


He was preceded in death by a daughter Sharon Stidham in 1976, a grandson Daniel Bivins Jr. in 1979 and a brother Shade in 1975.







Dr. Robert Billings will be the guest speaker at the Sunday services, June 3, at the North Sharon Bible Church. He will be

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
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Community Education Keeping Up with Sports

Regulations on Legal Use Of School Buses: Superintendent Masten reported that State regulations indicate that buses may not be used for any purpose other than transporting children to and from school and on school sponsored trips and under certain conditions to transport Sr. Citizens.

possibility of having to arrange for other transportation of customers from the High School to the Athletic Field for the Chicken Broil.

Years ago, I thought it might be a good idea to start a file of published reports in which some scientist or another advised the public to avoid the use or ingestion of a product for health reasons. I'm glad I never got around to doing it because by now the collection would have grown to the point where it would fill at least one library.

The list is endless, from cholesterol to saccharin. The latest addition to the list is black pepper. According to the magazine SCIENCE NEWS, a scientist from the University of Kentucky called a press conference at a meeting of the American Chemical Society in Honolulu to announce that he had produced tumors in laboratory animals by applying extracts of black pepper to their skin. He said he also suspected cinnamon, vanilla, and anise. Members of the Society's agricultural and food chemistry division made a surprise appearance at the press conference to disclaim the announcement as being "too premature" and "too broad in scope." In Retrospect

One of our loyal readers handed me a McClure's Magazine the other day dated November, 1903. In many ways reading it pointed out that things nowadays were very different than then, but in many ways they were little different. It was most interesting reading.

The table of contents contained a feature article on the wonders of and "The Explanation of the Properties of Radium". It must have been that radium and its applications and uses were evidently, at that time, about as controversial and confusing to the average person as Nuclear Power is today. The arguments about its alleged advantages and uses and its potential dangers raged quite unabated at that time.

Dr. Ray Stannard Baker, a top flight reporter, discussed the "Labor Boss" and another reported on "New York, Good Government In Danger". An announcement was made of forthcoming articles by Ida Tarbell on the "History of the Standard Oil Company" which was also to recount its sins. Seems almost like current subjects doesn't it?

Let us remember that the magazines of those days filled a somewhat different role than they do nowadays. Besides current events these magazines contained top flight fiction by famous authors, one of whom in this issue was Rex Beach and another Stewart Edward White.

It should also be remembered that in 1903 there was no radio nor TV. This was the month and year in which the Wright Brothers made their first plane flight, and automobiles were a rarity. Most of us lived a much greater confined existence. We stayed at home in our own communities and had little contact with the world as a whole except thru the newspapers and magazines. So the magazines of that day were not pointed to a specialized field like our news and business magazines of today. They touched on all phases of our life.

The fiction was partly humorous and partly romantic or "Gothic" as it is called today, and while there were decorous pictures by well known artists to illustrate these stories, and photos to accompany the articles, none of them resembled those in
