Dear Editor:

I was very much interested in your article this week "In Retrospect." It is slightly ahead of me. I worked in the post office at the time that picture was taken. The post master was Frank Koebbe and the carriers were: 1. Lawrence Wurster, 2. Tom Thorne, 3. Fred Tracy, substitute carrier, Henry Leckardt, Walter's father

4. Merrick Birch and 5. John Schaffer. The man in the white shirt (unknown) was Bill Chase and the woman in front (unknown) was Mrs. Gail Waters-Cathey. In 1918 Bill Chase, LeRoy Marx and Webster Schill enlisted in the army so Edna Lanning replaced Bill.

We put up mail for four trains on the Ypsilanti-Hilldale branch and six trains on the Jackson-Toledo branch daily. The bags were carted to the railroad station by Enoch Silkworth and his horse drawn boat.

We worked from 6:30 in the morning until 7:00 at night with an hour and half for dinner. I earned \$1.00 a day and I think the most Bill got was \$12 a week. The mail went out on time and was received by the railway mail clerk. There is really no excuse for the poor mail service now, however it is not the fault of the local post office, they can't deliver what they don't receive on time.

A Special Meeting of the Board of Education was called to order at 8:05 P.M. in the High School Library by President Corliss Mick. Members Present: Horning, Bunney, Kensler, Mick, Macomber and Walkow. Absent: Willey. Administrators Present: Masten, McGuire.

AUDIENCE PARTICIPATION: Pres. Mick asked the audience if anyone wanted to address the Board on a concern they had. It could be done at this time or just prior to discussion by the Board. If the item was not on the agenda, it could be discussed but no decision would be made at this time.

Mrs. Rodriguez stated she had several questions to direct to Mr. Masten regarding the removal of the crossing guard at M-52 and Main St.

Pres. Mick asked her to hold her questions until that item came up on the agenda.

APPOINTMENT OF BOARD MEMBER: Secretary Kensler read letters from 4 area residents requesting appointment to the Board to fill the vacancy of Mrs. Willey. They consisted of 1) Mr. Lavera Lench, 2) Mr. Paul DeFronse, 3) Mr. James Curley and 4) Mr. Fred Munson.

After a brief discussion, Mrs. Kensler nominated Mr. Fred Munson to fill the vacancy. Mr. Bunney nominated James Curley. Supported by Walkow.

Moved by Macomber supported by Horning that nominations be closed. Yeas: Horning, Bunney, Kensler, Macomber and

Walkow. Motion carried.

Pres. Mick stated she would call a roll call vote and asked each Board member to state the name of the person they supported. Bunney - Curley, Kensler - Munson, Walkow - Curley, Macomber - Curley, Horning - Curley.

Pres. Mick declared James Curley elected to the Board to fill the vacancy of Mrs. Willey.

TAX LEVY: Moved by Bunney that the 1978 tax levy for school purposes be as follows: Allocated operating 11.22 mills, special operating 18.38 mills, 1967 debt .18 mills, 1967 debt .45 mills, 1970 debt .18 mills for a total school tax of 30.41 mills.

Supported by Macomber. Yeas: Horning, Bunney, Kensler, Walkow and Macomber. Motion carried.

WORKMAN'S COMPENSATION INSURANCE: After a discussion it was moved by Bunney that Workman's Compensation Insurance be awarded to Manchester Community Schools at a premium of \$8,646.00 for awarded to Corporate Services acting as Agent for Michigan Association of School Boards, self insurance program. Supported by Walkow. Yeas: Horning, Bunney, Kensler, Macomber and Walkow. Motion carried.

BUS INSURANCE: Moved by Walkow that Bus Fleet Insurance for the 1978-79 school year be awarded to State Farm Insurance Company at a premium of \$2,540.83. Supported by Horning. Yeas: Horning, Bunney, Kensler, Walkow and Macomber. Motion carried.

SALE OF OLD BUSES: Moved by Horning that the bid received for bus no. 24 from Mr. Gibbons in the amount of \$525 be rejected. Supported by Walkow. Yeas: Horning, Bunney, Kensler, Walkow and Macomber. Motion carried.

RESOLUTION TO BORROW ON STATE AID: Moved by Kensler that the school district apply for permission to borrow \$250,000 on 1978-79 anticipated state aid that the Superintendent be authorized to file the application, that the notes shall be dated October 1, 1978 and shall mature no later than September 1, 1979, that the notes will be executed by the president and secretary of the board, that valid bids will be received and that the formal application shall be placed in the official board supplementary file. 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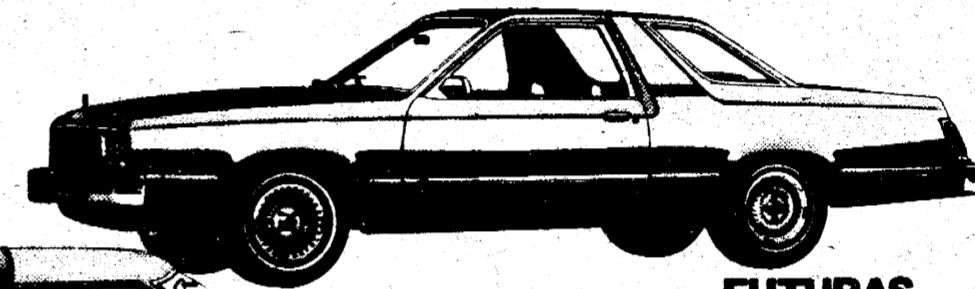

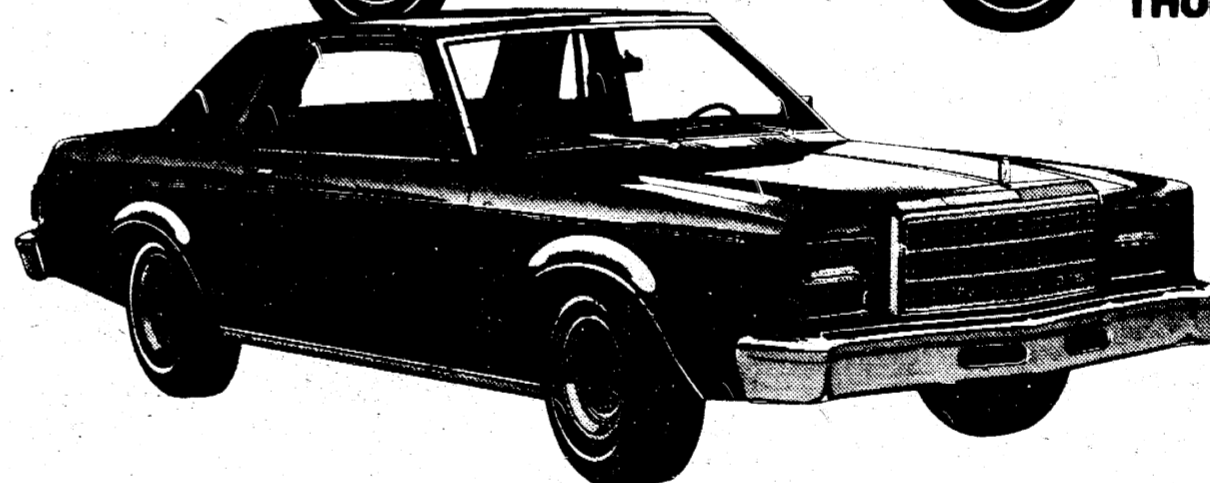

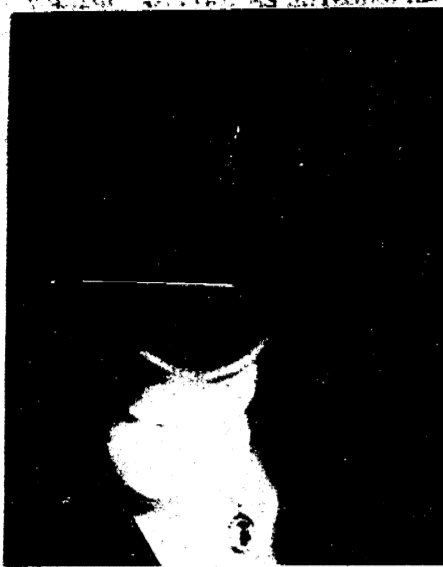

### AGRICULTURE IN ACTION

MICHIGAN FARM BUREAU EXTENSION

#### JAWBONING IN WASHINGTON

Those of us who remember our Sunday School lessons know the Biblical character who slew his enemies with the jawbone of an ass. And there are some in Washington, D.C. today who think that same weapon—possibly derived from the same basic type of animal—can be used to combat inflation.

President Carter has designated his

chief trade negotiator, Ambassador Strauss, as chief jawboner against the evils of inflation, and although Bob Strauss is a nice fellow who cannot be labeled as a relative of that particular species of Biblical beast, he does possess that natural Texas ability to sell ice boxes to Eskimos. Unfortunately, inflation cannot be talked away, and those who advocate such are foisting a cruel hoax on the American people who, by this time, have caught on to the difference between the causes and symptoms of inflation, and know that it is the federal government, jawbone and all, that keeps the hidden tax of inflation going full blast.

Recently, Allan Grant, president of the American Farm Bureau Federation, endorsed the suggestion of Federal Reserve Board Chairman William Miller that Congress take action to delay a further increase in the minimum wage due to take effect next January. Grant said that Congress should indicate it has gotten the message on California's Proposition 13 by cutting the federal budget from five to ten percent across the board.

The truth is that we need to reduce federal spending about \$50 billion, which would leave more in the hands of we, the people, to spend as we see fit. Most of it would be spent in ways that would increase private investment and spending, thus creating more jobs, while at the same time reducing inflation.

Why can't our leaders see this obvious truth?

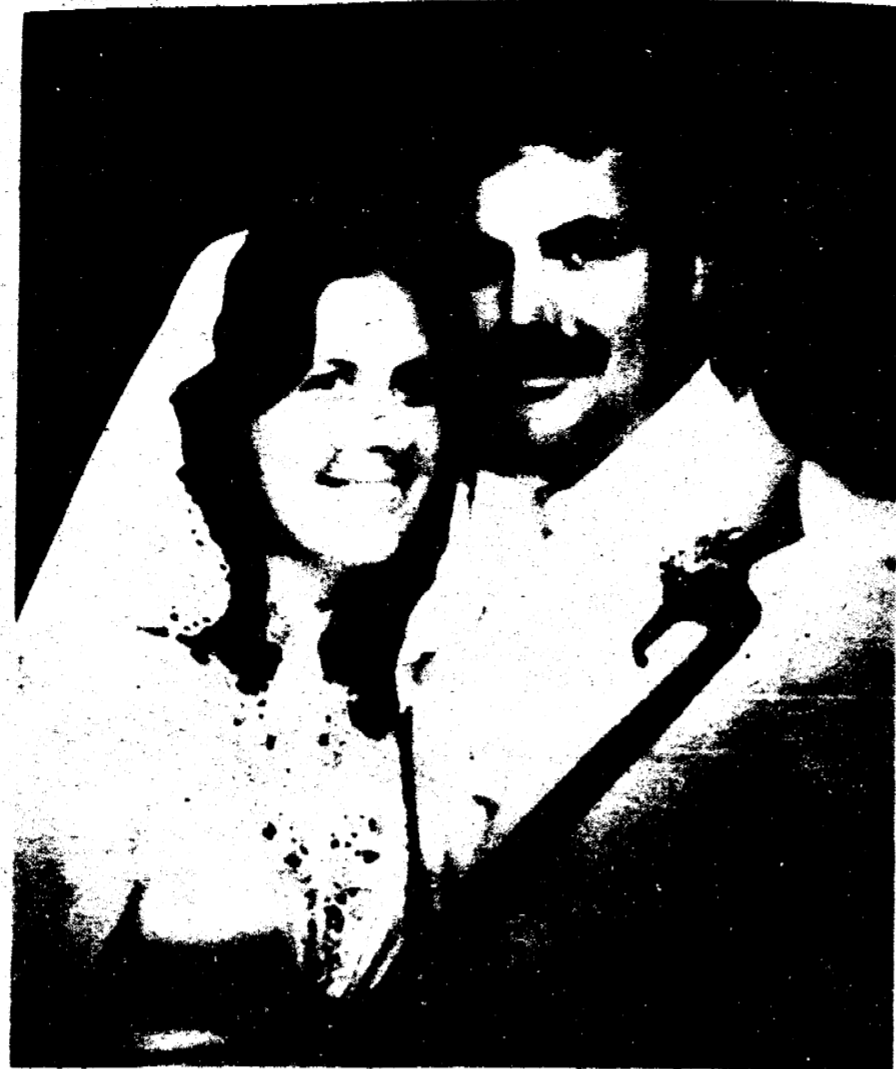

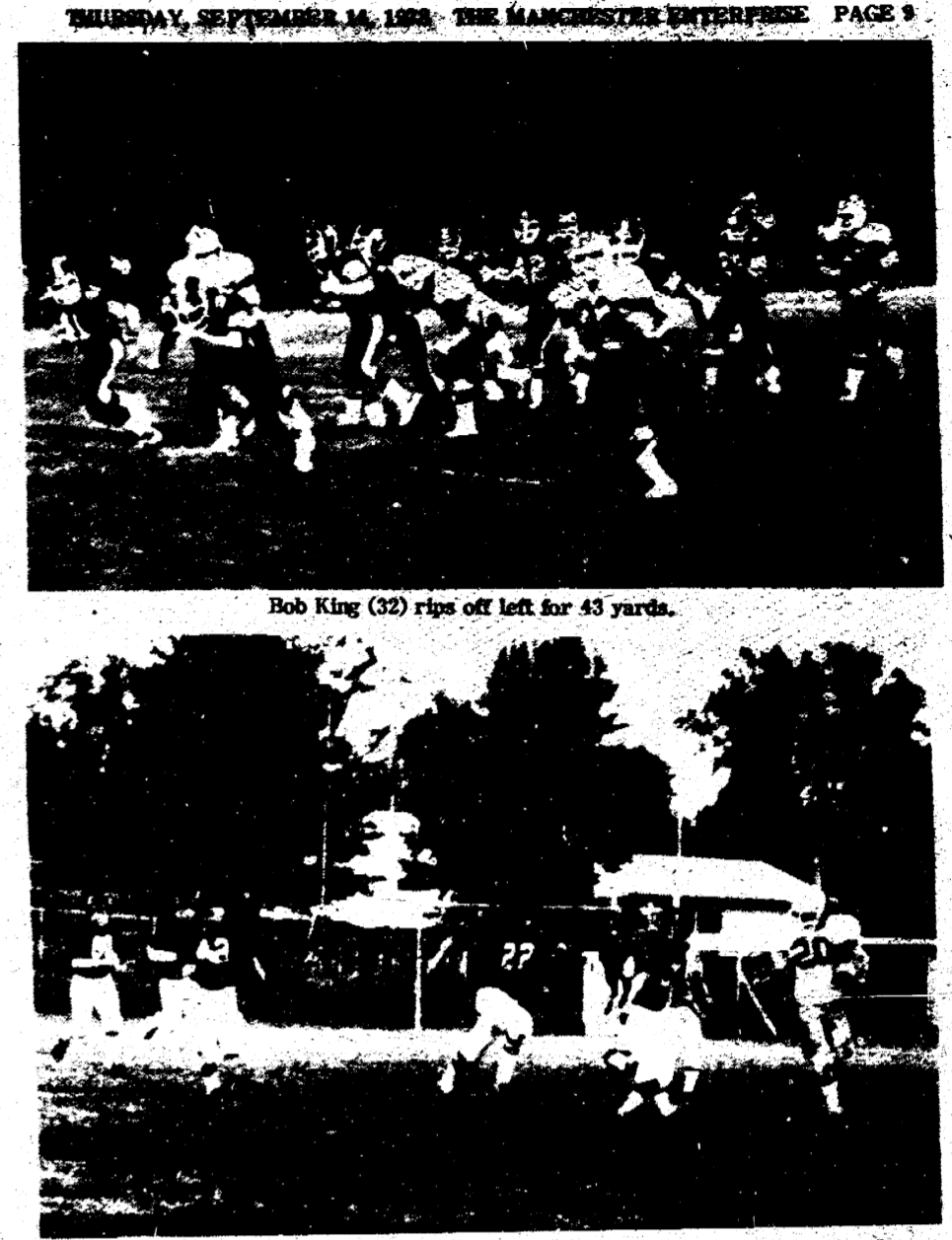

Mr. Raynor B. Snyder was present representing Mr. James Hendley to discuss suggestions and valuation of property owned by Mr. Hendley of East Main St. Schaffer asked to discuss as Council then meets again.

James Scully presented plans of the Knights of Columbus, joined by adjoining Property Owners to pave the entire area of their drive and around building on Madison St. Cost \$5,000.00. He asked permission of Village Council to pave access on old railroad now used as a street at a cost of \$100.00 to the Village. Their parking lot would be open to public parking when no functions are being held in their hall. There were no objections voiced by Council Members.

Mr. John Hinkley of Haab, Black Associates Inc. Architects was present requesting from Village Council variances in setback requirements on Proposed Plans for Manchester Township Offices and Fire Department. Public Hearing scheduled for September 11, 1978 at 8:50 P.M.

## FIRE! OR WHEN THE SIREN BLOWS

The Manchester Township Fire Department has always been a source of community pride. Strangers in town remark about the spiltsecood speed in getting the trucks on the road, no easy task, because our men are all volunteers who are awakened from sleep at night, or called from their regular employment during the daytime.

The "behind the scene" activity is little known to most of us, but these volunteers spend hours of their own time, without pay, to keep the equipment at the ready. The Township does pay them \$5.00 per hour during a fire, but all of the hours of work and upkeep on engines, hoses and equipment is donated by these local men who take such pride in their fire department, that they even periodically visit surrounding fire departments, attend classes in First Aid and fire procedures on their own time, at no cost to the citizens of this community.

In trying to trace the fire department through its history, a lot of which has been lost to us, we did come up with some interesting side-lights on its activity.

At the turn of the century a cistern under the center of the street at Main and Clinton Streets, was the existing "fire hydrant" of its day. This cistern was filled with water by suctioning, from the river, by hose and hand-pump. The hotel, which caught fire twice during these years, was saved both times because of the availability of water in the cistern. Two other cisterns were also used during this time, one was just east of Territorial and Macomb, the other on Duncan near Division. These were all kept filled at all times.

Some of the first equipment gathered together were a hand pump rig, whose side handles folded up, against the tank for storage, and a 30 gallon chemical rig mounted on two wheels. There was also a "Ladder Wagon" which had leather buckets hanging from the sides, to be used as a Bucket Brigade.

After acquiring three or four pieces of fire-fighting machinery, the men who tended them discovered that they had created a FIRE DEPARTMENT! Some of these men were Mel Barbour, Frank Kern, Sweeney Blythe, A. Mathias, Joe Weiss, Frank Lowery, and G. Harrier, Jr.

So they began, in earnest to plan for fire protection. The next pieces of equipment were Tankers, Hose Trucks, and Chemical Trucks. One of the first, was a Steam Truck.

We are still using two Ford chassis built by hand, by Jim Kensler, Gale Koebbe, and Lawrence Scheid. They are mounted with heavy plate steel tanks for carrying great volumes of water, and government surplus pumps which will throw water for several hundred feet.

Our largest truck, lovingly named "Big Dutch" is a 1966 Bean, No. 701. Big Dutch carries its own water and high pressure hose, plus a resuscitator.

Manchester Township Fire Department services Sharon, Freedom, Bridgewater and part of Norvell Townships, and averages 4 runs a month.

## More "In Retrospect"

While we are on the subject of rural mail carriers, let us remember that Merrick Burch was a carrier from 1905 until he retired in 1940. When he became a carrier there were five routes out of Manchester and they were, of course, delivered with a horse drawn mail cart. When the automobile came into use in the 1920's the carriers could cover so much more territory than with a horse drawn vehicle that the five routes were consolidated into four routes and the fifth carrier whose name, if we remember correctly, was Dietle, was transferred to Chelsea.

Besides Burch at that time the other carriers were Wm. Cramer who became a carrier in 1922, Harry Sutton who started in 1924 and Walter Vogt who took over his route in 1923. Following their return home from World War I these fellows looked about for jobs and were lucky enough to become carriers. When Burch retired in 1940 his route was apportioned among the other three and so they remain today.

When we first knew "Bill" Cramer he was, of course, carrier on R-1 and lived up on Ann Arbor hill. We got to know him quite well and were told that he grew up in this vicinity and after his school days he went to the Detroit area where he, always having had a great interest in things thespian, became a professional actor and, having a rather good voice, was very active in one of the Stock companies which offered "legit" drama on the stage there. After several years, however, his parents who continued to live in Manchester, both became semi-invalids and Bill decided that he should return home to care for them. This, he

did and succeeded in becoming a rural mail carrier.

A few years later they both passed away and Mr. Cramer, after a couple of years married and continued to live in the family home here.

Bill was active in his church, in the K of C's and in all phases of community activities, especially when they pertained to things musical or dramatic.

He always liked children and became personally acquainted with all those on his route. In this process he found that some of them were rather ignored by Santa Claus so he set out to pinch hit for Santa.

One Christmas he obtained a Santa Claus suit and purchased enough candy, oranges, popcorn balls and the trimmings so that each child on his route could have a Christmas stocking. And so the day before Christmas each year for several years, his wife drove his car around the route and he in his Santa suit left a sock full of goodies for each child on the route. Many of these children still remember his thoughtfulness.

Several years after his retirement he suffered a chronic illness and was confined to the hospital for some time before he died. Soon afterwards his wife passed away and their only surviving relative was a niece who soon afterwards, sold the old home and all traces of the Cramers vanished from Manchester.

Bill's sense of humor was rather priceless. One year Manchester held a Homecoming and among the attractions of the carnival which accompanied the festivities
