Note to the reader:

A letter written by me appeared in the February 14 edition of the Manchester Enterprise. It concerned my views on the recent School Board decision to appropriate funds normally apportioned to Spring Sports to the repair of the school buildings. This letter received a reply by "JAW". The following letter is directed at

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"WAL" It is not my intent to get into a letter war with anyone, especially when that "anyone" resorts to hiding behind initials rather than stating his/her/its opinions with his full name, as I might add, the Enterprise requires of its letter writers

(maybe I should write my own weekly column). I have no time for hickering through the mail but I feel I must omehow acknowledge that I analyzed your column (it was just recently brought to my attention) with extreme interest.

I usually look forward to criticism as I find it a worthwhile way of learning about others' views and attitudes and thus. broaded my own horizons. But when that criticism is mixed with such childish sarcasm as yours, JAW, I hardly find it worth the paper it is written on.

I would only like to point out things to you, JAW:

First, and most importantly, while finding it very easy to attack my criticism, you never did get around to offering a logical answer to the criticism. All you offer is, "Like all athletes (all??), he blames this dilemma on the school board". If the School Board isn't to blame, JAW. who is, the athletes?

Instead, you go into a long winded discussion about how the quality of education in the United States is going downhill. Do you seriously think, JAW. that athletics is to blame for that? instead, I think the blame lies with people like you who dream of the good old days when "better educated students at a low cost" was truly possible, and now refuse digit inflated economy as necessary for

quality. Is refusing to pay the cost of education going to improve it? All you have to do is look as far as the Manchester Community Schools to decide that. You state, JAW, that less than one half of our state's students can read or write adequately and that is tragic indeed, yet if sports were to blame for that, doesn't it seem logical that only student/athletes would be reflective in this statistic? Why would the other students be affected? In other words, instead of only the student/athletes "knowing less", why does your statistic include HALF of the school

Next, your ludicrous statement that a state championship is only beneficial to the athletes themselves while carrying no merit for the rest of the student body or community, brings to mind two cases in point: 1) if no one else benefits, why do so many people attend high school sporting events, and 2) you would be hard pressed to find even a dozen people among the 43,000 Michigan State students who would tell you that after they leave MSU, that they will "forget about" winning the 1979 NCAA Basketball Championship and 90% of this 43,000 never even had personal contact with the team.

Finally, as for your comment that the students should have no say in the matter because they don't contribute anything to the schools. I can only say that unless you are a teacher, then you have no right to complain about the quality of education because you have no input in it nor are you involved in the direct benefits of same. And that statement is as idiotic as

I'm not saying JAW, that sports is a panacea, but what I am saying is that the program for the Athletic Boosters.

lessons learned through sportsmanship i.e. the spirit of competition, the ability to get along with others, teamwork, ability to lose gracefully, are also an integral part of learning to live in our society. It is doubtful that anyone can ever be the corporate president, millionaire, or our nation's president (remember U-M's foothall All-American Gerald R. Ford) without being exposed to this type of education whether through athletics or some other

So while sports perhaps isn't the ultimate answer, JAW, I stand behind my oninion that it is important enough to warrant closer scrutiny before writing it off in order to solve the mistakes of the School Board and the school system's financial planners.

Perhaps, you are correct JAW. Being a president, millionaire, etc. would be better than being a state champion. My question to you is, why can't the students at Manchester High School be both?

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

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

Tab Deadline - The deadline for order ing 1960 Michigan license plate tabs by mail has now passed. Tabs must be on by March 31; if you haven't yet got yours, stop by a Secretary of State office soon to avoid the end-of-the-month rush.

Census Time - Every household will soon be receiving a questionnaire from the U.S. Census Bureau. It is vital that these by filled out fully and promptly, so that an accurate census can be taken: federal & state grants are based on population. Older Workers - Governor Milliken has

designated this as "Employ the Older Worker Week," to emphasize the job potential of those citizens over 45 who are working or seeking work: their experience and dedication are valuable job resources. Guilty, III - The Michigan Supreme Court has reversed a lower-court decision and has declared constitutional our landmark law providing for a verdict of "guilty, but mentally ill." This law allows a middle ground between "guilty" and "not guilty by reason of insanity." The law requires that psychiatric treatment be provided for those given this verdict.

Welfare Reform - The House has approved HB 5199, which could save up to \$1.5 million a year by reducing to one month from six months the amount of time welfare recipients could receive assistance from the state after they move out of Michigan. During that month, recipients would be able to seek work or

Insurance Changes - A new law now in effect requires auto insurance companies to offer drivers several options for collision insurance, with a broadened provision paying for damages to the driver's car even if the driver is 50 percent at fault. After July 1 of this year, you may sue to recover a deductible amount if the other driver is 50 percent at fault.

Gym Clothes - The Attorney General has ruled that public schools need not furnish students with gym clothes and shoes for phys-ed classes unless the school requires students to wear or use a specific type of clothing or equipment: then it must be provided at no charge. 

#### Dependents' Tax Regulations Vary

Separated and divorced parents are subject to certain tax regulations when claiming children as dependents, the Internal Revenue Service

Since each child can be claimed by only one parent, generally the parent with custody of the child for the greater part of the year is entitled to the dependency deduction.

But there are two exceptions to the rule based upon terms of the divorce decree or other agreement and the amount contributed to the child's support by the parent without custody. Divorced or separated parents should check the details of these exceptions in their tax

instructions before either parent claims the children as dependents. Additional information is available free in IRS Publication 501, "Exemptions," and IRS Publication 504, "Tax Information for Divorced or Separated Individuals," by filling out the order blank in the tax package, or from local







When President Carter announced early last month that 13 million tons of corn and four million tons of wheat would not be going to the Soviet Union, there was great concern about what the market would do. For a couple of days, the markets closed, and when they opened, prices fell the limit in the futures markets. However, the markets didn't collapse after


