JUDGE KENNETH BRONSON NOW PRESIDING 14th DISTRICT COURT



Judge Kenneth Bronson, age 44, lives in Ann Arbor Township with his wife Andrea and five of their six children, who range in age from 20 to 14. He has been a District Judge since elected in 1974 to that position. Judge Bronson, noted for his outstanding legal accomplishments by Who's Who in American Law in their first edition published last year both as a judge and more particularly as an attorney, he's served in the 14th District Court Division 4, the recently created division, upon his election out of the other various districts in the District Court. Prior to becoming a District Judge, Judge Bronson served in the City of Saline from 1965 through 1968 as a Justice of the Peace, having won election therein in 1965 and also served as acting Justice of the Peace in Manchester during the entire time for 1965 through 1968, holding court in Stanton Roesch's office in the evenings, one evening a month. Judge Bronson has been noted for creating the deferred sentencing program which allows first offenders, after suitable labor and other forms of punishment and/or rehabilitative acts, to have charges against them expunged upon the approval of the Probation Department and the Prosecutor's office in specific cases. This action has saved the careers of many people who would otherwise not be employable in their chosen career or field. It is noted for achieving results bringing almost entirely no repeat offenders for those that did it under this program. This innovative program has been cited and reported on by newspapers throughout the country. Judge Bronson further has created the work program through the court, used instead of jail sentences for individuals who either are so wealthy and for whom a fine would be relatively unimportant, or people who have no money at all for whom a fine would be literally impossible, and otherwise they would have to go to jail for their penalty, and for other individuals who the court feels do not belong in jails but do deserve a reminder in addition to a financial one that their activities should not be condoned. In Retrospect

Manchester has had, over a period of years, some very loyal native sons; people who were proud of their town and willing to devote time to making it a better place in which to live. Some of these should be remembered in retrospect. Among the more consistent Manchester boosters was Laurence Wurster (always to be spelled Laurence), who was a native Manchesterite. Said to have been nicknamed "Dutch" when he entered school because he could speak only German as did the rest of his family, he soon became one of the best liked boys in his grade in school and received excellent grades. After graduation he was offered a position in the Peoples Bank of Manchester which was located where the Sutton Agency now is and for many years was a valued member of the staff there. "Dutch" was a rather small, slender fellow but his genial personality and his unflinching enthusiasm about anything that he tackled made him a host of friends. He eventually married and had one son, Ray who grew up to be a charming fellow like his father. But then misfortune struck when his mother was taken ill and became an invalid. But this didn't seem to phase "Dutch"! His genial presence every day on Main Street was the same and he always had time and effort to devote to things civic. He spearheaded many worthy causes for his town and his church and served as a village officer. I remember for example, what a lot of time and effort he put into getting City Road paved. It was quite a battle but eventually he won. At that time there were no paved streets in Manchester except the few blocks of Main Street and quite a few of the older citizens thought that to spend money for such foolishness as a pavement was silly but his persistence won out. This was only one of the victories that "Dutch" won which time later proved to be the right

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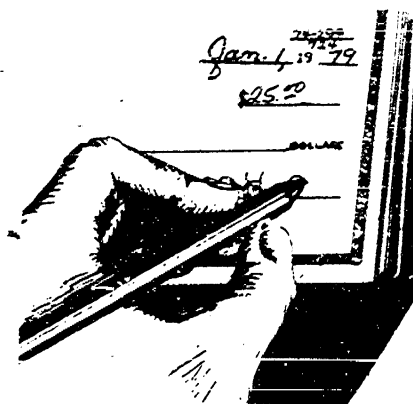

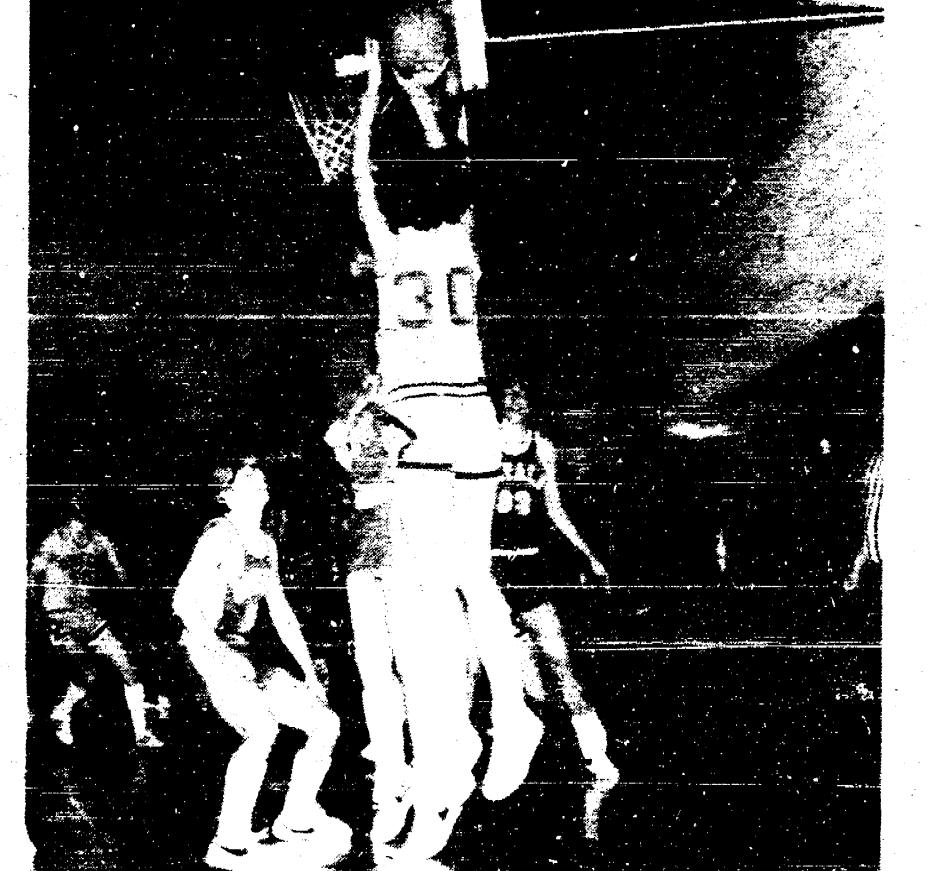

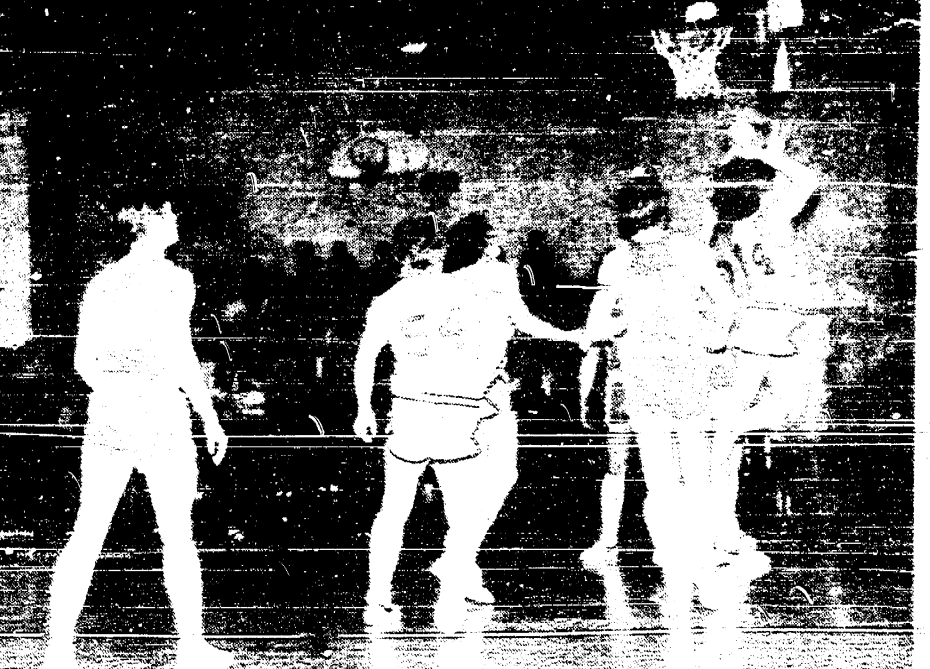
DAN J. BOUTELL AREA BANKER RETIRES
