## BRIDGEWATER TOWNSHIP Ordinance No. 10

AN ORDINANCE TO ESTABLISH THE FISCAL YEAR OF THE TOWNSHIP OF BRIDGEWATER, WASHTENAW COUNTY, MICHIGAN, AND THE ANNUAL SETTLEMENT DATE FOR SUCH TOWNSHIP PURSUANT TO MICHIGAN PUBLIC ACT 596 OF 1978.

THE TOWNSHIP OF BRIDGEWATER, WASHTENAW COUNTY, MICHIGAN ORDAINS:

Section 1. Commencing in 1979, the fiscal year of the Township shall extend from April 1 of each year until March 31 of the following year. Any preexisting Township budget lawfully adopted by the Township Board shall be proportionately extended to coincide with the foregoing new fiscal year periods.

Section 2. The annual settlement day meeting of the Township Board shall hereafter be held on the 15th day of the last month of the fiscal year of the Township unless said day falls on a Saturday, Sunday or legal holiday whereupon said meeting shall be held on the following Monday which is not a legal holiday.

Section 3. The annual meeting of the electors of the Township, where the same has not been abolished, shall be held on the last Saturday in the last month of the aforesaid fiscal year at such time and place as is determined by the Township Board.

Section 4. This Ordinance shall take immediate effect. All ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed.

## School Election Monday, June 11

The annual school election will be held from 7:00 A.M. to 8:00 P.M. on Monday, June 11th. Just after we had completed last week's "Ode to a Dandelion" it was checked by a friend of ours and he chastized us rather unmercifully for being prejudiced. "No where," he said "did we mention rhubarb, and rhubarb was just as much a harbinger of spring as was the lovely dandelion", stopped to think about it, we decided that he was right and so we shall try to make amends to rhubarb for inadvertently omitting it from our Spring fantasy.

While pondering on this subject of rhubarb, however, we stopped in the local food store to view the steaks while on the way to purchase a bit of hamburger and as we passed the produce counter we saw an attractive stack of red and green rhubarb and as we paused we heard a wiseacre nearby say "I hope the rain doesn't hurt the rhubarb". This corny remark brought back vividly, memories of that pink and green stalk which, depending on whether or not you looked at the distinctive tang of rhubarb, was either sweet or sour.

Mother called it "pie plant" and our patch grew for years in the back of the garden and we watched for its first tender shoots pushing up in the spring.

As soon as it was big enough we harvested it and stripped the leaves from the stems and it was a rather common visitor on our table until June. By then our romance with rhubarb was over. We had eaten it in a dozen ways. There was rhubarb sauce with sugar and a wee bit of butter, sometimes laced with gooseberries, and also rhubarb betty, and of course, rhubarb pie.

Perhaps rhubarb has, however lost its stature as a harbinger of spring because we note it is now available all year round, all cut up and peeled and frozen, all ready to be cut up and served after having been quickly cooked but I'll bet it doesn't taste of spring like the old fashioned kind fresh from the garden did.

**WCC Approves Scholarship Program**

A new, comprehensive, \$100,000 scholarship program was approved by Washtenaw Community College trustees Tuesday, February 28. The program offers scholarship assistance to older individuals in the county, seniors in each high school in the county, adults returning to education, and persons who do not qualify for federal scholarship help.

"Through this program we hope to remove money as a barrier to anyone seriously interested in getting an education," Dr. Gunder A. Myran, WCC president said.

The various scholarship categories are designed to assist individuals of all ages, whatever their educational background, to advance themselves through career and general education programs at the College. Myran emphasized.

Scholarships are divided into five categories: high school merit (for seniors in 15 public and private high schools in the county), community merit, start-up (for

returning adults), emeritus (senior citizens), and Trustee (for persons not eligible for federal financial assistance).

The total cost of the scholarships is \$94,400, which will come from the College General Fund and community sources.

Each scholarship will include tuition, books, and supplies for two semesters. The program becomes effective immediately and scholarships will be applicable for the Fall semester 1979. Persons interested in applying may call the financial aids office at the College - 973-3525.

## Walkathon Getting Underway

Co-Chairpersons Bonita Kothe and Matt Donnellon, have announced the date for the 3rd Annual March of Dimes Walkathon. April 28th is the big day, with a rain date of May 5th. "The Superwalk is growing in popularity, and it is hoped it will be bigger and better than ever this year," says our State Farm Agent, Matt Donnellon. "To help it grow, the Middle Schools in Chelsea and Clinton are being invited to join our Manchester people, in our walk against birth defects," Matt said. "Our goals this year are 175 walkers, with pledges of \$8750. With the help of the community, we can reach these goals," he said.

And much help is needed to finish the walk safely and successfully. Safety is the most important item of the day's activities, therefore, people are needed for communications and pick up cars. CB's are needed at checkpoints and along the route, and those who tire out between checkpoints, are surely grateful to see those cars marked with March Of Dimes signs come along. If you would like to help in this area please contact Gary Bondy.

People are also needed at each checkpoint, to help with checking walkers in and out at the Middle School, for getting snacks to the checkpoints, for the welcoming committee when the walkers return, and to help with awards and prizes. This years route will be essentially the same, with these 2 exceptions. Due to another activity at the High School, the Walk will begin and end at the Middle School. 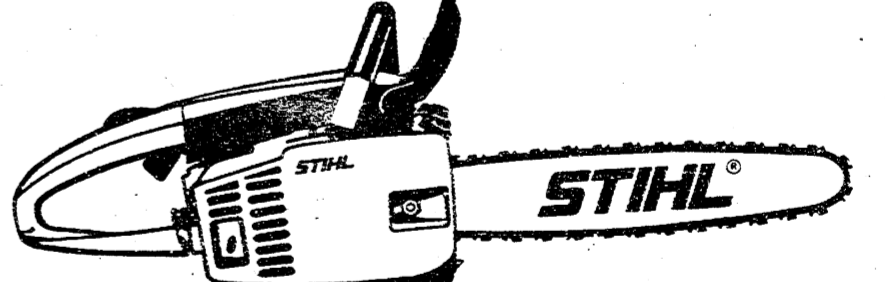

### 41st Annual Southwestern Michigan Vocal Festival

The 41st annual Southwestern Michigan Vocal Festival, presented in cooperation with the Department of Music at Western Michigan University, will be held on Thursday evening, March 22. The 1400-voice festival chorus will present a free public performance in James W. Miller Auditorium at 7:00 p.m. This year's guest conductor is Douglas McEwen of Arizona State University in Tempe.

The large chorus has been prepared for the festival by choral directors from 30 participating Michigan high schools. Since its inception in 1935, the Southwestern Michigan Vocal Festival has been dedicated to one goal: "To provide an experience in mass singing of good repertoire under the leadership of an inspiring conductor." Under the early direction of Harper C. Maybee and Elwyn Carter, this festival became one of the most respected and successful of its kind in the nation.

The evening concert will include the 1979 SWMVF Honors Choir. Made up of the "best quartet" of voices from each school,

this 100-voice ensemble will perform three works during the evening program, including Paratum Cor Ejus by Vivaldi; O Love Divine by Handel; and Sweet Canaan by Taylor.

Douglas McEwen first conducted the SWMVF in 1976. His success with the large chorus prompted the committee to desire his return as soon as a new generation of students had evolved. McEwen is the Director of Chorus at Arizona State University in Tempe. He received his masters degree from Indiana University and his doctorate from the University of Northern Colorado. Before accepting his current position, he was director of Choral Activities at the University of Colorado and the University of New Mexico at Albuquerque. As a professional musician, he has served as assistant director of the Meadowbrook Choral Institute, appeared as guest conductor with the Minneapolis Symphony, and recorded movie sound tracks. Recently, he was appointed Director of Choral Masterworks for the International Youth and Music Festival in Vienna.

This year's Festival Chorus will perform six works: Dona Nobis Pacem by Haydn; Rachmaninoff's Ave Maria; and Glorious Everlasting by Cousins. The massed chorus will continue with Arnold's The Bells; Blow, Thou Winter Wind by Rutter; and Shepherd Me, Lord by Kingsley.

Also participating in the festival will be

the 40-voice University Chorale, under the direction of Mel Ivey, and the "Gold Company Band" conducted by Stephen Zegree. Kathryn Loew, University Organist, will also perform.

The 1979 Southwestern Michigan Vocal Festival committee includes Barbara Baltmani of Mattawan High School, Randy Posthumus of Kent City High School, Mark Webb of East Kentwood High School, and three representatives from Western's Department of Music: Marilyn Heim, Mel Ivey, and Carl Doubleday. This year's festival pianist is Carol Perry, a WMU junior from Marshall.

Participating high school choirs include: Bangor, Brandywine (Niles), Climax Scotts, Comstock Park, Constantine, Creston (Grand Rapids), East Grand Rapids, East Kentwood, Fennville, Gobles, Central (Grand Rapids), Greenville, Harper Creek, Jenison, Kent City, Lakeview, Manchester, Marshall, Martin, Mattawan, Niles, Rogers (Wyoming), Otsego, Plainwell, South Haven, Ottawa Hills, Springfield, Union (Grand Rapids), Vicksburg, and Wyoming Park.



Constant up dating on the shelves means parallel changes in the card catalogue; this job she attended to religiously. A custom made check-out desk and rugged carpeting has been installed under her supervision. Mary's willingness to help patrons of all ages, her integrity and cheerfulness always made a trip to the library a most pleasant experience. She will be missed but we all wish her well in the coming years.

### Coupon Book Promotion

Better Business Bureau of Metropolitan Detroit cautions area consumers to take a close look at home telephone solicitations which feature a "shopping spree" and appear to offer over \$500.00 in "free" gifts, service, and merchandise.

This approach, which is currently being used in our area, is actually a promotion to sell coupon books for \$24.95, and any implication that the benefits of the book are "free", when they actually cost \$24.95, is misleading.

The Promoters of this coupon book set up a "boiler room" of telephone solicitors who will make calls to entire telephone exchanges with the sales pitch.

Coupon book telephone solicitations of this nature generally create an impression that an area resident has been specially selected to receive this offer when, such is not the fact.

It is the Bureau's opinion that it is misleading for a coupon book promoter to notify a consumer that he is eligible to receive anything of value, if in order to receive this item, a special service and handling fee of \$24.95 is charged.

The Bureau advises consumers to judge the value of a coupon book in terms of the \$24.95 cost, and not, the \$500.00 or \$1,000.00 value being claimed for it.

### AGRICULTURE IN ACTION MICHIGAN FARM BUREAU

#### LETTUCE STRIKE AFFECTS YOU

The California lettuce strike could be over by the time you read this, but it is still an issue that concerns all of us regardless of whether it's settled or not.

Strangely enough, despite all the violence

that's occurred during the strike, there's been little national news media exposure. For example, back in February, upwards of a thousand United Farm Worker supporters invaded the lettuce fields. Keep in mind that these are private fields and they were trespassing. They went through the property of growers who had striking and non-striking employees alike, and terrorized workers on the job. Their rampage brought out sheriff's deputies from four counties, left two policemen injured, and a shambles of battered cars and trucks. Yet,

in all of this, the leader of the United Farm Workers Union, Cesar Chavez, goes about talking of non-violence.

There are those who have sympathy for the farm workers because they believe them to be poor, downtrodden migrants. This is simply not so. The lettuce workers in California are local residents who are already making from \$9.00 to \$12.00 an hour when you count the basic wage and bonus piece rates. Chavez's new wage demands range from 32 to 90 percent above that.

The national news media have missed the point about the violence and the wages, and they have also missed a third issue-votes turning down Chavez's union. There were three votes just prior to the lettuce strike when disenfranchised workers voted the UFW out.

In spite of the "non-news" coming out of the lettuce fields, there are church and other groups still singing the praises of Chavez and his "non-violent" ways. Chances are, with the help of some of the church groups, perhaps even your own, you'll be hearing more about Cesar Chavez and his union in other states as well.

In the meantime, violence continues and lettuce lies in the field to rot in California.

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

**Burn Center Approved at U of M**

University Hospital, Ann Arbor, received approval from the State Health Director February 28 to construct a separate building to be used as a Burn Center.

The multi-story facility will house thirty beds, two operating rooms, a four-room outpatient clinic, patient and family waiting areas, physical medicine and rehabilitation area, social services, and research and education areas.

The thirty beds include two 6-bed intensive care units with hydro-therapy in each, six acute care and 12 rehabilitation beds. This project will consolidate all existing burn care beds in the Ann Arbor

health facilities service area, which includes the ten existing burn beds at University Hospital, six at St. Joseph Mercy Hospital, and 14 Rehabilitation beds at Chelsea Community Hospital. University Hospital will designate twenty of its medical surgical beds as burn beds.

No new beds will be added to the University Hospital or to the Ann Arbor health service area.

The Burn Center will be dependent upon the main hospital for laboratory, x-ray, dietetics and housekeeping services.

Cost of the project is \$6,437,000.

The National Institute of Burn Medicine has undertaken a \$6.5 million fund raising campaign from private sources to finance the center.

The State Health Director's decision coincided with the recommendation of the Comprehensive Health Planning Council of Southeastern Michigan.

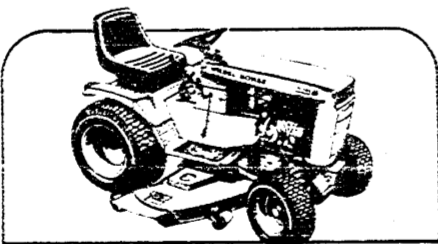

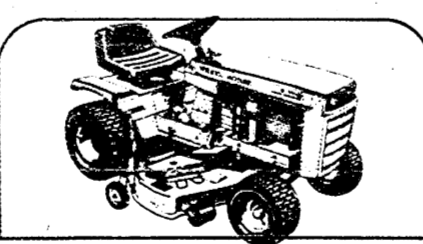

## 20th Century Club

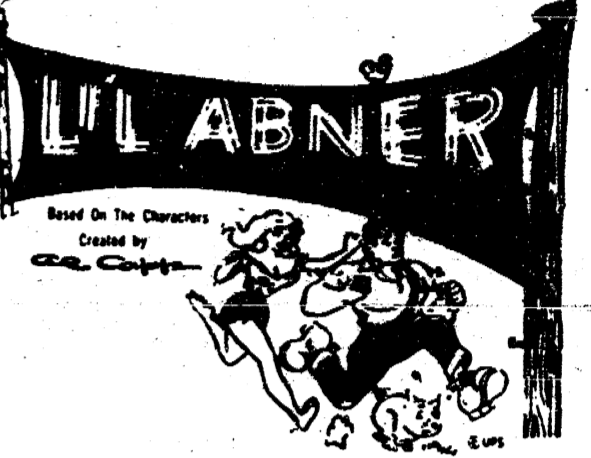

Mamma and Pappy get wind of General Bullmoose's plot, and the entire population of Dogpatch invades the capitol city to rescue Abner. The Mercer-de Paul score is filled with hits such as "Namey You," "If I Had My Druthers," "Love in a Home," and such hilarious foot-stomps as "Progress is the Root of All Evil," "Oh, Happy Day" (a scientists dream of a conveyor-belt future), "The Country's in the Very Best of Hands" and "Jubilant T. Cornpone."
