. Overseas Double A tried to use the same sales technique as in the U.S. that is by establishing distributors in various countries such as France, Italy, Germany, and others. One thing Double A overlooked that in these countries it was a practice to sell complete hydraulic systems rather than individual units and perhaps it was for this reason that Double A eventually set up its own sales organizations in these various countries. It must also be remembered that at the time Double A entered the world market most of the technical know-how was in the U.S. and foreign countries where more or less just starting with the transmission of power through fluid components. Today this is no longer true and technical know-how is about even with the U.S. We held the position of export manager until our retirement and by that time Double A equipment was being sold throughout the whole world.

Herb Upton's presidency was taken over by Don Beach and later by Fred Gierny and at the present is in the hands of Clyde Nixon who for several years was director of the English Plant and its European contingents. Double A sales have flourished and today are in the neighborhood of \$25-\$30 Million per year. One of the characteristics of Double A which always impressed Henry Sharpe, President of Brown & Sharpe was the

comradre which existed in the old plant. It had always been one of Mr. Upton's habits of hiring families as employees. The first of these was the Clisham family consisting of a father and two sons. They stayed with the company for about five years with the exception of Jimmy who then continued arguing. He won, damn it! The Brown & Sharpe people frequently laugh when they run across ways down the old Double A. But then on the other hand none of them ever worked with a growing company. We started out with part time employees and at present Double A has around 250 and 300. We started out with no money and now they have millions. We started out with machines that we found in junk yards and now they are the best on the market. They can laugh if they want to, but they had not been for our struggles they would not even be there. 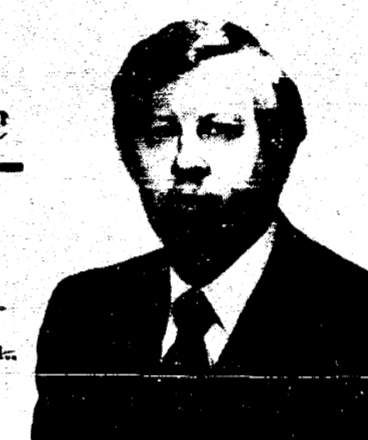
### 19th District State Senate Candidate

There is little question but what the lot proposals on taxes are generating interest than many of the legislative candidates. While I have no disagreement with this attention, we should all recognize that the adoption of any one or more of these proposals results in a great deal of responsibility and decision being left to the legislature. Therefore, it becomes extremely important that those elected should not only be willing to accept these responsibilities, but that they should also have the experience, understanding and legislative ability necessary to carry out the will of the people.

The political process is more than just saying yes or no or standing stubbornly on the sidelines opposing this or that. It is being able to hammer out through the process of negotiations the best possible solution to the problem. This requires the leadership to rally support for one's position.

I personally favor the adoption of the Tax Limitation concept. This proposal would be an aid to the legislature in adding the line on spending. I have also been working toward placing a complementary and compatible proposal on the ballot to deal directly with the property tax issue, something the Tax Limitation proposal fails to do. I am the primary sponsor of the Governor's local optional income tax proposal. This would allow-- by vote of the school district's residents-- the option of increasing their personal state income tax by 2% and remove 22 mills of property tax. This provides local control just as with the property tax. This feature is very important for if we were to shift to more and more state funding it will mean the Golden Rule will apply. I.e. whoever has the gold establishes the rules.

The second major issue of importance is reform the worker's compensation law. Its low dollar benefits for job-related injuries on one hand and the extremely high costs to the employers serve neither the best interests of labor or management. This is the single most important factor to business and industry's decision to leave the state. We need the jobs for they have a direct bearing on the economy, welfare load, and unemployment. A loss of jobs results in an increased tax burden on those remaining taxpayers. The Democrat controlled legislature has failed to move on the worker's compensation issue. I believe it is time to reform the

## 4-H Handicapped Riding Program

The 4-H Handicapped Riding Program started its first classes in Washtenaw County on July 10, 1978. Barbara Wahn, instructor, reported that twenty-six students are presently participating in the classes which meet four times a week. Student response to the program has been nothing less than enthusiastic. Some showed up the first day in cowboy hats and boots, or with treats for the horses. There were numerous smiles as the students practiced mounting the horses and riding around the ring for the first time. Class activities stressed improvement in balance, posture, and muscle coordination. Observers could see that the program was "fun" for the handicapped students in addition to being therapeutic.

Since many of these students are restricted from activities such as this, due

to their handicaps - special equipment has been provided to accommodate their individual needs. All participants wear safety helmets, and breakaway stirrups are used so that the riders leg cannot get caught. Body harnesses are provided for those students who require additional support. A mounting platform is used to assist students in getting on and off the horses. Volunteers are another one of the safeguards built into the program. They assist the students by serving as sidewalkers and leaders, in addition to clarifying the instructors directions and giving encouragement to the rider.

Community response to this initial pilot program has been exceptional. The 4-H steering committee would like to thank the

many businesses, local 4-H clubs and private individuals, who have donated both supplies and energy towards the development of this program. Specific groups from the area who have contributed their services include: Dr. Mike Spensley, Lee Knapper and Bob and Katrene Starling.

For the past two summers many young people have been employed by the Village of Manchester through a state grant program called the W.O.R.C. work program (Work Opportunities Resource Corps). Their work has consisted mainly of mowing, brush control, painting, drainage work and park maintenance. Some of their projects have been: painting picnic tables, restrooms, backstops and trash cans; putting in and painting the new posts around Carr Park; weeding potanias; clearing hazardous intersections; picking up trash weekly along village streets; and mowing all the park lawns. The majority of their time this summer has been spent at the site of the new Child Bro Park located behind the water tower. This area, which was thickly wooded and overgrown with brush is now well cleared and mowed and represents the good work that has been accomplished through the W.O.R.C. Work Program.

The objectives of the eight week long program, which started in 1977, are to provide summer employment for youths 15-21, to do conservation work on public lands, to help give people an awareness and appreciation of our environment, and to provide employment training through the development of skills, attitudes and work habits of persons participating.

These sixteen are divided into two groups of eight and are supervised by Barbara Korth and Susan Korth.

Mr. Bruce Daniels, the program officer, has worked hard to arrange this worthwhile program and hopefully Manchester will receive a grant again next year also so it can continue.
