CHRISTMAS EVE LUMINARIA

Last Christmas Eve you may recall the tiny bags with candles that illuminated Ann Arbor Street. This year the Manchester Art Guild is sponsoring Manchester's second luminaria. In addition to those living on Ann Arbor Street, those on Main Street from Wolverine to Union will be contacted and invited to participate. The cost for the bags, sand, and candles to be set every ten feet in front of each home will be \$2. Kits will be delivered the week before Christmas. There will also be a limited supply of additional kits for those living elsewhere in the village who wish to join in the luminaria. These may be obtained by calling Sue Bond (428-7927) and will be distributed on a first come basis.

Luminaria is said to have its origin in the sixteenth century when Mexican Indians set many luminarias (bonfires) on the patios of their churches and on the flat roofs of their adobe homes on Christmas Eve to light the way for the Holy Couple. In the cities, these bonfires came to be replaced by an ingenious arrangement in which a paper bag was weighted down with sand and a small candle placed inside. The American version as the luminaria is said to have begun in the southwest when the first wagon trains arrived from St. Louis in the early 1820's.

Today in the southwest homeowners put out thousands of paper bag lights in front of their homes. Visitors to this area have been so impressed with the luminaria displays that the custom has spread to many sections of the United States and Canada. For the second year Manchester residents will join together in lining their streets with candles.

"On Christmas Eve a candle light to shine abroad through Christmas night. That those who pass may see it's glow and strangers may each other know."

IN RETROSPECT

Since I was induced to write this series of vignettes about Manchester during the twenty years which began nearly fifty years ago, we have wished many times that we had what has been called "perfect recall" of many incidents, but we soon discovered that we don't. We remember a great many things about various people but the various dates and some of the circumstances under which some of these events took place are very nebulous in our memory.

We have several names on our list of folks that could be the subject of an incident, but about whom we felt that we needed to do some research. One of these was Millard Hatch.

In the days of 1939-40 he came to Manchester to teach Math and to direct the MHS band. There was a high school band in those days but directing it was not a full time job. There were no musical activities in the lower grades and the band man spent part of his time teaching Math.

We don't remember where he came from but soon he had made himself well liked by most everyone. Even his Math students admired him, even when he threatened to use a rather large book which he invariably carried about with him while in class, to pound into some of his students, a smattering of mathematical knowledge. He often threatened but never got to the application point, but he induced many of his students to get to work and get good grades.

He too, was a good musician and his band members worked hard for him and the band developed into a unit to be proud of.

He was single and had a room at the Kueblers, and took part in community activities and made many friends about town.

I can't now remember why he left his

position here but when he did he joined the Army and not long afterwards was stationed at Schofield Barracks at Hickam Field near Honolulu as a bagler.

We were watching "Pearl" the other evening on television and were reminded of him and of a letter which he wrote to the Kueblers soon after the attack on Pearl Harbor. I read his letter in which he very vividly described the day Pearl Harbor was attacked. He told of standing in front of the barracks blowing "assembly" on his bugle to call the members of his group to fall in for action to defend their area against an enemy that no one seemed to know was coming. He described vividly how "just plain scared" he was, right down to the marrow of his bones, blowing for dear life, standing there amid the falling bombs and the flying debris from the planes which were blown to bits while yet on the ground, and "praying to God" that his luck would hold until the mess was over, and it did.

At the close of his letter he said that we must have been stupid to have let such a catastrophe occur—that many of our leaders must have been so credulous that we very busy negotiating in Washington and were so thoroughly hoodwinked by those they were conferring with that we failed to find out what was really happening, and expressed the thought that we were quite stupid about the whole affair; that it should have never happened.

Remembering this letter, we were forced to wonder if times today were and different now than they were in 1941. We hear learned statements made by various politicians but we wonder who to believe, but we do believe that there is no better protection than preparedness, and as Teddy Roosevelt said in 1909, we should "Walk softly, speak quietly, but carry a big stick". Isn't that just as true today? Maybe reducing expenditures for-

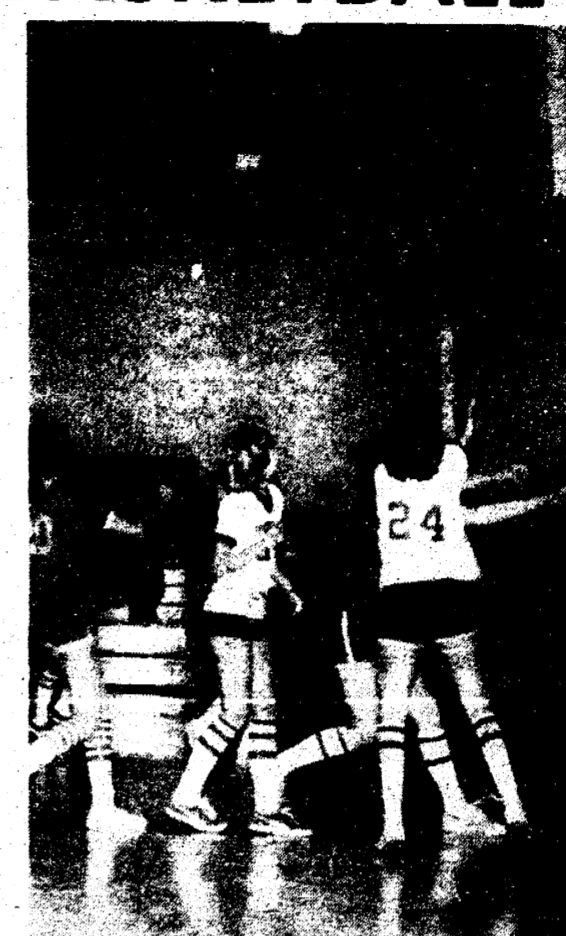

CANCELLATION OF SCHOOL: Mr. Masten reported that school was cancelled on Thursday, November 16, 1978 because of no electricity throughout the village and some surrounding areas. On Monday, November 20th, Klager school did not

operate because the boiler had cracked during the night. The break was in a different location than the area repaired during the summer.

LCAA PETITIONS: Mr. Masten reported to the Board that he had petitions from Ida and Dundee, 2 schools larger than Manchester who want to become a part of the Lenawee County Athletic Association. There is only room for 1 school and it will be up to the various Boards of Education in the LCAA to determine which school is if any, admitted.

U OF M BUREAU OF SCHOOL STUDIES: Mr. Masten stated that Mr. Ray Kehoe from the U of M and one of his associates had begun their study in the areas of 1) curriculum 2) facilities and 3) procedures. An opinion poll has been given to teachers and students.

A report on their study is due in February.

DECERTIFICATION OF CUSTODIAL MAINTENANCE UNION-Mr. Masten reported that the Custodial - Maintenance Workers Union had filed a request with the Michigan Department of Labor to decertify. The union was officially formed in February, 1976. There will be an official conference on December 1, 1978 in the Superintendent's office.

Supported by Macomber. Yeas: Macomber, Walkowe, Horning, Mick, Kensler, Bunney and Curley. Nays: -0-. Motion carried.

MIDDLE SCHOOL GIRLS VOLLEYBALL: After a discussion it was moved by Kensler that the Manchester Community Schools sponsor 7th and 8th grade girls volleyball teams during the 1978-79 school year on a limited basis. With the understanding that the season does not exceed two months and the number of interscholastic contests be limited to six with no more than four of these contests being away and further that the coaching remuneration be 4% for each of the teams. 1978-79 BUS DRIVERS PAY: Moved

We continue the flat rate increment as it is with the exception that it would be on a prorated basis in the remaining pays or lump sum the first pay in June. The method of payment to be chosen by each individual driver, with the base drivers pay being \$4.70 per hour.

And further substitute drivers and probationary drivers being paid \$4.25 per hour. The probationary period to be 3 months (90 working days). A driver who has worked a minimum of 6 months (120 working days) will be placed on the second step the next school year. A driver who has worked 90 days but less than 120 will be placed on the next step at semester time the succeeding year. A driver who has worked less than 90 days will remain on the same step the succeeding year.

And further, driver school will be paid to probationary drivers after being eligible to drive 3 months (90 days) at a \$4.25 rate and advanced drivers school will be paid at the rate of \$4.70 per hour to experienced drivers.

All extra trips will be paid at the rate of \$4.70 per hour. And that extra trips will be paid on one hour minimum with the exception of those that immediately precede or follow a regular run which will be paid to the closest next one-half hour. Supported by Horning. Yeas: Walkowe, Horning, Mick, Kensler, Bunney, and Curley. Nays: Macomber. Motion carried.

TRANSFER OF FUNDS: Moved by Kensler that \$1,700 of the funds budgeted for new musical instruments be transferred to the maintenance account to repair school owned instruments. Supported by Walkowe. Yeas: Macomber, Walkowe, Horning, Mick, Kensler, Bunney and Curley. Nays: -0-. Motion carried.

November 20, 1978

A detailed account of Federal and State Sewer Grants and Expenditures was presented for review and discussion.

Public Works Activities as reported by Koebbe and Daniels included: Meeting

with Mr. John Holland at site on Schaffer Court concerning catch basin; Crew has hauled some top soil to the South end of Kirk Park to be ready for seeding next spring; Working at getting truck and snow equipment ready for the winter; The No-Parking from 2 - 5 A.M. signs are in place at the Village Limits, a notice was placed in November 16, Manchester Enterprise; Crew has cleaned the leaves for the under body scraper on the Ford Dump Truck; Front spring on the 1974 Ford Dump truck is being rebuilt at the Vogt Blacksmith Shop in Jackson; The two (2) hour parking signs for Main, Adrian and Clinton Streets have been ordered; On Clinton Street the two (2) hour parking will be enforced from the Alley across from the Village Hall to Madison Street; Air Compressor was delivered; Crew has patched asphalt streets, picked up leaves along the curbs that were in piles, also the bags at the curbs; Do not have a place to replace the dumping site at Manchester Stamping Plant as of Dec. 1, 1978; Shipments of new water meters have arrived, waiting for replacement heads as they were shipped with cubic foot heads and gallon are used. BOARD OF EDUCATION WORK SESSION

The Board of Education met with members of the Community and staff for an informal meeting concerning the Athletic program. President Mick explained that this was the first of several such meetings to discuss different aspects of the school program. Various discussions during the meeting indicated the Board has not yet developed an extended plan for improvement over the next few years but intends to do so after discussing different aspects of the school system with interested Community residents and staff members.

Jim Fielder, Director of Athletics reported that about 26% of the student body participated in winter athletics with approximately 32% participating in fall and spring sports. The reason for the low participation in the winter was attributed

to sports with smaller teams and a lack of indoor facilities for practice sessions and contests.

Members of the Athletic Boosters were present. Joe Fitzgerald, Ted Slautz and Clyde Wellwood reported on the new track and baseball field recently constructed on the Klager School site.

It was reported that nearly \$57,000 has been expended on the track and another \$18,000 on the baseball field. It is estimated that over \$10,000 worth of services and materials have been donated. Emory Garlick indicated that this project would have cost twice as much if formally constructed.

The Board was reminded that the facility would need maintenance and improvements and it was recommended that future budgets take this need into consideration.

The Boosters indicated the hope that the area will develop over the years into a complete recreation center serving all age groups in the Manchester Community.

Superintendent Masten presented the breakdown on the last year's expenditures and receipts. The total cost of the Middle School and High School programs was \$68,000. Gate receipts for the year were nearly \$12,000. The remaining \$48,000 was from General operating funds.

After the reports, items concerning many aspects of the program were discussed by the people attending.

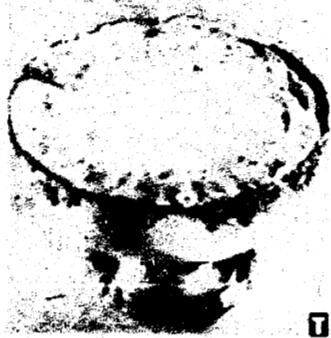
