



### Recipes for a Family Reunion Feast

#### FROZEN PARTY SALAD

- 1 cup Miracle Whip salad dressing
- 1 8-oz. pkg. Philadelphia Brand cream cheese
- 1 20-oz. can pineapple chunks, drained
- 1 16-oz. can apricot halves, drained, quartered
- 1/2 cup chopped maraschino cherries
- 2 tablespoons confectioners' sugar
- Few drops red food coloring
- 2 cups Kraft miniature marshmallows
- 1 cup heavy cream, whipped

Gradually add salad dressing to softened cream cheese, mixing until well blended. Stir in fruit, sugar and food coloring; fold in marshmallows and whipped cream. Pour into 9 x 5-inch loaf pan. Freeze. Unmold. 10 to 12 servings. Variation: Substitute one 16-oz. can peach slices, drained, for apricots.

#### BANANA MALLOW PARTY PIE

- 1 3 1/2-oz. pkg. vanilla pudding and pie filling mix
- 150 cups Kraft miniature marshmallows
- 1 cup heavy cream, whipped
- 2 bananas
- 1 9-inch baked vanilla wafer crust, chilled

Prepare mix as directed for pie filling on package, except using 1 3/4 cups milk. Cover surface of pie filling with waxed paper or transparent wrap; chill. Mix until well blended; fold in marshmallows and whipped cream. Slice bananas into crust. Pour filling over bananas. Chill several hours or overnight.

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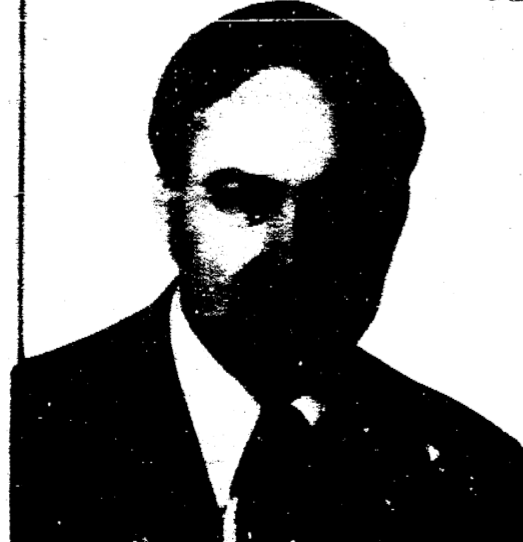

In reply to your letter in last week's Enterprise. First, the donation by the Theatre, the Jaycees worked with the Theatre to sell tickets and help publicize the play from which the money came. Yes, the theatre could have sat empty that day and done nothing, but it didn't. It made many children happy, it helped publicize the theatre and it helped support the fireworks. For many people who attended, it was a first. Many of these same people will go back and see plays which will help support the theatre.

Second, the donation from the Village. You stated it came from a Special Fund, but where did this money come from? Well, every year the Jaycees put up and take down the Christmas decorations. The Village agreed to pay us to do that (\$150). Prior to last year we had not received money from the Village because we were well off financially, therefore we did not accept the money. They also would match any donation we made towards the purchase of new decorations, therefore money was set aside for that reason. You also said the fireworks is not a community service. Well, we think differently. Any time you have approximately 2000 people from our community join together for an event, we would say that is a community service.

You also stated that if the Jaycees want the fireworks, they should obtain the monies. We do not feel that it is a question of the Jaycees wanting them, but the people of the community wanting them. We do this for the people. It

takes time and work to organize the events that take place on the 4th of July, such as the parade, picnic and children's games.

Again we will say it, if we had \$1.00 (2c a week) from each person who saw the fireworks (just one dollar) that would have given us approximately \$2,000.00., then we would not have needed the donations you complained about. We heard many compliments about the fireworks. If they were so good, why didn't people donate \$1.00 towards them. Many people were very generous giving \$5 and more. But what about the majority of the people who did not bother to donate anything at all? We can't see where \$1 or \$5 will make that much difference in the way a person lives. We feel the Board which sat at the bank, should have been full of names 2 weeks prior to the fireworks. If not then, surely that night when everyone was there to watch the display.

So, you see, the Jaycees did work to get the money. The donations were donations, but were made possible with the help of many organizations and individuals. By the way did you donate?

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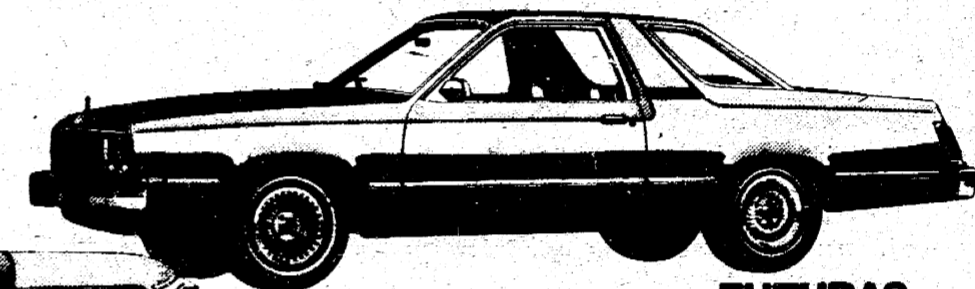


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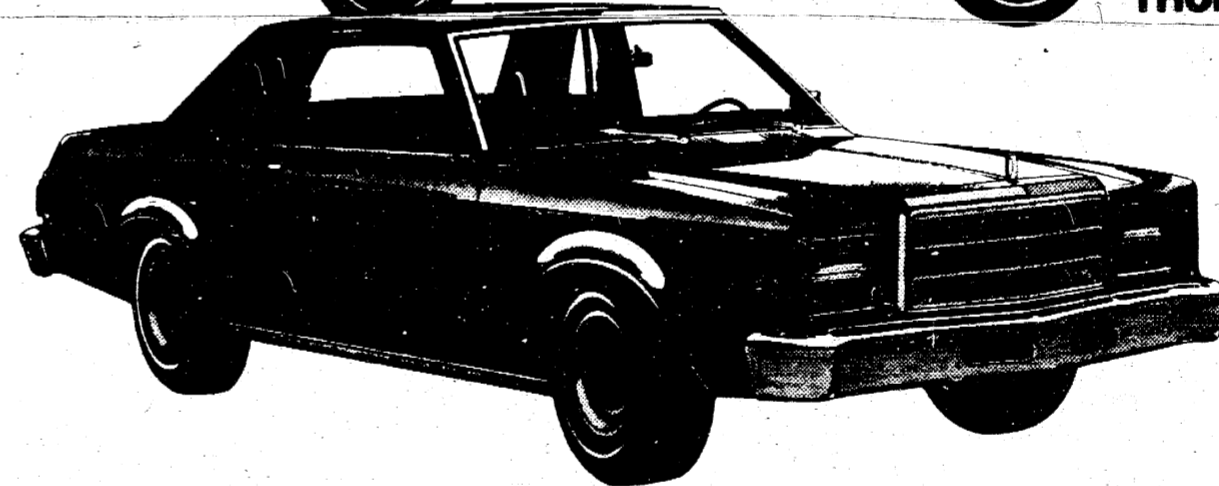

## Outreach Program

As of July 1, 1978, you may see your first postage stamps in Michigan, except for postage stamps. This change allows you to buy your first stamps at the post office or other sales office nearest your home, even if it is in another county.

## Manchester Village Planning Commission

May 8, 1978

The regular meeting of the Manchester Village Planning Commission was held at the Village Hall, with members present; Broucek, Whittington, Leeson, Daniels, Tracy, Krauss, Chapin and Duncan.

The meeting was called to order at 7:40 p.m. by Ch. Broucek.

Minutes of the meeting of March 22 were reviewed and a correction made. On the motion by Whittington, seconded by Chapin, the amended minutes were unanimously approved.

Mr. and Mrs. Robert Dorr were present to request a variance from the Ordinance in order to construct a garage on the premises at 508 East Main St., with allowances for only 4 feet of rear yard set-back, and 4 feet of side yard. It was moved by Whittington to recommend to Council that the variance be allowed; seconded by Tracy, and unanimously approved.

Mr. James Cox was present to request a variance from the Ordinance in order to construct a carport on the premises at 118 Riverside Drive, with allowance for only 5 feet of side yard. (The structure would be 10 feet from the nearest building on adjacent property.) It was moved by Chapin to recommend to Council that the variance be allowed; seconded by Daniels, and unanimously approved.

Mrs. Harold Arnett was present to request a conditional use permit for the

establishment of a "one chair" beauty shop in the basement of her home at 207 South Clinton Street. The zoning of the District is R-1B (Single-Family Urban Residential District). There is not space on the existing premises for required off-street parking. It was moved by Chapin to recommend to Council that the conditional use permit be granted, if provision is made for adequate off-street parking for all vehicles as per the Zoning Ordinance. The motion was seconded by Duncan, and unanimously approved.

Mr. D.E. Limpert was present to apply for a change in zoning on that property described as "Thomas Morgan Addition Lots 8, 9, 10, 11, 12", on the southwest corner of Duncan and Morgan Streets, from the present zoned use of R-1B (Single-Family Urban Residential District) to I-3 (Urban Industrial District). He also is requesting the vacation of the platted alley on the west side of these properties; the alley is between and parallel to Division and Morgan Streets.

Following discussion and verbal offering of alternative arrangements, the following recommendations to Council were moved by Daniels: that favorable consideration be given to Mr. Limpert's application for rezoning of the properties described as "Thomas Morgan Addition - Lots 8, 9, 10, 11, 12", from R-1B to I-3, provided that Mr. Limpert simultaneously apply for rezoning of the properties facing on Duncan Street and extending to the Village Limit, currently zoned I-2 (General Industrial District), such that the parcel generally north of Duncan Street be re-

zoned R-1B, and the parcel generally south of Duncan Street be rezoned R-3 (Medium Density Multi-Family Residential District). Further, that Mr. Limpert's request to vacate the alley between Division and Morgan Streets shall be denied. The motion was seconded by Tracy, and the verbal vote was all Aye, except Nay by Chapin and Broucek. The motion was declared approved.

After a brief review of other incidental items, the meeting was declared adjourned at 9:50 p.m.

WHO SHOULD CONTROL INFLATION?

If you're fed local schools should be controlled by and answerable to your community, that what your children learn should be a joint effort of their teachers and you — you may be about to lose that.

Let's look at three recent developments. First, a recommendation by the Carter Administration that a cabinet-level Department of Education be created. Administrators of a cabinet-level department of education aren't going to sit back and let the direction of education continue as a local function — not if they want to keep their jobs. The very nature of a

federal bureaucracy is a direct and total. The second development is passage of Proposition 13 in California, a state constitutional amendment to restrict property taxes — the state financial support of schools and teachers. That triggered development number three, a call by the president of the National Education Association for federal funding of local schools to replace the dollars local schools might lose as a result of property tax cuts. The tragedy is that local school boards might opt for this one, might campaign for state federal dollars for local schools rather than exercise their management

authority to tighten their budgets. An financial support and budget control pass from local school boards to a state or federal body, as was direction of what your children study — and with it comes a diminishing responsiveness of teachers and schools to the community — to you — a tragedy that need not happen.

I read in the Enterprise, with a great deal of interest, the history of Double A, and I find that a great many others also did. And then I thought of the statement that J.A.W. made that more than half of our population had arrived in this vale of tears sometime after World War II, and it seemed to me that a great deal of the history of Manchester during past years—from 1928 to 1945—might be interesting to this paper's readers, and so with the encouragement of ye editor, we shall proceed to recount some of the incidents, some humorous and some not, some trivial and some not, that we remember about the town.

We arrived in town in the summer of 1928 and came to stay for a couple of months but those few weeks lasted 18 years.

Our first glimpse came when we arrived on the morning train and proceeded to hitch a ride up town from the depot with "Duck" Kirk in his model T pickup in which was the morning mail which he took to the post office next to the People's Bank where the Sutton Agency now is, on what was then referred to as Exchange Place, not Main Street.

That we were disappointed in our first glimpse of the town was rather an understatement. The main street, and all the other, was unpaved and dusty. There were sidewalks but no curbs and gutters and

On those days the country kids went to country schools; there was no consolidated district nor any school buses.) After it had been discussed for some time Jim, with a sly grin on his face turned to the group and said, "I know where the increase came from. It's because of that morning train that the railroad put on some six years ago. It comes through town whistling for every crossing at the ungodly hour of five fifty."

After the laughter died down the audience agreed that that was, after all, a very logical reason.
