## DUTCH VICTORIOUS IN PAIR OF NAIL-BITERS

On Tuesday the Dutchmen finally got to play a game in their home arena as they hosted the Warriors of Grass Lake. In last week's article I said Clinton got some revenge by downing us after we nailed them in football. Well, we tasted some revenge as our loss to Grass Lake was sweetened by a 61-59 win on the round-ball court. On Friday we hosted the Hudson Tigers and in a real seat-edger we finished victors 67-62.

Before I get on with the contest I want to point out 2 players who helped the Dutch achieve victory this week. First Rick Krzyzaniak for his clutch baskets--we found ourselves down 1 to the Warriors and Rick canned a 10-footer at the 17 second mark. All-in-all Rick scored 22 the first night and 19 Friday. Secondly, it's the rebounding and point production from Bob Weirich. Bob missed last year but came back this year and at 6' 1" he's listed as the tallest. Bob poured in 33 points this week, 14 and 19.

As the jump took place it looked as if we might be in trouble against the Warriors for the simple fact 4 of their starters had height ranging from 6' 2" to 6' 5". But it's not how tall you are

On Friday, we welcomed Hudson to our court, something they weren't too happy about for the simple reason we have a 16 of 17 record at home. They controlled the tip but turned the sphere over and we converted making it 2-0. We went cold as at 5:02 Hudson held a 6-2 advantage but Bob brought us back by dumping in 2 field goals and a freebie, 7-6. Steve Melcher chalked up 4 as Jeff Geiger hit for 2 to leave the first 8 minutes behind with us up 1, 13-12. The Tigers again grabbed the jump but this time scored to capture the lead. At the 5:36 mark, Hudson sank one making it 17-15 us and they stalled at 15 for the next 2 minutes while we added 5. That was their last 2-pointer of this period but free throws kept them alive, as in the last 2:17 they sank 7-8. As the clock ticked its last (and I mean last) we hit at the horn (alho it didn't sound) to end half up 32-26.

They worked on the clock all intermission and it appeared to have life but it soon went wacko only to let us finish 15 minutes without its help. A stop watch
