## IN RETROSPECT

A year or so ago we tucked away the following story, meaning to save it for an appropriate time, and now at the opening of the hot lunch season I guess this is it:

The North Pole news is a school newspaper put out by the Our Lady of Mount Carmel School of Redwood City, California. Not long ago the following story appeared in an issue written by its twelve-year old editor Martha Mendez. Here is her account:

Did you ever see Miss Sanders going through the garbage cans? Do you wonder what she's looking for? She's looking for fruit that people waste. She washes off the fruit and gives them to the kids, if they are whole. She can't give them the sandwiches and other stuff because it might have gotten rotten and the kids could get sick.

Not long ago Miss Sanders and I went to look for fruit and other kinds of fruit. This is what we found: 76 slices of bread, nine slices of bologna, eight slices of cheese, 24 slices of ham, 28 slices of salami, about a quarter of a head of lettuce, about a quarter of a jar of peanut butter, about half a jar of jelly, turkey, three eggs, tuna, lunch meat, 15 apples, 11 1/2 oranges, 5 1/2 bananas, one celery, one carrot, 18 cookies, three marshmallows and three bags of chips. We went to a store to find out what it would cost and it came to \$17.90.

I thought it would be interesting to find out how much it would be if the kids threw away \$17.90 worth of food every day for a week so I timed \$17.90 by 5 for five school days and it came to \$89.50. Then to see how much food was wasted in a year I timed \$89.50 by 36 weeks of school and it came to \$3,222.

With all the money the kids waste we could get new equipment for the school or we could buy new books for the kids to study or we could give the money to the missions or we could pay the teachers to not give us homework for a month.

Thrift and the idea behind it seems to be as much out of date today as the horse and buggy. We waste our energy, we throw away enough food every day to sustain several small African nations and when we're told about it we become vaguely guilty.

Thrift is oftentimes a bad word. We don't expect anybody to do anything about anything like the Redwood City affair. This message will probably be heeded by no one.

My wife wants to know if any of you guys remember the injunction about thrift from David Copperfield which went: "Annual income twenty pounds, annual expenditure nineteen nineteen six, result happiness; annual income twenty pounds, annual expenditure twenty pounds one and six, result misery."

We have also been accumulating various and sundry bot mots and among them are: Happiness is getting a letter about a bill you've already paid so you can sit down and write a nasty letter.

The law of inertia states: Given enough time, what you put off today will eventually get done by itself.

## Fall House Tour Sunday October 7

For over 15 years the Altar Society of St. Mary's of Manchester has sponsored an annual house tour, and this year the date is October 7th, from 1 to 5 p.m. Tickets and maps, at \$2.50, may be obtained in the church basement the day of the tour or earlier at Krauss' Pharmacy for \$2.00. Refreshments will be served that afternoon and assistance will be available for out-of-towners in helping them find their way.

Going west on Austin Rd., the next road to the right is Lamb Rd. and if we travel north on it for about 3/4ths of a mile we reach the residence of Irwin Paul. When Mr. and Mrs. Paul bought this home, about five years ago, it had not been occupied for over 15 years. The raccoons may have established squatters' rights, but with determination and ingenuity, Mr. Paul finally evicted them. He and his wife had always dreamed of restoring an old home, and this project kept them busy for several years. Mr. Paul is a widower now, but still recalls the effort and time spent on their vision. There were no windows left in the structure and all the plumbing and wiring had to be replaced. However, the building was basically sound and the Pauls began to restore this home that was originally constructed between 1830 and 1840. The large entry porch has barn siding on the walls that was taken from an old shed on the property, pieced so that it fits perfectly. All the beams exposed throughout the house are original and disclose Mr. Paul's mastery of carpentry. The floor in the entry and living room are made of chestnut, all of which were removed, cleaned and replaced. The clothes closet in the foyer has handmade oak doors, put together with wooden pegs and still using the first hardware. The brick on the fireplace was cafted by hand and came from a chimney in the house. To compliment the restoration, the Pauls used antique furniture and pictures; and the vintage clock on the mantel deserves special attention. There is a more modern note in the living room and this is the walnut server made some years ago by Mr. Paul to house his wife's collection of crystal, linens and china. There is a matching piece in the family room. The color scheme is wedgewood blue and ivory and many of the soft pieces were re-upholstered by Mrs. Paul. The stairway leading to the second floor is new, but the woodwork was all salvaged materials from the original house. The built-in drawers in the larger bedroom upstairs indicate how skillful Mr. Paul is with the use of space and wood. Returning to the downstairs area, and to the addition, we find a custom kitchen with oak cabinets constructed to Mrs. Paul's specifications; they are more than convenient. The family room leads off the kitchen and has a lovely oak table in the eating area. There is plenty of room for relaxing in this cozy atmosphere. On one of the tables is a glass case, once used to display perfume, that was part of Hauselier's Drug Store, part of Manchester's business district years ago. Attractively grouped in the case is a collection of soap stone carvings.

From the family room a few steps takes the visitor to the downstairs bedroom. With more than adequate closet space this room houses twin beds comfortably. The next door bath doubles as a powder room and is decorated in pastel shades of lavender, blue and turquoise. To save steps the laundry was installed behind louver doors in the hallway leading back to the foyer. Altogether the newer section harmonizes and blends with the old completely. To those individuals hesitating about attempting to restore an older home, the Paul place will be truly inspiring; after all they found a beam in the barn dated 1836, and there are

not many buildings still around with more age than that.

Continuing north on Lamb Rd. to Sharon Valley Rd., we turn east to Sharon Hollow Rd., turn left and continue north again until it merges with Pleasant Lake Rd., keeping on the black top highway as it turns east again. After about 9 or 10 miles we are in the community of Pleasant Lake and directly across from the elementary school, at 11663 Pleasant Lake Rd., is the home of Mr. and Mrs. Ellis Pratt. It is an attractive red sided ranch with white trim. This home was built in February 1976 and intended as a retirement home for the Pratts as well as a place where Mr. Pratt could conduct business. The foyer leads us through the center of the house, giving access to all areas. On the right is the office, decorated to suit a man, but providing visitors with more than office comfort. On the left is the living room, colored in rich earth tones in the rust hued carpeting and accent pieces. Although Mrs. Pratt claims she does not have any special skills, she

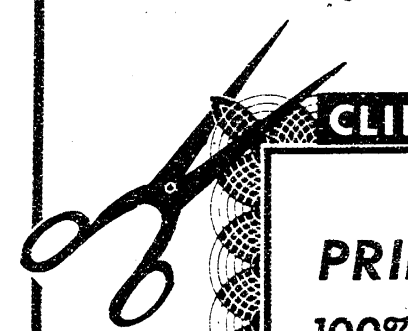

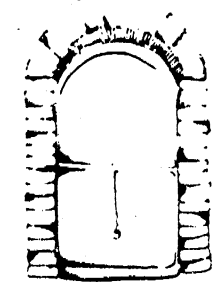

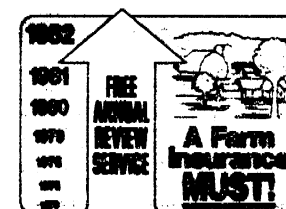
## CHRISTMAS, ALREADY?

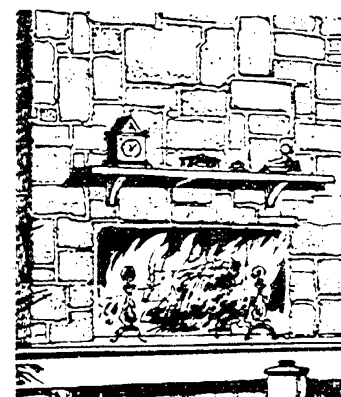

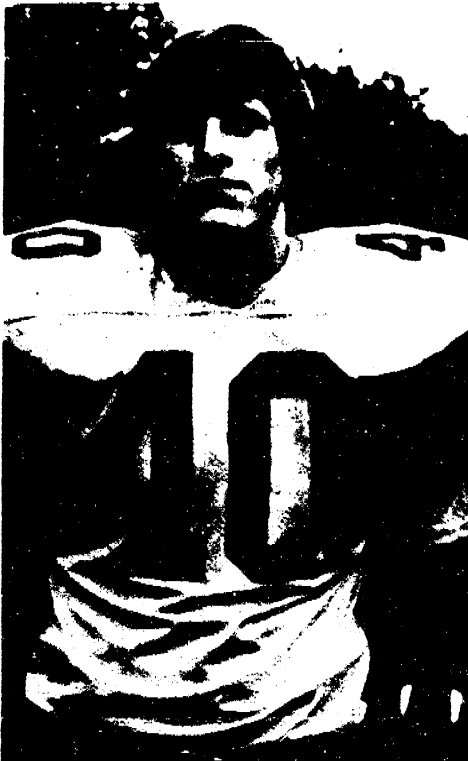

Friday, we travel to Hudson to face the Tigers at 8 P.M. Hudson finally won last Friday as they beat Clinton.

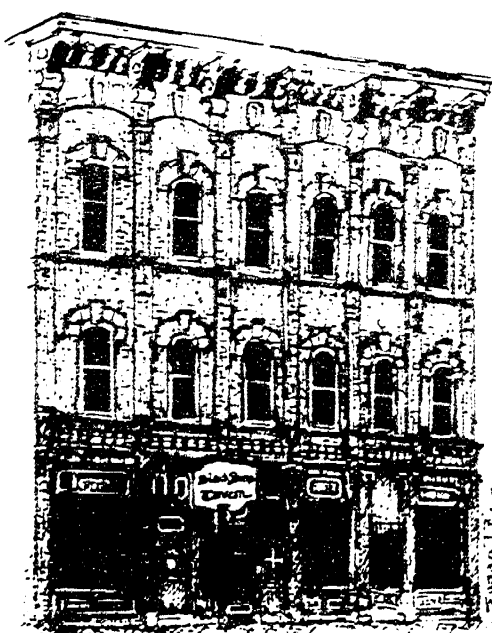

### ORDINANCE NO 10 Sharon Township Fire Ordinance

ADOPTED: SEPTEMBER 6, 1979  
EFFECTIVE: IMMEDIATELY

An Ordinance to establish charges for fire department services under Michigan Public Act 33 of 1951, as amended (Compiled Law 41.801 etc.), and to provide methods for the collection of such charges and exemptions therefrom.

TOWNSHIP OF SHARON

WASHTENAW COUNTY, MICHIGAN

ORDAINS:  
SECTION I.  
PURPOSE

The within Ordinance is adopted for the purpose of providing financial assistance to the Township in the provision of fire department services from those receiving direct benefits from the fire protection service. It is the further purpose of the within Ordinance to provide for full funding of the contracted for fire department services which remain, in part, an at-large governmental expense based upon the general benefits derived by all property owners within the Township from the existence of a Contract for Fire Department Services and said Fire Department's availability to extinguish fires within the Township and perform other emergency services.

SECTION II.  
CHARGES

The following charges shall hereafter be due and payable to the Township from a recipient\* of any of the following enumerated services from the contracted Fire Department:

A. Grass or wood fire	\$500.00
B. Rubbish fire	\$500.00
C. Auto fire	\$200.00
D. Truck fire	\$300.00
E. Aircraft fire	\$300.00
F. House fire	\$200.00
G. All farm buildings (each)	\$200.00
H. Livestock yards	\$400.00
I. Petroleum storage	\$400.00
J. All other commercial	\$200.00

Fee to be multiplied by number of Fire Departments charging township.  
\* Recipient is defined as the Owner of Land or other property.

SECTION III.

TIME FOR PAYMENT FOR RUN

All of the foregoing charges shall be due and payable within 90 days from the date the service is rendered and, if in default, payment shall be collectible through proceedings in district court or in any other court of competent jurisdiction as a matured debt.

### SECTION IV. EXEMPTIONS

The following properties and services shall be exempt from the foregoing charges:  
A. False alarms.  
B. Fires involving township buildings, grounds and/or property.

### SECTION V. LIEN RIGHTS

Where land or other property of value remains following a fire call by the contracted Fire Department, the Township shall hereby have a lien upon the same to secure the payment of the foregoing rates and charges due to the Township resulting from such fire protection service. Such lien shall remain upon the property until the charges have been paid in full and may be foreclosed by the Township to secure such charges in the same manner as the foreclosure of mechanics' liens under the laws and statutes of the State of Michigan existing at the time of such foreclosure.

The foregoing lien rights shall not preclude the Township from proceeding in district court by suit to collect any monies remaining unpaid.

### SECTION VI. NON-EXCLUSIVE CHARGE

The foregoing rates and charges shall not be exclusive of the charges that may be made by the Township for the costs and expenses of maintaining fire department services by contract, but shall only be supplemental thereto. Charges may additionally be collected by the Township through general taxation after a vote of the electorate approving the same or by special assessment established under the Michigan Statutes pertinent thereto. General fund appropriation may also be made to cover such additional costs and expenses.

### SECTION VII.

MULTIPLE PROPERTY PROTECTION

When a particular service rendered by the contracted Fire Department directly benefits more than one person or property, the owner of each property so benefited and each person so benefited where property protection is not involved shall be liable for the payment of the full charge for such service hereinbefore outlined. The interpretation and application of the within section is hereby delegated to the Township Treasurer subject only to appeal, within the time limit for payment, to the Township Board and shall be administered so that charges shall only be collected from the recipients of the service.

### SECTION VIII.

SEVERABILITY

Should any provision or part of the within Ordinance be declared by any court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid or unenforceable, the same shall not affect the validity or enforceability of the balance of this Ordinance which shall remain in full force and effect.

### SECTION IX. EFFECTIVE DATE

This Ordinance shall take effect immediately. All ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed.

### America & Me Essay Contest

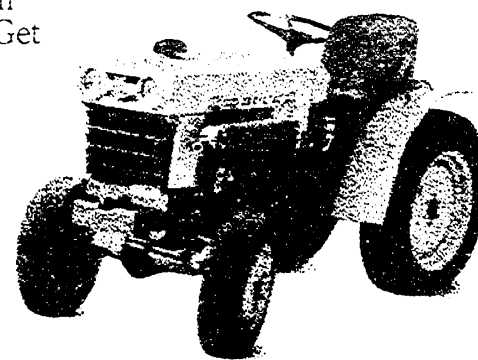

"LETTUCE" FOR FARM WORKERS

The nation's auto workers will be making more money. They presently make about \$15 an hour—counting fringe benefits.

So, it may come as a surprise to learn that California farm workers who pick lettuce for the nation's largest lettuce operation have just signed a contract which will pay them more than auto workers—on an hourly basis. The contract calls for base wages of \$5 an hour, and piece rates of 75 cents a carton. That, together with medical, pension, and vacation benefits, brings their total take to well above the \$15 an hour range.

Of course, picking lettuce is seasonal work, and the seasons range from a couple of months or so along California's border with Mexico—to seven months in the coastal area around Salinas.

Even so, it's an economic package that puts farm labor right alongside their industrial counterpart and even better in some cases.

What's good for lettuce workers may not be all that great for their employers—and for consumers. The contract was signed

with the United Farm Workers by a large New York-based conglomerate whose principal income is outside farming. But local farmers will have to compete with its wage structure; they'll have to live with it.

So, whatever else it is, it's another blow to the family farm.

In most businesses, increased wage costs are passed along to the consumers. But, it isn't that easy for farmers. So, what we may see is less lettuce on the market bidding for higher retail prices—simply because fewer farmers can afford to grow it.

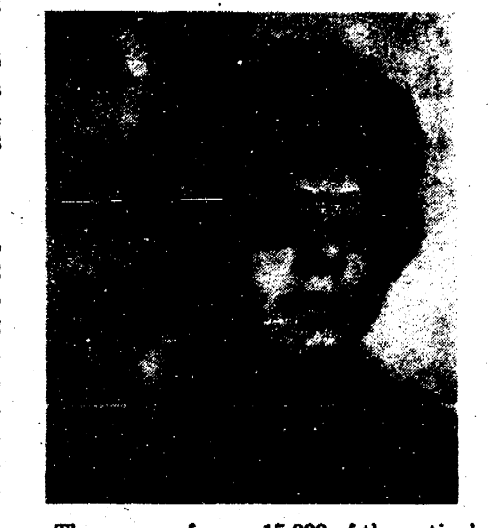

**John Reed - National Merit Semi-Finalist**



The names of some 15,000 of the nation's most intellectually able students who qualified as Semi-finalists in the 1980 Merit Program were released today by National Merit Scholarship Corporation of Evanston, Illinois. Semi-finalists who advance to finalist standing in the competition will be considered for approximately 4,300 Merit Scholarships to be awarded in the spring of 1980. Manchester High School is pleased to announce that John Reed, son of Mr. and Mrs. Keith Reed of 225 South Washington, has been awarded Semi-finalist status.

Over 1.1 million students enrolled in about 18,000 high schools entered the 1980 Merit Program by taking the 1978 qualifying test, the PSAT/NMSQT. Semi-finalists are the highest scorers in each state, named

from the top half of one percent of the state's senior class in numbers proportional to that state's percentage of the nation's graduating seniors. In order to increase the educational opportunities of Semi-finalists, most of whom will complete high school and enter college in 1980, they also are identified to regionally accredited U.S. colleges and universities.

To be considered for Merit Scholarships, Semi-finalists must qualify as Finalists by meeting further requirements—being fully endorsed and recommended for scholarships by their secondary school principals, submitting records that confirm high academic standing, and substantiating their high qualifying test scores with equivalent scores on another test. Over 90 percent of the Semi-finalists are expected to qualify as Finalists next February and each will receive a Certificate of Merit attesting to distinguished performance. All Merit Scholars will be chosen from this highly able group of Finalists and announced in April and May.

John has been very active in athletics at Manchester. He has participated in football, wrestling, and baseball during his four years here. In his spare time John enjoys reading, especially science fiction, and writing. For his college career John is undecided but leaning toward the business area. He is applying to Adrian College and Rose-Hulman Institute of Technology in Indiana.

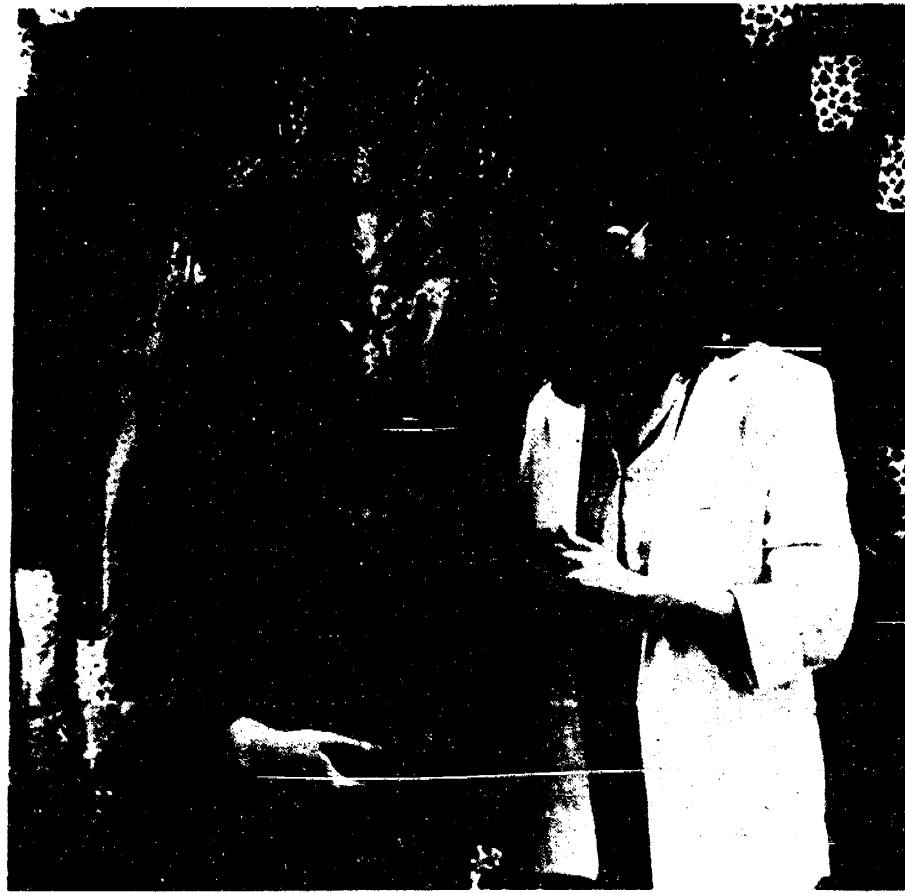

## Board Of Education Minutes

These are the proposed minutes of the September 17, 1979, Board of Education meeting. They are not official until approved at the next regular meeting, along with any corrections made by the Board. The meeting was called to order at 8:05 by President Corliss Mick in the High School Library.

Board members present: Mick, Macomber, DuFresne, Bunney, Horning and Curley. Absent: Walkow.

Secretary Curley read a letter from the Board's thanking the Board for the use of grounds to hold a circus. To show their appreciation they donated \$50 to the Library Fund.

Letter from Mr. James Datsko, Attorney for Mr. Reed Davis, regarding a driveway easement on his property on Sufort Street was read by Secretary Curley.

President Mick turned this item over to Building and Grounds Committee for review.

Letter of appreciation was received from the family of Don Walter.

Mr. Bunney stated that the minutes of September 5th, 1979, should be amended to read \$860,000.00 instead of \$866,000.00.

Superintendent Masten reported on the Center for Occupational and Personalized Education (C.O.P.E.), an agency to work with delinquent teenagers who are assigned by schools and juvenile courts.

It was originally supported by CETA funds and small contributions from schools. We have received billings from COPE but have not paid them for 2 reasons: 1) The program does not have Board approval and 2) We have never had any of our students assigned to the program. Mr. Masten said he didn't believe there was any legal basis to have to pay these bills.

Secretary Curley reported that the Board had received 36 applications for the position of Superintendent of Schools.

Each Board member is responsible to contact Mr. Curley after the September 20th deadline and before the October 1st screening of applicants to review the applications at his home.

Moved by DuFresne to enter into executive session to discuss negotiations. Supported by Curley. Yeas: Mick, Macomber, DuFresne, Horning, Bunney and Curley. Nays -0. Motion carried.

We're so glad to note that a coalition is being formed among the small towns in New Jersey and New York to perfect an organization that will represent the small towns of the United States in Washington. For too long say these organizers, have the larger cities and towns in these United States been able to send representatives down to see the Great White Father and to put the pressure on to get federal aid for these small towns which contain at least half of our population and who have been paying their fair share of taxes on a federal level. It has seemed to us that most every day or so we read in the paper that Detroit's mayor was in Washington sitting on Jimmy's knee to plead for funds with which to pay for some municipal expense which Detroit did not have the funds available to pay for or to make up the deficit which developed when they overspent their budget. I hope that Governor Milliken becomes aware of this movement and that such a coalition may be organized in Michigan because it seems to us, that to date, the Michigan small towns have not been very well represented in Lansing although they contain about half of the population of the state. It is, of course, much easier to communicate with the dense population in Detroit than it is with the sparsely settled regions of upper Michigan but the rural folks feel just as important as the big city dwellers. Most of us however have lived within our incomes, paid our bills and kept our nose clean. I worried a bit when I heard that our Government down in Washington was broke and had no money available with which to pay their bills and employees on October 1, and then I read a bit further and noted that they passed an emergency measure Monday to keep the government functioning. And, believe it or not, they revoked a 12.9 per cent pay raise for Congressmen and top level federal employees. The House is expected back on the 9th to do their part. Among other needs is that to appropriate funds with which to pay our Senators and Congressmen, so don't worry to much. The Social Security recipients will probably receive theirs along with the others such as the Departments of Health and Welfare, Education and Welfare, Department of Defense, Labor, Transportation and others.
