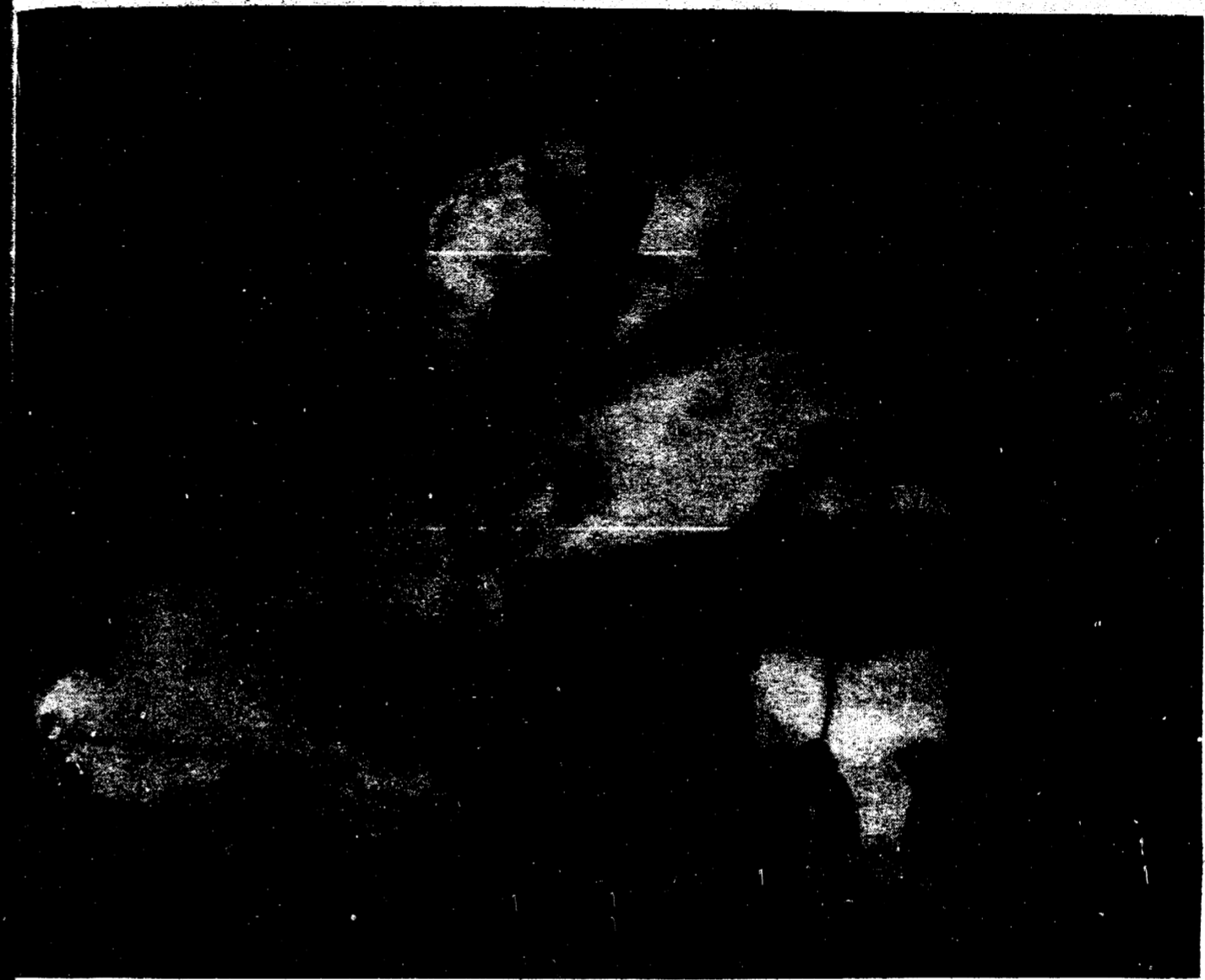

FIRE HITS BRIDGEWATER AGAIN IN RETROSPECT



A few weeks ago we asked for suggestions about incidents that occurred during the period from 1925 to 1945, and we have received several which will be used in future efforts. We also received a couple of inquiries also about places and incidents in the Manchester area not directly related to this time period but nevertheless we think, related to the general subject.

One such question asked was "Just where is 'Podunk' which is located near Manchester and how and why was it so named?" In past years we have been asked this question several times and have done some research regarding it, coming up with the following:

Podunk is that area on Wallace Road west of the Clinton-Manchester road which runs east and west on the north side of the pond formed many years ago when there was built a dam and a grist mill near the south side of the present pond which was near a station on the railroad called River Raisin. For quite some time after the railroad was built there was this mill located there, together with a store, a harness shop, a general store and several houses. Among the landowners nearby were George Merz, T. Smith, Mrs. C. Dresselhouse, William Dewey, H.E. Wiedman and Henry Palmer. The railroad station was located at the point where Hogan Road and Wallace Road joined west of the pond where, Wallace Road was built under the railroad tracks. Some years later several houses were built on Wallace Road east of the railroad tracks, and recently several other houses have been built in the vicinity.

I have been unable to find out who is to blame for designating the area as Podunk, but I see nothing derogatory about it as some have inferred. It is a very distinctive name and in its way, as attractive as River Raisin by which name it still appears on many not so old maps of this area.

And while we are on the subject of railroads, we and many others who have lived in Manchester for some time, miss the two railroads which use to be such an important part of Manchester. It was fun too, on a summer morning, lean on the railing of the old bridge on Main Street and watch the morning train puffing its way across the bridge across the upper pond on its way to Saline and Bridgewater, and on a hot summer afternoon throw rocks at the carp who wallowed in the pond below. As we remember them they seemed as big as pigs and wallowed about in the mud in a similar fashion.

But the railroad bridges in Manchester are both gone and so are the railroad and the mill and other buildings at "River Raisin". But the last time we drove through there "Podunk" was alive and well, and its proximity to the pond and the natural beauty of the surrounding land made it a pleasant place to live.

Maybe the abandonment of these railroads was a sign of progress but the many things that have happened since then give support to the theory that the demise of this method of transportation was somewhat hastily accomplished and did not contribute to the possibilities of progress for Manchester.

However, J.A.W. points out the sign located in the middle of the north block is "well placed". I disagree mainly because its the only place in town where there are 2 steps to the sidewalk. Two

steps are mighty difficult for a wheelchair. Secondly, he talks about the sign at the post office "seems unnecessary... only need to pick the right time for their service". I feel the present spot is great-- I can open and let my elevator down on the curb and wheel to the door. Why does J.A.W. feel we can pick our time any better than anyone else? He mentions moving this one to the IGA where he'd like to see it located in the first spot to the right of the entrance. If done I'd need to enter the space backwards to be able to open and lower lift. I have parked there in the past with no problem parking or entering.

Thirdly, about the sign located in front of the Union Savings Bank--I too feel its sort of a funny location because once you're up the ramp you have 2 steps into the bank at both doors. Because there is a drive-in I go there but sometimes you need to go in. Hopefully in the near future the bank will have an entrance on the level. As for J.A.W.'s suggestion for moving it so it's centrally located; again how would I get out and up the curb? I do agree it would be handy to locate a sign at the rear of the Black Sheep, Great Lakes and Village Tax Office for the reason that there are no steps except at the Black Sheep, which I've heard will change.

In conclusion to J.A.W. and the city fathers--wheel a bit in my chair and see if you can handle it. Handicapped means not only is one having problems walking but also that some can't walk.

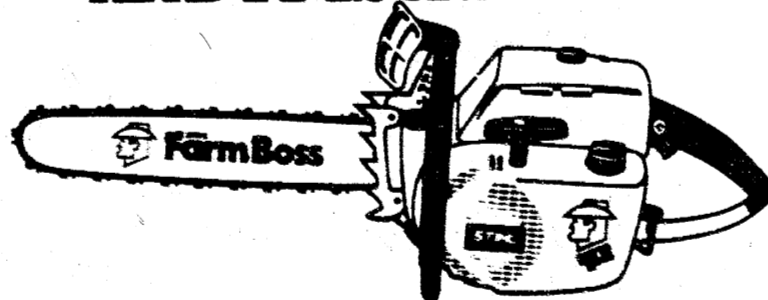

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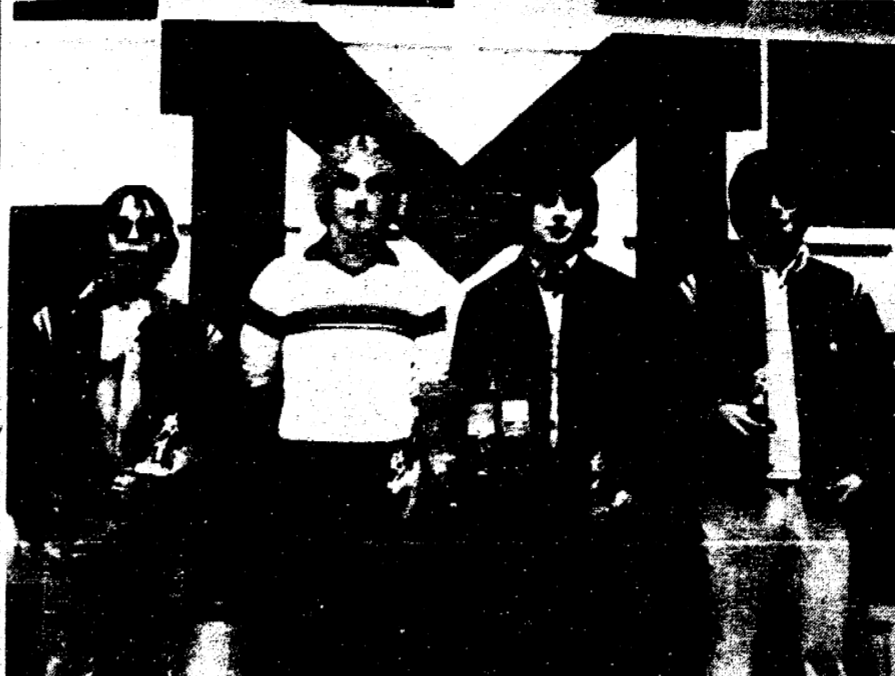

MICHIGAN FARM BUREAU EDITORIAL

WHAT GOVERNMENT PATERNALISM HAS BROUGHT IN MICRONESIA

Once upon a time, many years ago, a group of happy, carefree, self-supporting, self-respecting people lived on an island paradise in the South Pacific, not knowing nor caring about the goodies available from the ever-flowing abundance of the Treasury of the United States of America.

But this blissful scene was disrupted by a great world war and the Yankee liberators arrived from the USA to throw out the Japanese invaders, establish military bases and to Americanize the "ignorant" natives.

At first, the Americans promoted agriculture on such islands as Tinian and Rota in the Marianas, but now there are between seven and eight thousand people eligible for food stamps from the Department of Agriculture and the farmers have quit farming and the fishermen have quit fishing.

In 1967, thirty-three million pounds of fruit and vegetables were produced in the group of islands now known as Micronesia. Then came free food from the Great White Father in Washington, D.C., and the market collapsed. In 1975, the production was down to 1.1 million pounds and the fishing catch was way down, too.

Hundreds of millions of our tax dollars are being spent each year, supposedly to help these people develop their own economy and to get them ready for a closer association with the United States, but the unlimited welfare and other money-throwing schemes of the federal government has produced people who are catching on fast to that old American tradition of free federal money—and they like it!
