In due time along came World War two and once again we were called to help save the democracies of the world, even after we had been told by our leaders as a campaign promise that "No mother's son will ever set foot on foreign soil".

Once again we went all out to produce guns and ships and planes and withstood uncomplainingly rationing and gasoline and tire restrictions and all the other problems that all out defense brought forward, and we sent the cream of our young men over seas to both sides of the world to do battle, and many of them never returned, but we kept our chins up and were proud of our good deeds, and most of our leaders.

Then about the time all the wounds from this holocaust had healed slong came Viet Nam with all its confusing questions and an increasing number of our citizens rebelled against it, honestly believing that we should not have been there and that we could not accomplish anything while there. We had protests of various kinds and some of our youngsters fled to foreign countries to escape doing anything for their native land by serving in the armed forces. I don't think most of them were cowards, they were just confused and by now who can say if they were wrong?

Finally that affair came to an end and for once peace reigned in the world-or at least as far as we were concerned-but we, especially our present generation, became more and more restless and uncertain of present and future and unrest was evident in many places. We became obcessed by many "isms", or "cukey" philosophies-like "woman's lib" which most of 'em have had

# Farmers, Fishermen Forums Begin Again File Tax Return

Certain farmers and commercial fisher men must file their 1979 federal income tax returns and pay any tax due by March 3, 1980, the Internal Revenue Service

Persons who earned at least two-thirds of their 1978 or 1979 gross income from farming or fishing and did not make an estimated tax declaration by January 15, 1980, or pay any amount of estimated tax FAMILY FILM, entitled "One Who Was by this date, must file their return and pay all tax due by March 3, 1980, to avoid paying a penalty.

IRS Publication 225, Farmer's Tax Guide: 595, Tax Guide for Commercial Fishermen; and 505, Tax Withholding and Estimated Tax, provide additional information. Taxpayers can get a free copy of these publications by mail using the order form in the tax package, or by calling the IRS. IRS has special phone numbers for tax forms and free publications. In Detroit, the number is 237-0794. Elsewhere in area code 313, call 1-800-462-9910. The number for the rest of the state is 1-800-482-0828. Forms and publications can also be picked up at IRS offices.

### Obituary

Services were held for Dr. Arthur J. Schaible, who died January 15 in Seattle, at the First Presbyterian Church in Fairbanks.

He was a long-time general surgeon and University of Alaska regent who concentrated on business after his retirement from medicine in 1972.

Schaible was born Nov. 15, 1906 at Walvis Bay, South West Africa, where his maternal grandfather had arrived from Germany as a missionary. His father, also a missionary, had come to Africa in 1901 from Michigan. The family returned to Michigan when Schaible was 14.

He entered Elmhurst College in Elmhurst. Inc., later graduating from Valparaiso University, also in Indiana. In 1935 he received his medical degree from Northwestern University near Chicago.

Three years later he was in the Army Reserve and working at Walter Reed Army Hospital in Washington, D.C. He was told by a congressman admitted to the facility that by contacting the Alaskan delegation he might secure an appointment in Alaska. Shortly afterwards he was at Tanana Hospital. In 1941 he moved

staffed Fairbanks Medical and Surgical Clinic. He retired in 1972.

He married Druska Carr in 1949. She died in 1957. On Christmas Day, 1958, Schaible mar-

ried Grace Berg in New York City. She survives. In 1972 he joined the board of Alaska Airlines, where he served until 1978 and

continued another year in an advisory He was one of the organizers of the Alaska Territory Medical Association. serving as one of its early presidents. He

was also a fellow of the American College of Surgeons. His membership on the UA Board of Regents stretched from 1961 to 1969. He received an honorary degree from the UA in 1972, the year after a similar honor

came from Elinhurst College. Other survivors include a brother, Herbert, of Elmhurst; and two sisters. Katherine Pelton, Whittier Calif., and Mary Kyper, Lunenberg, Vt.

# World Day of Prayer

Michigan will join with the rest of the U.S. and 170 other countries around the globe on March 7, to demonstrate their Christian fellowship in the annual observance of World Day of Prayer.

"Responsible Freedom" is the theme for 1980 World Day of Prayer, which received an official proclamation from Michigan Governor William G. Milliken recently.

"In a world plagued by tenuous relationships between nations, peoples and cultures, prayer serves as a common bond and as a means of dedicating ourselves to improving the quality of life throughout the world," Milliken said.

His executive declaration urges support for World Day of Prayer as an "effort designed to facilitate a moral and spiritual awakening in America and throughout the world."

Women in this country have been observing a national day of prayer since 1887. World Day of Prayer is one of three inter-national celebrations sponsored by Church Women United as visible expressions of concern for the global community. CWU, an ecumenical group which seeks justice and reconciliation among all people, also sponsors May Fellowship Day and World Community Day. Offerings from World Day of Prayer and World Community Day support Intercontinental Missions projects of Church Women United.



The American Red Cross Bloodmobile will visit Manchester, Monday, March 31, from 12 to 6 p.m. at the Emanuel United Church of Christ.
