## In Retrospect

We have, we are told, the largest and most expensive primary and secondary school system in the world, yet most everybody is not at all satisfied with it. It seems to us that the schools have forgotten what they're for. They are doing many things that they were never supposed to and failing to do what they are supposed to, and that is to convert illiterate children into literate children.

This was brought out not long ago by a school principal in Baltimore, Md. This school, Lake Clifton High, is new and has all the trimmings...an auditorium, a gym, a clinic, drama classes, hot meals, bus trips, and all the rest. It's not one of the jungles that we read about. It has no apparent racial problems but the principal of that school was not satisfied, and so he subjected the entire junior class to a rather simple test.

Several sentences were repeated to the class three times and they were then required to write them out. They were asked to fill out an application for a job, then address an envelope, then write a letter complaining about defective merchandise and then were given a tape recorded message of a routine character and asked to summarize it on a memo.

This would seem to be a rather routine test...a test of the ability to write based on a routine level, and 57 per cent of this junior class failed the test...in their eleventh year of schooling they were still illiterate.

It must be assumed that those who failed the test were unable to write, since reading and writing are two facets of the same subject and arithmetic is a sign language and cannot be taught without help from the written word and so a majority of this junior class had gotten that far without a rudimentary knowledge of the Three R's, yet without them the rest of the subjects involved at that level can be little more than gibberish (History, Geography, Literature, the Physical Sciences and the Social Sciences). This is all very laughable. If they are incapable of learning at this level we are sorry for them...they deserve our sympathy, but they don't belong in the Junior class of a high school. They belong back in a senior section of our first grade or being employed at something within their capacity.

It seems to us that in both cases our schools have failed, failed the students, themselves and the public. The principal of this Baltimore school has taken the stand that no member of his Junior class will be graduated as seniors unless they can prove that they can read and write. He says that the school's diploma was going to guarantee that. This stand has shaken the pedagogical establishment to its very roots and the press too has evidently been quite "shook up" about it. His stand seems very basic and mild but in the circumstances in which he finds himself, it is quite daring.

Now I don't mean to infer that the circumstances above enumerated are true of any local or nearby schools but I must admit that I have some grave misgivings about them. I have, during the past several years, had submitted for publication, some weird and marvelous examples of high school Englishes which had to be translated into English before it could be published, and the spelling in some of these epistles was as weird as the grammar. I wonder if anyone had taught these students how to use a dictionary or even if there was such a book.

Perhaps some of this lack of ability to read and comprehend is the fault of the schools but it seems to us that some of this lack is to be blamed on our way of life nowadays. For instance, in the days before talking movies and TV one had to be able to

read somewhat to comprehend the printed subtitles at the movies for instance, but nowadays one can get by merely hearing the spoken word...one doesn't have to learn to write it. But there's no substitute for the teaching of the three R's; let's get back to fundamentals and forget some of the futilities.

## LETTERS TO THE EDITOR



Dear Editor:

With the passage of HB 4726 the Michigan Legislature is to be commended for taking the first step to ensure that thousands of senior citizens won't be placed in the untenable position of choosing between food and fuel. The bill establishes a home heating assistance program for persons with low incomes for this year, 1980 and 1981. A similar program last year helped almost 350,000 households, two-thirds of which were headed by senior citizens, absorb some of the winter's high home heating costs.

We urge the Legislature to move quickly to provide funding for this program by passing HB 4730. House Bill 4730 proposes to amend the Severance Tax Act to increase the tax rate from two to six percent. The revenues from this increased tax would fund the Home Heating Assistance Program, as well as a State Weatherization Program and an Energy Conservation Fund. We do believe, however, that a six percent increase is inadequate to fund all these programs and urge the Legislature to increase the tax to ten percent, as originally proposed.

The home heating season is here now. Failure to act on HB 4730 could mean no heat, or worse for thousands of the State's older citizens.

This is not based on the premise that you are not now doing a good job. It is rooted firmly in the belief that the job you are doing is one of society's most important and demanding, and that we as parents would like to assist you in whatever way our skills permit. As parents, we would very much like to share with you and our children the joy of learning!

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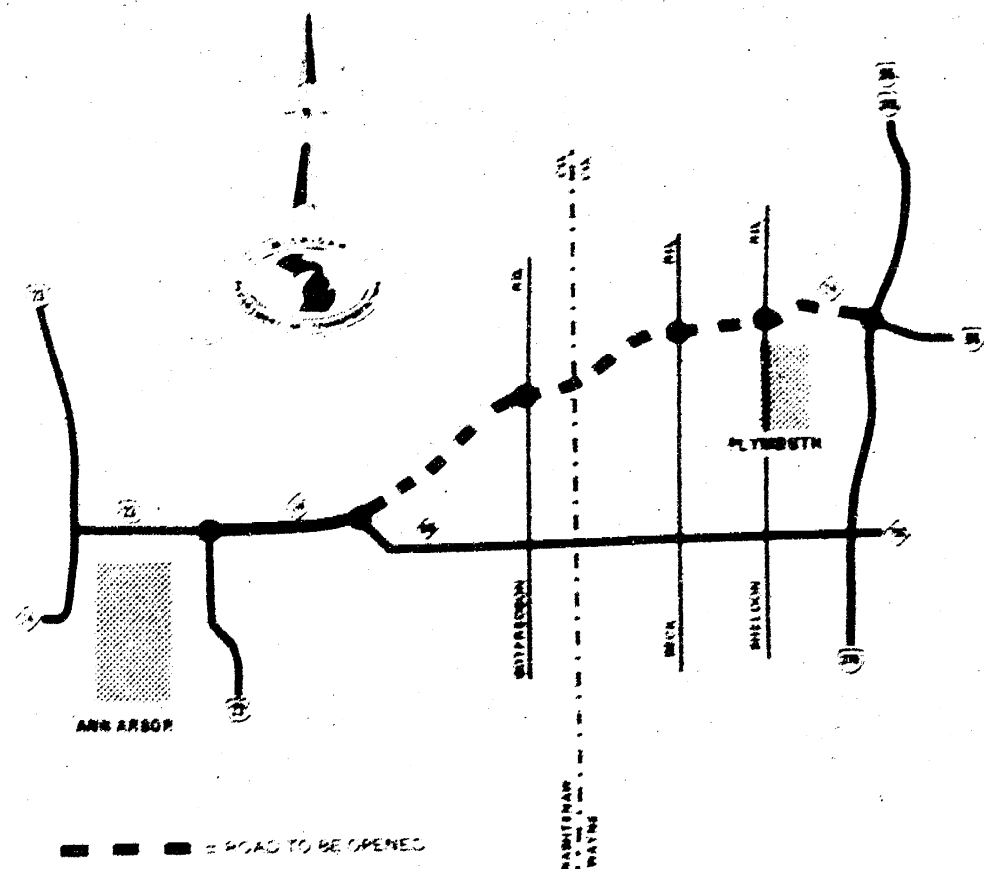

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**OPENING OF FREEWAY ANNOUNCED**

The new M-14 Freeway connecting Plymouth and Ann Arbor will "Open All the Way" with public dedication ceremonies October 31 (Wednesday), the Michigan Department of Transportation (MDOT) announced today.

MDOT Director John P. Woodford and Michigan Transportation Commissioner Weston E. Vivian of Ann Arbor will join children representing Plymouth, Ann Arbor and Northville to cut the ribbon at noon. The freeway will be opened to traffic about two hours later when barricades along the route have been removed.

The public is invited to the ceremonies, which will be conducted in the eastbound lanes of M-14 at the Beck Road interchange. The final 12-mile leg of the freeway was built by the Holloway Construction Co., C.A. Hull Co., Walter Toebe & Co., M & B Contracting Corp., and Eisenhour Construction Co., at a cost of \$34,624,409.

The new freeway is located just north of the existing M-14. It extends six miles on either side of the Washtenaw-Wayne Coun-

ty Line, connecting with existing M-14 at Griswold Road on the west and I-275 northeast of Plymouth on the east.

The freeway is six lanes between I-275 and the Beck Road interchange and four lanes along the remainder of the route. It includes 23 bridge structures and interchanges at Voorheis Road, Godfredson Road, Beck Road and Sheldon Road.

Work on the final segment began in 1976. Its completion will relieve traffic on Eight Mile and Ford roads and on I-94, including fans traveling to Ann Arbor for University of Michigan football games.

The Plymouth Chamber of Commerce will sponsor the Oct. 31 ribbon-cutting ceremony. Federal, state and local officials have been invited.

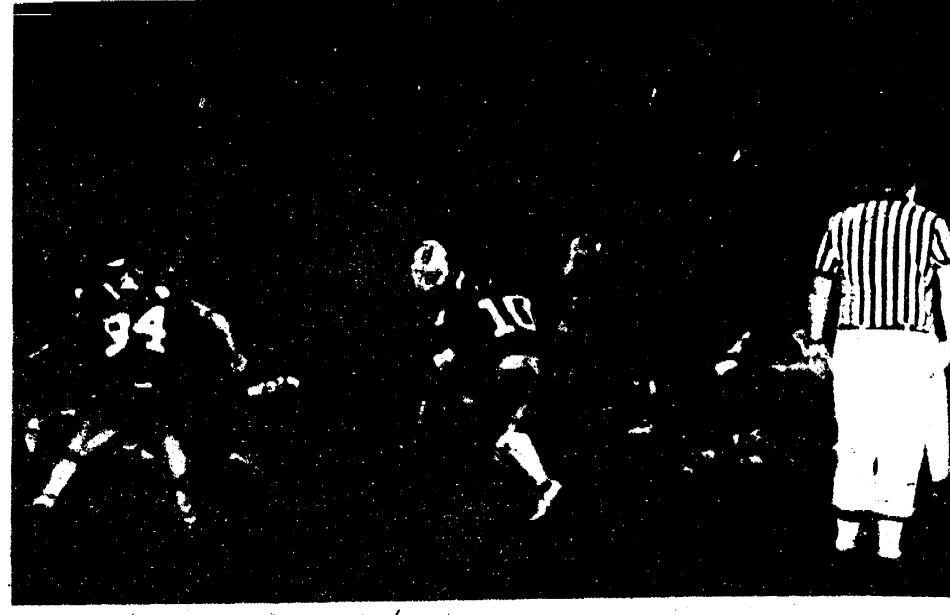

## In Retrospect United Way Rides Again

We read the letter from Russell Jenter with a lot of interest. When we first knew Manchester, the Jenter Furniture and Undertaking Establishment was, for a few years, located on the north side of Main Street. Sorry, I'd forgotten this. The swimming hole was before my time. About 1935 J.H. (Ham) Kingsley and his dog Mike resided in the present Jenter Funeral Home where he had lived for many years. He was the builder and owner of the original Manchester Electric Light plant located where the former Ford plant is now located. Both "Ham" and Mike were well known as part of the Main Street scene. They daily visited the stores together.

If I remember correctly Mr. Kingsley died in 1936 and soon afterwards the Jenters purchased the present site of their funeral home, and after considerable remodeling moved into it, and from then on funerals were held there. Before this time the mortuary was located in the store building on Main Street and the funeral services were held in the home of the deceased or in the church.

Russell was one piano pupil who didn't have to be urged to practice and became an excellent pianist and organist with a leaning towards popular music and he played organ at Emanuel Church and practiced there and we can remember at least one time listening to his rendition of the theme from Dvorak's New World Symphony from which the song "Going Home" was based and as he played it, it took on a very pronounced Dixieland tinge.
