## What Is The United Way of Michigan?

The United Way of Michigan is a state-wide federation comprised of 23 health and community services. It was founded in 1947 at a special meeting called by Henry Ford II and Benjamin E. Young, Vice-President of the National Bank of Detroit. 125 leaders from 61 Michigan counties sought a solution to bring order out of the chaos of many fund-raising campaigns for health and welfare services in the state. Thus the United Way of Michigan was established and was the first United Way organization in the World.

The United Way of Michigan is an extension of our local United Way in that it brings together State and National Agencies. The U.W.M. sees to it that each community is treated fairly and receives as well as gives.

All Michigan United Way agencies are carefully screened by over 200 members of the U.W.M. Admissions and Budget Committee, people from all over the state, representing all walks of life. They decide the amount needed by each agency to bring its services to the communities in Michigan. Each county and communities "Fair Share" of this amount is determined on the basis of local conditions and the communities ability to support. Each is asked to pay only its Fair Share.

The United Way of Michigan is comprised of the following 23 agencies: Michigan League for Human Services, Michigan Council on Crime and Delinquency, National Urban League, United Service Organizations, Inc. (USO), Leader Dogs for the Blind, Child and Family Services of Michigan, American Social Health Association, Arthritis Foundation, Michigan Chapter: Children's Leukemia Foundation of Michigan, Epilepsy Center of Michigan, Hemophilia Foundation of Michigan, Jackson Laboratory, Kidney Foundation of Michigan, National Multiple Sclerosis Society, Michigan Chapter; National Council on Alcoholism, Michigan Division; National Council on Alcoholism, Special Health Project, United Cerebral Palsy Association of Michigan, Michigan Association for Better Hearing and Speech, Kenny-Michigan Rehabilitation Foundation, Michigan Association for Retarded Citizens, Michigan Heart Association and Mental Health Association in Michigan.

The Manchester United Way budget amount for the above agencies is \$2,698.00. A united campaign - uniting the fund-raising efforts of practically all health and welfare agencies into one drive - makes sense! Everyone benefits: the contributors, member agencies, volunteer workers, communities, and most importantly, those people the agencies serve. GIVE ONCE FOR ALL!

**AN INTERESTING NOTE:** Manchester's first area drive was held in December of 1947 with a goal of \$3,000, and the Manchester United Way was incorporated as a non-profit organization in 1950. (solicitation # MISC 3084) Our 1979-80 campaign goal is set at \$24,748.00 - a far cry from that first goal 32 years ago!

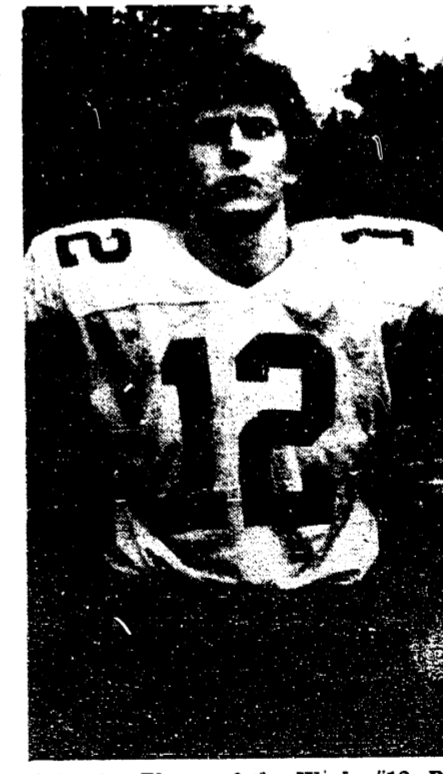

Following the kick-off we knew they would pass and the sphere feel into our hands - Dan Burch and five plays later it was over.

A letter was read by Kathy Hagerman which had been received from the Manchester Twentieth Century Club regarding an organizational meeting concerning a new swimming facility. A discussion followed. Members present concluded that our finances had been committed to the new athletic facility at Booster Field. A letter of response will be sent to the chairman of the committee stating our position.

Pat Fitzgerald asked why the cross-country meet was cancelled. Bill Scaletta stated that the reason was that no bus was available until 4:15 P.M. which would mean that the meet would not get underway until

5:30 P.M. A discussion followed.

Being no further business the meeting was adjourned at 8:55 P.M. on a motion by JoAnn Clark seconded by Bill Broucek.

The next regular meeting will be held on Wednesday, October 3, 1979 at 8:00 P.M. at the high school.

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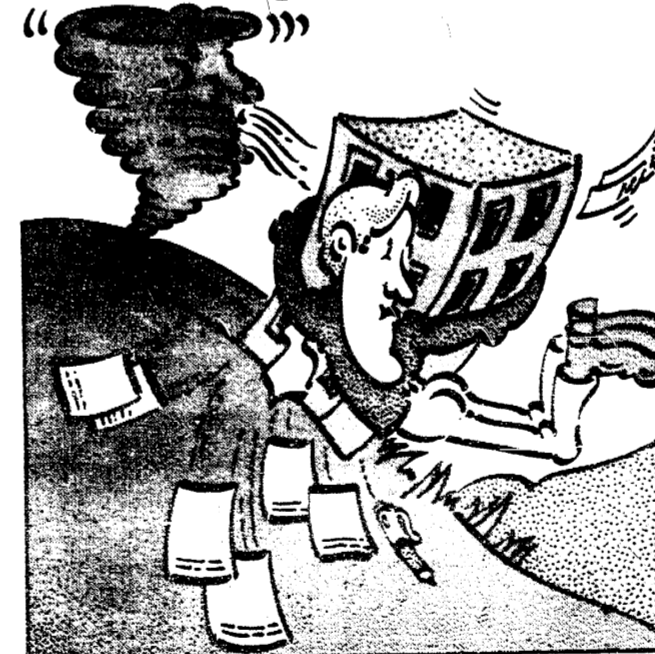

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### Nominated For Highest FFA Degree

Gerald Huehl of Chelsea has been nominated to receive the American Farmer Degree, highest degree presented by the National Future Farmers of America (FFA) Organization. Gerald was nominated for the degree by the Michigan FFA Association. The nomination was approved at a recent meeting of the National FFA Board of Directors in Alexandria, Virginia, virtually assuring the awarding of the degree. One of 788 FFA members nominated for the American Farmer Degree, Gerald will receive the degree in a special ceremony on Thursday, November 8, pending a final vote of 122 student delegates representing nearly half a million FFA members.

Travel awards will be presented to American Farmer Degree recipients to offset their travel expenses to the National FFA Convention in Kansas City. The cash awards are sponsored through the National FFA Foundation by J I Case Co. of Racine, Wisconsin; Pioneer Hi-Bred International, Inc., of Des Moines, Iowa; The Federal Land Bank Systems of the United States; Amoco Oil Co., of Chicago, Illinois, and The Chevrolet Motor Division, General Motors Corporation, of Detroit, Michigan. At the convention each American Farmer Degree recipient will be presented a gold key and certificate by the National FFA Organization.

The American Farmer Degree is much sought after because it is only presented to approximately one member in 700 of the 494,394 member organization. It is presented only by the National FFA Organization to members who have demonstrated exceptional agricultural and leadership achievements.

Gerald is the son of Mrs. Earl Huehl and the late Earl Huehl of Chelsea and is currently farming in partnership with his brother Dennis Huehl on Fletcher Rd.

He earned the American Farmer Degree on the basis of his work experience while in

high school and his agricultural production achievements since graduation.

Chelsea high school vocational agriculture instructor and FFA advisor is Keith Garner of Blissfield.

To qualify for the American Farmer Degree, FFA members must have advanced through a system of degrees unique to the FFA organization. FFA members begin as Greenhands and after one year of membership may be advanced by the local chapter to the Degree of "Chapter Farmer". The third degree, that of "State Farmer", is presented by the State FFA Association to two percent of the State's FFA membership in any one year. Only students who have earned the State Farmer Degree are eligible for the American Farmer Degree.

The National FFA Convention is an annual event of the Future Farmers of America and is carried out in cooperation with the U.S. Office of Education, of the Department of Health, Education, and Welfare. This year over 20,000 FFA members, vocational agriculture teachers, parents, and guests are expected to take part in the 52nd National FFA Convention. The convention is conducted entirely by student members between the ages of 14 and 21. Six National FFA Officers take charge of all business sessions and 122 official delegates represent the membership in voting on all issues of business.

In addition to the American Farmer Degree, many other FFA awards are presented during the convention. Contests are held in dairy, livestock, poultry, meats, milk quality and dairy foods, agricultural mechanics, floriculture, nursery/landscape, farm business management, and public speaking. Several guest speakers of national prominence address the convention audience and entertainment is interspersed with the business. The convention is the largest annual youth convention in the nation. It closes on Friday evening with the installation of six new National FFA Officers.

### WHO PICKS UP THE TAB?

The current strike by about 600 grain handlers pits the American Federation of Grain Millers against eight grain firms in the Great Lakes port at Superior, Wisconsin and Duluth, Minnesota.

In the 10-week-old strike, each idle worker has gambled an average of over \$3,000 on their efforts to gain cost-of-living protection in a new contract. The losses to the grain firms, in business losses, demurrage on stalled freight cars, and business diverted to other ports, already adds up to millions of dollars.

The biggest losers in the strike will be the innocent victims of the labor dispute. They are the farmers of the upper-Midwest who depend on the Superior-Duluth port for a market for much of their grain.

The farmers spend the final weeks of the growing season fine-tuning their machinery and grain handling equipment. This year, just as they were about to begin harvesting the bumper crops of wheat and barley, their market broke down.

With the grain market paralyzed for two months this close to harvest time, the movement of the old crop to market could not be completed in time for the new crop to start coming in. Insufficient storage space and lack of adequate transportation add up to bad marketing conditions.

It's too early to try to estimate the cost of the strike and the related tie-up of storage and transportation to the grain producers in the Midwest. That will depend on how much price discount they suffer, and on how much of the grain may have to be stored on the ground or in temporary facilities.

No matter when the strike is ended or what kind of settlement is finally reached, one thing is certain: in the long run, it will be the farmers who pick up much of the tab!

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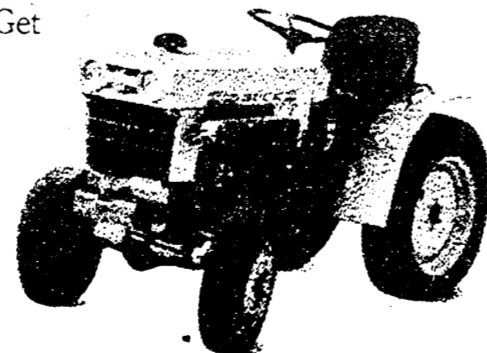

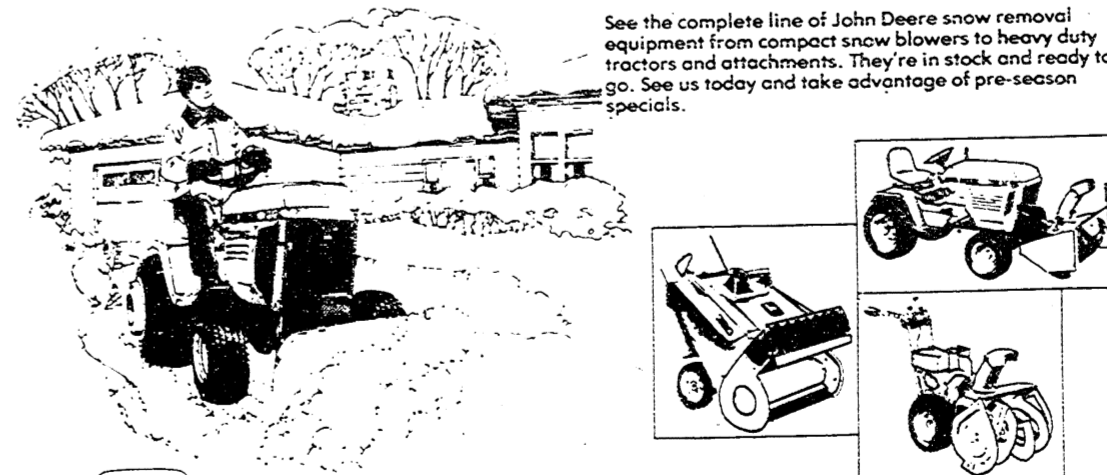

## Fall House Tour Sunday October 7

About twenty miles southwest of Ann Arbor, in the River Raisin Valley, the village of Manchester is located. The townspeople are equally proud though of the newer homes, some of them of contemporary design and well suited to the hilly countryside.

For over 15 years the Altar Society of St. Mary's of Manchester has sponsored an annual house tour, and this year the date is October 7th, from 1 to 5 p.m. Tickets and maps, at \$2.50, may be obtained in the church basement the day of the tour or earlier at Krauss' Pharmacy for \$2.00. Refreshments will be served that afternoon and assistance will be available for out-towners in helping them find their way.

A recently developed site on the banks of the River Raisin, appropriately called Riverbend, is the location of our first two houses. Don and Eleanor DuRussel moved into their spacious home, a mission brick ranch at 324 Riverbend, in the Spring of this year. Although they feel they still have much to do, they have accomplished a great deal in the months since then. The wide porch invites visitors into a "great" Great Room. The DuRussels eat, lounge, entertain and do most of their living in this room. ## IN RETROSPECT

A great many of the well known columnists who write for today's media paint a rather giddy picture of our world of today. Excerpts from various of their columns are far from complimentary about the inhabitants of this world of ours. May we quote from several of them:

"The universal music is disco which is chloroform in a 12-inch disc. I have been investigating disco music. I have only one record of it but with disco that is all that you need at least until it wears out. There's a lot of wearing out going on these days.

"Americans sit naked together in hot baths. They take their own blood pressure with do-it-yourself blood-pressure kits and take years off their appearance by daily applications to graying hair and occasional surgery to eyes, chin and buttocks.

"Most popular themes in literature deal with the science of fornication, the preparation of food, the care and maintenance of their internal organs and the plight of young women of the 18th and 19th century in their encounters with arrogant males and large sinister houses.

"Their favorite movies depict the consumption of human beings by monstrous beasts, the destruction of planets, and the use of weaponry both ancient and futuristic to eliminate supporting actors.

Another writer of considerable importance insists that a horror they do not dare contemplate is "the hospital", for few who enter there dare to return until bankroll, trust fund, home, car and the future of their children has been forfeited to experience the miracle of modern American medicine."

He claims that minute by minute, hour by hour and day by day we are haunted by radio, television and print with a promise of arthritis, diabetes, cancer, stroke, coronary thrombosis, emphysema, rabies, cholera, insanity, blindness, alcoholism, nephritis, liver, progressive warts, cirrhosis of the liver, cloven hoof, trichinosis, and brain tumor. All this reminder is said by authorities to be shown that the hospital will get 'em if they don't watch out; that they won't get sick if they pay attention to their warnings and if they do it's nobody's fault but their own.

And then another discussion is devoted to the precept that people in this country love to buy things; that it is a good way to get rid of money that has been inflicted on them. They buy, he says, burgers, and chicken and doughnuts and also aspirins, automobiles, witty t-shirts, and guns.

And then he goes on to point out that people shoot each other more easily than they use to, and they do so with less enthusiasm than they use to. He goes on to point out that you can shoot a mayor dead as was done not so long ago, with no more penalty than for stealing his car. And then he reminds us that the tax laws are a national disgrace, declared to be by the president who declared the moral equivalent of war on the world oil supply, he sez, and recently tried to convert the Buddhist dictator of South Korea to Christianity, and he has promised to give us a government that is just as good as they are, which may explain a lot of deficiencies.

Thank the Lord I don't pretend to be a learned member of the "media", just a fellow who for many years had chronicled to the best of his ability the happenings in a typical American small town and I don't think that this vale of tears in which these columnists live and suffer is quite the jungle that they write about. Most of us who live in these mid-American small towns may be a bit narrow minded, bigoted and hidebound but on the whole we are still believers in God, motherhood, the innate goodness of the individual and when we look back on the
