### HIT OR MISS by farley

The following letter to the editor appeared in the Toledo Blade of March 16 and I think it will bear reprinting although I wish to insist that I do not necessarily mean to infer that the Manchester schools are as lacking in achievements as those this writer infers are present in the Toledo schools, but one must admit that the deficiencies that she enumerates are present to a greater or lesser extent in all of our present day schools.

The letter was written by Elizabeth Papps, a teacher of English in a Toledo high school. She says:

In a recent editorial the question was asked "Can Johnny Catch Up?" in which was echoed the concern of the nation as it faces the fact that our public schools are not preparing our youth to be a member of the work force or for college. As a teacher I am profoundly worried because every year I see a deepening decline.

Twenty years ago in the core curriculum of Toledo schools the novel Ivanhoe was considered easy reading for freshmen and A Tale of Two Cities was easily read by sophomores. Today the seniors find these titles difficult or impossible to read. Why?

Verious explanations blame the students and social changes, television, and federal and state directives. In my opinion based on experience and recent serious studies of public schools the above list is not to blame for the major part of the responsibilities.

The responsibility rests with the leadership of the administration; with the leaders who set the tone, hire the teachers, establish the curriculum and standards. They are not qualified in the academic areas. They are products of various colleges of education and these colleges are no-content colleges with the lowest standards and minimum academic requirements.

The administrators who formulate the curriculum are not experts in a subject field. Their graduate work is devoid of scholarship in an academic field. They avoid visiting high school classes; they do not conduct in-service meetings that add depth to the teacher's knowledge of the subject area; they do not offer demonstration instruction for teachers; they do not evaluate teachers; they do not actively involve themselves in decisions concerning the choice of material to be taught nor how it is to be taught. Since they are not experts in any subject they call themselves "generalists"-a safe term which absolves them of any knowledge or responsibility.

Curriculum is usually written in the summer by any teacher who is willing to work and get paid. The results are either imposed upon the schools without discussion, evaluation, follow-up or revision and are seldom seen by the classroom teacher, or if seen are disregarded because they are unteachable. Two years ago, new composition books were purchased and they joined four other sets of composition books that are on the shelves from other years.

It is an appalling situation. Can Johnny catch up? Textbooks are purchased by the curriculum department for the senior high schools only if they are written on a below high school reading level.

The sad fact is that the declining academic achievements of the students

### Manchester Village Planning Commission

March 4, 1980

The regular meeting of the Manchester Village Planning Commission was held at the Village Hall with members present: Hinkley, Leeson, Wellwood, Bond, Daniels, Grossman, Tracy, and Smith. Council President Jeff Schaffer attended.

The meeting was called to order at 7:30 p.m., by Ch. Hinkley.

Minutes of the meeting of February 2 were read, and on motion by Grossman, seconded by Wellwood were unanimously accepted.

As a community service project, the Emanuel Church is interested in sponsoring a senior citizen housing project. Messrs Emory Garlick, Mike Briggs, and Jim England explained in general terms what they are considering, and showed slides of an existing facility to demonstrate several types of layouts having few or many units similar to apartments, including some designed for physically handicapped persons. It is the consensus of the Planning Commission that this

project should be given favorable consideration and cooperation.

Mr. David Little was in attendance to request consideration regarding prospective creation of two apartments above his store (The Clothes Line) at 134 East Main St. He presented drawings of room layouts and access. It was moved by Tracy that we recommend to Council that a conditional use permit be granted to Mr. Little for the apartments. The motion was seconded by Wellwood, and unanimously approved.

The question of site or sites for industrial development has been under consideration. It is felt that provision of an "Industrial Park" concept is needed and long overdue. Various suggestions were made and discussed, and for immediate follow-up Chairman Hinkley named Member Wellwood to attend Council meeting on March 17 to explain our thinking and receive their input.

It was moved by Daniels that the Council be asked to consider increasing pay for Planning Commission members to ten dollars per meeting attended.

It was also included in the motion to request that Council provide a budgeted allotment, in addition to member's pay, for procuring materials and publications for Commission needs. The motion was seconded by Smith, with roll call vote: Leeson yes, Wellwood yes, Bond yes, Daniels yes, Grossman yes, Tracy yes, Smith yes. The motion passed.

The membership terms of Harry Krauss, Clifford Tracy, and Clyde Well-

wood being expired this month, it was moved by Daniels, seconded by Smith, that Council reappoint each for new three year terms, expiring March, 1983. Passed unanimously.

Meeting was declared adjourned at 9:30 p.m.

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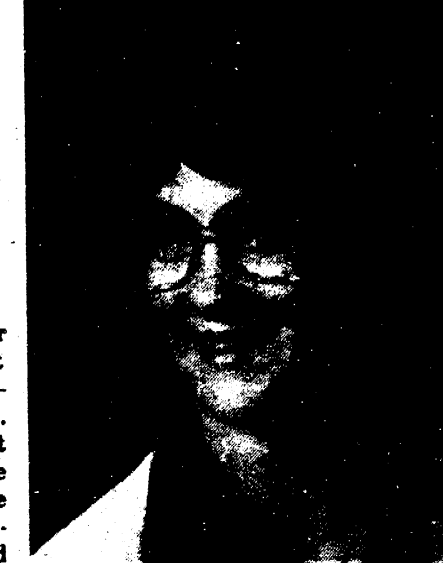

Dear Stockholder: March 28, 1980

We would like to take this opportunity to bring you up to date on developments effecting the Bank's dividend policy and the current status of the proposed merger with The Citizens Bank of Saline.

As I am sure you are aware, the current economic climate with rapidly increasing interest rates makes it extremely difficult to obtain normal profit margins. As I dictate this letter, it is with the knowledge that our current money market rate is 15.7 percent, that this very afternoon First National City Bank of New York raised its prime rate to 19 1/2 percent, and the Fed. Funds market (borrowings between banks) was 19 7/8 percent at 2:00 o'clock. If, in fact, all of our loan dollars were currently earning these high rates, the margin would be sufficient to obtain normal profits. However, with most of our loans at lower rates, that needed margin does not exist.

With this earnings picture, the Board does not feel justified in declaring a dividend for the first quarter of 1980. It is of little comfort, but you should be aware that the banking industry in general is suffering similar results. Rest assured we will do everything possible at Union Savings Bank to obtain maximum profits during this period and to regain normal profitability as soon as possible.

The Board of Directors of the Union Savings Bank along with the Board of Directors of The Citizens Bank has agreed to further pursue merger possibilities. We will continue to keep you informed as progress unfolds. Should you have any questions, please feel free to contact me.

The next Historical meeting will be held Monday, April 28th at the Emanuel Church Hall.

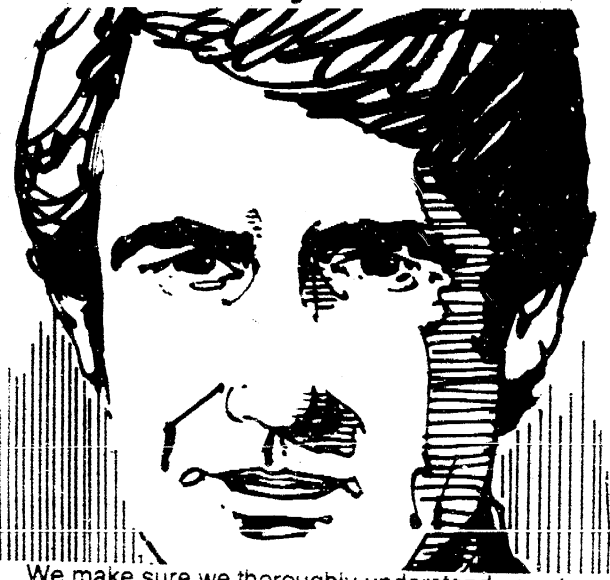

reflects the academic standards of educational leadership.

The ultimate responsibility rests on the shoulders of the elected members of the Board of Education who are elected to represent the interests of the community and they are the ones who must approve the appointment of all personnel. Unfortunately they hire without questioning the administrative choices. They do not demand to see credentials nor qualifica-

tions. They become a rubber stamp. They are overwhelmed by the meaningless educational jargon that the college of education has created, and in this the administrators are experts.

These members should remember that the master's degrees and doctorates from the colleges of education gave us the theories that have brought the public education to its knees. They insisted on new math, reading without phonics, permissive use of language, acceptance of subliterary reading and writing, the open classroom, the abolishment of grades, and social studies instead of history and

geography, rap sessions, all-elective programs, the fiasco of programs for the gifted; and all this at the expense of tax dollars followed by the casual admission that all the above theories were failures.

Today's popular catch phrases include "Back to basics", "Core Curriculum", "needs assessment", and "magnet schools". What do they mean? Nothing has changed or will change except the phrases. Our high school students can not read with understanding (even on a below high school level) They can not add nor subtract.

In answer to the original question Johnny can never catch up unless the educational leadership catches up, an improvement in academics could be achieved immediately if the leaders knew what to do.

It is therefore imperative that the elected school board demand scholarships as the first requirement before hiring school curriculum administrators. Unless this is done I see a continuing decline and I don't believe that public education can survive another twenty years of administrative incompetence.

I urge parents, teachers and students to take an active and vocal role in order to affect this change.

Reed reported he had attended a meeting of the Manchester Village Association and commented on the excellent presentation made by Chief Zsenyuk.

Reed was appointed Chairman of the 1980 Census for the Village of Manchester.

Hinkley requested reappointment of members of the Manchester Village Planning Commission. The next meeting will be held April 1, 1980. Moved by Petsch, supported by Reed to amend the resolution concerning Planning Commission Compensation to read as follows: The chairman of the Village of Manchester Planning Commission shall receive the sum of \$12.50 for each regular meeting of the Village Planning Commission attended by him during his term of office. The Planning Commission members of the Village Planning Commission shall receive the sum of \$10.00 each for each regular meeting of the Village Planning Commission by them during their term of office. ## State Offices Expand Hours

Secretary of State Richard H. Austin today announced expansion of Saturday service to 42 statewide branch offices beginning April 14th.

The 42 selected offices will be open Tuesdays through Saturdays. The remainder of the 200 statewide branch offices will continue to be open from 8:30 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. Monday through Friday. The combination of schedules will provide Saturday service without increasing either the number of employees or total hours worked.

Expansion of Saturday service means that most individuals wishing to renew a license, purchase plates, register to vote or otherwise transact business on any day of the week except Sunday, can now find a local office open within a reasonable distance, Austin said.

Previously, all branch offices were open Monday through Friday. To accommodate those individuals who could not transact business weekdays, however, Austin said that in 1978 Saturday service on a limited experimental basis was inaugurated at 12 branch offices.

The public response, clearly demonstrating the need for Saturday service, led to this major rescheduling of hours, Austin said.

### Census '80

Returning 1980 census questionnaires are flooding the mail boxes of the Census Bureau's district offices, according to district manager, Michael Beria.  
The "mail-back" method, historically a relatively new census-taking technique, will save taxpayers at least \$180 million if all households that were asked to do so return properly completed questionnaires by mail.  
Census takers will have to go out looking for any questionnaires that do not come back within a reasonable time. Those who forgot to drop their filled-out

questionnaires in the mail on Tuesday can still save tax money -- and the time they will otherwise have to spend when the census taker calls -- by mailing them now.

Another time and money saver is to make sure all questions that apply to the household members and to the house have been answered. Referring to the yellow instruction guide enclosed with the questionnaire will be helpful, but if you're still puzzled, call the census assistance telephone number which is printed on the address label of your questionnaire. Operators are standing by to help you.

"Each of us has a substantial stake in making the population count complete," the manager said. "There have been significant changes in this area since the last nationwide population count in 1970, and this is our chance to bring the record up to date. It is vitally important for several reasons."

"First, census results determine our representation in government at all levels. From the U.S. House of Representatives, State, county, and city governments right down to the local school board, seats in elected governing bodies are apportioned according to census population figures."

"In dollars and cents, a complete count is important, too. Census figures count heavily in the allotment of money for a great many local government programs. The census results influence the distribution of some \$50 billion a year in Federal revenue sharing programs in which Federal funds are provided directly to local and State governments for their use."

There is no good reason for any of us to

leave ourselves out of the census, the manager stressed. Answers provided to the Census Bureau cannot be used to embarrass or harm any individual, family or household in any way at all. No other government agency, no organization public or private, and no other individual can find out what is on a particular 1980 questionnaire.

"Everybody in the United States has the right to count," the manager added, "but to count, you must be counted."

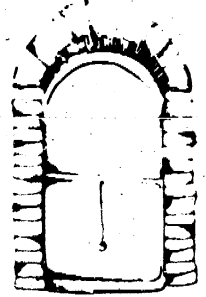

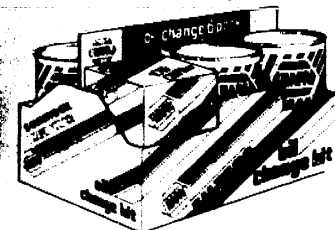

Monies raised from the event will be divided among National Kidney Foundation affiliates in eleven states. The funds will be used for education, research and direct patient care programs.

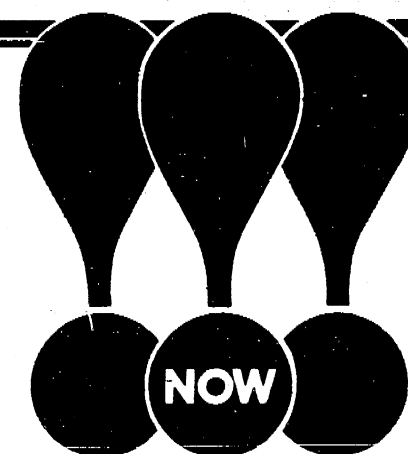

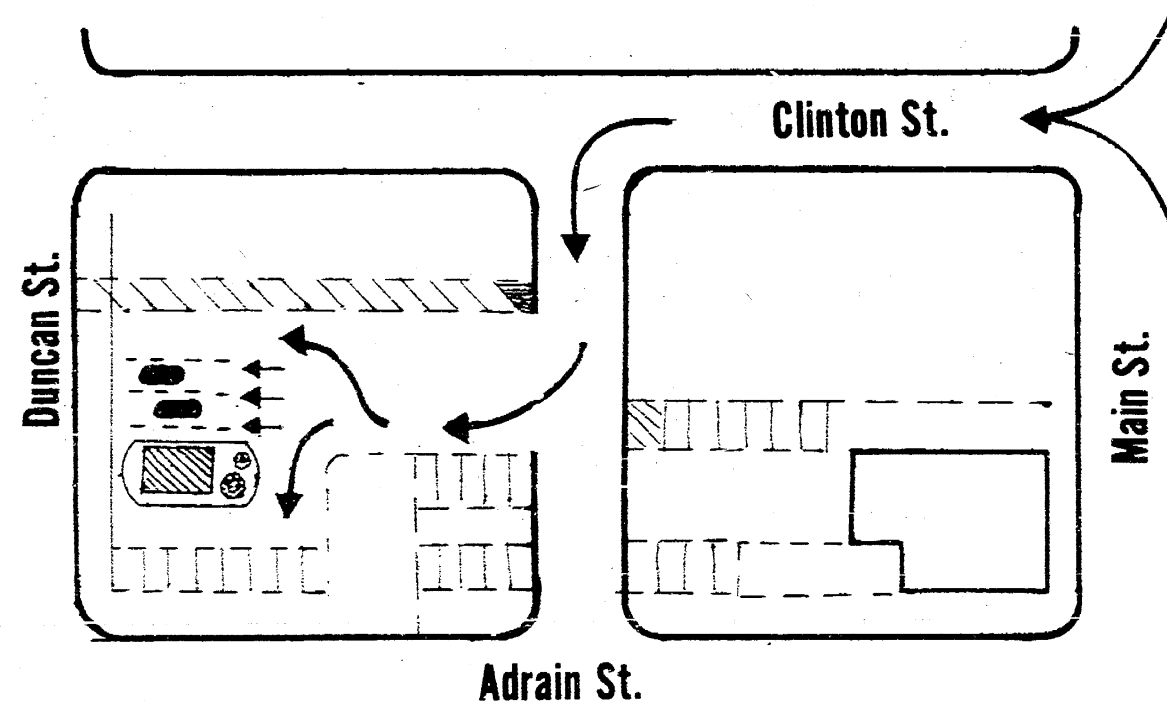

### Artrain Comes To Tecumseh

April in Paris may be nice, but April in Tecumseh will be FREE when the Michigan Artrain visits April 16-21.

You don't have to fly to Europe to see the masters at the Louvre museum when you can get acquainted with works of such masters as Picasso, Matisse and Chagall on the Michigan Artrain right in Tecumseh.

### Mechanic Certification Tests

All Michigan motor vehicle mechanics who want to take June 1980 state certification tests must apply by April 30, Secretary of State Richard H. Austin announced today.

According to Austin, Michigan's Motor Vehicle Service and Repair Act now requires every repair garage to employ at least one state-certified mechanic in the categories of major repair offered by the garage. Effective January 1, 1981, however, the certification requirement applies to all mechanics doing major repair work.

"These June tests," Austin said, "are an opportunity for mechanics to take the first step toward getting certified."

Mechanics wishing to take the exams may obtain applications from the Michigan Department of State, Bureau of Automotive Regulation, Lansing, Mich. 48918. Applications are also available at all Department of State branch offices throughout Michigan and at most Michigan Employment Security Commission offices. ### HIDDEN TAXES IN BREAD ALONE

How many taxes are on a loaf of bread? An astounding number of 151 taxes. The Tax Foundation, a private research organization. This clearly illustrates the problem of overtaxation. You see, you pay hidden taxes on every product you buy, thus greatly adding to the cost of the item.

The Tax Foundation started with a loaf of bread made and sold in Indianapolis. It counted the federal and state taxes paid by the grocer, the baker, the companies making ingredients used in the bread, and the railroads that hauled the ingredients. Here is what the study showed:

The grocer paid four federal taxes - individual income tax, telephone tax, tax on transportation of property, and a tax on his safety deposit box. The baker, a national company owning its own trucks, paid eight federal taxes - corporation income tax, stamp taxes on its security transfers, the telephone tax, the telegram tax, transportation tax for its product, the safe deposit tax, and the social security tax.

The grocer and the baker also paid 15 state taxes, with the bakery paying most of them because it was a corporation and

because of the gasoline and motor vehicle taxes on its trucks. Included in the state taxes paid by the baker were four corporation taxes paid in Delaware where the company is chartered. Both grocer and baker paid an Indiana gross income tax. That's not all. A Kansas City flour mill which supplied the baker paid seven federal taxes and eight Missouri state taxes. And the railroad that brought the flour to Indianapolis paid five taxes to Uncle Sam and an assortment of taxes to Missouri, Illinois and Indiana - the states crossed on the delivery.

Next, the sugar that went into the bread came from a large new Orleans refining company that paid eight federal taxes and six Louisiana taxes. There were taxes paid by the railroad that hauled the sugar to Indianapolis, the sale warehouse in Chicago from which the same came, the malt company in Chicago, the shortening manufacturer in Cincinnati, the milk solids company, and the yeast factory, both in Chicago, and the railroads that carried these ingredients.

Is there any wonder why people complain about high costs? Is there any wonder why people clamor for amendments to the U.S. Constitution to limit federal spending and balance the federal budget?

### News of Good Things Growing

With warm breezes gently filling many of our days, thoughts turn to getting outdoors for fresh air and warm sunshine. Good things growing in Michigan include MANY foods ideal for spring picnic planning.

Plan an "all-Michigan" picnic centered around your favorite recipe of potato salad coupled with a ham loaf made with Easter Sunday's leftovers.

Combine four cups ground cooked ham with one small onion, finely chopped. Soak two cups seasoned breadcrumbs in one-half cup hot water, mix with ham mixture and two eggs slightly beaten. Line an 8 x 3-inch loaf pan with foil and sprinkle with one-quarter cup brown sugar and one-quarter teaspoon ground cloves. Place four canned peach halves on the sugar. Press meat mixture into the pan and bake one hour at 350 degrees. Turn out on a heated platter and carefully peel off the foil.

If you want to add a vegetable to the menu, it's a little early for fresh Michigan corn-on-the-cob, but corn pudding or escalloped corn, as some people prefer, is delicious.

Add some tasty cole slaw made with Michigan cabbage, carrots and onions to the menu and baked apples for dessert. Rome Beauty, "queen of the baking apples," and Northern Spy, both popular varieties in our state, are excellent baking apples. Michigan apple growers lead the nation with their production of Northern Spies and produced about 100 million pounds of the two varieties last year. A total 680 million pounds of apples of all varieties were harvested in 1979, third largest production in the nation.

Pickles are a picnic perennial, as are Michigan carrot and celery sticks, for a garnish tray. Other Michigan items you

might want to add to your garnish display are deviled eggs, cottage cheese, stuffed or French fried mushrooms or onion rings.

If the weather should change, don't let it spoil your plans. Just move your picnic indoors. Pick up a potted plant and use its freshness to bring the outdoors inside! Our state's floriculture industry is the fourth largest in the nation, earning \$42.1 million in 1978 (latest figures available).

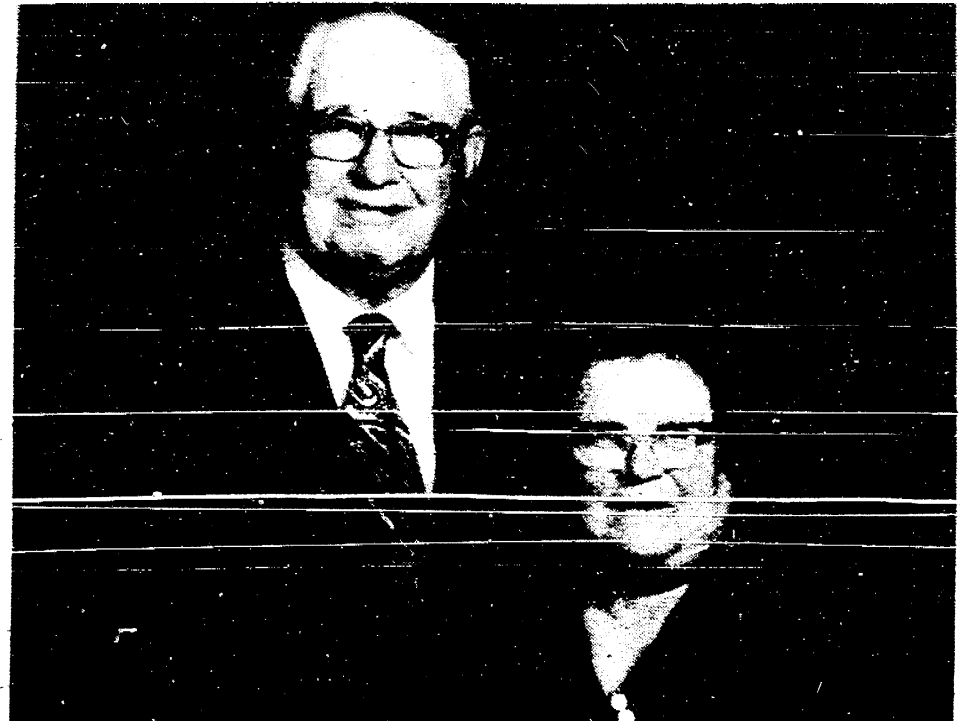
