It has been partially thawed several times and now just seems to be a scrambled blob of ice cream which probably tastes like the Lord knows what, but you can have it at a bargain. Then too, nestled down in one corner there is a gob of somewhat pale hamburger or ground chuck. I'm not quite sure which but it has all of the physical characteristics of both and seems to be suffering from freezer burn. I can't quite remember when it was placed gently there but it seems to me that it was in 1978 when it was put in to preserve it until I could retrieve it and mix it in with Laddie's dog food on a day when he had been unusually good.

Further research brings to light a mysterious plastic dish of a hardened gray substance which is believed to be solidified chicken fat which was put there one day so that it would harden and then be much easier to throw out but I might be wrong. Maybe it is the balance of a mess of rhubarb which we couldn't quite finish last spring. I am inordinately fond of rhubarb but too much of it has a rather uncomfortable effect on my eliminator system and didn't quite dare to finish it, but stored it away for future reference and then forgot about it.

When refrigerators with freezers first came on the market we mortgaged our

The boughten stuff you buy nowadays is made so that it very seldom, if ever, spoils whether you keep it in the refrigerator or not but the process of preserving the preserves seems not to preserve the items.

Like many of you, we received last week a notice from our supervisor that our assessment has been raised by some odd 20%. The question which immediately comes to our mind is why? Has there been an increase in service? Is extra service being added or even considered? There is inflation but taxes were raised last year to take care of that. There is also talk that inflation is going to be lowered by action of congress or do our supervisors have no faith in congress?

The reason for the raise is explained in

that the State of Michigan feels that property should be assessed at one half of Market Price. But what is Market Price? Have our supervisors asked this question or do they merely say amen to anything the State proposes. If so, we ought to vote them out of office for being derelict in their duty. It is difficult these days with 13% mortgage interest to sell any house in Manchester. So in reality there is no Market Value to begin with.

Is there then an increase in service? I can only speak for my property. It is in the village, has no water, no sewer, and when there is snow, no snow removal. It has a light over the driveway. But that light has been there for 40 years. So there has been no increase in service. Does this make it more marketable. Hardly. I could connect to the water system but the house is quite a little bit higher than the present water supply. So I probably would have little pressure and only get drips out of the faucet instead of a stream of water. Unfortunately the lowest point in the nearest sewer connection is ten to fifteen feet, about the low point in my land so I would have to run a single line all the way to the plant. Quite expensive and certainly deductible from market value.

If there are others that feel the way I do I suggest that we attend the Board meeting come March 10 and 11 and confront them with questions regarding this latest assessment. Perhaps the least we can do is to find out who the genius is in Lansing that sets these values and have a confrontation with him. The whole thing smells to us of taxation without representation and if this was hated in 1776 it is still being hated in 1980.

Public Works activities as reported by Koebe included: The crew has patched some of the asphalted streets as weather has permitted; Mailed in the Act 51 report on street programs - need to have someone named street administrator by the Council; Worked on the ice rin' and repaired the park tables; Salted streets twice and bladed the snow off once; Mailed out the letter to fulfill the requirements of the Wastewater NPDES permit; Mrs. Bernice Shadley stopped at the Public Works Dept. and checked out the billing for account #21800 at 316 Morgan St. One person was in concerning a letter from the Robert Scott Apts. 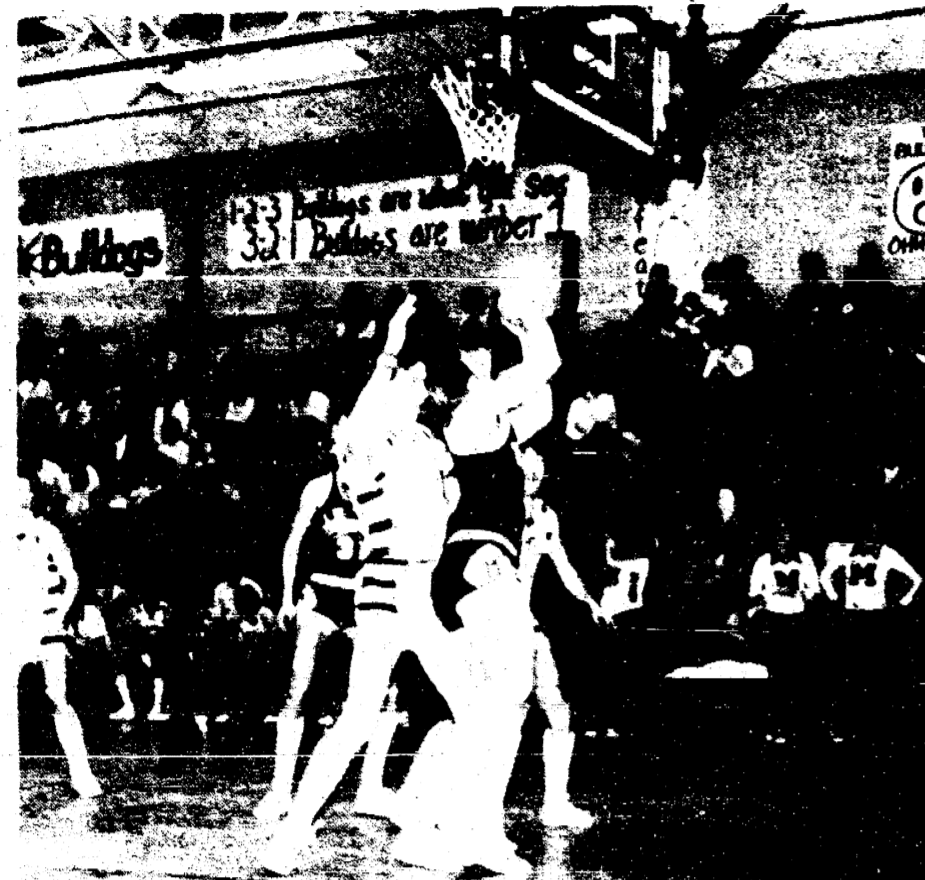

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# DUTCH WIN 1, LOSE 1



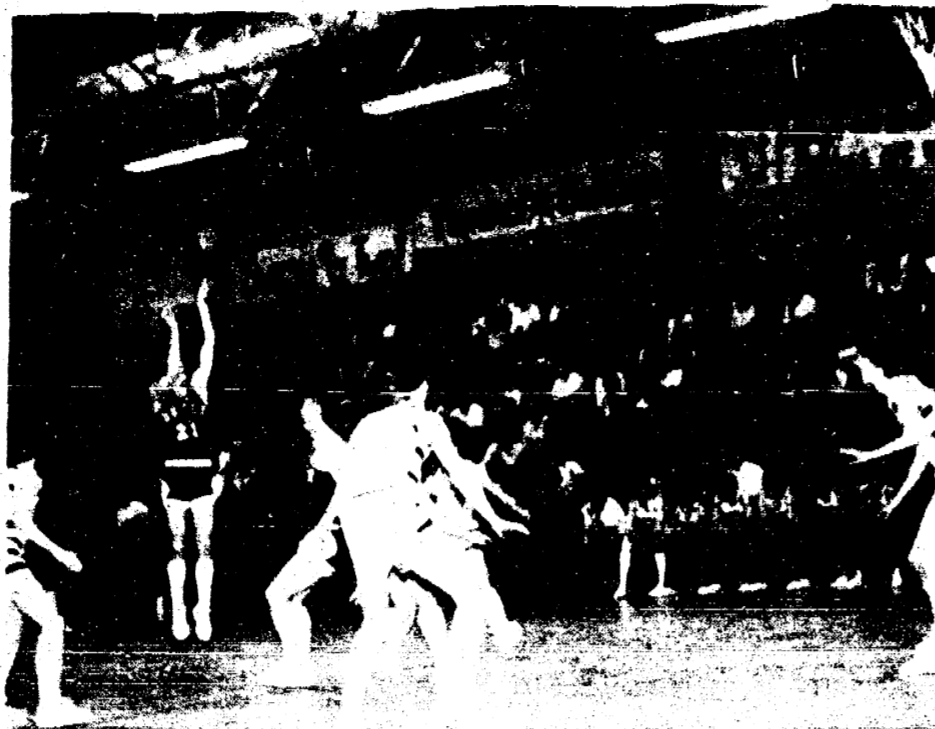

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### OBSERVATIONS

For the past several weeks we have been more or less discussing legislation in our State and Federal government. Mostly we have been writing about their inability to cope with the problems of these days and their inability to come up with any ideas for solving such problems. The remark has been made in this paper by another writer suggesting that we get rid of the present caucus and replace them with a new set of caucuses. Unfortunately we feel that this process has been pursued for too many years now and has gotten us absolutely nowhere.

In order for a democracy to operate at its maximum amount of efficiency voters should really study the various candidates to their fullest and then choose a candidate with whose policies they agree the most. And it is that less the problem of today. We hardly know the beliefs of any of our candidates and the media through which we may obtain them seems to be mostly interested in their poll results. We have recently agreed with Senator Dale who recently remarked during a debate that he was glad someone finally raised a question regarding issues.

What are the issues of the 1980 elections. Number one undoubtedly is inflation. Some of the rest, in which order place you want to place them are Taxes, Energy, Defense, Economy, Foreign Policy, and Unemployment. At the present time we have three candidates for the Presidency in the Democratic Party and a half dozen or so in the Republican Party. But who stands for what and what are their selective methods to improve conditions in these issues is anyone's guess. There is only one whose policies and beliefs we pretty well know. And that is

the incumbent President.

A year ago Carter stated that the inflation rate was 12% and that he intended to do something about it. Well he did. It is now 12%. He also promised to lower taxes and balance the budget. This he was going to accomplish by reducing the government's size and do away with various departments whose work was superfluous. Well some of this he did simply by jacking one or more departments into a single unit. The only problem was that more people had to be hired to do the work that before and accomplish less. Hence the government became larger and taxes went higher.

Next he was going to do something about Energy. There has been some progress there. We built the Alaska Pipeline, or rather the Oil companies built it, and since we had so many water parts to install the oil most of it is sent to Japan and Europe. Meanwhile our gasoline prices went from 62¢ per gallon to \$1.25 each and at times was hard to get. Many of our so called Allies think their arms at us and it looks like the only friend we have left is Canada. Maybe we should try harder on becoming better friends with China. After all the U.S., Canada, and China would be one hell of a force that should put a tremble in the hands of any other country.

Our Foreign Policy is practically non-existent and Unemployment is starting to climb. Not a rosy picture either.

So much for the policies of one candidate. Yet the polls show him with an overwhelming amount of favor. But they also showed such favor for Dewey in 1948 except that Truman was elected. So what I would like to see is the media forgetting about polls and tell us what the other candidates have to say about the issues. Besides coming to a movie star what is his idea how to fight inflation. The only time I heard him speak was a two minute answer on income tax, and several one minute answers on why he fired his campaign manager. And there were three different reports on that. Some say the managers aides were all fired and some say they quit. So what? Are we going to vote for a man as President on the basis that he fired his manager?

Kennedy seems to be losing ground in the Primaries which is not a bad idea. All I have ever heard him state is that he

intends to upset Carter. And once he was on the air during a moment stating that his main concern was to install a national health program. Apparently that is his main issue. The only thing such talk teaches one is that more money would be spent and inflation would go higher.

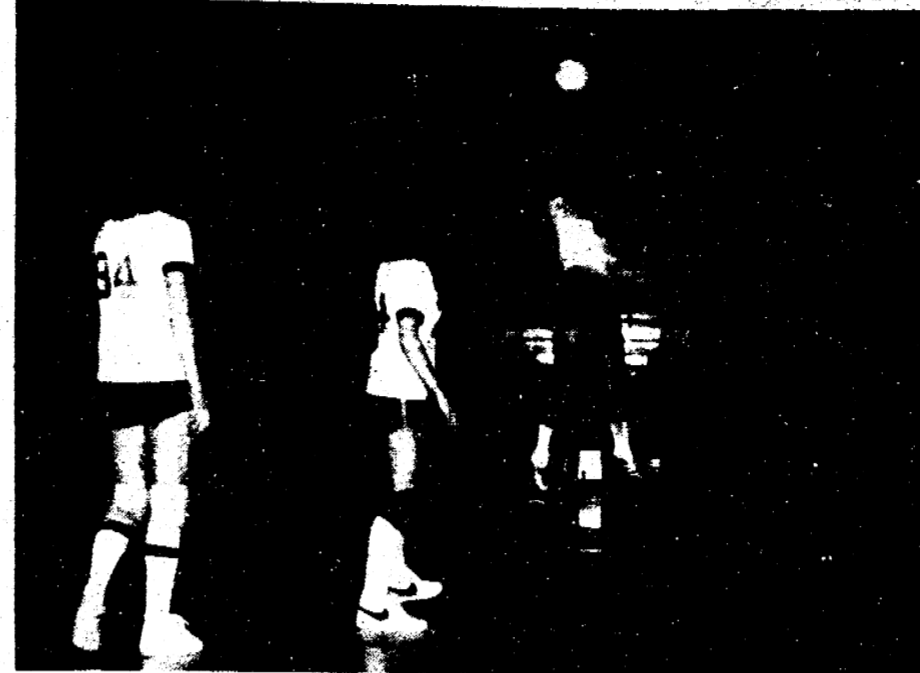

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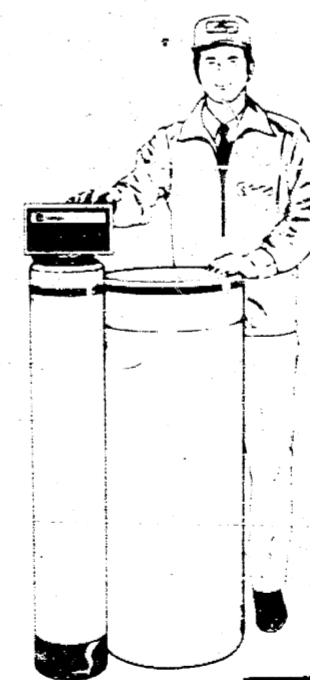
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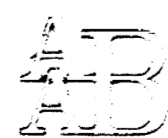

Planting stock available for Spring 1980 includes: White Pine, Red Pine, Scotch Pine, Jack Pine, Austrian Pine, White Spruce, Norway Spruce, Colorado Blue Spruce, Tulip Tree, Black Walnut, Black Locust, Autumn Olive, Honeysuckle, Multi-Flora Rose, Black Walnut Seed and Emerald Crownvetch Seed. Also available will be two types of Wildlife Packets for those wishing an assortment of trees and shrubs. Each packet contains 250 seedlings.

Sharon Hollow Road between Sharon Valley Road and Bethel Church Road will be closed as of March 3, 1980. The road closure is necessary for the construction of a new bridge over the River Raisin.

The present one lane bridge has deteriorated to the point that it must be replaced. The new bridge has been designed to current safety and structural standards. Because its deck is 34 feet wide, the new bridge will comfortably handle two way traffic.

Detour routes have been selected and signed by the March 3rd closure date. The primary detour routes will be Sharon Valley Road and Meyers Road. However, some traffic will use Bethel Church Road.

Almost immediately after Sharon Hollow Road is closed, the old bridge will be removed. Construction will then begin on the new bridge. The project is scheduled for completion by September 1, 1980.

The Road Commission recognizes the inconvenience imposed by the closure on the motorist and will continue efforts to

minimize the time the road is closed. The cooperation of all citizens and organizations effected by the construction is appreciated.

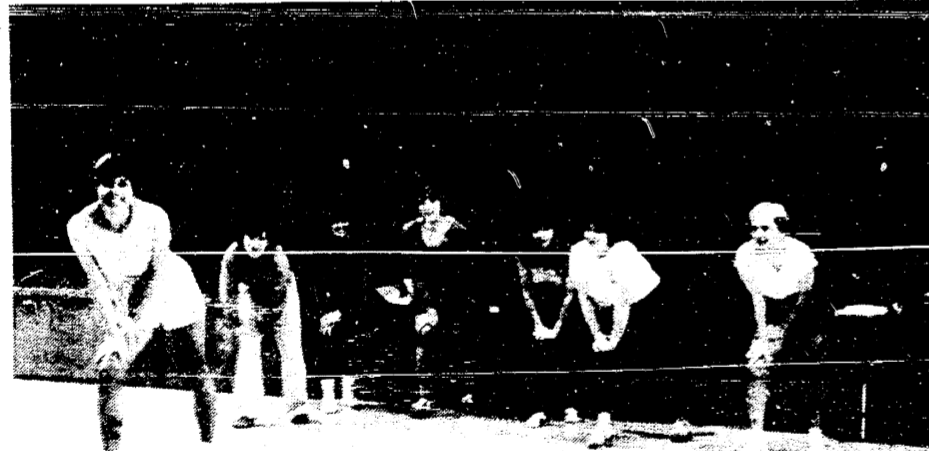

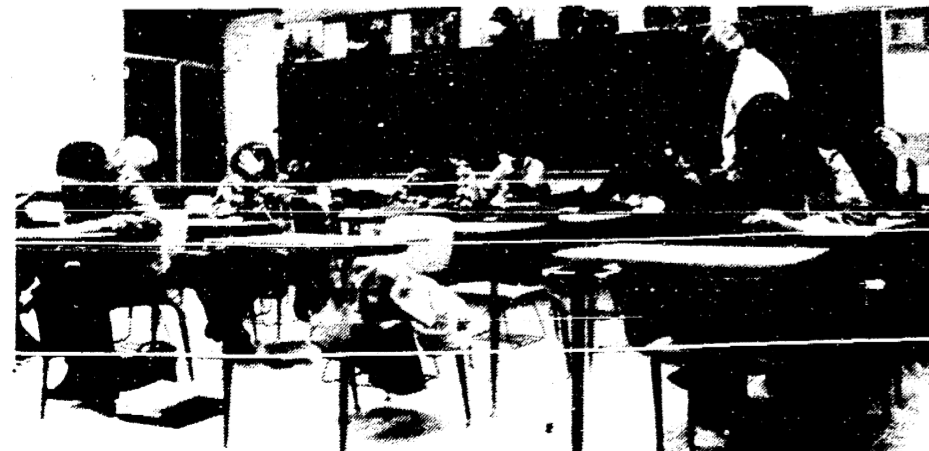
