HIT OR MISS by farley

The other day there was held at Ann Arbor, among other places, a demonstration protesting the proposed draft and vice versa. The percentage for it was some 45% and against it some 50%, and undecided 5%. These percentages however, are not so important, but as we thought about it we decided that perhaps it was us old gaffers who had failed the younger generation, not the youngsters who had failed us. We too are not a bit sure of our ideals and loyalties.

Then we read that only 5% of the present population could personally remember World War I. For the moment this astonished us until we were forced to remember that World War I took place 55-60 years ago-it couldn't have been that long ago. At that time we were just about high school age, and at the time the war ended we, wanting to make spending money, had obtained a job "carrying copy" for the Associated Press wire service in Jackson. There were there two daily newspapers, one morning and one evening, and both were subscribers.

operators could set the news in type and then rush it to the stereotyping room and onto the presses. The previous day's issue was always left on the presses so that all one had to do was remake the front and back pages and get the extra on the street. I remember that this was completed in less than an hour at times.

By then a group of carriers had been summoned and papers were issued to them and they were transported to various parts of town to cry at the top of their voices, "Extra-Extra", and soon the whole town was alerted.

There was at this time in Jackson, a factory operated by the Sparks-Withington Company who were making what were then known as trench sirens, an ancestor of those now used on police cars, ambulances, etc. But then they were hand operated with a crank, and the faster you turned the crank the higher the note of the siren. They were used in trenches to alert the occupants of an impending assault or an air raid and in the cities, etc. and they made an infernal racket.

Many women were employed in this factory making these sirens which were being turned out in large quantities-the first time that women had been employed to any extent in a factory.

We had a friend working in shipping there and so the first thing we did was phone the plant and confirm what had happened, and so bedlam broke loose. Everyone dropped their tools and rushed to the shipping area of the plant and grabbed one or two of the sirens, then raced to the several huge Packard trucks parked there and all that could, climbed aboard and the trucks were driven down the streets of the town. It took little time to alert the whole area and a wild and raucous celebration ensued which continued throughout the day when sheer exhaustion toned it down somewhat. By afternoon some of the celebrants found it necessary to bolster their spirits with liquid substance, and before long some of the celebrants had fallen by the wayside.

The police were somewhat on duty but they too joined in the affair and when it became necessary they simply escorted or assisted the fatigued celebrants to a quiet corner until they revived somewhat and could be taken home. We shall never forget the rows of forms laid out in the triangular park in front of the depot on East Michigan Avenue. It looked before long, like the aftermath of a great battle.

This celebration released the tension which had been evident for so long when everyone was working and praying and hoping for a victorious conclusion of a war in which most of us thought that we were forced to participate in order to preserve our democratic way of life and we were all united in achieving this result. I suppose there were a few conscientious objectors when the draft for this war was announced but most of us were very proud to serve our country, and those who by the time they were drafted, had not volunteered, accepted their fate stoically as did their families, and marched away to do their bit for their country, proudly if not gladly. Most of us were glad to fight, if we had to, for our privileges, and even joked a bit about it.

I remember a vaudeville act-vaudeville was at that time the TV of the 1916's-when a blackface pair-the negroes of that time didn't think they were being insulted when they were portrayed as

December 5, 1979

The regular meeting of the Manchester Village Planning Commission was held at the Village Hall, with members present: Hinkley, Leeson, Tracy, Daniels, Smith, and Bond.

The meeting was called to order at 7:35 p.m. by Ch. Hinkley.

Minutes of the meeting of November 7 were read, and an addendum requested. Bond moved that the corrected minutes be approved, seconded by Tracy, and accepted.

Chairman Hinkley read a letter of explanation from the Washtenaw County Metropolitan Planning Commission with regard to a proposed Central Area Action Program, involving all out-county communities, to develop strategies for implementing the County Comprehensive Plans policies and for moving toward attainment of county and national objectives. Mr. Hinkley has replied via letter that we will be pleased to participate in

the program. The meeting was opened for the agenda item planned for discussion on future development and expansion of our central business district. Mr. Don Lämpert, Chairman of the Manchester Village Association was in attendance and was asked to join in this discussion. The inventory of the Central Business District is to be updated, and then plans for possible future development of the C.B.D. and adjoining neighborhoods are to be prepared for recommendations. The question of available industrial areas was also considered in the broad view, although future plans for essential services must be set before positive recommendations can be made.

It was suggested that a joint meeting with the Village Council be arranged to consider any topics which may require inter-communication. Adjournment was moved by Daniels, seconded by Tracy.

The meeting was declared adjourned at 9:45 P.M.

Observations

Last week's issue of the Enterprise contained two Letters to the Editor which should elicit quite an amount of discussion. The first was a letter written by Ed Fredricks, State Senator, 23rd district and comments on the necessity of reducing business and State Income tax. There is no question that everyone would like to see a great reduction in taxes collected but pray tell me why on these two items. This shows typical legislative thinking over which we have been complaining frequently in the past. To begin with the business tax is minimal unless more than \$50,000 has been earned. And anyone that earns \$50,000 per year can well afford to pay tax. Even at \$50,000 it is a small tax so why all the concerns. At least money has been earned to be able to pay.

Next our good senator wants to cut the State Income tax banning retirement income from any tax at all. Amazingly he

states that this amount will save 4 1/2% on retirement income between now and 1986. Big deal. He does not say what that is in real money. So we did some figuring and on our retirement income and savings will amount to about \$10.23 per year. So our good Senator is like all the rest of the legislators making a big deal over peanuts.

If the Senator is really interested in the welfare of his constituents he should take a good look at the Personal Property taxes. For his information school taxes amount to 88% of the total property tax, 14% for the county, while Village, Community College, Intermediate school, and special assessments take each from 3% to 6%. In short our Property Taxes would be quite bearable if we got rid of the School Tax.

However schools have to be paid for and thus a reduction in one tax must be replaced by an increase in another tax. Using the Senators 4.4% State Income tax as a criterion and again referencing my own income we find that if the Senator raises the State tax to 4.9% I wouldn't have to pay the 68%. That to me makes a whole lot more sense, (why not, it saves me paying). Basically all of our schools are filled with children belonging to parents that live in Michigan. But not all of these parents are property owners. Probably less than half of them are and although not all of them are laborers the percentage between being employed and unemployed is much less than between property owners and non owners. And it

February 4, 1980

Council met in regular session with the meeting called to order by President Schaffer at 7:00 P.M. Present were: Hinkley, Minick, Petsch, Reed and Daniels. Minutes of the January 21, 1980 meeting were read, corrected and approved in a motion by Hinkley, supported by Petsch. All years, carried.

Daniels reviewed Public Works activities for the previous two weeks which included: Made repairs at the landfill site. Replaced one gate and reset the post at the packer; Work was done on the ice rink every day that the weather permitted; Worked on equipment maintenance, each unit was greased and oiled; Checked with Mr. Bill Steude of the Michigan Municipal League on revenue sharing and we were told that we could hold a hearing and use the money where it was needed (not exceeding legal limits); A copy of the proposed 1980 budget was taken to accountant for review; The department has taken the water meter from Mann's Service Station to Ann Arbor for testing, due to the large amount of water used (311,000 gal.) in the last billing period; The repair parts have been ordered from Peterson & Matz, Inc.; Fillyaw's Service Station requested we make a check and find out why they are using such a large amount of water. It was discovered that water was running continuously in one of the restrooms; Park equipment and tables are being repaired for next summer; Repaired water main on Feb. 2, 1980; Gas report for month of January was presented.

Enter Koebe at 7:15 P.M. A letter of resignation from Douglas Manwaring was read. Moved by Koebe, supported by Reed to accept the

resignation of Douglas Manwaring. All years, carried. Daniels to notify CETA of the resignation and ask that the job opening be posted.

Minick reported on extended services, such as Fire, Police and Medical that were available thru Cable Television. A representative will attend the February 18, 1980 meeting to submit information and cost. He will review the East Lansing Ordinance as a model for Cable Television. Minick also reported the Senior Citizens Complex Committee would like to attend a meeting of Council to show what is involved, slides of what they are thinking about and need opinions. He was advised to report to the Committee that they should first attend a meeting of the Manchester Planning Commission, then attend a meeting of Council.

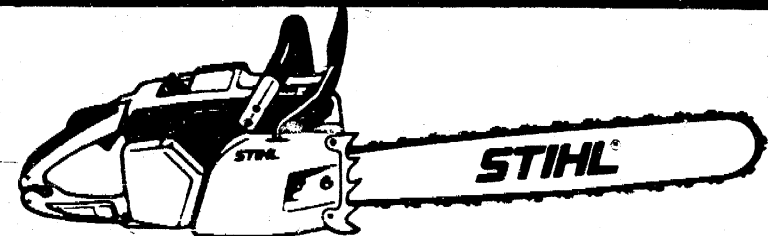

School Board Minutes

These are the proposed minutes of the January 28, 1980 Board of Education Meeting. They are not official until approved or corrected at the next regular meeting of the Board of Education.

SPECIAL MEETING

January 28, 1980

The meeting was called to order at 8:00 P.M. by President Mick in the Study Auditorium. Board members present: Horning, Walkow, Mick, DuFresne, Macomber, Bunney and Curley. Absent - 0.

President Mick opened the meeting with a brief statement indicating that the Board was not in total agreement with the recommended cuts in the budget. However they all were in agreement of the end results and that was physical soundness.

President Mick said she would take a list of names of the people that wanted to speak to the agenda item and call them in order. No one would be recognized after the Board began to deliberate.

Mr. Fitzgerald asked if the Board could give their presentation before the question and answer period.

President Mick stated that the Board would give their presentation and then accept comments and or questions from the audience and then the Board would deliberate. During the time the Board was in deliberation no questions would be answered.

Dr. Thompson indicated that there were severe budget problems. The major sources of these problems come from about 12 dozen basic areas:

- 1) No proposed amount in the Budget for

annuities. That along with salary increases consumed a large portion.

- 2) Transportation costs are running far over the projection. Gas & Oil was figured at \$25,000. The new figure is \$40,000 and that's only a guess. Maintenance of fleet, parts and contracted services are about the figure that was budgeted.

- 3) Maintenance at Nellie Ackerson and Middle School. Middle School gym roof is a sieve everytime it rains. No heat controls at that building.

- 4) Boiler problem in all schools. The Department of Public Health has required that we install safety valves on all of our boilers to avoid water contamination. That is a \$500 item per building.

- 5) High School electrical system experienced problems which cost \$3,500.

These are the major problems. There are more, some are small some are larger, but they all add up.

Some solutions to our problems are less pleasant than others:

- 1) Interest on investments are higher than anticipated.
- 2) About \$8,800 from the Headlee Roll-back.
- 3) Some Federal reimbursement monies were higher than anticipated.

Dr. Thompson continued by saying that the Board of Education is legally bound to

adopt a balanced budget.

Areas where cuts were recommended are as follows:

- 1) Supply budget has been cut. Building Principals have \$300-\$400 for 2nd semester teaching supplies.
- 2) Vehicle replacement has been decreased by approximately \$10,000.
- 3) Band and Shop equipment decreased by \$15,000. It was \$17,000 the new figure is \$2,000.
- 4) High School Custodial Staff decreased by 2 part-time people.
- 5) Maintenance and Transportation person reduced by 1 hour per day.
- 6) Library Aids at Elementary and Middle School reduced by 33% to 50%.
- 7) Secretarial time at all buildings except Pleasant Lake reduced by 33-50%.
- 8) Food Service time reduced.
- 9) No Drivers Education instruction until after July 1, so it can be charged to the next fiscal year.
- 10) Elimination of Spring Sports which brings back between \$11,000 and \$11,500, \$9,800 in coaching salaries and \$1,500 in transportation costs.
- 11) Elimination of 2 teachers: One 5th Grade teacher and One 6th Grade teacher which will pick up about \$14,000.

The overall effect is: Receipts \$2,307,513; Disbursements \$2,434,455; Expen-

ditures over Receipts \$126,942; 1979-80 Fund Equity \$137,335; 1979-80 Balance \$10,693.

President Mick added that due to declining enrollment we lost 79 children this year. And a projection of a minimum of that much loss for next year. There have been no staff reductions because of decreased enrollment. The Budget Committee has indicated that many of these same types of problems will have to be looked at again in June.

Mr. Fitzgerald, Mrs. Settles, Mr. Stripp, Mrs. Meade, Mr. Settles, Mrs. Bristle, Mrs. Reed and Mr. Blossom asked questions relevant to the recommended cuts, the possibility of holding a Special Millage election, the Headlee Rollback and cuts in administration.

Mr. Bunney asked questions regarding some specific line items in the budget. He indicated he would not be in favor of employing the legal firm that handled the negotiation of the teacher contract again.

He asked if there could be an increase in lunch prices to offset increased costs. Mr. McGuire said when prices are increased participation drops 5-10%.

Mr. Bunney asked questions regarding cuts in other areas. Also, what maintenance projects have been completed

from the allocated \$6 Mill. Dr. Thompson listed the completed areas.

Mr. DuFresne asked about the line item reduction of the Annual Election and the proposed reduction of 1 maintenance person. Dr. Thompson responded by saying that if we layoff a maintenance person we will lose CETA funding for 1 maintenance person. As a result this proposed reduction could not be recommended.

Mr. Walkow asked what alternatives we had besides cutting spring sports.

Dr. Thompson said there are priorities within the budget. 1) Roof repairs at the Middle School and 2) Heat controls at the Middle School. These are his priorities as presented to the Finance Committee.

Mr. Horning indicated that after all the problems we have experienced during the past year in this area, he supported Dr. Thompson's recommendations.

Mr. Walkow responded by saying that the people in the Community have supported Spring Sports through their donations to construct the track and there were a large number of children involved in Spring Sports. He is totally in disagreement with the elimination of it. He said he thought some other areas could be cut rather than sports.

Mr. Bunnay said he shared Mr. Walkow's opinion, but beyond that he realized all cuts are painful and he didn't like being a part of any of it but felt more strongly in the area of cutting spring sports because of the fact that there is very little for teenage students to do in Manchester after hours and the elimination of sports would create more idle time and the community as a whole will suffer. He continued by saying he would be more in favor of adopting an amended budget with a zero balance or marginal balance versus the \$10,000 balance we now have to keep that program in.

President Mick said she shared the same feeling but what would happen if they adopted a budget with a 0- balance and an emergency came up. Where would money come from? Her top priority is the instructional soundness for every student and that instructional cuts come last.

Mr. Curley, Chairman of the Finance Committee, stated there were no other places to get the money. At the beginning, the Committee was looking at a deficit of \$50,000 to \$60,000. The top priority of the Committee was to keep the educational staff as much as possible for the remainder of the school year to eliminate disrupting classes. The original plan was to cut 4 teachers which would have meant split grades at the elementary level. The High School was reviewed but the Committee felt changes could not be made at this time, but it would be looked at next year.

A lengthy discussion followed on possible alternatives to the recommended cuts.

Mr. Macomber indicated he was very upset. He thought we were trying to "eat our cake and have it too". Over the past several years, even before he was on the board, the roofs leaked. He said he has looked at other schools who operate on less money than we do \$248,000 less, and

they have 35 more kids and 8 less teachers.

He indicated he has checked and double checked, we've got \$250,000 more budgeted than another school with 35 more kids and we can't even make ends meet. That's amazing to me. I wouldn't just bury my head in the sand and keep going. I've brought this up time and time again. The most disgraceful thing that I've done since I've been on this board is when I approved that Bus Contract and this Teacher Contract. I think they're a shame. To tax the tax payers of the Community. A Superintendent gave the Bus Drivers a bonus without Board approval and I can prove that. It's not even in the Board minutes. And then we wonder why we're out of money. We bail out people everywhere. I think it's about time, and I've brought this up time and time again, we can operate this school as sufficiently as any school can be operated. They are doing it all around us.

I think this is an educational institution not a place to come and fatten your pocketbooks. I think we're here to educate the kids and I think that's a job we ought to be doing. The worst thing that ever happened to this school system is when they passed the tenure law. We've got people sitting on here that will sit here

and die of old age and still be here. I've just about had it. Listening to this stuff go on and it's very simple to get this thing—Board members sit right here and sign, and this is just an example of what I'm talking about, a 2 year contract and there were only 2 Board members who have voted against that and we could have made some changes at the end of that first year. But you sign up somebody for a 2 year contract or 3 year contract you have to pay that or else. Time and again we're in that situation time and time again. We lock the door after the horse is gone. There was a big AD in the paper about all the different schools all around us and there was only 1 that I could see that made a cut and that was Clinton Schools, preparing for this. The Budget Committee brought this up to Mr. Masten about making some cuts way back in the 1st of the year and he wouldn't. Nothing was done at that time. We couldn't get it done. Nobody wants to be the tough guy to get that job accomplished, all they want to do is go along and spend the tax payers money as long as the tax payers will shuck it out. I don't mind paying, I just want to get the kids an education.

Mr. Bunnay responded by saying he didn't know exactly who Mr. Macomber Continued on page 11

is this imbalance which forces a smaller contingency to pay exorbitant costs for schools open to anyone. Hence we would like to see some effort being expended to remove these costs from the property owners and have school cost transferred to a State Income tax. At least everyone then will pay a just share of total school costs.

The other letter which drew my attention was written by a former athletic genius bemoaning the fact that shortcomings of the school funds had forced curtailment in the athletic program. Like all athletes he blames this dilemma on the school board and in his words on their pathetic display of financial management. He also seems to feel sorry for the inability of the school kids to be able to change this decision.

To begin with he overlooks the fact that the kids do not pay one lousy cent to keep the school open and hence are not entitled to request any changes in the school board's decision. We were always of the opinion that the purpose of the school was to teach students reading, writing, and arithmetic and not to develop in his words an atmosphere revolving around football, basketball, and other sports. Perhaps in his time this condition existed and it is no wonder that at the present time we have the condition where high school students are found to be lacking in being able to read and write. State tests have shown that less than one half of our students attain a passable plateau in these two categories. I happen to be well acquainted with one student in the Junior class who recently switched his speech class because it first required that students had to write and read their speeches. He flatly stated that he was not able to either write the speech and even if he could he would not

be able to read same. Our writer makes a big to-do about students winning in the Spartan Relays and even basketball tournaments but does not realize that these honors are bestowed only upon a very small percentage of the entire student body. So one student wins a State championship, but what about the other 150. What do they get. Nuttin. The one that does win remembers the feat all his life, the other 150 forget about it as soon as they graduate.

He also states that the rest of the kids have to work and worry all their lives. Well if they know how to read and write they won't have to worry, they can climb to unlimited heights even perhaps become President of the USA, or Corporation Officers, or even Millionaires. And that, you will have to admit is better than being a State champion.

Last but not least he attacks the school board not considering what children are now going to do with their spare time. One hears this argument over and over again. Never do these critics ask the simple question what did kids do before there was football, basketball, and what not? Kids have been going to school for over five hundred years where schools offered no athletic programs. I remember attending school for over eight years where we had no sports contact. The only sport we had was our books with their new words, new ideas, new concepts, new directions, all of which kept us so damn busy we had no time to hang around in the streets, alleys, etc., etc.

I also disagree with him that attitudes do not change. They changed in the 50's when all this new education started, when sports took a more prominent effect in the lives of students, when new math was introduced and when progressive education took a strong foothold. And what was the result of this. Students had a lower

education standard than before, they knew less, school taxes were getting higher and higher, and crime was on a rapid pace of increase. Obviously the change in attitude was in error and the time has come to change back to the way it was. If he wants a challenging job give us lower taxes, better educated students, at a lower cost and maybe Manchester will get out of its ultra-conservatism.

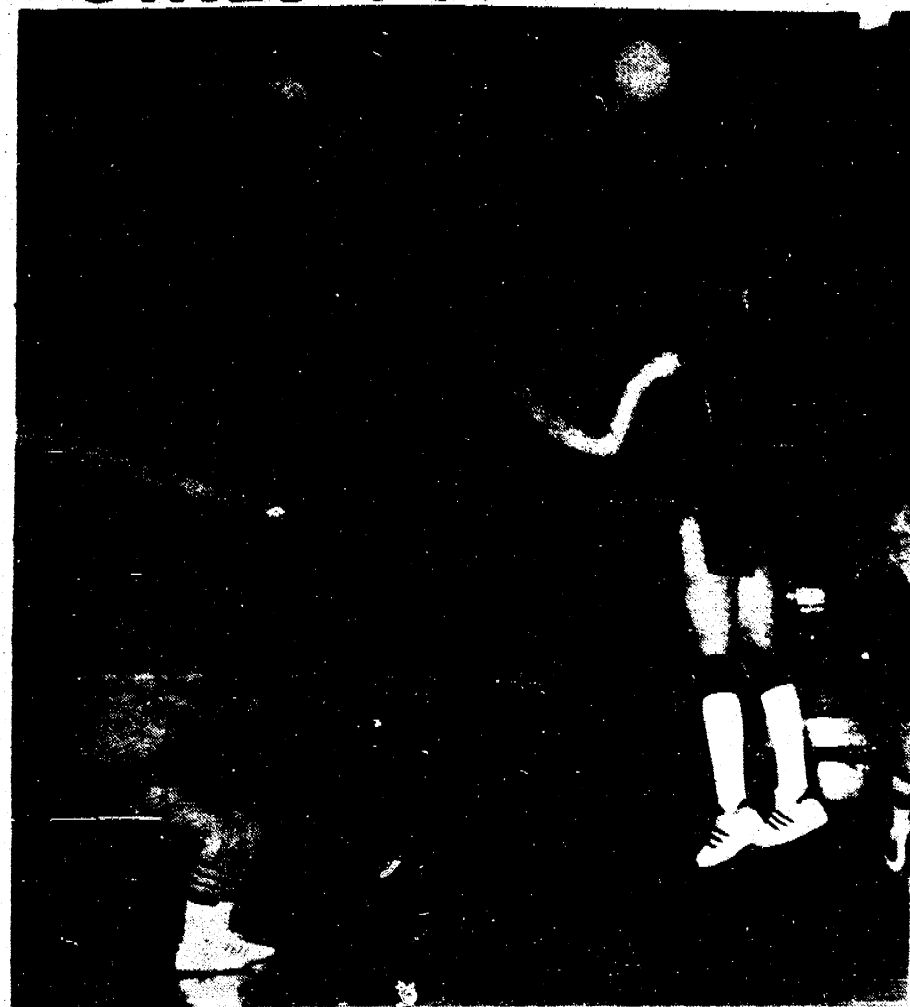

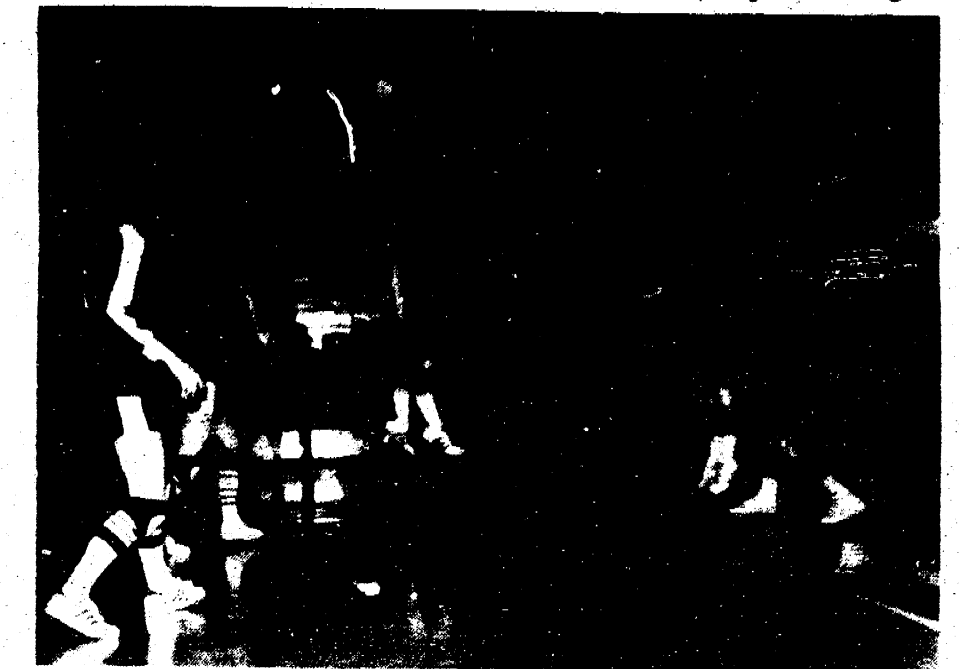

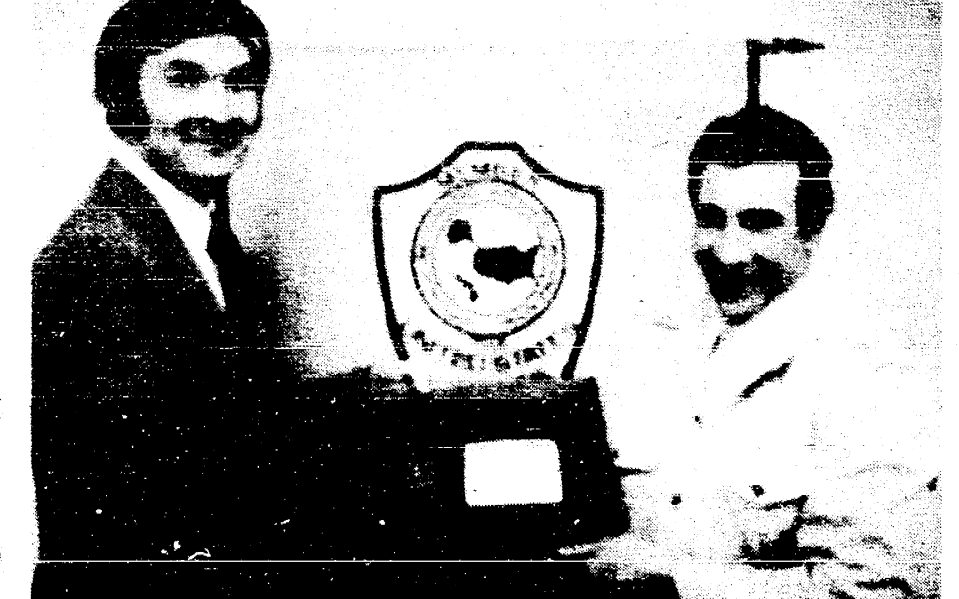
