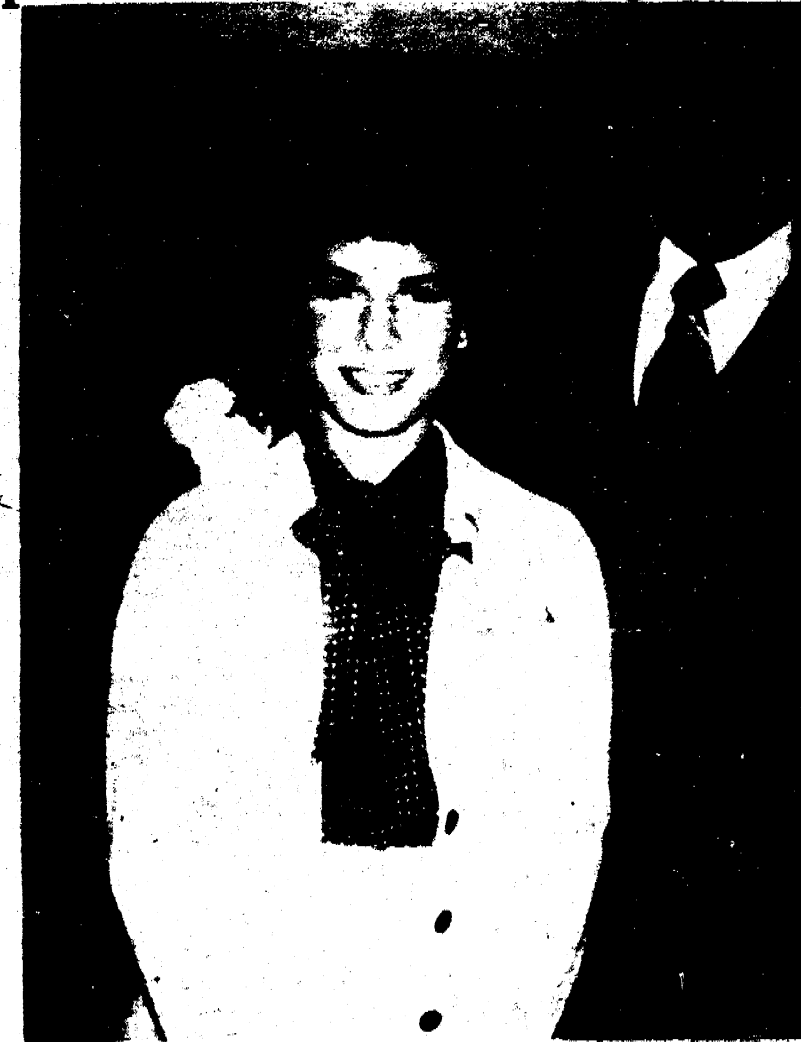

The whole area up the hill on Ann Arbor Street was known as "Ann Arbor Hill" regardless of the street that it was on. A large field of alfalfa which belonged to Mr. Cramer was just north of the house, then owned by Mrs. Bessie Parr. I remember when "Bill" dynamited a stump from the middle of that field. He must have used plenty of explosive, for pieces of the stump flew far and wide and the explosion rattled windows and shook houses in the whole neighborhood.

At the time of which I wrote, the first house east of Jenter's was occupied by Mrs. Georgia Rager and children; George Thomas, Rita and Marian. A lovely family that I knew well, and by Mr. and Mrs. Walter Schaeble.

Bill's partner in the muskrat farm was Chuck Wurster of Austin Road, a well known wool and fur buyer at that time. Bill was a person who should be long remembered for the many things that he did for his church and his town.

U.S. SHOULD NOT FUND UN PROGRAMS, BIRCHERS CLAIM

Area members and friends of The John Birch Society do not view the United Nations as a supporter of true human rights and freedom. Instead, they believe that our contributions to the United Nations have helped to suppress basic rights and glorify tyrants. They also believe that UN Day on October 24 should be viewed as "a United Nations Day of Shame," and that we should withdraw from the world body. During the period around October 24, Birchers will be distributing literature, hosting film showings, and conducting other educational projects that support their beliefs.

These educational activities will be coordinated locally by Allan Rickert, who serves as a Section Leader in the Ann Arbor area. According to Mr. Rickert, "the United States has to pay at least 25 percent of the regular UN budget. By comparison, more than half the member nations of the world body individually contribute only 0.02 percent. As a group, these nations pay less than one-tenth of the amount contributed by U.S. taxpayers. Yet, they make up a majority of the votes in the UN General Assembly. Mr. Rickert adds that "this is only the tip of the iceberg. Besides the regular budget, there are also separate budgets for a number of UN agencies. Most of our contributions to the United Nations go to help finance these separate budgets. In fact, during the two-year period of 1976 and 1977, we gave the United Nations a cool \$1 billion, which was about 40 percent of total UN

spending."
Commenting on the use of these contributions, Mr. Rickert charges that "we have not purchased a platform for American ideals. Instead, our tax dollars are helping to support a platform for tyrants."

Asked to cite an example, Mr. Rickert states that "in 1971, the UN expelled the government of Free China, and welcomed instead the Communist Chinese, the murderers of millions of their own people." Citing a more recent example, he points out that "the United Nations has not condemned the massive slaughter of men, women and children that is presently taking place in Communist Cambodia. However, the UN condemned the United States in 1976 for importing nickel and chrome from anti-Communist Rhodesia. In fact, the United States did not even vote against its own condemnation. The resolution passed 124 to 0, with the U.S. abstaining."

Mr. Rickert concludes that "we should get the United States out of the United Nations and the United Nations out of the United States."

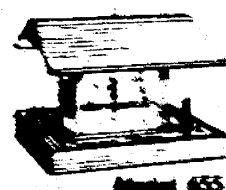

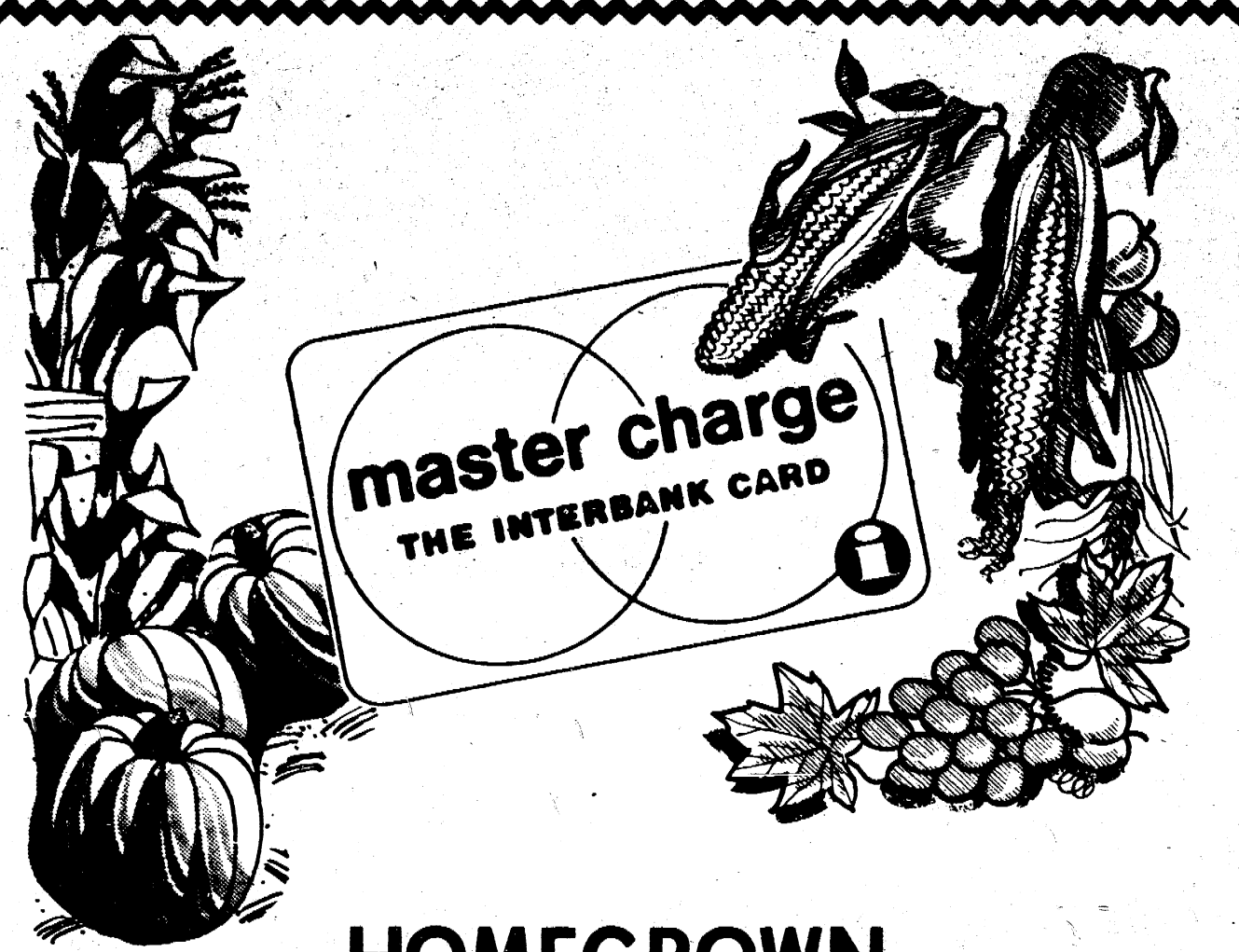

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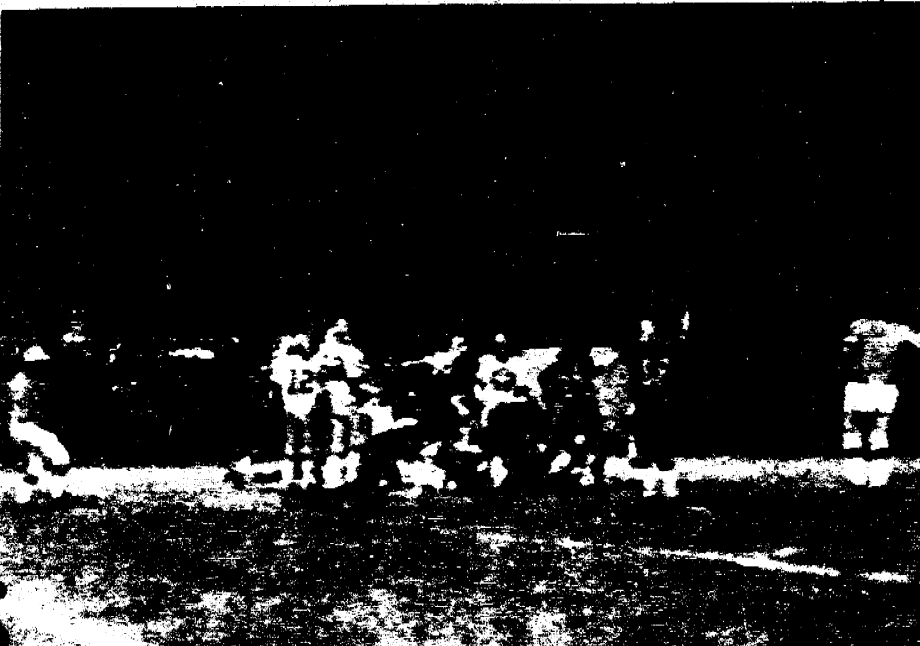

On the night that we speak of, the siren sounded and Art, dressing hurriedly, dashed down the alley and unlocked the sliding doors, but when he tried to push them open he found that they had frozen shut when the temperature had fallen drastically during the night. He tried valiantly to budge the doors as did a couple of others when they arrived but to no avail. In desperation, Art surveyed the situation for a few moments then dashed into the building and jumped into the drivers seat of the truck. Then he started it up and shifted it into reverse, and stomped on the accelerator. The truck lurched backwards and with a resounding crash backed through the frozen doors and soon the vehicles were on their way to

answer the alarm.

If I remember correctly there was considerable criticism about the act but in a few days workmen arrived and installed overhead freeze proof doors. Maybe this was not the correct way to solve a critical problem but it was very effective.

And by the way, does anyone remember the time that Earl Alber, rushing to answer a fire call shortly after he moved into his home on West Main Street, stumbled into his garage, only partly awake, and proceeded to back his car out to dash to the fire barn only to discover that he had forgotten one little thing--he had forgotten to open the garage door.

But throughout these years, Manchester has had a Fire Department of which they can be proud, and I don't think that the average person stops to realize how much time and effort the members all have given with little regard for their personal safety.

Limpert also requested Sewer and Water service for 4 lots corner of Duncan Street and Hibbard Streets. He must submit proposed plans for extension of sewer and water main thru certified Civil Engineers.

Moved by Althouse, supported by Duncan to adjourn as Council at 7:45 P.M. to convene as Zoning Board of Appeals. All years, carried. Planning Commission members present: Daniels, Leeson, Wellwood. Council members present: Althouse, Duncan, Fitzgerald, Koebbe, Mrs. Anne Pnirowski's request for a variance to allow construction of a building with a five foot variance was considered. No objections were heard. Moved by Fitzgerald, supported by Duncan to approve the variance request for Mrs. Anne Pnirowski. Roll call vote taken. All years, carried. Schaffer declared a recess of Zoning Board of Appeals to reconvene as Village Council at 7:50 P.M.

Public Activities as reported by Koebbe included: paving completed on Turrey and Division Streets. Seamp program is completed, crew is working cleaning up after chipping. Water Meters are being read. Three water and sewer services were placed. Streetlight is working in the new parking lot at the rear of the service station. Placed two signs (Slow Children at Play) on Schaffer Ct. Patched some holes with asphalt. Called school to glass containers at transfer station for cleanup; also installed two new posts, to replace broken ones. Koebbe commented on the nice job of paving on Turrey and Division. Moved by Koebbe, supported by Althouse to purchase 250 feet of 1" cable at a cost of \$1,085.83. All years, carried.

Adjourned as Council at 8:15 P.M. to reconvene as Zoning Board of Appeals to consider the request of Manchester Baptist Church for a conditional use permit to build a church building in an area zoned Agricultural and to consider request for 2 variances on property located on Macomb St. The request was for variance in setback requirements on the site plan. Members present: Daniels, Leeson, Wellwood, Althouse, Duncan, Fitzgerald, Koebbe. Duncan reported the Planning Commission had voted to recommend to Council that the variance be approved. Adjacent property owners were present to ask questions on the set back requirements, type and size of building, devaluation of property, noise, sewers. Reason for variance request is to leave room for expansion and parking. The building would be a wooden building with aluminum siding, structure to conform to building in neighborhood. Sewers are adequate and there would not be a noise problem. Schaffer asked if there were any questions. A resident objected to variance setback on Macomb St. No other objections were voiced. Moved by Duncan supported by Koebbe, Conditional Use and variance requests of Manchester Baptist Church be approved. Roll call vote taken. All years, carried. 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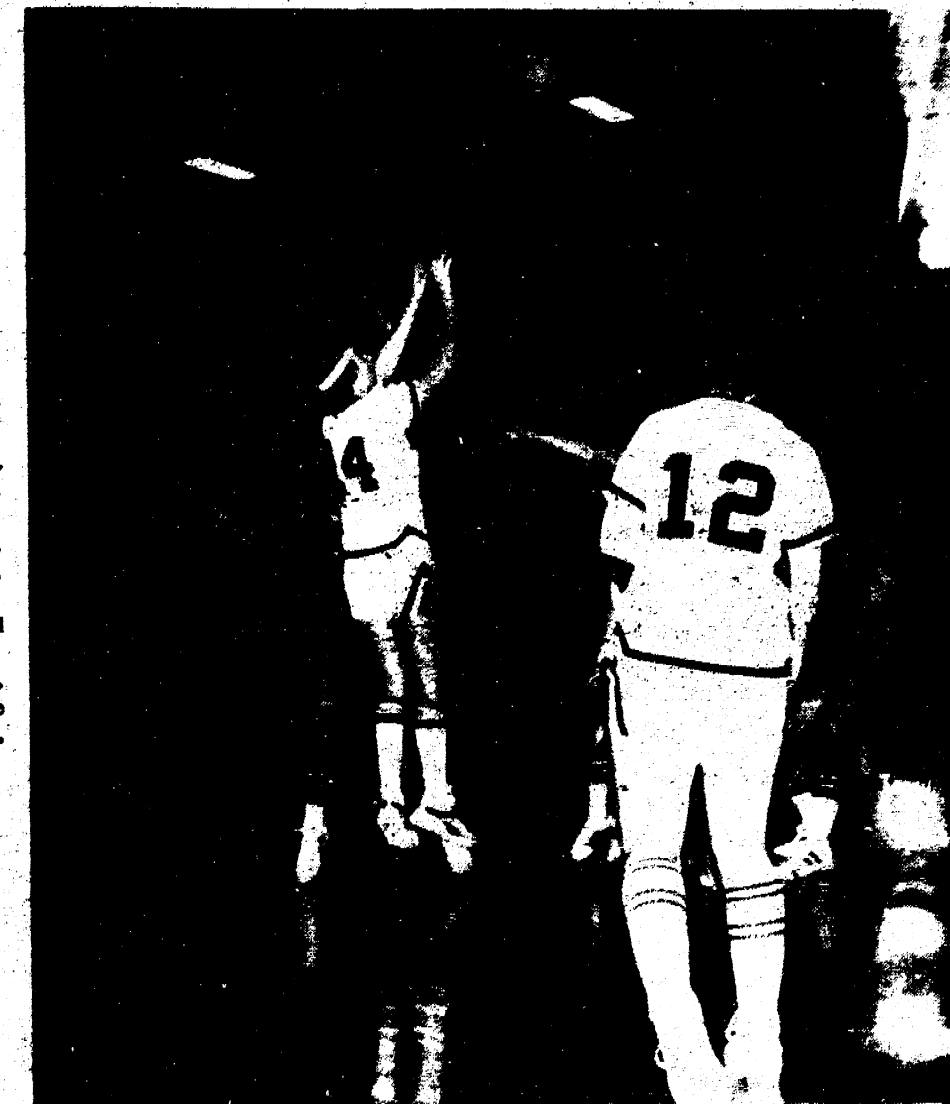

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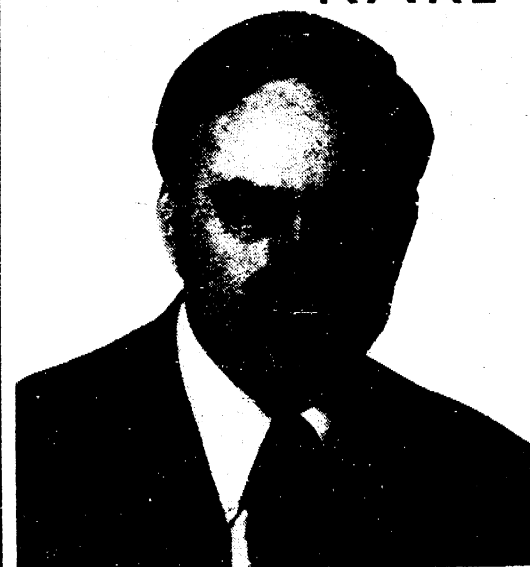

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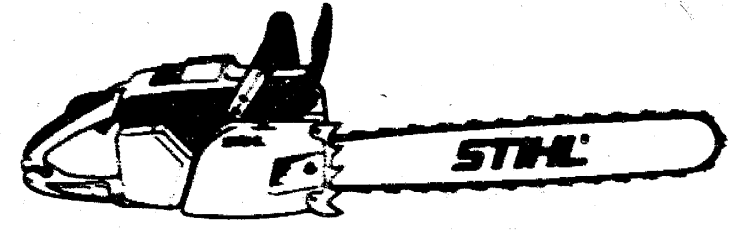

Stand outs on defense were Jim Coval and Bart Nicholson.

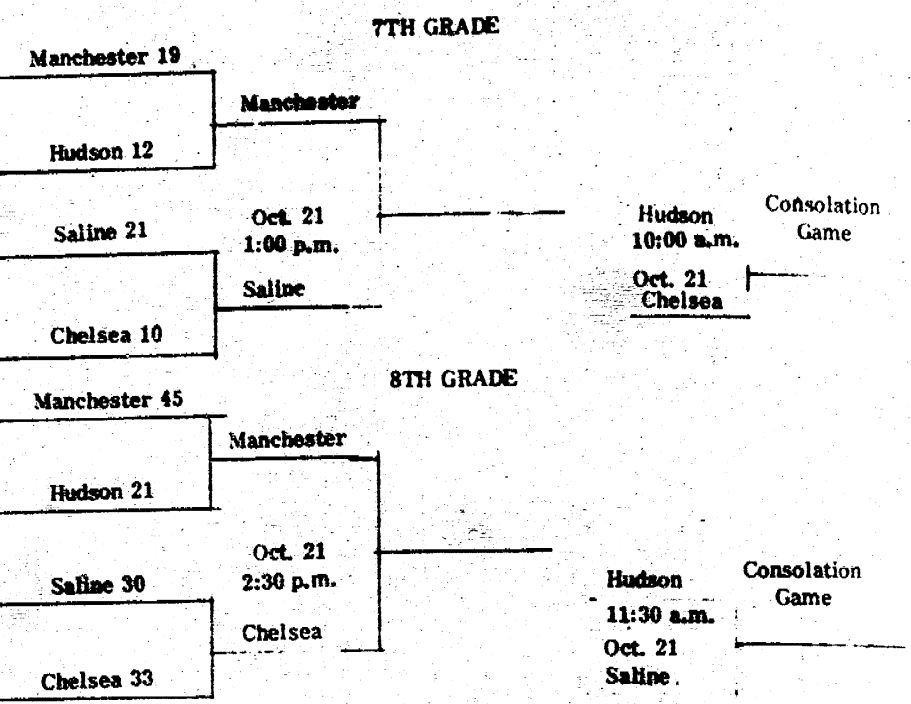

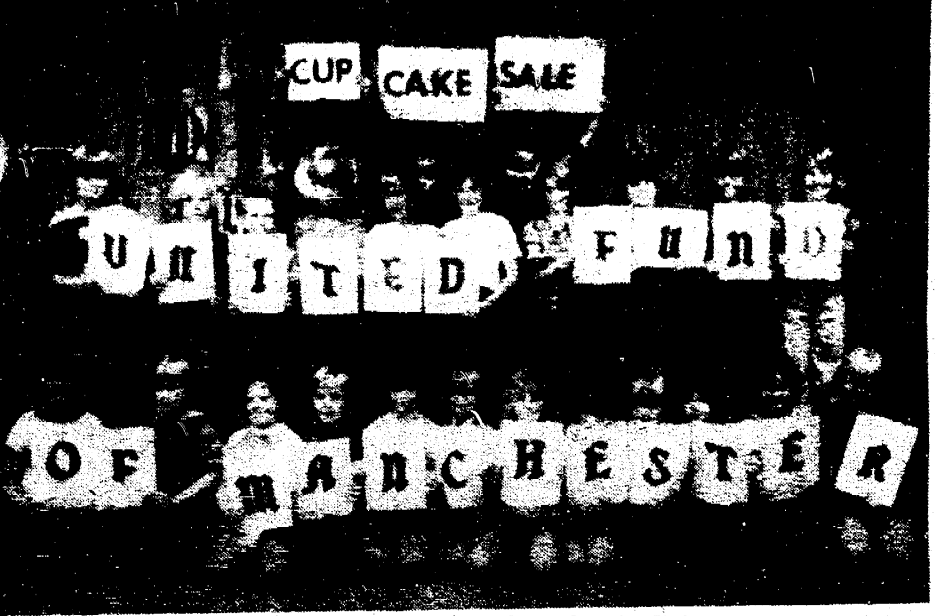
