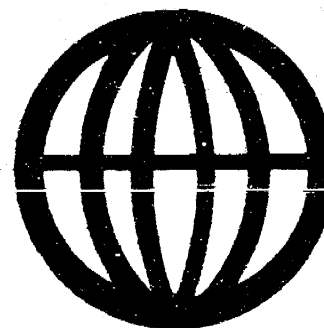

Child Psychologist To Speak To Mats

Dr. David Klimek, whose specialty is the psychology of children, adolescents, young adults, and families, will address the Manchester Association for Talented Students on April 2 (not April 3 as previously scheduled). The meeting will begin at 8:00 p.m. in the High School Library.

Tax Exemptions For Age, Blindness

An exemption is a set amount which is deducted from your gross income in figuring taxable income, the IRS explains.

The regular exemption is \$1,000 and is allowed for the taxpayer, his or her spouse, and his or her dependents. For taxpayers who use the Tax Tables, this exemption allowance is computed into the tables.

In addition, there are exemptions for age and blindness. The age and blindness exemptions may be claimed only for the taxpayer and his or her spouse, not for a dependent.

A citizen or resident of the United States who is 65 or older by the end of the year is allowed an additional exemption of \$1,000. Taxpayers are considered 65 on the day before their 65th birthday.

Citizens or residents of the United States are allowed an additional exemption of \$1,000 for blindness if they are blind at the close of the tax year. Persons losing their sight late in the year are entitled to the exemption for the entire year.

A person is considered blind, for tax purposes, if the central visual acuity does not exceed 20/200 in the better eye with corrective lenses or the field of view is no greater than 20 degrees.

Taxpayers who desire additional information on the subject of exemptions should use the mail-order form in their tax packages to request the free IRS Publication 501, "Exemptions." The publication is also available at local IRS offices.

Low-Income Workers Must File For Tax Refunds

Certain workers, often students, retirees, homemakers and other part-time workers, who had low incomes last year and Federal tax withheld from their salaries may be eligible for tax refunds. However, these workers must file a Federal tax return in order to get their refunds, according to the Internal Revenue Service.

Often taxpayers do not file because their low earnings fail to reach the level at which the law requires them to file a return. In general, the income requirements for filing are:

— Single taxpayers who made less than \$3,300 in 1979 are not required to file a Federal tax return.

— Singles 65 and older who earned less than \$4,300 don't have to file.

— Married couples under 65 years of age filing a joint return must have earned a combined gross income of \$5,400 before they must file.

— Married couples where one spouse is 65 or older and filing a joint return must file if they earned \$6,400. They must file a return if both are 65 or older and they made at least \$7,400 last year, and they are filing a joint return.

Part-time workers can determine whether they have a refund coming by checking their Form W-2, Wage and Tax Statement. If Federal income taxes were withheld, they must file a return to claim a refund.

Taxpayers who had no liability for income tax in 1979 and do not expect to have any tax liability for 1980 qualify for exemption from withholding of Federal tax from their salaries. These taxpayers should file a copy of Form W-4, Employee's Withholding Allowance Certificate, with their employers.

What you can do about TORNADOS

BEFORE

- Know how to get emergency weather information in your community and know what it means.
- A National Weather Service "tornado watch" means conditions are right for tornadoes to form.
- A "tornado warning" means a tornado has been sighted; take cover.
- Most communities use sirens or horns to warn of a tornado sighting; know what your system is and what it means.
- Plan and practice what your family will do in case of a tornado.
- Have a prearranged place in your home (basement if you have one or in interior room or under stairway if you don't) to go for shelter.
- If you're in a mobile home, get out. If a shelter is available, go to it. If not, lie in a ditch or other depression.
- If you're in a car, get out. Lie in a ditch or other low area.
- Be sure you have the right kind of insurance and enough of it to cover all damage a tornado could do.
- Make an inventory of everything in your house and keep it in a safe place away from home (like a safe deposit box). It will be a great help in speeding payment for your losses.

AFTER

- Cooperate fully with law enforcement and disaster service officials. Check you local news media for instructions and information on emergency services available.
- Notify your insurance agent of your loss as soon as possible. He can advise you what to do next.
- Stay away from your property to guard against vandalism or looting until law enforcement agencies organize protection.
- Protect against additional damage: board up broken windows or holes in the walls or roof; cover or otherwise protect furnishings from further damage by rain or wind. If necessary, have utilities turned off to prevent damage from explosion or fire.
- Don't be rushed into signing repair contracts. Fly-by-night repairmen often prey on tornado victims. Be sure you know with whom you're dealing. Your insurance agent or adjuster should be able to help, or ask your Better Business Bureau or friends or relatives to recommend someone.
- Keep receipts for all repairs and additional living expenses. Most homeowners insurance contracts will reimburse these costs; casualty losses exceeding \$100 that aren't reimbursed are generally tax deductible.

Tornadoes can strike almost anywhere in the United States. They can occur any time of year but March through August are the danger months. Between 1974 and 1978 there were 4,338 tornadoes recorded in 48 different states. 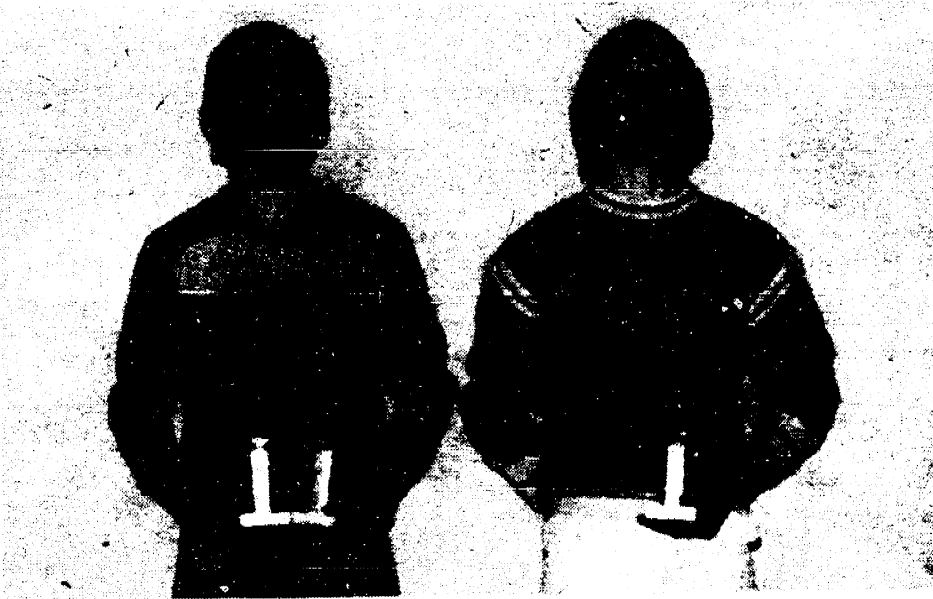

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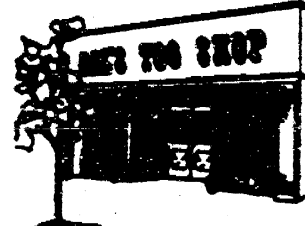

March 3, 1980

Minutes of the February 18, 1980 meeting were read and approved in a motion by Hinkley, supported by Petsch. All yeas, motion carried.

Mrs. Candance Sloat, Mary Smith, Village Treasurer and Richard Kuntz, Accountant were present and reviewed the water bill for 606 Parr Rd. Apt. 2. Mrs. Sloat's bill is paid in full. Moved by Hinkley supported by DuRussel that Petsch send a letter to Mr. David Little and meet with him notifying him of action and of the \$50.44 and \$70.70 still in arrears. All yeas, motion carried.

Mrs. Bernice Shadley was present to question the bill on one of her renters at 316 Morgan St. Mrs. Shadley was advised to contact Gerald Mann and try and settle the problem with him.

Mr. John Holland and Mr. Ray Smit of McNamee, Porter and Seeley, Consulting Engineers were present to review the EPA Construction Grants Program for sewers for Village of Manchester which included Step 2 Grant Program and Step 3 Funding for Construction. The Step 2 Program tentative Certification date for DNR is June, 1980 and EPA in September, 1980.

Koebbe and Daniels reported on the requirements for hiring a full time CETA employee. The rules and regulations have

changed this past year. Moved by Koebbe, supported by Minick the Village Attorney contact the CETA office for clarification on requirements and pay scale. All yeas, motion carried.

Public Works activities as reported by Koebbe included: February 22, 1980, Mr. Mark Chapin reported a sewer stoppage on Riverside Dr. between Riverside Dr. and Furnace St. This is one of the sewers that the Department has a problem with. The stoppage is usually in the same place every time we work on it - deep in the manhole. Mr. Chapin feels that it should be dug up and checked. I think it would require the use of a sewer box and a large unit to handle this type of problem; Worked on the past-due water billings. Sent out shut-off notice letters as instructed to do; Patched asphalt streets, then hauled in two more loads of asphalt and stock piled them; Worked on the chains in the primary tank so this unit can be placed back in service before a run-off comes. We lubed all of the bearings and now have this tank in service. Down time was two days; Stopped at Mr. Datsko's office twice concerning Mrs. Day's overdue water payments as Mr. Petsch requested me to. As of yet, we do not have anything in writing from them. Petsch to contact Datsko; Checked with Gambles and Ace Hardware concerning buying a new mower. Their models run about \$180.00 per mower. They do not have the Toro mowers which the Village has had in previous years and had good luck with. The price of a Toro mower will be \$189.95

for a 19 inch mower and \$199.95 for a 21 inch mower. Lawnboy mowers will cost about \$250.00; Called Robinson Asphalt Co. and talked with Mr. Gary Gooding concerning the asphalt that they laid for us last year and the holes that have appeared in it. They checked the streets and told me that they would fix it. They had no idea why the holes appeared; Next week we will be looking for curb stops for the water services which will be turned off. McNamee, Porter and Seeley to be contacted to check on sewer between Riverside Dr. and Furnace St.

Chief Zsenyuk presented the Police Report for the month of February, 1980.

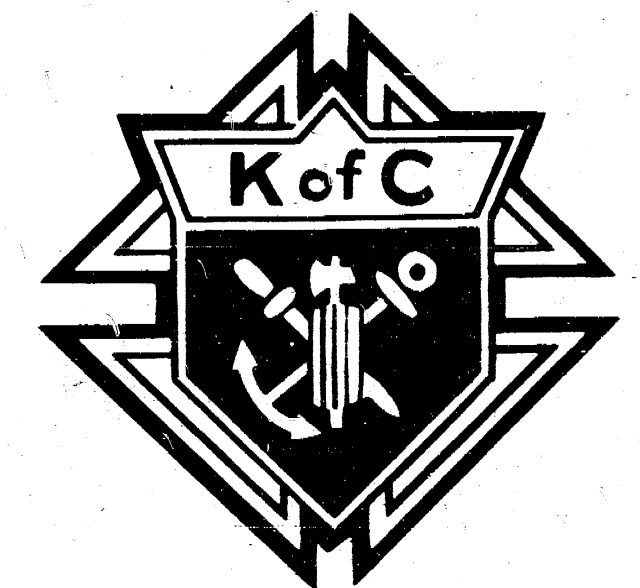

Washtenaw County Benefit From Truck Taxes

Washtenaw County benefited from a total of \$1,925,317 paid in truck taxes during the fiscal year ending Sept. 30, 1979; according to the Michigan Trucking Association.

The truck portion of the money to counties state-wide represents 35.9 percent of the total amount of special state highway users taxes. While trucks pay 35.9 percent of the taxes, they represent just 14.9 percent of all motor vehicles registered.

In Michigan, all communities are served by truck and 1,001 of Michigan's 1,659 populated communities are served by truck only. Included are eight county seats with four entire counties having no other method of transporting property.

Those four counties are Gladwin, Keveonaw, Montmorency and Oscoda. The eight county seats served solely by trucks are Atlanta, Crystal Falls, Eagle River, Gladwin, Harrison, Leland, Mio and Lake City.

These counties and communities are guaranteed service through the regulation of the trucking industry. Such service is guaranteed through the federal and state regulatory systems throughout the nation to insure that all communities, large and

small, can depend on regular truck shipping service. Without that regulatory system, truck service to small communities on unprofitable routes would not be mandatory and could well be lost.

FOOD AS A WEAPON

Farmers will never know how much the Soviet grain embargo cost them. There is no way of telling where the price of wheat, corn and soybeans would be without the embargo.

Traditionally, the prices for grain and feed crops rally in the spring. This year, the grain embargo seems to have prevented any spring rally. It's interesting to note, too, that prices for commodities such as cotton and sugar, for which there still is a free export market, have soared.

Dr. Ray Goldberg, Professor of Agriculture and Business at Harvard University's Graduate School of Business, says the grain embargo added one customer to the review of world commodities and that is the United States government. The government has replaced the Soviet Union as a purchaser of grain.

This is an unfortunate way to start the decade of the 80's. A farmer back in the 70's and 60's had to know how to get the most out of government programs and improve the yield of his crop. In the 70's, export markets grew and farmers had to become sophisticated in their marketing to handle the broad price swings.

Now we begin the 80's with the closing of a major export market. The best we can hope for is that farmers were volunteered for a short-term retaliatory measure.

If food is continually to be used as a weapon because we have no better weapons, then it's not going to be just the farmer who is in trouble.

Family Service Annual Report

At the annual meeting of Manchester Family Service, Inc. the following statistics were reported: 76 families were assisted this year, including 190 individuals with 89 of them children; 6868 miles were driven by 14 volunteer men and women drivers; 65 pieces of furniture were relocated in 31 low income homes; over 3000 pieces of clothing and 300 household items were available to families on assistance or in need; 4 families were given emergency food orders; 1 home-aide was found for one family and 3 others were referred to county agencies better equipped to handle this problem for families of every income level; 4 families were referred to the House-by-the-Side-of-the-Road (the county clothing distribution agency) and dozens of families from all walks of life were assisted with information regarding agencies, organizations or what to do in specific situations or emergencies.

Volunteer drivers are always needed and the gasoline situation is not helping. Car-pooling and a surge in help from Out-County Dial-a-Ride is helping (for Dial-a-Ride phone 971-4114 three days to a week before needing transportation in the county). Emergency drives are something else and are always given priority.

Usable clothing which is given to the agency is distributed at "Shops" 3 times a year to area families on assistance or in need.

Furniture can be relocated usually in a very short time, if families who have items and families who are in need of things will contact the chairman of the agency. Manchester Family Service has no storage space for this sort of thing and

has to manipulate the trade between the two families from lists compiled by the phone calls.

This local agency also conducts the Christmas Project for the Department of Social Services, Salvation Army and Washtenaw County Health Department. Special notice is also maintained for Easter and Thanksgiving.

Approximately seventy-five local, state, county and federal contacts were used by the Service in the past year. Financial aid came from the United Way of Manchester, the Salvation Army, Bethel United Church of Christ Fellowship groups, Sharon Methodist Starlight Circle, United Methodist Women, Knights of Columbus, St. Mary's Catholic Church, the Huron Valley Night Hawks and many individuals.

Nine volunteer board members make up the "staff" which is assisted in many projects by volunteer groups, Beta Sigma Phi, Jaycees Auxiliary, Knights of Columbus and all of the churches in the area and many individuals. 

HIT OR MISS by farley

The following letter to the editor appeared in the Toledo Blade of March 16 and I think it will bear reprinting although I wish to insist that I do not necessarily mean to infer that the Manchester schools are as lacking in achievements as those this writer infers are present in the Toledo schools, but one must admit that the deficiencies that she enumerates are present to a greater or lesser extent in all of our present day schools.

The letter was written by Elizabeth Papps, a teacher of English in a Toledo high school. She says: In a recent editorial the question was asked "Can Johnny Catch Up?" in which was echoed the concern of the nation as it faces the fact that our public schools are not preparing our youth to be a member of the work force or for college. As a teacher I am profoundly worried because every year I see a deepening decline.

Twenty years ago in the core curriculum of Toledo schools the novel Ivanhoe was considered easy reading for freshmen and A Tale of Two Cities was easily read by sophomores. Today the seniors find these titles difficult or impossible to read. Why?

Verious explanations blame the students and social changes, television, and federal and state directives. In my opinion based on experience and recent serious studies of public schools the above list is not to blame for the major part of the responsibilities.

The responsibility rests with the leadership of the administration; with the leaders who set the tone, hire the teachers, establish the curriculum and standards. They are not qualified in the academic areas. They are products of various colleges of education and these colleges are no-content colleges with the lowest standards and minimum academic requirements.

The administrators who formulate the curriculum are not experts in a subject field. Their graduate work is devoid of scholarship in an academic field. They avoid visiting high school classes; they do not conduct in-service meetings that add depth to the teacher's knowledge of the subject area; they do not offer demonstration instruction for teachers; they do not evaluate teachers; they do not actively involve themselves in decisions concerning the choice of material to be taught nor how it is to be taught. Since they are not experts in any subject they call themselves "generalists"-a safe term which absolves them of any knowledge or responsibility.

Curriculum is usually written in the summer by any teacher who is willing to work and get paid. The results are either imposed upon the schools without discussion, evaluation, follow-up or revision and are seldom seen by the classroom teacher, or if seen are disregarded because they are unteachable. Two years ago, new composition books were purchased and they joined four other sets of composition books that are on the shelves from other years.

It is an appalling situation. Can Johnny catch up? Textbooks are purchased by the curriculum department for the senior high schools only if they are written on a below high school reading level.

The sad fact is that the declining academic achievements of the students Continued on p. 5

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
