How can the telephone replace a book? For openers, there is the Tel-Mod Library, a collection of numbers to give information on various medical problems. Subjects such as: alcoholism, arthritis, cancer, diet, first-aid and skin disorder are just a few of the problems discussed.

The ramification of these two book substitutes is exciting. The future looks bright with even more variety in ways of recording and storing knowledge.

 In Retrospect - The Manchester Enterprise

A few issues back you listed former businesses that used to occupy the Main Street of Manchester. But you failed to mention the E.C. Jenter Furniture and Undertaking establishment which was a part of Main Street for many years. It originally was on the south side of the street several doors west of the Union Savings Bank. Then it changed places with Dresselhouse and Davidter's Hardware store and moved across the street to where the Laundry Mat is now situated. It was at this site until the Furniture part of the business was phased out. The Funeral end was moved to its present site.

Also, no mention has ever been made of my great grandfather - Fred "brick" Schaible who occupied a farm west of town. It was he who made the bricks for the stores and houses of Manchester as well as Emanuel's Church. I am sure that many of the males of Manchester will remember the

"ole swimmin' hole" that was located on the Schaible farm and enjoyed for many years. It was a busy place in the summer and especially on Saturdays and during lunch hours while school was in session. It used to be a contest to see who would be the first swimmer of the season. Harold Sutton and myself claimed ourselves victors when one year during our freshman or sophomore years (1931 or 1932) we opened the season by taking a dip during lunch hour on the Thursday before Good Friday. We didn't linger long, however, for part of the river was still frozen over.

The swimming hole was for males only as swimming trunks were unheard of. At least it was supposed to be for males only until the girls thought it great fun to raid the spot and snatch our clothes and carry them off into the middle of an open field. They were always kind enough to leave our shoes and socks. One of us would then be selected to rescue our gear by making a skirt of skunk cabbage leaves tied around our waist with our socks.

These raids began to happen quite regularly until one day, led by a brave lad in our midst (the late Dr. Paul Rague), we leaped out of the water, grabbed the girls and threw them into the river, clothes and all. After that, to my knowledge, the raids stopped.

To the Editor:

On March 21, 1978 the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearms published in the Federal Register eleven pages of new rules that would enable the Bureau to determine who owns every dealer-purchased firearm in the United States. Under the new BATF regulations local gun dealers would, four times a year, be required to surrender the name and address of each person who has legally purchased a firearm from him since 1968.

As Senator Orrin Hatch commented, "this attack on our citizens has the potential of depriving them of their legal right to hold and bear arms." Representative John Ashbrook warned that "this is a broad sweeping plan for gun control." Apparently Robert Carr, representative from the 6th Congressional District does not agree with them for he says, "I have no objection to the regulations." Once again Robert Carr has proven that he has no regard for our Constitution. The 2nd Amendment says...the right of the people to keep and bear arms shall not be infringed.

As we all know, before a Government can become totally oppressive, as Stalin in Russia and Mao in China, they have to disarm the citizens. Only the people who have the means to defend themselves are completely free.

Luckily, in spite of Robert Carr, there

was such a hue and cry from aroused citizens who want to keep their guns for protection and sport, that the regulations at this time have not been enforced.

It's time all of us in the 6th District let Robert Carr know that we are against gun control in any form.

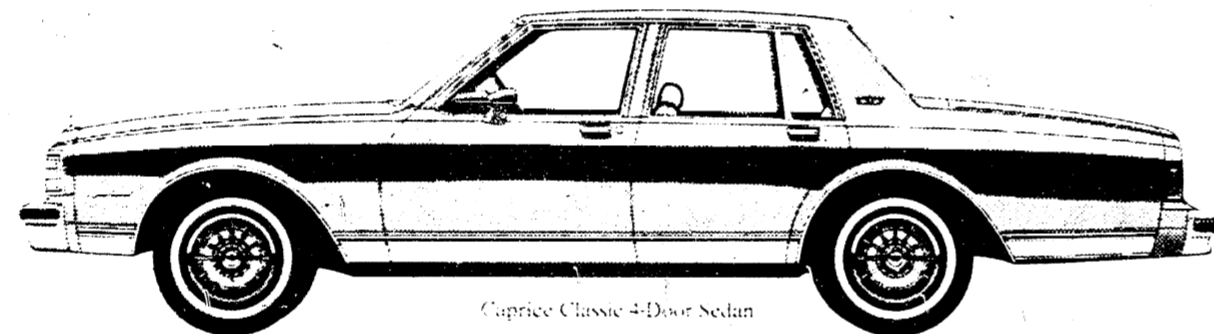


DONT PANIC!

Some politicians and some members of the news media almost had a coronary the other day when the U.S. Department of Agriculture released some preliminary figures showing how much land in this country was owned by foreign interests. No doubt many of them conjured up visions of Arabs in their big Rolls Royces driving down U.S. country lanes looking over their vast holdings of soybean, corn and wheat fields or herds of cattle. There are other figures, however, that we need to look at in order to put all this into proper perspective. Figures from another government report should cause even more concern than the land owned by foreign interests. Recently USDA released a report entitled, "Who Owns the Land?" and it shows that

governments-local, state and federal-own 40 percent of the land in this country. Foreigners own five-one hundredths of a percent. It is the legislators and the Congress that have passed laws giving various agencies of government the power of eminent domain so that millions of acres in this country have been condemned and purchased until now government owns 40 percent of the land. Possibly some of these same lawmakers who helped pass, and continue to support these eminent domain laws are the same ones who are protesting the loudest about foreign investments. We need to be concerned about government and foreign ownership, but when you compare 40 percent and five one-hundredths of a percent, it's not too hard to figure which one should give us the most concern.

Manchester Village Planning Commission

September 18, 1979

A working session of the Manchester Village Planning Commission was held at the Village Hall, 7:05 PM, with members present: Hinkley, Leeson, Daniels, Tracy, Wellwood, Bond, and Krauss. The expansion project of the Union Savings Bank of Manchester was up for discussion, especially in regard to the proposed drive-in facility and parking lots. The meeting was called to order for the transaction of business at 7:30 PM, at the same place and with membership as above.

Mr. Richard Wolf and Mr. Stanton Roesch were present as representatives of the Union Savings Bank. The revised site layout, including the new facility requested by the Bank was reviewed.

It was moved by Wellwood that the new site layout be recommended for approval, except four (4) changes as follows: (1) angle parking spaces, for traffic moving from north to south, be provided along the west property line of both the Village and Bank properties, with the south nine spaces reserved for Union Savings Bank employees only; (2) eliminate the proposed parking along the Duncan Street right-of-way, (six spaces), and mark for "No Parking"; (3) eliminate four spaces shown north of the proposed drive-in banking building, and relocate the building eight feet northerly; (4) eliminate five parking spaces as proposed adjacent to Adrian Street, south of the Manchester Electric Inc. store, and landscape the resultant unused strip. The motion was seconded by

Krauss, and passed unanimously. Mr. Allen Schaffer and Mr. Stanton Roesch, representing Union Construction Co., were present regarding a desired change to the company project as previously approved. It has been determined that twenty parking spaces will be required. It was moved by Tracy to recommend granting of the requested variance, to permit parking to five feet of the Territorial Street property line, thereby providing for parking within the remaining front buffer zone. This parking area to be for passenger vehicles only, including pick-ups being so used. The motion was seconded by Wellwood, and the vote six in favor, Bond abstaining. Declared passed.

A request by Robert and Karen Paul (not present) for variance to the non-conforming use of their property at 500 Ann Arbor Street as a party store, to build additional space onto the existing building. It was moved by Krauss to deny the request, seconded by Tracy, and passed unanimously.

Minutes of the meeting of September 5 were read, and on the motion by Krauss, seconded by Bond, were accepted.

The meeting was declared adjourned at 9:35 PM.

"Pioneer Days"

The Waterloo Area Farm Museum, located three miles west of Waterloo, on 9996 Waterloo-Munith Road, is the only one of its kind in Michigan and is on the National Register of Historic Places. From Ann Arbor the museum is a delightful forty minute drive through the country to the northwest. Seventeen years ago a group of enthusiastic citizens formed the Waterloo Area Historical Society. The Society has restored and furnished a farm house and outbuildings as a tribute to the Michigan Pioneer Farmer between the years 1844 and 1895. Volunteers started the museum and now maintain it. The artifacts have been lovingly donated by area residents. For the one-time visitor the museum provides a unique look into our pioneering past. A person interested in greater involvement can guide, work on restora-

tion, clean, or take classes in early American arts and crafts.

On the second Sunday in October the Waterloo Area Historical Society hosts a "Pioneer Day". Pioneer Day is a celebration of pioneer life and the major fund raising activity of the society. In addition to a tour of the house the visitor can talk with a soldier in the Civil War encampment, listen to old time fiddlers, take a wagon ride, and visit with craft demonstrators. Demonstrations include: sheep shearing, spinning and natural dyeing, soap-making, chair caning, basket making, rug braiding, rug hooking, forge work, whittling; the preparing of sauerkraut, molasses cookies, apple butter and butter. Crafts and baked goods are for sale.

The majority of the arts and crafts demonstrators on Pioneer Day also teach classes at the museum during the summer months. This summer 10 workshops and 13 classes were held. The topics ranged from edible plants to apple head doll making. The emphasis is on personal instruction and completing a craft from start to finish. Class size is limited and class fees are very reasonable. Plans are in progress for an expanded educational program for next summer.

The summertime visitor is greeted by a guide dressed in traditional pioneer clothing. The guide leads one through the restored farm house, milk cellar, bake house, ice house, forge, barn, and log house, as if the visitor was coming to the guide's own home. During the tour which lasts from 45 to 90 minutes the visitor experiences life as our pioneer ancestors did. Children might put on the yoke that was used to carry milk and water from outside to the kitchen, or a woman might test the weight of an iron kettle on the kitchen stove. A man might handle tools in the forge. The Waterloo Area Historical Society's working philosophy is that history should be brought from behind sterile glass cases and yellowed textbooks into people's lives. The unique guided tour makes this philosophy clear. School groups and senior citizens are given

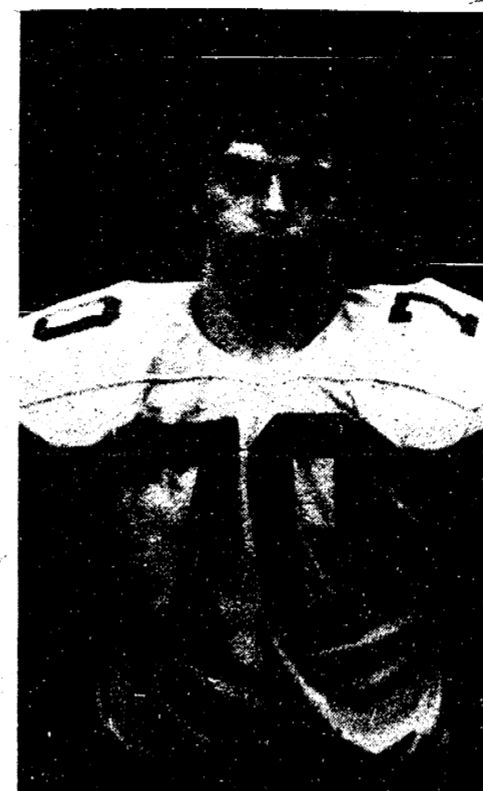

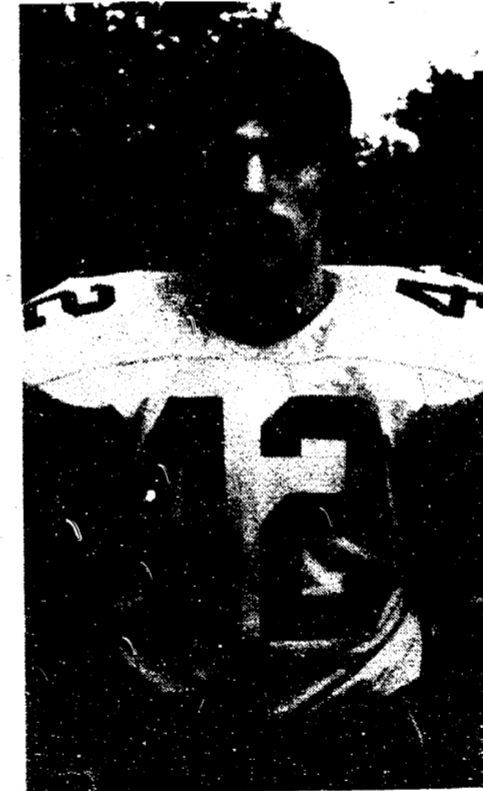
A victory is sweet but those wins over Hudson are sweeter—of course it was only last year we came away with a win on Homecoming Night against the Tigers

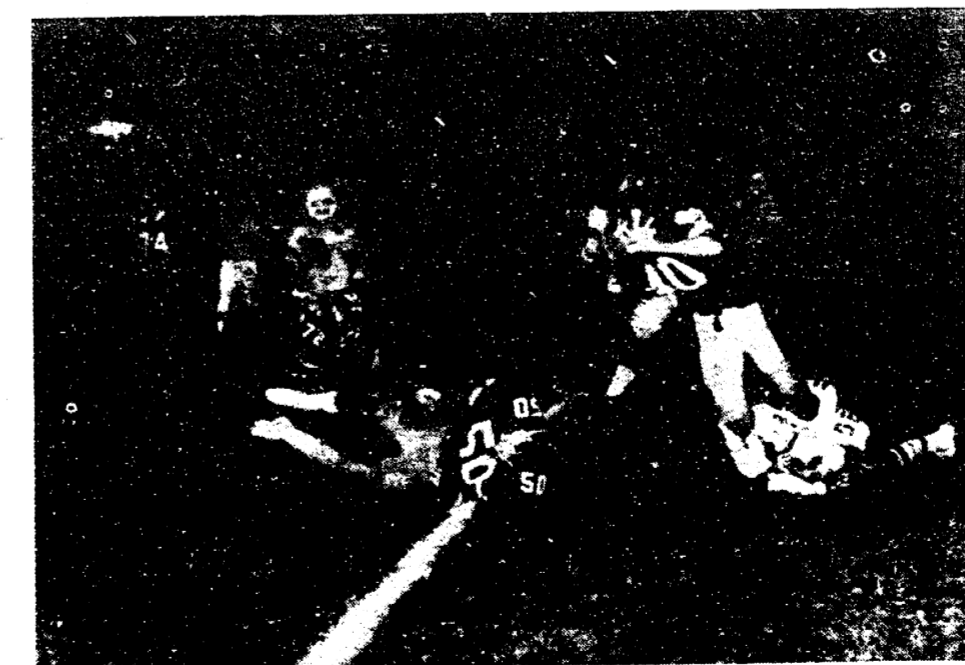

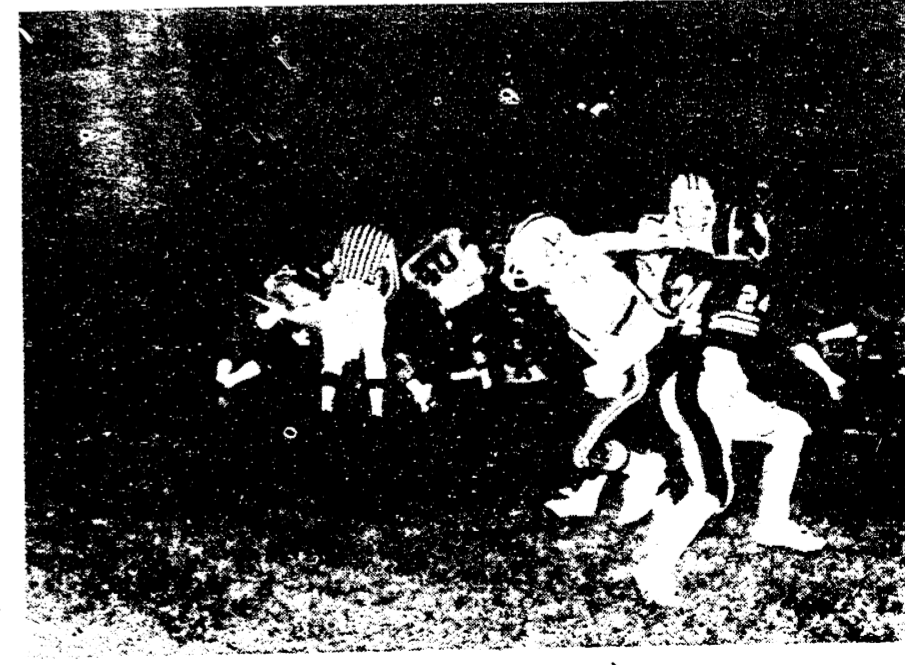
