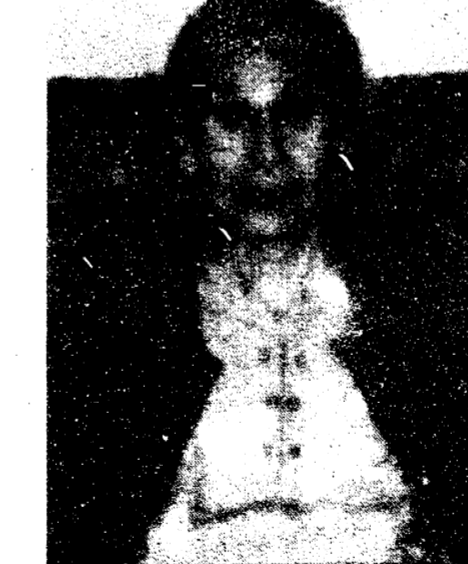
Ann Arbor Bank and Trust Breaks Ground For New Manchester Office

In Retrospect

We read the letter from Russell Jenter with a lot of interest. When we first knew Manchester, the Jenter Furniture and Undertaking Establishment was, for a few years, located on the north side of Main Street. Sorry, I'd forgotten this. The swimming hole was before my time. About 1935 J.H. (Ham) Kingsley and his dog Mike resided in the present Jenter Funeral Home where he had lived for many years. He was the builder and owner of the original Manchester Electric Light plant located where the former Ford plant is now located. Both "Ham" and Mike were well known as part of the Main Street scene. They daily visited the stores together.

If I remember correctly Mr. Kingsley died in 1936 and soon afterwards the Jenters purchased the present site of their funeral home, and after considerable remodeling moved into it, and from then on funerals were held there. Before this time the mortuary was located in the store building on Main Street and the funeral services were held in the home of the deceased or in the church.

Russell was one piano pupil who didn't have to be urged to practice and became an excellent pianist and organist with a leaning towards popular music and he played organ at Emanuel Church and practiced there and we can remember at least one time listening to his rendition of the theme from Dvorak's New World Symphony from which the song "Going Home" was based and as he played it, it took on a very pronounced Dixieland tinge.

So far in 1979, 396 pints have been collected from the area at the spring and fall blood clinics. 131 of these have been from Double A Products employees, an outstanding record for industry participation.

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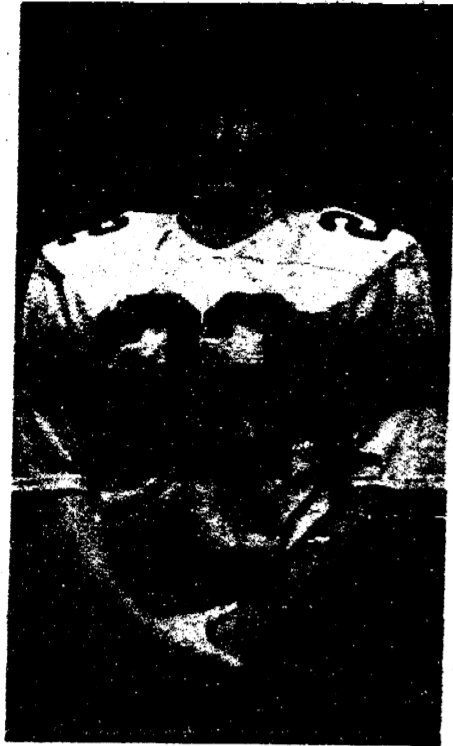

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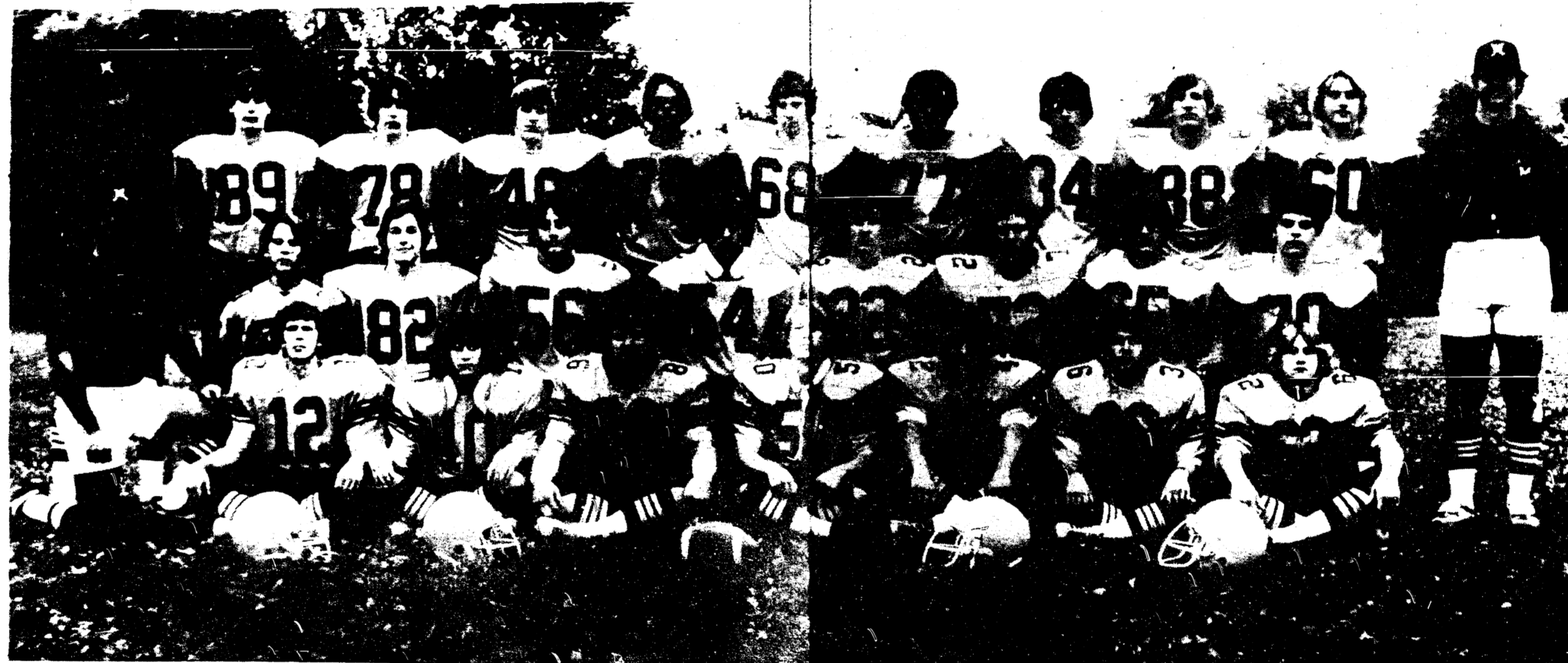
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Board Of Education Minutes

October 15, 1979

Moved by DuFresne to accept and approve the minutes of the Executive Session of September 17, 1979, as submitted. Supported by Bunney. Yeas: Bunney, DuFresne, Macomber, Walkowe, Mick, Curley and Horning. Nays -0-. Motion carried.

Moved by Horning that the Financial Report indicating receipts in September of \$874,078.87 and disbursements for the same period of \$183,585.15 leaving a balance September 30, 1979, of \$792,349.76 be approved as submitted. Supported by Bunney. Yeas: Horning, Bunney, DuFresne, Macomber, Walkowe, Mick and Curley. Nays -0-. Motion carried.

Moved by Walkowe that current bills totaling \$206,141.80 be approved for payment. Supported by Macomber. Yeas: Curley, Horning, Bunney, Macomber, DuFresne, Walkowe and Mick. Nays -0-. Motion carried.

Mr. Kappler distributed informational material concerning the High School to each Board member. If there are any questions or concerns, they may request that this item be placed on the agenda of the November 19th, regular meeting.

Superintendent Masten reported on the progress of negotiations. He hoped that by the end of the week bargaining could begin on class size, fringe benefits and salaries.

Mr. McGuire gave the Financial Report on the School Service Account.

ATHLETICS: Year to Date Revenues \$3,214.05. Year to Date Expenditures \$2,140.76. Year to Date Balance \$1,073.29.

FOOD SERVICE: Year to Date Revenues \$10,890.58. Year to Date Expenditures \$1,484.34. Year to Date Balance \$9,406.24. Year to Date Balance in School Service Fund \$10,479.53.

Mr. McGuire reported that the large balance in Food Service does not reflect bills amounting to approximately \$5,000.

Mr. McGuire's report on the Internal Account indicated: Previous Balance \$24,623.75. Year to Date Revenues \$4,607.08. Year to Date Expenditures \$2,775.84. Year to Date Balance in the Internal Account \$26,454.99.

Moved by Curley that the Annual 1979-80 School Budget indicating estimated receipts of \$2,281,565 and estimated disbursements of \$2,380,315 leaving a fund equity June 30, 1980 of \$98,250 be approved. Moved by Bunney that easement be given to a strip of land 10 ft. wide and 140 ft. long in the North side of the Nellie Ackerson School property for driveway proposed at the Reed Davis property, with the understanding that Mr. Davis pays the school \$200.00 and all expenses incurred. Supported by Walkowe. Yeas: DuFresne, Macomber, Walkowe, Mick, Curley, Horning and Bunney. Nays -0-. Motion carried.

President Mick informed the Board that their choice of applicants for the position of Superintendent of Schools, Dr. Timothy Quinn, was in the process of accepting a position in another school district.

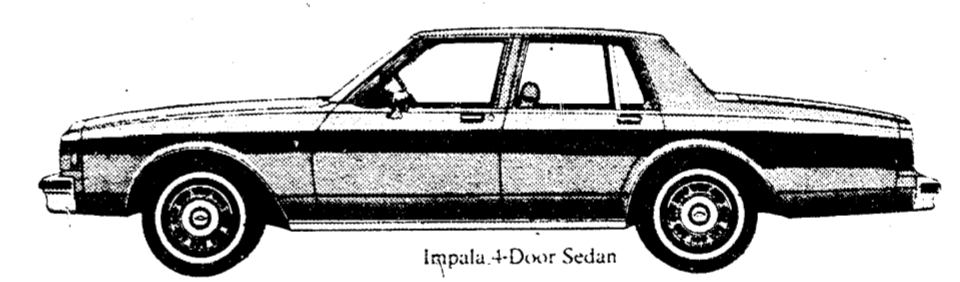
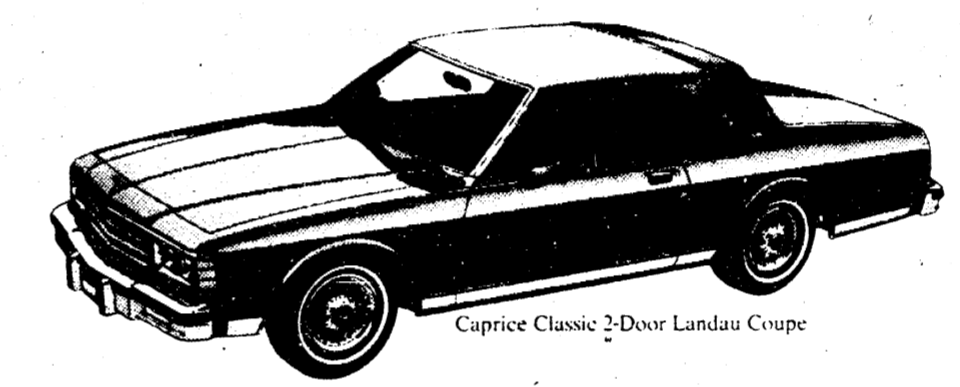

ANNUAL FINANCIAL REPORT
Manchester Community Schools
JUNE 30, 1979

The following Financial Report is taken from the 1979 certified audit. Any district resident interested in a more detailed breakdown of receipts and disbursements may inspect the audit at the Board Office.

The audit is on an accrual basis so year end balances represent cash on hand, equity in school buses, student accounts and taxes receivable. The actual cash available on June 30th, was \$137,000 as compared to \$181,000 last year.

Monies were spent for Special Maintenance projects in excess of the Special funds appropriated. The large portion of the maintenance fund was spent on roofs, boiler repairs, a new boiler and heating controls.

It was possible to budget \$35,000 for new replacement equipment but many needs for materials and equipment still remain. Projections on next years budget are fairly dismal.

Operating millage was reduced one mill (\$67,000) by the Headlee Amendment and a loss of 79 students has put Manchester in the position of receiving no General State Aid.

The need for salary adjustments and increased costs of utilities and instructional materials will provide a very tight budget year.

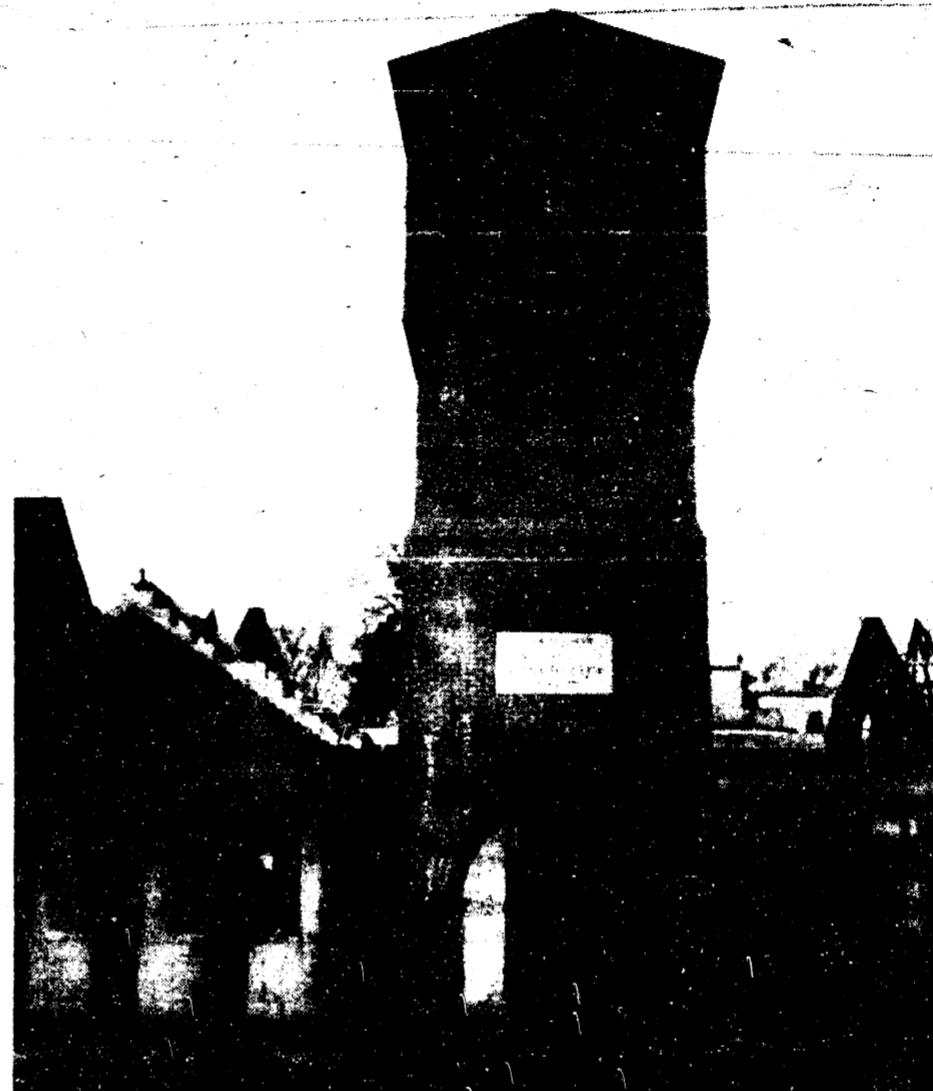
