The regular meeting of the Manchester Village Planning Commission was held at the Village Hall, with members present: Broucek, Whittington, Leeson, Chapin, Daniels, Krauss, and Tracy.

The meeting was called to order at 7:27 p.m., by Ch. Broucek.

Minutes of the last meeting were read, and on the motion by Krauss, seconded by Chapin, were approved.

Mr. Allen Schaffer, accompanied by Mr. Douglas Schaffer were in attendance to review a site plan and letter, previously submitted, and further to show an elevation view of the proposed project for improvement of the Union Construction Company installations at 505 Territorial Street.

It was moved by Tracy that rezoning the area, which will include the buildings, drives, parking, etc., from "AG" (Agriculture), or "R1B" (Single-Family Residential) to "I-1" (Limited Industrial District) be approved in the concept as presented, including the site plans on file. This area is approximately 181.50 feet frontage on Territorial Street, by 330 feet deep (south from Territorial Street.) The motion was seconded by Krauss, and unanimously approved.

The meeting was declared adjourned at 8:20 p.m.

Girl Scout Week

MARCH 11-17, 1979



GIRL SCOUTS

March 11-17 is Girl Scout Week, marking the 67th anniversary of the founding of Girl Scouting, March 12, 1912, in Savannah, Georgia, by Juliette Low.

More than three million members of this organization are observing 1979 as the International Year of the Child, and will be highlighting it with special "Find the Gift in Every Child" projects during the celebration.

"All children are gifted in some way," said Fran Bauer, President, Huron Valley Girl Scout Council, "but many don't know, until they try, that they have a special talent or ability they can take pride in or share with others. That's what Girl Scouting is all about...helping each girl discover her potential and then to develop it."

Appropriately 1979 honors the child since it was 20 years ago that the United Nations unanimously accepted the Declaration of the Rights of the Child.

Girl Scouting is the largest voluntary organization for girls, ages 6 through 17, in the world. It is part of a worldwide family of girls and adults in 94 countries through its membership in the World Association of Girl Guides and Girl Scouts.

Huron Valley Girl Scout Council, which serves more than 10,000 girls in Washtenaw, Livingston, western Wayne and northern Monroe counties, is one of nearly 350 councils in the United States.

U of M Youth Band

The University of Michigan Youth Band will present a program on Sunday, March 25 at 3:00 p.m. at the Manchester High School. Admission will be free, with a reception following.

The Michigan Youth Band/Wind Ensemble Program was founded in 1973 in an effort to provide broad and stimulating musical experiences for musically gifted youth. The program is sponsored by the University of Michigan School of Music and Extension Service, in cooperation with University Bands.

The band is composed of approximately 67 students from 35 different schools in many cities throughout the state. Some students travel as far as 150 miles each Saturday morning for three hours of rehearsal at the U-M School of Music.

Membership in the Youth Band is gained only through audition.

The opportunities in musical performance are provided through participation in the band, wind ensemble, and chamber music programs. A scholarship program involving advanced study at Interlochen and The University of Michigan is also a large part of the ever-growing opportunities for Youth Band students.

Even though the Youth Band/Wind

Ensemble is a relatively recent addition to the University of Michigan Bands, it has already received national recognition through performances such as the Music Educators National Conference in Chicago in April 1978.

Kurt Sauter, senior trombone player in the Manchester High School band program is a member of this group and will be performing in their concert.
