Although I left Manchester in 1951, my roots are there. As a longtime subscriber to the Manchester Enterprise, I am enjoying the "In Retrospect" column very much. It was a pleasant surprise to see my name mentioned in last week's issue.

May I add my two cents worth to the memorabilia? I was born in the house

on E. Main St. Just east of the new Jester Funeral Home. It originally belonged to my grandparents, George and Christine Wurster. As the story was told to me by my Grandma Wurster, the original part of the house was once an old cigar factory, and they built the rest of the now existing structure around it. This is where my mother, Georgia Rager, her sister, Vera Schable, and brother, Lawrence "Dutch" Wurster, all grew up. My Grandma told me that my uncle "Dutch" acquired that nickname because when he first started school in Manchester, he could speak only German, and it stuck with him all his life. Wurster park in Manchester is named in honor of my Uncle Lawrence. He and Will Kramer were good friends and were both involved in many community ventures and services. I know they played baseball and football, and I believe their teams were called the "Manchester Dutch", as they are today. At one time my Grandmother provided room and board for teachers in the Manchester schools. When my Aunt Vera married Walter Schable back in the 1920's, the upstairs of the house was made into an apartment for them, and they lived there with their daughter, Joyce, until the late 1940's. It was then occupied by Keith and Ashly (Fisher) DesErma. After they moved, it was occupied by the Hugh Stearns. After the death of my Grandma Wurster, at the age of 91 years, the downstairs of the house was made into two apartments, and my mother, Georgia Rager, continued to live in one of them until her death in 1968, and Mrs. Kramer (Minnie) did live in the other apartment, and they were very good friends. The Chuck Wurster mentioned as being in business with Will Kramer was my Grandpa Wurster's

nephew. Oh, yes, my roots and part of my heart are most definitely in Manchester!

**NO BLT's?**

The news is still buzzing about the nitrite scare brought on by the Department of Agriculture, particularly the Consumer Division headed by Mrs. Carol Tucker Foreman.

Everyone must be familiar with the problem by now, but in case you aren't, the whole thing sets up this way...

Something called the Delaney Amendment says that if any food product is found to contain a carcinogenic substance, it must be banned from human consumption. It doesn't say to what degree or how minute--just says if it's there! Zero tolerance, in other words. So Mrs. Foreman says she is merely enforcing the law. Seems funny that no other Department of Agriculture official ever learned

about nitrites before Carol came along, doesn't it?

It also seems rather odd that the Massachusetts Institute of Technology scientist, whose study of rats led to the nitrite warning, is concerned over all the worry it created. Dr. Paul Newberne said he didn't think that just because nitrite causes cancer in rats that it would really create serious risks in human population. Calling the whole scare a "scientific tempest in a teapot," the MIT scientist appealed for "common sense and flexibility by the regulatory agencies."

Another scientist from MIT, Dr. Steven Tannenbaum, who authored the paper on human nitrite exposure, said the estimates of increased human cancer risk due to nitrite are so bad that he would flunk his graduate students if they did the same thing.

The real problem is the choice we are going to have to make. Cancer may kill you, eventually, but botulism is quicker and more certain! And without nitrite to cure meat, botulism is almost a sure thing.

And how are you going to make bacon, tomato and lettuce sandwiches? Experts point out that significant amounts of nitrite also occur in lettuce, spinach, celery and other leafy vegetables and Carol hasn't said a thing. Maybe she doesn't eat salad either.

# In Retrospect

Every time I let my memory wander back to the thirties and forties to recall various more or less humorous happenings that were concocted by the masculine element of the community, somehow the leaders in the event in question turned out to be business men of the town. There were a few more of them then and perhaps they had a bit more spare time and were working under a bit less pressure then than now. So while I hope that retelling these incidents will bring a smile to our faces, I don't suppose that the participants should be, in many instances, named.

For instance, somewhere just before the forties, speeders and other traffic law violators became numerous and so the Council up and hired Bert Filter of

There was, and is, on the west side of the street west of the Grossman service station, a couple of large trees and Mr. Filter developed a habit of parking in the shelter of these trees and watching for an unwary speeder to come barging up or down Main Street whereupon he would take off in hot pursuit to present the offender with a ticket.

One evening during the summer, about dusk, a couple of fellows with a considerable length of hay rope, snuck up behind Mr. Filter's car and attached one end of the rope to his rear axle and the other end they tied stoutly around the tree while another one of the fellows engaged Bert in congenial conversation. Soon afterwards another car drove madly through town going west at a high rate of speed, whereupon Mr. Filter took off on a mad pursuit. Of course when he came to the end of the rope his car came to a shuddering halt after it had leaped into the air several feet off the ground. Fortunately Mr. Filter didn't sustain a whiplash injury but he was considerably shaken up and definitely failed to see the humorous side of the affair. It is said that he vowed revenge and that he had a list of suspects, but needless to say those suspects were, the most law obedient drivers in town, and remained so until Bert, not long afterwards moved on to a better position in another nearby town.

Washtenaw Community College is a fine institution, and I have been glad to serve for the past four years as Trustee. Training for Jobs. WCC's programs are designed to meet the needs of students and the demand for employment. Advisory committees help shape the curriculum, and programs grow and shrink in relation to job opportunities in the community.

Millage renewal. To continue its record of excellence, WCC depends on renewal of its one-mill tax on the November ballot. I support this renewal of the existing level of taxation for the College.

More than 50,000 students have studied at WCC since it opened in 1966, few of whom would have found opportunities for education elsewhere. I have been glad to be part of this success story, and I look forward to continuing to serve as Trustee.

Richard W. Duffley is a native of Michigan and has lived in Ann Arbor since 1965. He is WCC Trustee and Treasurer of the Board, and is a Professor of English at the University of Michigan. In addition to offices held in professional groups, he is a delegate and former Executive Committee member of SEMCOG and a lay delegate to the General Convention of the Episcopal Diocese of Michigan.

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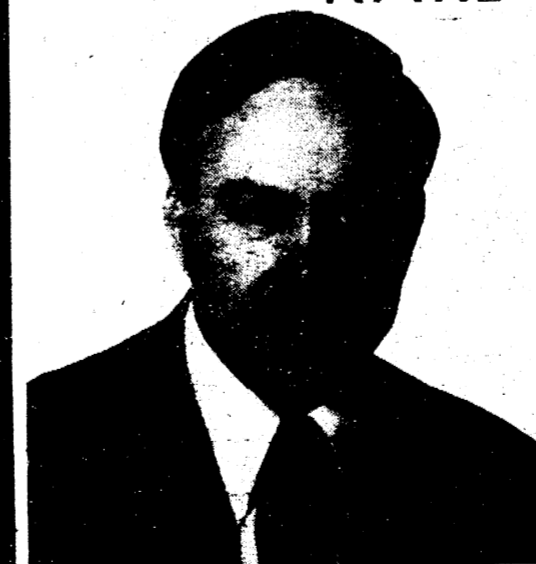

### National Diabetes Detection Week

In 1977 the University of Michigan Medical Center was selected as one of seven research and training centers for diabetes in the country. This federally funded program is administered by Mickey Cohn.

Researchers are trying to solve diabetes which is a metabolic disturbance caused by the lack of the hormone insulin.

The local unit, which meets regularly, supports the research, education and the diabetic camp. Wescott explains that Washtenaw County has approximately 6,800 diagnosed diabetics.

This group of the ADA-Michigan Affiliate is sponsoring the four detection clinics during National Diabetes Detection Week, Sunday, Nov. through Saturday, Nov. 11.

These clinics are for the diagnosis of diabetes in Washtenaw citizens. Anyone interested in learning if he/she is diabetic may appear for a free blood test at one of the participating hospitals.

Wescott suggests that citizens planning on taking the tests do so "two hours

after eating a large meal."

She points out that "diabetic clinics are not for known diabetics, but rather for "the detection of unknown diabetics."

Participating hospitals are: Bruce Memorial Hospital, Nov. 7 through 9, from 9 a.m. to 2 p.m.; Chelsea Medical Center, Nov. 6 through 10, from 2 to 8 p.m.; Saline Community Hospital, Nov. 7 and Nov. 9, from 8:30 to 11 a.m.; and Veteran's Hospital, Nov. 6 through 10, from 8 a.m. to 2 p.m.

### Seniors, You Are Needed

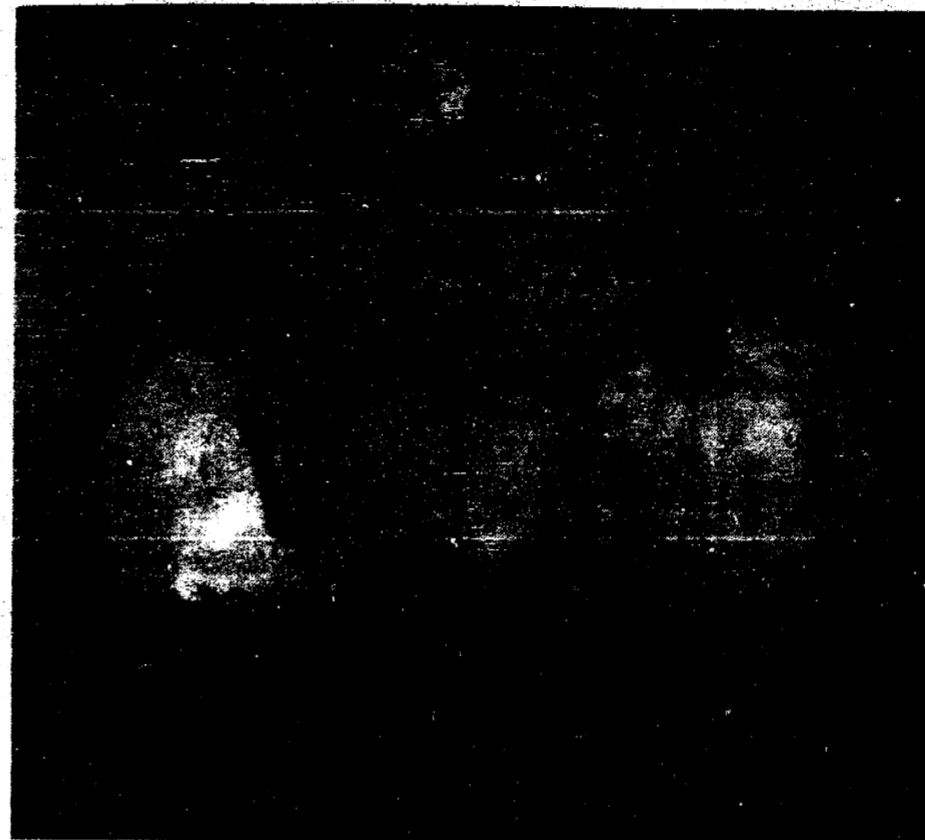

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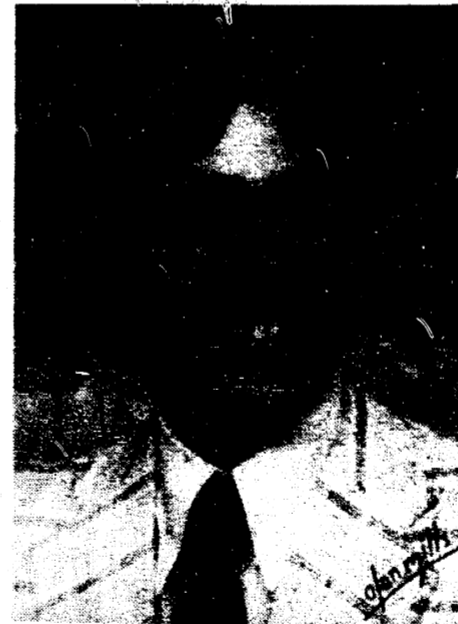
