WE DID IT! DUTCH EDGE HUDSON

It seemed as if we'd been losing to the Tigers for an eternity but Friday we turned the table. The Dutch totaled 199 yards of offense to their 80 as our halfback John Mooneyham nearly completed that much himself (77 yards) but it was his 6 point TD and 4 points in conversations that sent Hudson home losers.

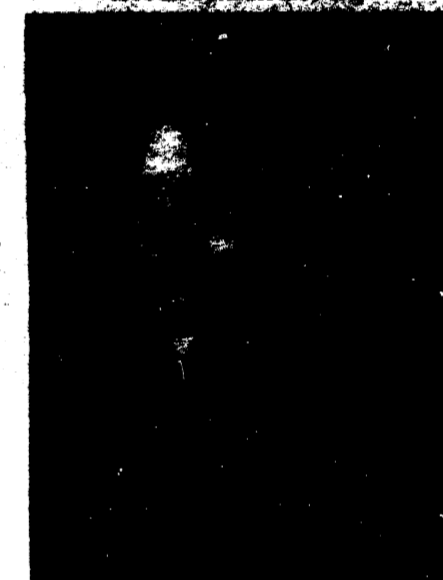
We booted to them to start the battle and in 3 plays they moved 5 yards so punted. On our first drive we advanced only 2 yards farther than Hudson so on 4th and 3 Jeff Geiger left-footed it. The Tigers began driving as in 4 plays they had gone 23 yards and added 2 firsts. A penalty helped us stop them so again they punted. We got a pretty good return—but—a flag on the ground was for a clip so we set up deep in our territory at the 10. On first down Droug Drouare blasted off right for 8 but then disaster—there was a mimp on the hand off and the leather fell to the turf only to have a Tiger pounce on it at the 12. It took 3 power sweeps by the same guy each time to get 6 at 3:41 and it was #40 also scampering for the 2 point conversion, 8-0. Upon receiving the kick we had 5 runs and an incomplete pass moved us from the 37 to the 49 before stalling, so punted. Hudson only tanged (1,2,3, kick) so we started in good position on the 40. I should add the quarter ended 2 plays ago. The Dutch were determined to strike as Bob Weirich carried 6 times in this 9 play drive for 22 yards but the clincher was Mooneyham's 26 yard run for the TD. It also was Mooney zipping right to tie it 8-8 at 6:42. Hudson had control for 4 downs then kicked and was thrust forward 9 times before kicking. They had possession when the gun sounded, 8-8.

We got first touch of the pigskin and proceeded to march right down the field. In 6 plays we'd advanced from our 31 to their 40 when Craig Rogers cocked his arm and threw to Geiger. This aerial for 15 set up first and 10 at the 25. Now it was Drouare as he zoomed left and was not tackled. Rogers handed to Mooneyham who cut-distanced the Tigers for 2 points so at 8:33 we led 16-8.

It was here the defenses took over as both offenses punted 4 times taking up all remaining 3rd quarter and most of the final. With under 5 minutes left Hudson mis-coed and we recovered but unfortunately on the first play we fumbled right back. On 4th and 13 on our 30 the Tiger quarterback fell back to pass—launched it—and in the scramble for possession a Tiger hugged it at the 6. The clock ticked under 2 minutes and on 4th and goal back at the 10 it went to.

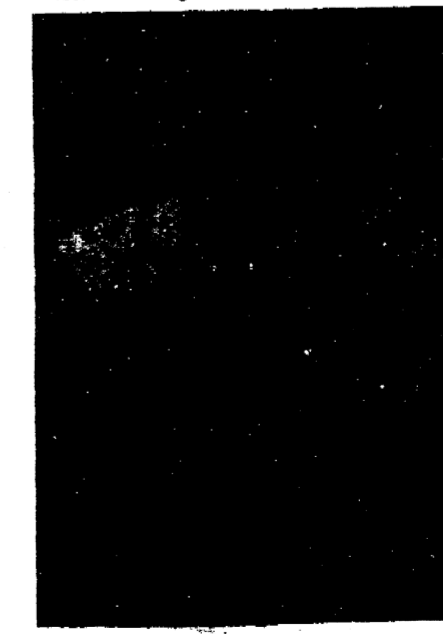

PSAT/NMSQT Exam at High School

Richard Parson, guidance director at Manchester High School, has announced that juniors will be able to join over one million other students around the world in taking the Preliminary Scholastic Aptitude Test/National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test (PSAT/NMSQT) this fall.

The test, co-sponsored by the College Board and National Merit Scholarship Corporation, is an important step in making college plans.

Scheduled for October 24th, at Manchester, the PSAT/NMSQT measures verbal and mathematical aptitude—two abilities important in doing college work. The test can also lead to other opportunities for high school students. For example, students can ask to participate in the College Board's Student Search Service which helps colleges learn about students like them.

By taking the PSAT/NMSQT, they can

enter the competition for scholarships administered by the National Merit Scholarship Corporation and can get a good idea of what the Scholastic Aptitude Test (SAT) is like.

Along with their score reports, students will receive a copy of ABOUT YOUR PSAT/NMSQT SCORES, a booklet that contains valuable how-to information about estimating SAT scores; finding out where to get and how to use detailed information about colleges and financial aid; and planning for financing a college education.

Also, students can use the College Board's College Handbook, to compare their scores with those of enrolled students at more than 2,800 colleges and universities.

ANNOUNCEMENT OF INTENT TO PERFORM FLOOD ELEVATION STUDY

The Federal Insurance Administration of the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development announced today that under authority of the National Flood Insurance Act of 1968 (P.L. 90-448), as amended, and the Flood Disaster Protection Act of 1973 (P.L. 93-234). It will fund a detailed study of the flood hazard areas in the Township of Sharon, Washtenaw County.

The study will be performed for the Federal Insurance Administration by MP&S/SH&G, A Joint Venture of McNamee, Porter and Seeley and Smith, Hinchman and Grylls.

The purpose of this study is to examine and evaluate the flood hazard areas in the community which are developed or which are likely to be developed and to determine flood elevations for those areas. Flood elevations will be used by the community to carry out the flood plain management objectives of the National Flood Insurance Program. They will also be used as the basis for determining the appropriate flood insurance premium rates applicable for new buildings and their contents, as well as determining the rates to be used for the second layer of insurance on existing buildings and contents.

This announcement is intended to notify all interested persons of the commencement of this study so that they may have an opportunity to bring any relevant facts and technical data concerning local flood hazards to the attention of the Federal Insurance Administration for consideration in the course of this study. Such information should be furnished to Mr. James S. Haller, the Chief Executive Officer of the community, for forwarding to FIA.

This Fall over 280 area residents have started in the 30 classes that reached sufficient enrollment to begin. One interesting note was the number of Washtenaw Community College classes that began this fall in the high school, as compared to last year. Also, starting this Fall, all names of individuals who registered for classes that did not start will be kept on file for the next session and added to the new registrants. The next session of Community Education classes will begin in January.

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IN RETROSPECT "THE ROAD TO RUIN"

XXX-rated movies are not new to Manchester. They had 'em years ago. Sometime back in the 1930's, I don't remember exactly when, there was a movie theater in Manchester where the Enterprise Office is now located and there the natives enjoyed Tom Mix and The Three Musketeers and the Ritz Brothers and Laurel and Hardy and others without even a thought of sex being depicted therein--no one dared jump into bed with anyone else--the Hayes censorship office

would not allow it. But perhaps to make up for this fact, once or twice a year there would be offered special attractions of a film depicting in more or less detail, the perils of sexual transgressions and the perils of V-D, subjects which were rarely discussed aloud in mixed company in those days. These special attractions usually consisted of a film to view which no one under 18 was admitted which was accompanied by an individual who, during intermissions, gave an impassioned lecture on the perils of violating the laws of decency and social acceptance. So, one day, there came to Manchester and its theater such a film with a lecturer

and all entertainment and amusement very good. Many local folks probably were glad to take advantage of the opportunity to enhance their knowledge pertaining to this very important subject. Then too, along about this time came Halloween and that evening the children all went tricking and treating as usual and late in the evening peace and quiet were restored to Main Street. At that time the police protection consisted of one night watchman--nothing else was needed --and he, I think failed to see or hear much that happened after midnight. On the corner, at that time, where the Grossman Service Station is now located, stood an old three-story hotel

part of the town for many years, had with the advent of the automobile, failed by the wayside and some years before this, became vacant. It then, for several years, been used as a furniture manufacturing plant where wicker and raffia furniture was made by a Jackson company, but when that kind of furniture went out of style, the plant was closed and the building deteriorated badly. Come the dawn of the morning after Halloween and when the natives began to come downtown for the day's activities they were greeted with a strange sight. There atop the cornice on the top of the third story of the old hotel was perched a sleigh, which it was later found out, belonged to Mr. Faulhaber and which had been hijacked from his premises down by the elder mill, and leaning tastefully against the sleigh was a large sign which had been carefully removed from the front of the theater which read in scarlet letters "THE ROAD TO RUIN".

I could name those individuals who were responsible for perpetrating the display but I don't think that I should. Suffice it to say that several of them put in quite a bit of really hard work dragging the sleigh up the fire escape and hoisting it up on the cornice. Then, too, part of the crew who took part in this little episode are still a part of Manchester's "Main Street". Perhaps they wouldn't like to be reminded of the "Indescriptions" of their youth. I don't know whether the movie at the theater or the display on the hotel attracted the most attention, but the one on the hotel was remembered far longer. The theater at that location, was discontinued after several years but was revived later at a location several doors West of that location and was run by Herb Widmayer for several years and later, before TV took its toll was owned by the proprietor of the Brooklyn Theater.

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A Different Look at PBB

For the past few years Michigan has been plagued with the problem of PBB. What was to be done with the diseased cattle, where to bury them, etc. all have raised many loud and emphatic discussions on the pro and cons of each method employed. At the present time we are having a major election in the State and accusations and proposed remedies are tossed about with reckless abandon.

The greatest problem is that we the voters are finding it very difficult in making choices as to which candidate to believe so that we can vote intelligently and elect the right person to the right office. About the only thing we really know, is that:

a. all politicians tend to consider it their right to bend the truth to their most desired advantage.

b. if they are elected that they will probably not do what they promised during their campaign.

c. they probably are no smarter than we are, so telling a lie does not hurt too much.

One thing that the voters do know is that an independent test was conducted in Michigan and the results of this showed that 90% of the population had PBB in their system in excess over normal. (Whatever that may mean) This news of course was horrible and added just more logs to be thrown on the political fire.

But wait a minute. The test only showed that 90% of the population had excess PBB in their system. The test did not conclude that 90% of the population was sick, or for that matter would eventually become sick. This gives us a chance to look upon this test from a new viewpoint. Could we not assume that the body of each individual, having received small doses of PBB has built up an immunity to it and in time will fluff off any parts which are still in the body.

Is not our entire program of vaccination built upon this premise? Typhus, cholera,

whooping cough, small pox and even polio all have been eliminated as threatening diseases. How? By vaccination, that is by injecting a human being with a small dose of the disease and allowing the body to create its own antibodies to fight it off. The human body also has the capability to create its own immunity against such diseases as mumps. To be sure, this is a childhood disease, but those people who did not have mumps in their childhood carefully avoid contact with a child that has it. Since mumps is a communicable disease there have been instances when persons who do not have immunity, contact the disease through exposure at a ripe old age.

So it could be possible that 90% of the population of Michigan has become immunized to PBB and thus we are a lot healthier than Americans in the other forty-nine States. That is at least from PBB.

Ah, you are perhaps saying you are comparing disease control with PBB and PBB is not a disease. Then let us consider rattle snake poisoning. There have been persons that have taken small doses of such poison over a long period of time and each time, slightly increased the dose until they achieved a stage where they could take a large enough dose, without any discomfort, that would kill five others in nothing flat. In short they allowed their body to build up an immunity to rattle snake poison. So it is possible to assume that 90% of the population of Michigan has built up such an immunity to PBB and we are a lot safer than any of our other American friends that live in the other forty-nine States.

So we can say to our politicians, go ahead and carry on your verbal contests but remember, come voting time, we will vote for who we think is best, not who can shout the loudest.

Ma Bell Proposes Rate Revision

Michigan Bell has proposed revising rates for extension telephones, Touch-Tone calling and several other services to simplify charges and relate them more closely to their actual costs.

Donald M. Lambe, Michigan Bell assistant vice president, said the proposal was not designed to increase company revenues.

"The overall revenue effect would be a wash because increases in charges for some services would be offset by decreases in charges for others," he said.

The proposal, filed with the Public Service Commission in Lansing, would break monthly residence extension rates into separate inside wiring and instrument charges, Lambe said.

Customers would be charged a 35 cent monthly inside wiring charge per extension plus a separate rate for each residence extension telephone provided by Michigan Bell. These rates would differ for various telephone models such as Princess, Trimline and Touch-Tone phones.

The company's proposal also calls for revised rates for residence and business Touch-Tone service.

Residence customers would continue to receive a standard rotary telephone at no additional charge as part of basic residence service. Under the proposal, the credit for customers who provide their own main telephones would be increased from 60 to 75 cents a month.

"There would be little change in the

vast majority of customers' monthly bills," Lambe said.

In Manchester, for example, a residence customer with one-party flat rate service with one standard rotary telephone now pays \$7.02 a month. This would remain unchanged.

A Manchester residence customer with one-party flat rate service who provides his own telephone now pays \$6.42 a month. Under the proposal, this customer would pay \$6.27 a month, or 15 cents less for basic service.

As part of its restructuring proposal, Lambe said Michigan Bell is asking to withdraw residence discount "package" rates for Princess and Trimline phones and Touch-Tone service and to discontinue future one-time payments for Princess and Trimline telephones.

He added that one-time charges such as premises visits, premises wiring and telephone jacks would be increased for residence customers.

Lambe said similar rate changes also were proposed for business customers.



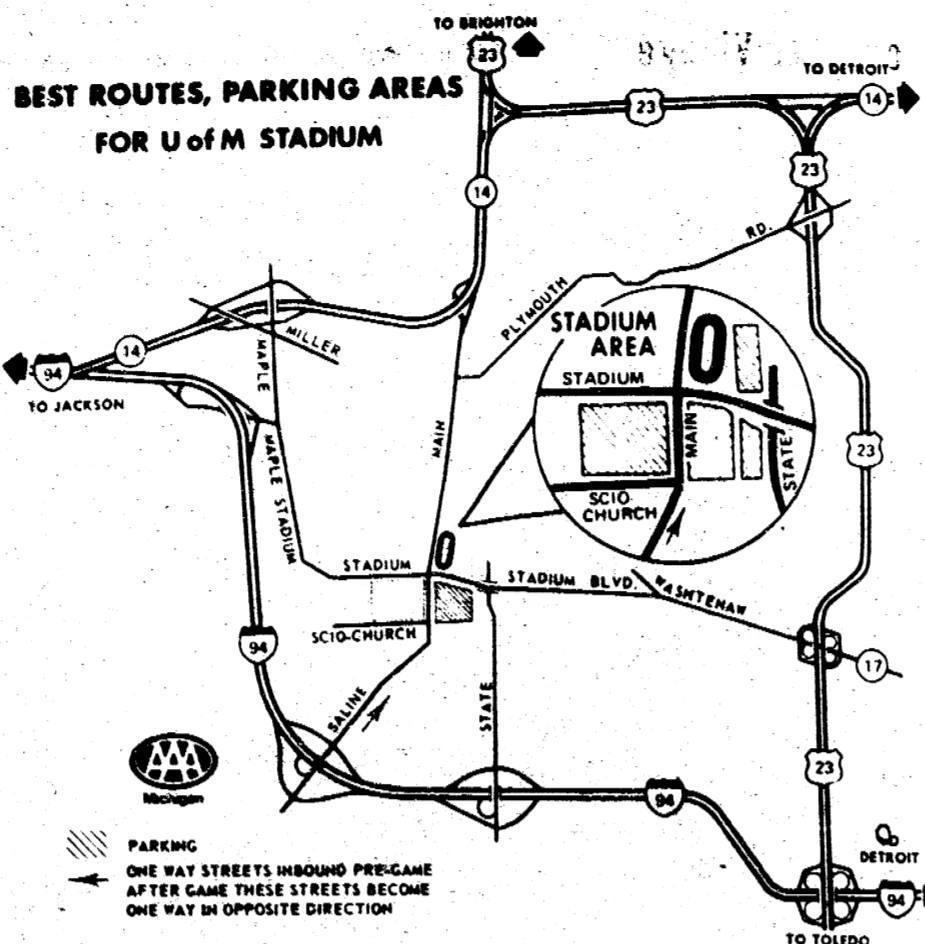
Although many of the band members major in music, nearly every department in the university is represented in the band.

BEST ROUTES, PARKING AREAS FOR U of M STADIUM



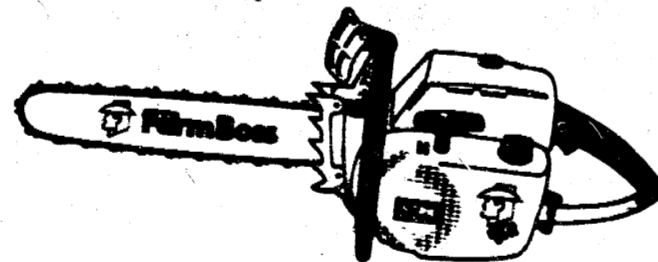

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Manchester Village Planning Commission

September 13, 1978
The delayed regular meeting of the Manchester Village Planning Commission was held at the Village Hall, with members present: Whittington, Leeson, Duncan, Chapin, Daniels, Wellwood, Krauss, and Tracy.

The meeting was called to order at 7:30 P.M. by Vice-Chairman Whittington. Minutes of the regular meeting of August 2 were read, and on the motion by Tracy, seconded by Krauss, were approved.

Minutes of the special meeting of August 16 were read, and after correction of time of "call to order", approval was moved by Daniels, seconded by Krauss, and accepted.

Pastor Nelson of the Manchester Baptist Church was present. He presented site plans and elevation view for their proposed church building on the property

in the South-east corner of Macomb and Wager Streets. The building will have a seating capacity of 125 persons, and parking space is provided in the rear for 45 vehicles. Requested are variances for a set-back of 16 feet from the Macomb St. property line, and set-back of 25 feet from the Wager St. property line. These variations are instead of 50 feet and 35 feet, respectively, per Ordinance if the building is in a District zoned AG (Agriculture), as this is. It was noted, however, that in this instance the 16 foot set-back from Macomb St. is more or less consistent with homes in the neighborhood. It was moved by Wellwood that we recommend to Council that the two (2) variances be approved. Seconded by Duncan, and passed unanimously.

Mr. Clarence Fielder was present to ask about transfer to a new owner of permission to have a multiple-family dwelling in a District wherein it is not allowed as a new conditional use under the present Ordinance. It was moved by Daniels that

we recommend Council that they get a legal opinion as to the required procedure such that a conditional use permit may be allowed for a multiple-family dwelling in Districts zoned R-1B (Single-Family Urban Residential District). The motion was seconded by Tracy, and passed unanimously.

Mrs. Anne Pniewski and Mr. Gary Pniewski were present. Mrs. Pniewski owns two adjacent lots on Torrey Street, each 66 feet wide by 187 feet deep. She wishes to build a home on one of these lots, known as Lot No. 6, and requests that a variance be allowed to permit her to locate the building one (1) foot from the property line between it and the adjacent lot owned by her. Also, that the second lot, known as Lot No. 7, be designated as a marketable property on which a home may be constructed. In accord with the Zoning Ordinance such a separation of the properties may not be allowed. A question was raised as to the legality of this specification, within Section 57.10. It was moved by Daniels to refer the situation to Council for legal opinion or whatever decision they may arrive at. Further, that the question be placed on the agenda for the Council meeting of September 18, 1978, and that the Village Attorney be present at the meeting. The motion was seconded by Wellwood, and unanimously approved.

A motion was made by Tracy, that if the afore noted separation of lots, each

is adopted by Council, that variance be allowed for five feet less than the required side yard on the north side of Mrs. Pniewski's proposed house. The motion was seconded by Wellwood, and unanimously passed.

Adjournment was moved by Whittington, seconded by Daniels, and passed unanimously.

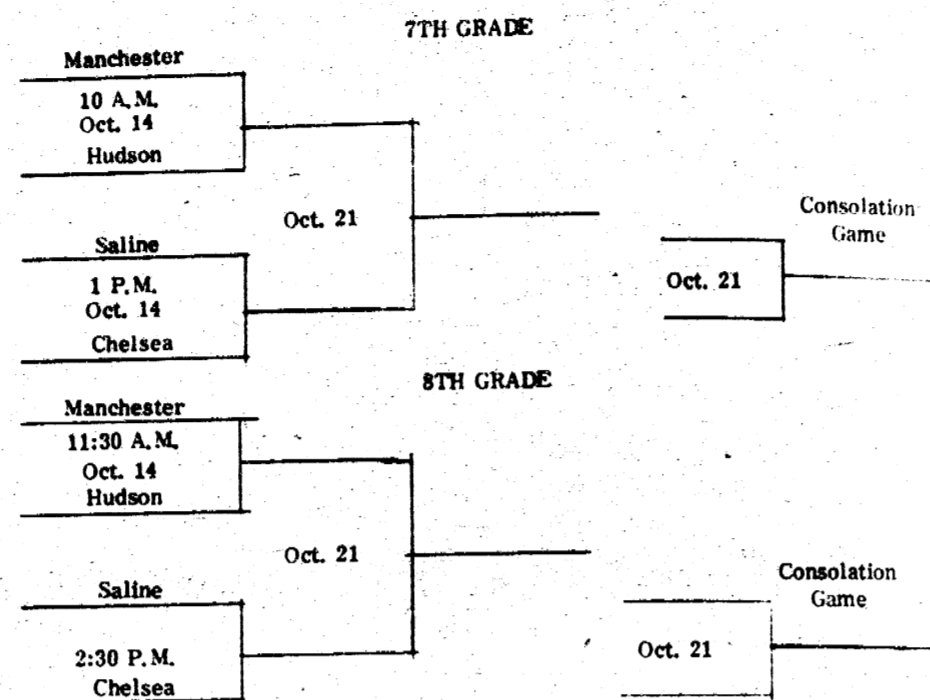

September 18, 1978

Moved by Fitzgerald supported by Althouse that Pastor Nelson's request be considered by the Zoning Board of Appeals at a Public Hearing scheduled at 8:15 P.M. October 2, 1978. Motion carried.

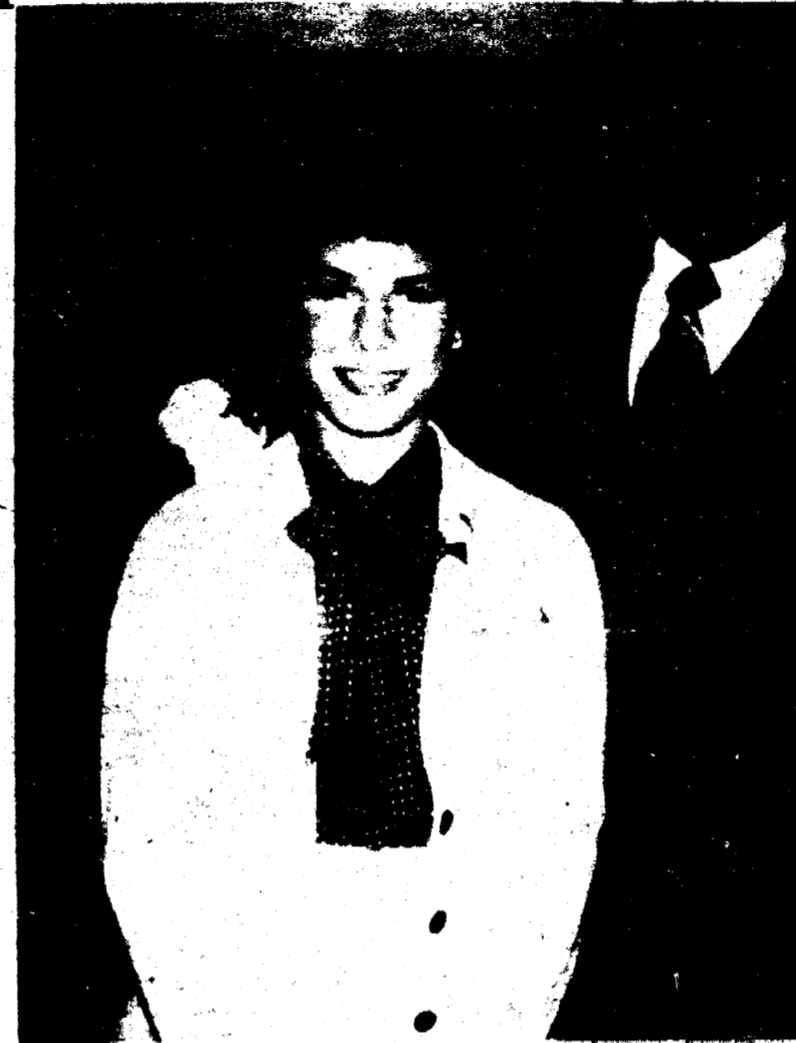
