Some 4,000 University of Michigan students were recognized at the University's annual Honors Convocation March 26.

Students from the Manchester area that were honored are: Susan John, 10300 Sharon Hollow Rd., College of Literature, Science, and the Arts, Class Honor; Rebecca Stucki, 13545 Austin, College of Literature, Science, and the Arts, with Class Honor and Gary Voegeding, 14355 Bethel Church Rd., a Class Honor in Engineering.

David V. Ragoone, dean of the U-M College of Engineering and president-designate of Case Western Reserve University, was the featured speaker. A reception and tea was held for honor students and their families.

A total of 4,969 awards were recognized at the convocation.

Of the total, 4,114 were Class Honors, recognizing an undergraduate academic record equal to at least half A's and half B's for two terms (one term for new students) during 1979.

In addition, 550 students were named James B. Angell Scholars. They have maintained an all-A record for two or more consecutive terms as undergraduates.

The problem of the cost of fuel and lights. The Stamp program wasn't meant to be used this way, of course, but it doesn't have to remain so unfair does it?
And then, on another front, there is the chap who with his wife, was living, with both of them in their seventies, on their Social Security checks. He received his allowance and she a separate check for half of his. Maybe this is not quite fair but they got by very nicely until she became seriously ill and was confined to the hospital for a couple of months.
Medicare and Medicaid is true, paid most of her expenses there, but there were many incidentals. For instance he had to drive a considerable distance each day to visit her or depend on the charity of friends and neighbors.
However, he succeeded quite well until she passed away when, of course, there were other expenses to be taken care of concerning a funeral, etc. These he managed to meet. He went to the post office on the third of the month following her death—she had passed away on the 28th of the preceding month—and found that her check for all that month had been returned by the post office—as they had been ordered to do—to the issuing office, to be cancelled. She was not entitled to anything for the month in which she was unfortunate enough to die though she had survived for twenty-eight days of that month. The amount involved was not great but it would have helped her husband pay some of the extra expenses that he found necessary at this time, but he was informed that he had nothing coming for that month.

Veterans Administration regional office acting director Gordon Clowney has announced a new program to help veteran home-buyers finance the installation of energy-saving home improvements.

Clowney said that under the plan, the cost of such items as solar heating and cooling systems and insulation and storm windows can be added to the loan amount when installed in conjunction with the purchase of an existing home.

Improvements can be financed for up to 30 years without any cash outlay and usually can be made after the VA has approved a loan without further government involvement.

Interested eligible veterans can discuss the program with loan guaranty specialists at the regional office at the McNamara Federal Building, Detroit, or with their lenders.

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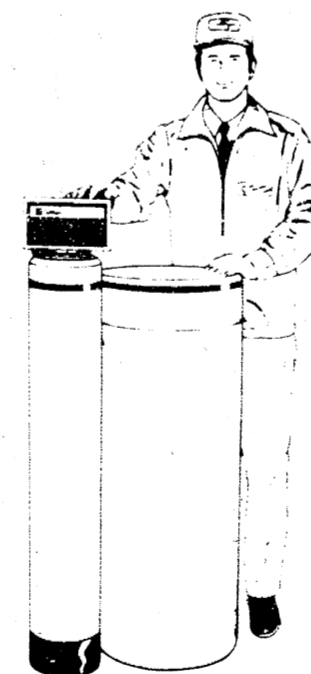

Rabies Is Still With Us

The rabies problem in the United States is measured not so much by the number of human deaths as by the number of persons who require treatment - more than 30,000 persons each year are bitten by suspected rabid animals and are required to take treatment.

The Communicable Disease Center in Atlanta, Georgia, reports in 1979 we had the greatest number of human rabies cases since 1950. Most cases were transmitted to humans as a result of bites from dogs, cats or bats.

Of the dog bites reported, 75% were dogs who had owners. 50% of these dogs had not had a current rabies vaccination and this sometimes required their victims to undergo painful antibiotics treatments if the animal could not be caught and confined for a 10 day quarantine period. In addition, the majority of the bite victims were small children. In Chelsea alone, the police department estimated that there were at least 30 dog bites reported last year.

The Washtenaw Academy of Veterinary Medicine urges you to protect your children and pets by having your pets properly vaccinated. State law requires all dogs to be vaccinated against rabies. Ann Arbor City Law also requires rabies vaccinations for cats, and legislation has been suggested to require this statewide.

Residents of the City of Ann Arbor, City of Ypsilanti, and Township of Ypsilanti must show proof of rabies vaccination to their local City Clerk to obtain their licenses. In the rest of the county, licenses must be obtained from the County Treasurer and are considered delinquent after March 1.

One new aspect that is being tried by some veterinarians nationwide is the use of coded rabies tags. Under this plan, different colored and shaped tags would be issued each year, and this would enable quick identification of the vaccination status of an animal wearing these tags, without getting close enough to read the year imprinted on the tag. For example, for 1980 the coded tags are red hearts. The duration of the rabies vaccine depends on the type of vaccine and the species. Most vaccines for cats are 12 months, but some canine vaccines are good up to 36 months.

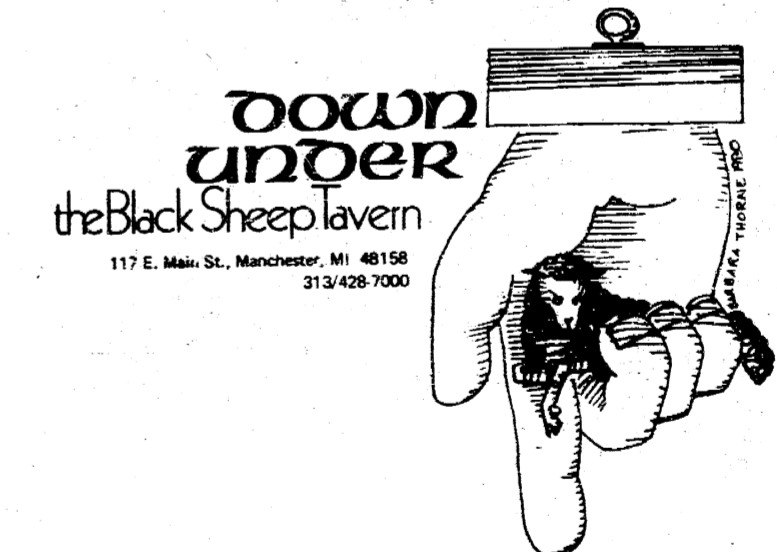
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WHAT KEEPS A FARMER FARMING?
