## MANCHESTER DAY CAMP



Tuesday morning, June 12th was very exciting. Brownie and Junior Girl Scouts checked in at the big pavilion at Carr Park for a busy day at camp. Then on to the Paint Shop for the stenciling of T-shirts. The stencil, made by Webb Seegert read "Manchester Brownie Day Camp, 1979". From about 9:15 to 10:00 the girls met with their leaders, in their assigned pavilion, to discuss camp rules, pick camp names and elect 2 girls from each troop to the Camp Council. The Camp Council met each day to gather information for their troops. At 10:00 the first Camp Flag Ceremony was conducted. Mrs. Schwab (Pidgeon) the Camp Director and a camper from each troop led the ceremony. Then the girls had time to make name tags. Camp was in full swing. Supplies had to be picked up and water jars filled. First day lunch was a Brown Bagger. The girls hiked to a favorite spot after talking about rules of hiking and to "Watch Out" for poison ivy. About 1:00 all were ready for a "Quiet Time" under the Singing Tree at the big pavilion. Senior Scout Carolyn Schwab taught us some new songs while Pidgeon had a staff meeting with the leaders. The big project for the afternoon was for each girl to make a situpon she could use all week. Newspapers were covered with wallpaper samples and visqueen was sewn on with yarn to make a portable cushion. Before everyone realized, it was 2:30 and time to clean up for the day. The Flag closing ceremony was at 2:45 and parents picked the girls up at 3:00. Wednesday, Thursday and Friday were filled with fun things to do. Crafts included plaster crafts using things from nature, molding with clay, shingle plaques, stone doodles and broaches made from pop can rings. The girls learned new games and tossed water balloons. The meals for the rest of the week were cooked at camp. The menus included hot dogs on a stick, hobo dinners, sloppy joes, doughboys and roasted marshmallows. Each troop prepared their own meals at their campsite except for Friday when the whole group had one "big picnic at the large pavilion". Each day followed about the same schedule with Senior Scout Kathy Gotts joining Carolyn under the Singing Tree on Wednesday. Jan Waldron, a troop leader and Kay Miller, a camp registrar taught us some action songs on Thursday and Mr. Rod

## In Retrospect

We read where the state is gonna provide breakfasts now for the "needy" children in our schools. There has been appropriated some fifty million dollars of taxpayers money for this purpose which will be added to the money now spent on the "hot lunch" program. Reading about this makes me think back to the days when the children walked to school carrying a lunch box containing their "not hot" lunch. Those were the days when many of us in our town were what nowadays would be classified as "needy". Many families had what now would be called marginal incomes, but we didn't even know it. We had sufficient clothing to wear and plenty to eat-sometimes the home grown pork had buttons on it after it was fried, but it and the boiled or baked potatoes and sometimes the fried corn meal mush with home grown vegetables and fruit were plentiful, and it seems to us that it tasted better than the carefully prepared canned or frozen stuff that comes out of the markets today. You don't suppose our taste buds have deteriorated do you? However it made most of us strong and healthy without our having any knowledge of a "balanced diet". Even our dogs did well on table scraps and didn't even know what a can of dog food looked like. We also got enough exercise to keep us healthy during "recess"-there's an obsolete word-and by walking to and from school. We played various games that we organized ourselves. This was true of both the village and city schools and also of the "country" schools which dotted the landscape every few miles, to which all the students walked. Our mother, all during our school years, rose early and helped get us ready for school and always had ready for us a breakfast of rolled oats, or fried mush or "flannel" pancakes (in the wintertime) accompanied by homemade sausage, or bacon. In our lunch boxes when we left for school, there were such goodies as a hard boiled egg or two, a bread and butter sandwich, and a small glass jar containing some homemade canned fruit and maybe a banana and a pickle and a small chunk of "rat trap" cheese. At our school we could purchase a half pint of milk which came in a glass bottle which was kept fresh after its daily delivery, in the refrigerator in the "domestic science" room. During our seventh and eighth grades and during high school we walked a block and a mile each day (we lived in a city of 50,000 at that time) and we (most of us anyway) walked or rode a bicycle to school and home for lunch and then hurried back to school-all in 50 minutes. This kept us in good physical condition. I suppose I'm just a crotchety old man but I do think that we learned a great deal more about self reliance and self dependence than the kids do now. Maybe the day is not far off when our children will be born and then shortly be turned over to "Big brother" and he will feed and cloth him, give him his breakfast and lunch and probably by then, dinner. He will then have also to provide clothing and a barracks for them to sleep in and by so doing absolve us of all responsibility for the future generation. By then we probably won't even bother to name our children. We'll just assign to them numbers-we now have our social security number, our zip code, our medicare number, our auto license number, our driver's license number, our credit card number, our checking account number and others-so why bother with such things as names. Maybe in another generation or so we can all turn into live robots with identical thoughts and actions, and with the advan-

**COUNCIL PROCEEDINGS**

July 2, 1979

Council met in regular session with the meeting called to order by President Schaffer at 7:00 P.M. Present were: Daniels, DuRussel, Hinkley, Koebbe, Minick, Petsch, Reed. Minutes of the June 18, 1979 meeting were read and approved as corrected in a motion by Hinkley, supported by Petsch. All yeas, carried.

The clerk reported the Village of Manchester is covered for Liability Insurance during the Manchester Street Fair.

Public Works Activities as reported by Koebbe included: Don Smith was in charge while Bruce Daniels was on vacation; Roadsides were mowed while manholes and water valves were raised for the new pavement; Parks were mowed and streets swept; Fire hydrants were flushed out and fences were put up on the Furnace Street bridge; Catch basins were cleaned and the sewer along the river bend was flushed; A grave was dug; The new Maple trees were watered; Gravel was put along the shoulders of the roads and the dirt roads were chlorided; Equipment was repaired on days that it rained; Asphalt streets were repaired with Cold Patch; The asphalt paving program has been completed; Mr. Robert Scott, owner of the Parr Road Apartments, contacted us and said that he would write his tenants about their arrears

if the Village would contact David Little about the arrears charges that were on the apartments when he still owned them. Mr. Scott also said that he would like us to continue sending the bills to the tenants; Sending the water bills to the tenants in the past has produced problems in that many times when the tenants move the Village is not notified of the change; The cost of having the Digester at the Sewage Plant cleaned out would be \$7700; We received a notice from the DNR stating that we were not meeting the discharge limitation for the Raisin River. There is excessive flow into the plant. Chuck Fifield of McNamee, Porter and Seelye was contacted and he is working to make a recommendation on our procedures that could be a solution to the problem.

Moved by Minick, supported by Reed that cleaning of the Digester at the Sewage Plant be handled by the Public Works Dept. All yeas, carried.

Hinkley was appointed to have 12 copies of the Ordinance Book made.

Reed reported he had met with Dick Kuntz and he will attend the next meeting. Village Payables for the month of June were reviewed. Moved by Reed, supported by DuRussel, the Village Payables be paid as presented. All yeas, carried.

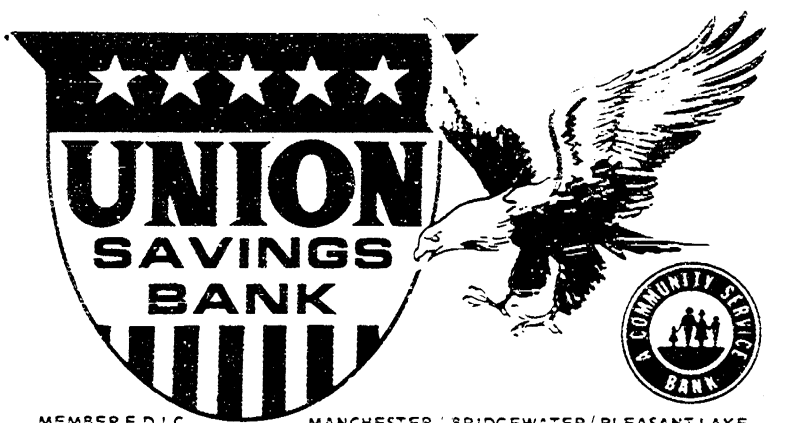

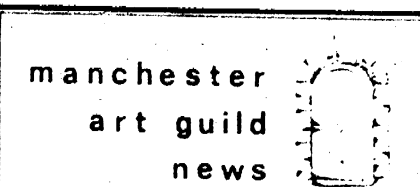

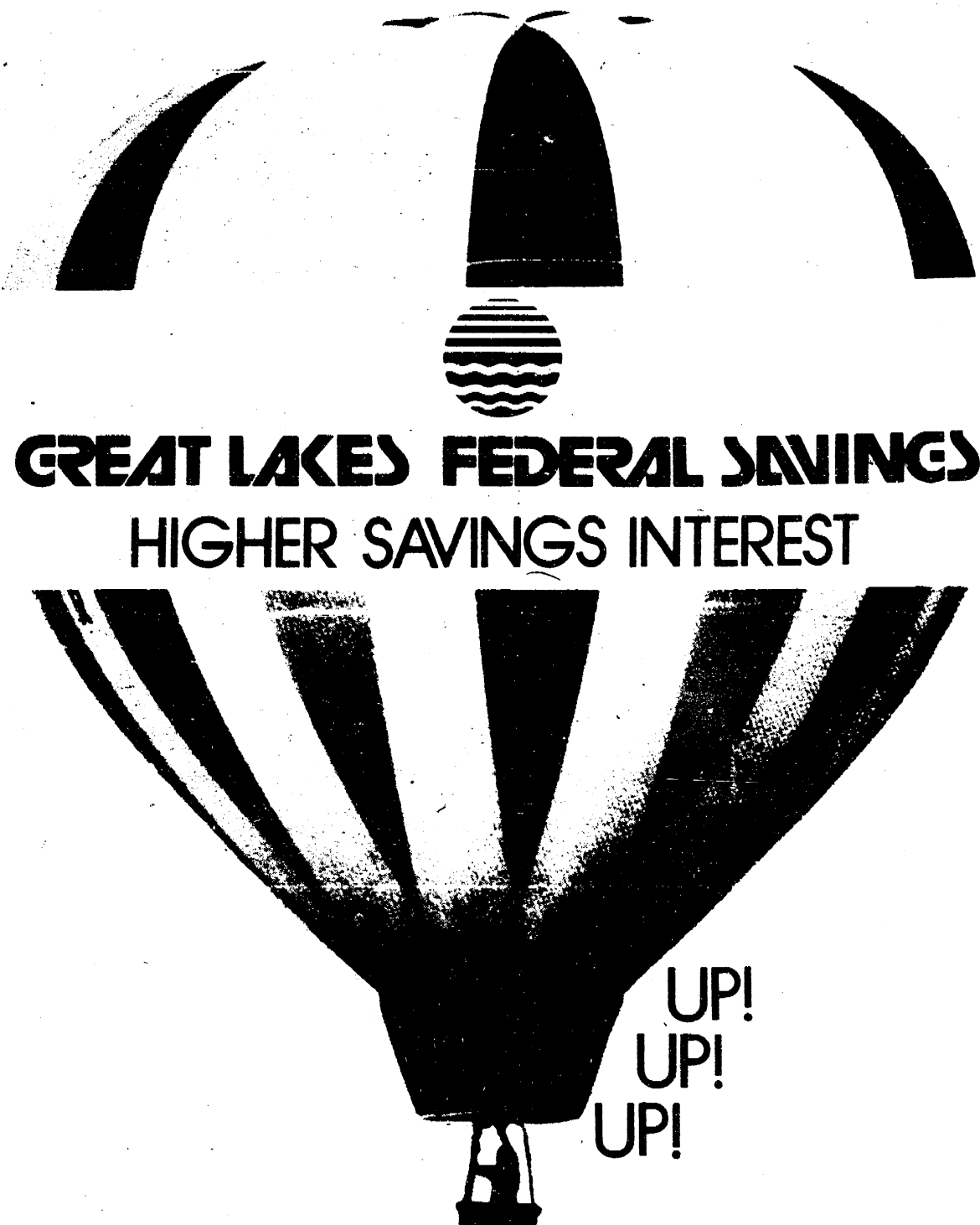
