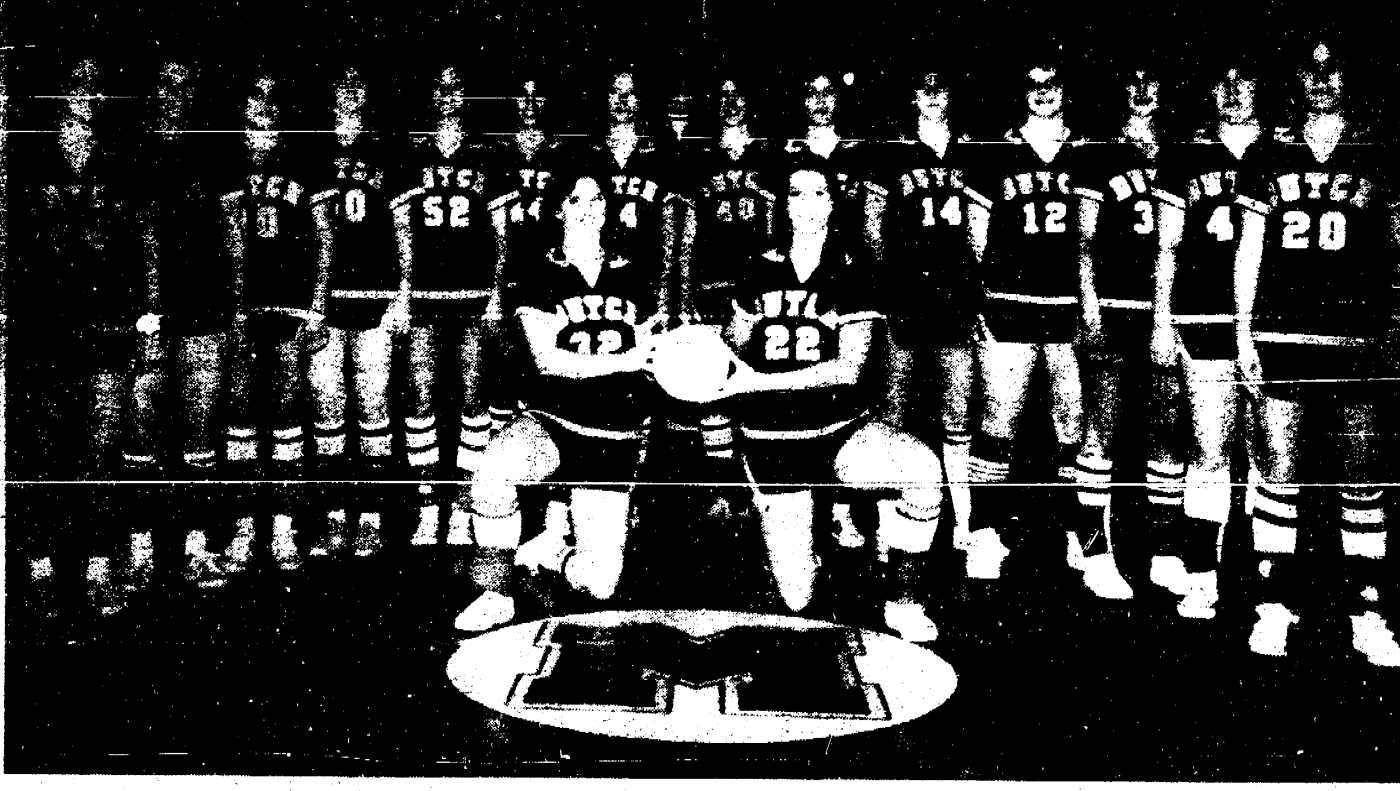

A Red Cross Bloodmobile will be in Manchester, Monday, March 26 from 12 to 6 p.m. for the annual spring visit. Last March, 189 pints of blood was donated by residents of the Manchester School District and employees of local industry. A 200 pint quota is the aim for this spring as the blood supply is critically low.

The new American Legion Hall on Adrian Street will host this Bloodmobile as its first. There is plenty of parking space which can be entered from Adrian and Duncan Streets.

Victory Baptist To Dedicate New Church

The pastors congregation of Victory Baptist wish to invite the public to the dedication of their new church building located at 419 Macomb St.

Ground Breaking was held October 15, 1978. Since that time much work has been completed in erecting the building. Under the direction of Pastor Ron Nelson and the congregation, we were able to have our first service News Years Eve, as was our goal.

We Praise God for His faithfulness and would like you to join with us at 3 p.m., March 11, 1979.

When I first saw Manchester, the building at the "Soulesville" dam was a rather battered wooden building which had been not long before, the Village Light Plant, but which now stood vacant. This plant was owned by J.H. "Ham" Kingsley who lived where the Jenter Funeral Home now is. His water powered generator provided the town with electricity for some years but he not long before, had sold it to Consumers Power Company who had franchises in the surrounding areas, and the plant now stood idle.

Along about this time, A.B. Cohen of Jackson leased the building and installed therein several automatic screw machines and with several employees turned out nuts and bolts. The establishment was familiarly known as Abe Cohen's Nut Factory.

About this time Henry Ford was buying land in Sharon, Saline and Macon and water powered mills in various southern Michigan locations. Soon afterwards if you will remember, he grew soy beans in Sharon and took them to the mill at Saline where they were processed and their oil used for paint for Ford cars.

I remember vividly, meeting a rather non-descriptive gentleman standing on the bridge in downtown Manchester one summer day who talked to me at some length about the town and smiled when I told him that it was a very good little place to reside. He sported a non-descriptive hat, and wore a tattered gray tweed suit which I am sure, had never been pressed, but he was a very interesting visitor, telling me of the possibilities for the use of water powered small factories and the glories of living in America's rural heartland. I kept thinking that I had seen his face somewhere but I didn't want to appear any more stupid than usual so I kept rather quiet for quite a few minutes, but my curiosity got the best of me and I innocently asked, "What is your name, I can't seem to remember it?" And he looked up with a half grin and replied casually, "Why I'm Henry Ford. I'm glad to meet you." And he went on for some minutes expounding his theory for making use of our natural resources. Perhaps he should be around nowadays.

Ford, about this time, purchased the old light plant building and the dam and tore down the old structure and built the one that stands there today. In it was put an assembly plant for Ford automobile instrument panels and which for quite a few years provided employment for nearly 200 from this area.

While this building was being constructed, Manchester saw its first picket. They were strange animals to the local folks who, at that time had very little sympathy for strikes and unions and pickets. Many of them at that time believed that all labor problems could be settled by personal contact, by man to man discussions and friendly arbitration. They had had no contact with big business nor big unions.

But one morning there appeared, pacing up and down in front of the plant being constructed, a picketer carrying a sign "Unfair to organize labor". Investigation showed that the contractor who was erecting the building, had been accused of hiring non union labor but that when told about it had invited the protesters to "go jump in the pond". The union didn't care for this attitude so they designated a picket who faithfully marched up and down in front of the construction site.


This addition to our town was discussed at length and lo and behold the next morning, as the picket arrived to resume his pacing, a couple of dozen farmers and businessmen gathered to observe his actions as he walked back and forth. He walked to the east end of his beat then turned and walked back towards town where the group stood watching him. As he

MANCHESTER FAMILY SERVICE

Manchester Family Service annual meeting summarized the year-round activities of the local United Way volunteer agency which works closely with Washtenaw County Health Department and the Department of Social Services.

Eighty four families were assisted for various reasons in 1978. These included 217 individuals, 102 of whom were children. 8229 miles were driven by 20 different volunteer drivers. These trips were cases of need for medical, dental or optical appointments; necessary trips to the Department of Social Services or Legal Aid, and assistance to Senior Citizens who have no transportation.

With the advent of Dial-a-Ride, transportation assistance will be diminishing as people now have a means of getting about the county by calling 971-4114.

Over 150 pieces of used furniture were located in needy homes by the agency. Those who have furniture, stoves, refrigerators and household items to give away may call Mrs. Franklin Reck, chairman of Manchester Family Service, Inc. and give a description of their offering. With a list of "Haves" and "Needs" by the phone, articles may be picked up quickly in most cases.

Used clothing that is clean and in usable condition is distributed three times a year by the agency through "Shops" that are set

up for families on aid or those recommended by churches civic organizations and individuals. The Beta Sigma Phi sorority and Jaycees Auxiliary assist with these "Shops".

Referral to House-by-the-Side-of-the-Road is given for clothing needs throughout the year. Excess clothing from the local distribution go to this county agency as well as Salvation Army or an Indian Reservation.

All types of emergencies; housing problems; home aides and the Easter, Thanksgiving and Christmas Projects are other phases of the agency's work.

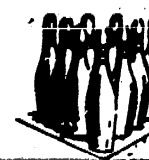

Township of Sharon Ordinance No. 9

ORDINANCE NO. 9
FISCAL YEAR ORDINANCE
Adopted MARCH 1, 1979
Effective: MARCH 8, 1979

An Ordinance to establish the fiscal year of the Township of Sharon, Washtenaw County, Michigan and the annual settlement day for such Township pursuant to Michigan Public Act 596 of 1978.

THE TOWNSHIP OF SHARON, WASHTENAW COUNTY MICHIGAN HEREBY ORDAINS:
SECTION I

Commencing in 1979, the fiscal year of the Township shall extend from July 1st of each year until June 30th of the following year. Any pre-existing Township budget lawfully adopted by the Township Board shall be proportionately extended to coincide with the foregoing new fiscal year periods.

SECTION II

MANCHESTER TOWNSHIP
ORDINANCE NO. 18

An Ordinance to establish the fiscal year of the Township of Manchester, Washtenaw County, Michigan, and the annual settlement date for such Township pursuant to Michigan Public Act 596 of 1978.

THE TOWNSHIP OF MANCHESTER, WASHTENAW COUNTY MICHIGAN ORDAINS:
SECTION I

Commencing in 1979, the fiscal year of the Township shall extend from July 1, of each year until June 30 of the following year. Any pre-existing Township budget lawfully adopted by the Township Board shall be proportionately extended to coincide with the foregoing new fiscal year periods.

DUTCH NIPPED TWICE



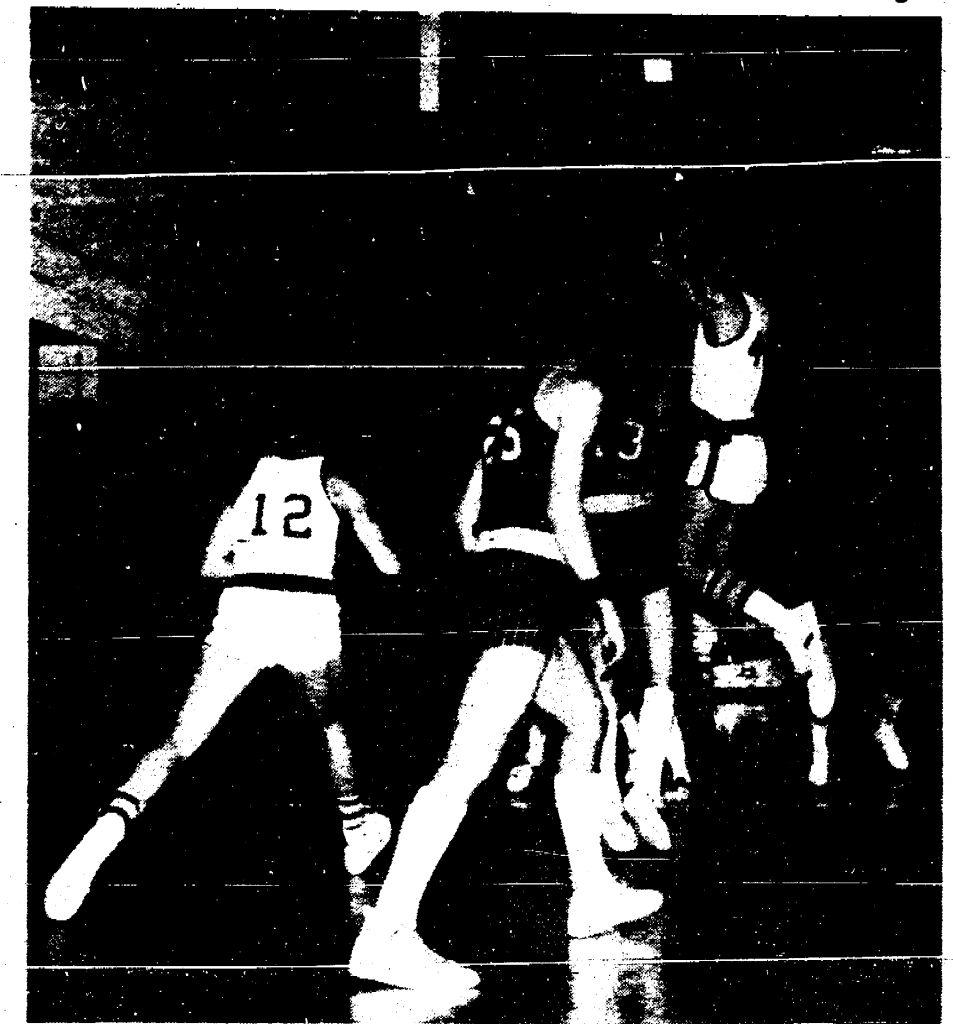
Senior Craig Rogers hits for 2 of his 8 at Blissfield. Photo by Jon Hardenbergh

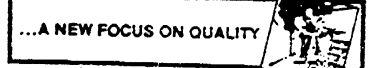

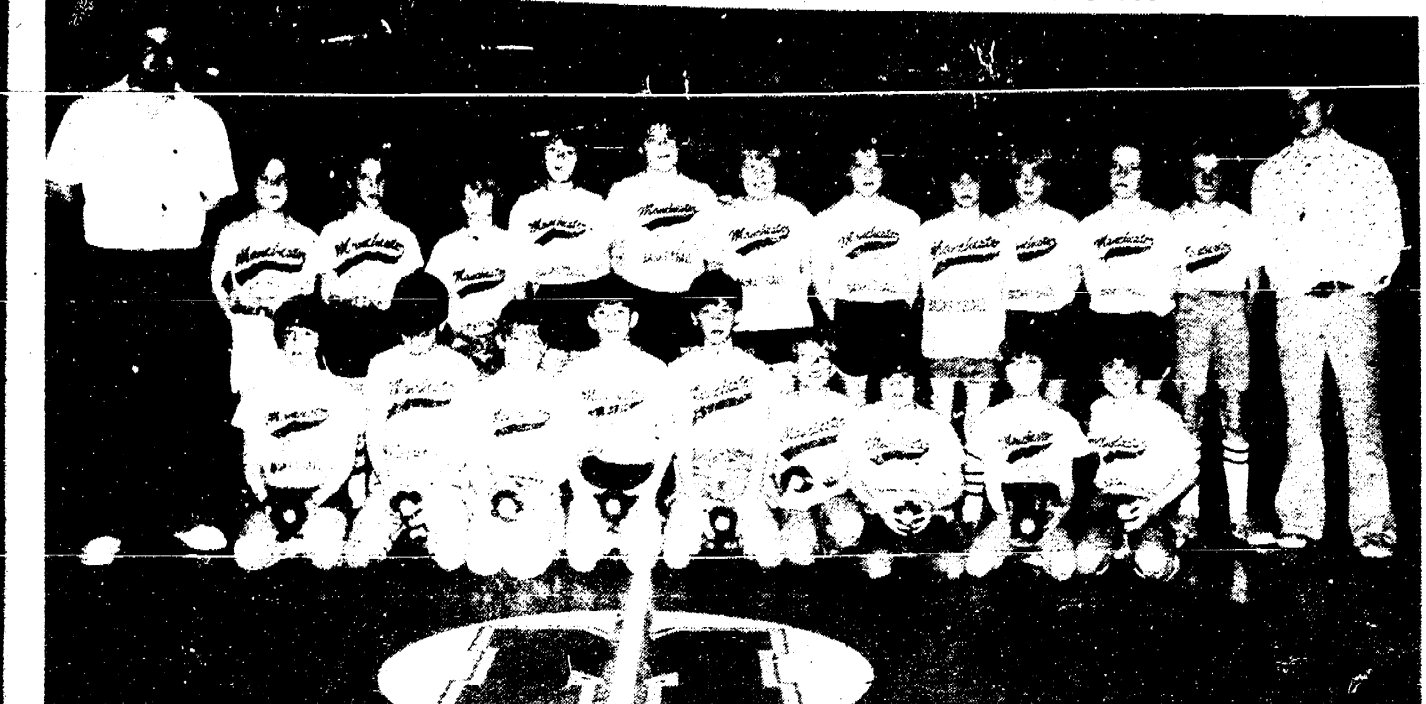



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Council Proceedings

February 19, 1979

Council met in regular session with the meeting called to order by President Schaffer at 7:00 P.M. Present: Althouse, Fitzgerald, Koebbe, Hinkley, Daniels, Zsenyuk.

Minutes of the February 5, 1979 meeting were approved in a motion by Koebbe, seconded by Althouse, carried.

Chief Zsenyuk reported \$2,000.00 had been received from the Insurance Co. for a Police Car which had been totaled and that a car could be purchased from the Chrysler Proving Grounds for a price of \$3,600.00 and be available in four to six weeks. Moved by Fitzgerald, supported by Althouse the car be purchased for the Police Dept. All years, carried.

Jim Mann and William Cannon were present to present plans for renovation of a building at 135 E. Main St. Sale of the building was contingent on being able to acquire a building permit. Fitzgerald voiced the opinion that Claran Knauss, Sr., Building Inspector was in charge of administering the Code and approval should come from him. Wm. Cannon was advised by Council to get approval from Claran Knauss.

Public Works Activities as reported by Koebbe included: The firm of McNamee, Porter and Seeley have plans and specifications prepared and sent to contractor for the replacement of the section of sewer across Kirk Park Bed. They are due at 7:30 p.m. Feb. 19th at council rooms as instructed to do. The contract on tree work

with Shepherd Tree Service was signed and returned to Mr. Shepherd and the company has filed its insurance with the village. Mr. Shepherd will set a date to start work this week.

Mr. and Mrs. Gary Widmayer were given the name of Terry Walkington in Lansing, our Basin Engineer who has control of our sewer program and the person to permit ground water place in the sewer system.

Mr. Claran Knauss and Daniels consulted with the village attorney on the Red Tax on Day residence, and the village attorney Mr. M. Gistingier contacted the Day's attorney Hendley & Datsko on the need of a Building Permit, which all building needs; On February 14, 1979 the firm preparing plans and specifications for the new township office and Fire Barn called about service of water and sewer requesting fee's and checking the Ordinance #83, the fee for a 4 inch service line would cost \$2,600.00 and all material, labor and equipment cost of work required. The public works had to replace 3 of the Two Hour Parking signs on Clinton Street in less than a month. Patched holes in the asphalt streets when weather has permitted. Plowed snow and salted streets as the weather required. Had the 74 Ford Dump Truck worked on at Widmayer Co. Complete tune up at cost of \$84.33. Met with Jim Mann to show him sewer location of E. Main St. and Torrey St. on the question of Mr. Hendley on village and the E. Well. Daniels presented a quotation on paint for Street Marking at a cost of \$800.00. Moved by Koebbe, supported by Althouse the paint be purchased for street

marking. All years, carried.

President Schaffer reported he had been advised by Village Attorney to get an appraisal on land which is owned by James Hendley. Moved by Koebbe, supported by Althouse the advice of Village Attorney be taken and an appraisal be received from an outside appraiser. All years, carried.

President Schaffer opened two bids for the Kirk Park Sewer. Union Construction Co. presented a bid of \$24,526.25 and was accompanied by a Bid Bond of 5%. Douglas N. Higgins presented a bid of \$19,875.00 and was accompanied by a Bid Bond of 5%.

Don Limpert questioned what the scope of the work on the project would be, and the legality of working on the sewer. Allen Schaffer replied to the question. Moved by Althouse supported by Hinkley the decision on the bids be left up to Public Works Committee. Roll call vote - Althouse years, Hinkley yea, Koebbe yea, Fitzgerald abstain, carried.

Moved by Koebbe supported by Fitzgerald a resolution be adopted for Designation of Bruce T. Daniels as Street Administrator for the Village of Manchester. All years, carried.

The clerk advised Council Kay Roesch would serve as Election Chairman assisted by Vera Schaible, Maxine Widmayer, Margaret Tapping. Moved by Hinkley supported by Althouse Kay Roesch be appointed Election Chairman and Committee as presented. All years, carried.

A recess was called for five minutes.

A Public Hearing was held on the Petition of Martin J. Way at 8:00 P.M. to vacate the South-eastern portion of Granger Street which lies south to a point where Granger curves from an approximately North-South direction to an East-West direction. Letter of objection was received from Margaret and Marie Schneider, Florence Kirk, Emma Westphal. A letter of objection was also received from Esther Walz. Objection was voiced by Roger Thornton. Moved by Koebbe, supported by Althouse to deny request to vacate that portion of Granger Street. Roll

call vote-Hinkley yea, Koebbe yea, Althouse yea, Fitzgerald yea, carried.

Hinkley questioned whose obligation it was to pay for sidewalk at Territorial and Washington Streets at Fire Barn Site. Fitzgerald expressed the opinion it should be on a 50-50 Basis.

The tentative floor plans for the Village Hall when it is vacated were presented by Hinkley.

A Public Hearing was held at 8:30 P.M. on a request from Allen W. Schaffer for a change in zoning for a parcel of land located at 515 Territorial St. from R-1 (Single Family Residential) to I-1 (Limited Industrial District) that a new Storage Building and new offices could be constructed for Union Construction Co. There was a question and answer period with audience participation. Objections were voiced to spot zoning by Miss Wade, Attorney for Jay Lantis. Objection was also voiced by Don Limpert. Broucek, chairman and Leeson, secretary reported the Planning Comm. had approved Site Plans as presented. It was moved by Althouse supported by Koebbe to grant the request to change the parcel of land in question to I-1 from R-1. Roll call vote - Hinkley yea, Koebbe yea, Althouse yea, Fitzgerald abstain, carried.

Council adjourned at 9:15 to reconvene as Zoning Board of Appeals to consider the request for variances in setback requirements by Union Construction Co. request a 40' setback on west side and 5' setback on East Side. Moved by Hinkley supported by Koebbe the request for variances be granted with the stipulations there be a Buffer zone on East Side existing fence line, Buffer zone along West side line, 50' Buffer zone in front and a maximum of 2 entrances. Roll call vote-Hinkley, Koebbe, Althouse, Daniels, Broucek, Leeson all years. Fitzgerald abstain. Moved by Althouse, supported by Broucek to adjourn as Zoning Board of Appeals at 10:00 p.m. All years, carried.

A recess declared for 5 minutes. Council reconvened at 10:05 p.m. A

IN RETROSPECT

Long about this time of year, when spring is sprung, we think back and recall some of the symptoms of Spring. The past few mornings when we ventured outdoors, we heard the birds singing their happy songs at the top of their voice and felt the balmy caress of the spring breezes and smiling to ourselves we recalled a couple of the definite signs of the season.

One of these signs was always the sudden growth of the perky dandelion which pushed its way up almost over night through the grass and the leaves matted on the lawns and in the field and fence corners. They spread their pointed leaves and almost over night their buds and nodding yellow flowers appeared.

When I was a pup the advent of dandelion season was one to look forward to. When I was not too old Mother and I went out to get a real "mess" of dandelion greens. We hunted spots where the grass and weeds had not been cut last year...preferably spots out of the traffic pattern of people and dogs; spots where they grew lush and tall and then we busied ourselves with a couple of old knives and dug and dug until we had at least a bushel of them.

They had to be harvested when they were quite large, but before the flower buds had matured enough to be nearly ready to open. If one waited too long the greens became too bitter for use, but if harvested at the right time they had a flavor that was delicious - and besides they were supposed to be good for what ailed us after three or four months of the winter blahs, and they were too.

I thing however that before those who harvested them for the table had prepared them for consumption they had earned their feast for after they were dug they had to be carefully cleaned and inspected, one by one, and then washed thoroughly several times as you who are addicted to them know, and then cooked until they are tender and tasty. A goodly chunk of salt pork or ham butt has to be cooked with them to provide a never to be forgotten flavor.

One of the dandelion's failings was that they "cooked down" a great bit and the bushel that one started out with was sadly shrunken by the time they were table ready.

Those of you, of which I am sure there are many, I am certain will agree with me that there is no substitute for these spring specials. They have a taste appeal all their own.

Besides their role as a cooked vegetable they too have a place in spring salads. The really tender new leaves, together with perhaps a bit of lettuce if you can afford it, doused with hot bacon grease and vinegar can add a real tang to any meal.
