HIT OR MISS by farley

Several of our better known columnists and editorial writers have during the past few weeks, tried to impress the average chap with what "Government" is costing them and while these writings are very informative I don't think they will cheer anyone up nor make any great difference in our lives. They don't tell us what we can do about it except to stage a revolt at election time and judging from past performances during the past few years I doubt that the majority of us are going to get excited enough to do that.

One writer recently points out that it is commonly said that the most expensive purchase that the average person will make is a house, but that is no longer true. Nowadays his most expensive "purchase" is what he pays for being governed. At present he doesn't buy a house. He can't afford it. But no one asks him if he can afford what he pays for government. He just becomes obligated to pay it. If and when you buy a house you have a choice. You can pick and choose and even refuse. But you are merely presented a bill for your share of the cost of government and if you don't pay up, you go to jail.

Last figures of government costs indicate that you pay all that you earn from January one to the middle of May to pay your share of its costs. But when you bought a house it used to be a rule of thumb that you could or should pay no more than from one-third to one-fourth of your income each month for it, and in at least thirty or forty years your payments would stop but your payments for government never stop. In many instances you even have to pay after you are an occupant of the cemetery in the form of inheritance taxes.

In other words one is paying almost twice as much for government as for a house to live in. And then too, when you buy a house you get a chance to pick and choose but with government you just get it stuffed down your throat. You get no chance to find out if the roof is sound or that the cellar isn't full of water or that the place isn't infested with termites, or that the neighbors aren't narcotic distributors. You do have two choices, one representative salesman from the two major political parties, but there is no guarantee that either one has anything anywhere worth the money to offer.

Maybe that is why lately so many folks don't bother to vote, to make a choice. They have an idea of what is in store for them and they don't like either one. The salesmen for government still loudly proclaim that our government is of the people, by the people and for the people and that one should be proud to have bought what they get for they are the ones who built it. What a joke. For what we pay we deserve better than that. I would hate to have to live in a house that I myself constructed. I would probably be living in a lean-to propped against a nearby fence with a leaky roof. But if I did I bet I could provide some kind of shelter on less than five months pay and if I didn't pay for it I would not be checked in jail for not so doing.

April 24th is World Laboratory Animal Day. Throughout the world on this day there will be demonstrations and various other activities in behalf of the hundreds of millions of animals that are made to suffer and die in painful experiments.

The majority of people suppose that most of these experiments are performed in medical research. This is a misimpression. Moreover, much medical research performed on animals in needless since there are satisfactory alternatives.

Here in the United States the National Coalition for Alternatives to Animal Research is mounting a campaign to get H.R. 4905 passed in the Congress. This bill is known as the Research Modernization Act. It is supported by dozens of animal welfare organizations that are part of the Coalition as well as by independent scientists, lawyers, philosophers, and

physicians. Those of us in Michigan who are concerned about the mistreatment of animals can do our share in getting HR 4905 passed. We need to organize a massive letter-writing and petition drive, urging our congressmen to support the bill. Many members of the Michigan Animal Rights Society, the Fund for Animals, and the Ann Arbor Vegetarian Society are already at work in this campaign. Won't you join us? April 7, 1980

Council met in regular session with the meeting called to order by President Schaffer at 7:00 P.M. Present were: DuRussel, Hinkley, Koebbe, Minick, Petsch, Reed, Zsenyuk. Minutes of the March 17, 1980 meeting were read, corrected and approved in a motion by Koebbe, supported by Petsch. All yeas, motion carried.

Mr. Ray Gonyer was present to protest Consumers Power Co. putting a pole and guy wire, which would require an easement of 10 feet, on his property. He was advised to check with the State Highway Dept. as his property is on a State Highway and there could be a question of right of way.

The Clerk administered the Oath of Office to Mary M. Smith Treasurer, Treestee - Gale Koebbe and Howard DuRussel.

Treasurer Smith presented names of businesses in the Village who had not paid their Personal Taxes for 1979. Chief Zsenyuk is to confer with the Village Attorney for action to take and will give a report at the next meeting.

Mrs. William (Marjorie) Smith who had attended a meeting of the Manchester Village Planning Commission was present to request a Public Hearing be set for her request for a variance permit to convert their home at 207 W. Duncan St. so as to provide three apartments. Moved by Hinkley, supported by Petsch a Public Hearing be scheduled for April 21, 1980 at 8:00 P.M. All yeas, motion carried.

Mrs. Vickie Curley, Mr. Dan Boutell, Mr. Michael Speiss and Mr. Wayne Winzenz were present to discuss the high rates of speed on East Main St. and

questioned whether the stop sign on Beaufort Street and Duncan Street could be removed to divert more traffic to Duncan Street. Chief Zsenyuk replied that he was reluctant to remove the stop sign at Beaufort Street due to the School on Beaufort. After much discussion Hinkley offered the following resolution and moved its adoption, supported by DuRussel: To provide a 3 way stop at Wolverine Street and East Main Street and that lines be painted on the Streets. All yeas, motion carried.

Moved by Reed, supported by Petsch that No Parking signs be placed on East Main Street on both sides going East from Wolverine Street to the Manchester High School and No Parking signs be placed on South side of East Main Street from Wolverine Street to corner of M-52. Motion carried.

Moved by Reed, supported by Petsch that parking be allowed only on the North side of East Main Street from M-52 going East. All yeas, motion carried.

Public Works Activities as reported by Koebbe included: Donald Smith appointed Foreman; Worked at patching asphalt; Dug three graves; Patched sewer lead on the main sewer on S. Washington St.; Worked on the Granger St. sewer; Had the Trojan loader's hydrovac repaired at Mann's Service Station; In the process of reading water meters; Mr. Petsch requested that 50 Maple Trees be order for the Village. The cost will be \$19.75 ea. for a total of \$987.50; The old adding machine at the Sewage plant broke and was unrepairable, replaced it with a new desk calculator at the cost of \$94.50; Have been assisting Dave Emmons in finding a place to put the refuse from the transfer site; All park tables have been painted; Work-

ing on the Cub Lawn Mower readying it for spring work; Zoning changes were researched by request of the Planning Commission from 1968 to the present and 50 were discovered; The council will need to give Mark Gistinger a request for court action against the person who was responsible for the damage to the Duncan Street bridge who lost his insurance; On April 1, Mr. Dave Emmons called and said that our refuse facility was good for another 30 days; On April 2, the forms were received for ACT # 641 P.A. 1978 for licensing of our refuse facilities. We are required to comply by May 1, 1980 or the department of Natural Resources will initiate enforcement action to close the facility.

Chief Zsenyuk to contact the Village Attorney whether to pursue court action for damage to Duncan Street bridge.

Meeting adjourned as Village Council and convened as Zoning Board of Appeals at 8:00 P.M. Present were 6 Councilmen, Manchester Planning Commission members Sue Bond and Lauren Leeson. Mr. David Little's request for a Conditional Use permit to construct 2 apartments above his store at 134 East Main Street was considered. Recommendation of the Manchester Village Planning Commission was read. Moved by Leeson, supported by Reed the conditional use permit be approved. Roll Call vote taken. All yeas, motion carried. Zoning Board of Appeals adjourned at 8:25 P.M. to reconvene as Council.

Mrs. Sue Bond reported the Historical Planning Commission would be conducting a survey of the Village for a Building Structure Inventory. Local residents will assist in the survey. Rick Newman will meet with the surveyors at the Bauernstube on April 16, 1980.

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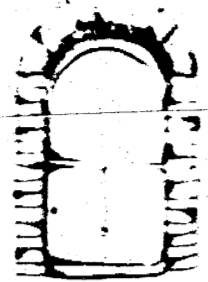

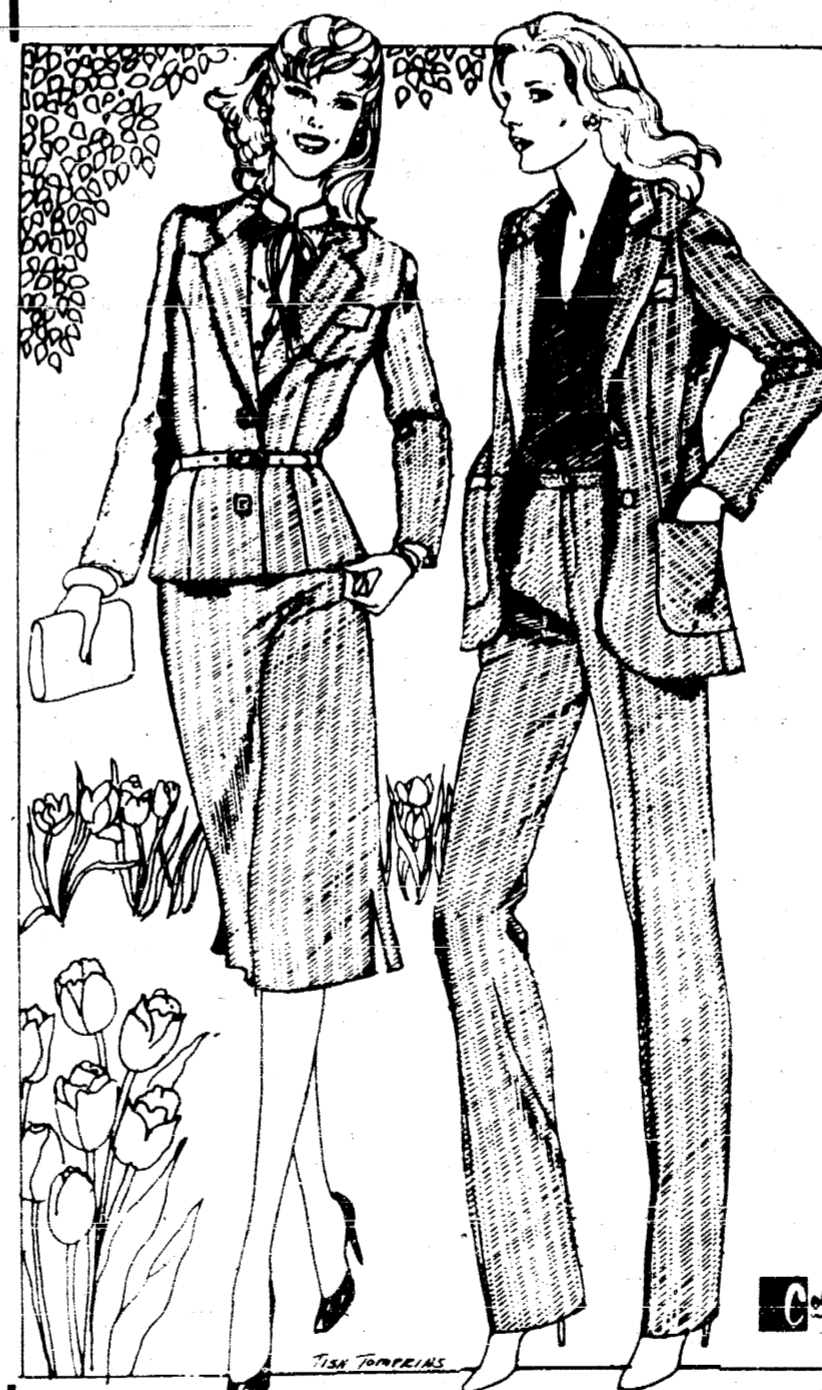

Nature Tour

Quaking ground, insect-eating plants, and rare and beautiful orchids are some of the fascinating things that may be seen and experienced in a bog. A walk into a bog is a walk back through time. Twelve thousand years ago Michigan and much of the northern hemisphere was covered by a huge sheet of ice. Moving like a large bulldozer, the glacier gouged and scoured the land. As the ice retreated, sand, gravel, and rocks being carried along by the glacier were left behind. Huge ice blocks separated from the main glacier, and were buried in the glacial debris. They melted to form kettle hole lakes.

As soon as the lakes formed, the forces of nature began filling them in. Some of these lakes are surrounded by floating mats of vegetation which are slowly covering them over. The quaking action of the bog mat is a reminder of the water below. Some of the floating mats are thin and can be hazardous. However, the Waterloo Nature Center has built a floating walkway over part of the Cedar Lake Bog. The bog trail and walkway are not available to the public unless accompanied by a park naturalist.

At 1:30 and 3:30 on Sundays, April 20th through June 8th, naturalist conducted tours will be offered at the center. The tours will begin at the nature center building and will last about 90 minutes. There is no charge for these programs. However, because the Waterloo Nature Center is a state park facility, all vehicles entering the area must have a state park motor vehicle permit. These are available at the reception desk.

The Waterloo Recreation Area is located just north of I-94, midway between Jackson and Ann Arbor. Nature Center

visitors take I-94 to exit 156, turn north and follow the park signs. Visitors are asked to leave their pets home. For additional information you may call 1-313-475-8069.

Manchester Schools Begin Testing Program

Students in grades two, four, six, eight, and eleven will be administered standardized tests during the period April 14-25. These tests, named the California Achievement Test (CAT) are designed to measure student achievement in reading, math and language skills.

These tests are intended to provide teachers with information regarding the specific strengths and weaknesses of each child. This information will make it possible to design a program to meet the individual needs of students. In addition, data regarding the overall progress of the Manchester Schools in these subject areas will be collected.

The tests will be scored by computer. Dr. Thompson, school superintendent, has indicated that he expects the information to be returned to the schools by June 1. Copies of individual students scores will be available to all parents. Thompson has stated that as part of his efforts to involve the Community in decision making regarding the schools all school test data will be made public early in June. Individual test scores are, of course, private.

Some crops and livestock are produced for shipment to other states and countries.

A great way for city people to get out in the country is to visit a Pick-Your-Own farm. These farms have grown in the past decade to become another large agricultural business which services many families. Freshness of produce as well as economy of price brings families out to the farms from late Spring until late fall. This specially posed picture is intended to focus attention on the White Cane Law. Sponsored by Michigan Lions, the law states that a motorist must stop at least 10 feet from a person carrying a white cane or being led by a Leader Dog to allow them to cross the street in safety.

The right-turn-on-red law has created a problem for the visually impaired pedestrian who normally crosses the street after listening to the flow of traffic. Motorists who are unaware of the White Cane Law, or who do not obey it, can cause a needless tragedy.

Another law designed to help the blind requires all public facilities to permit a

person with a Leader Dog in harness to enter and/or use their premises. Although most people are aware of this law, some are not, and Lions of Michigan are constantly working to educate the public about both of these laws according to a Lions spokesman.

April 25th through May 4th is White Cane Week. 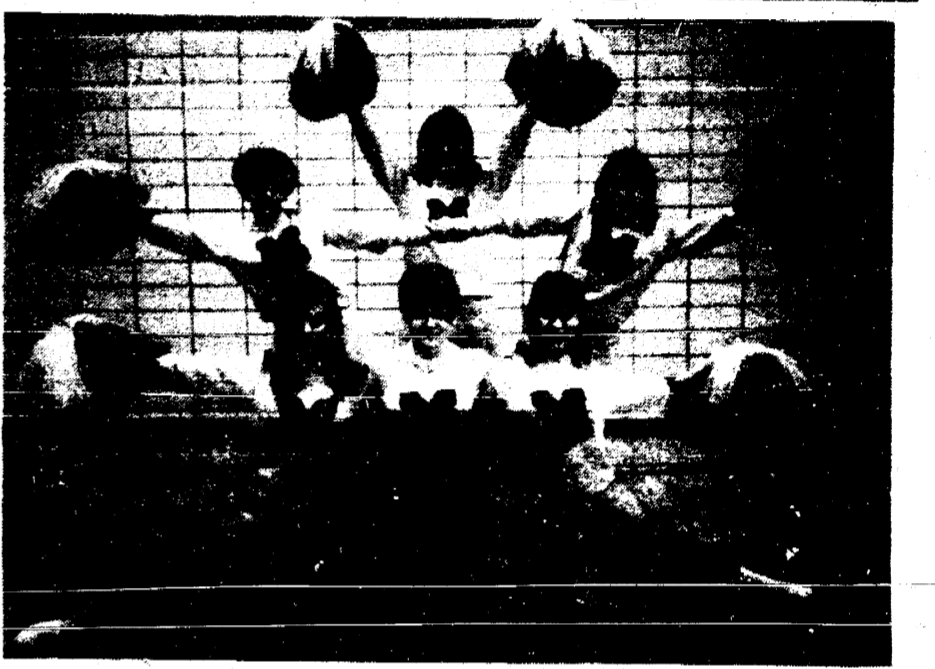

2. Voting upon any other matters incidental to the proposed consolidation of Union Savings Bank of Manchester with and into The Citizens Bank of Saline as may properly come before such Special Meeting of Shareholders, or any adjournment or adjournments thereof.

A copy of the Consolidation Agreement, executed by a majority of the Directors of the two Banks, is attached as an Exhibit to the Joint Proxy Statement that is to be delivered to each shareholder in connection with such Special Meeting of Shareholders, and is on file at the Main Office of Union Savings Bank of Manchester and may be inspected during business hours. A sprint race will be featured. Trophies to be awarded for 1st three places.

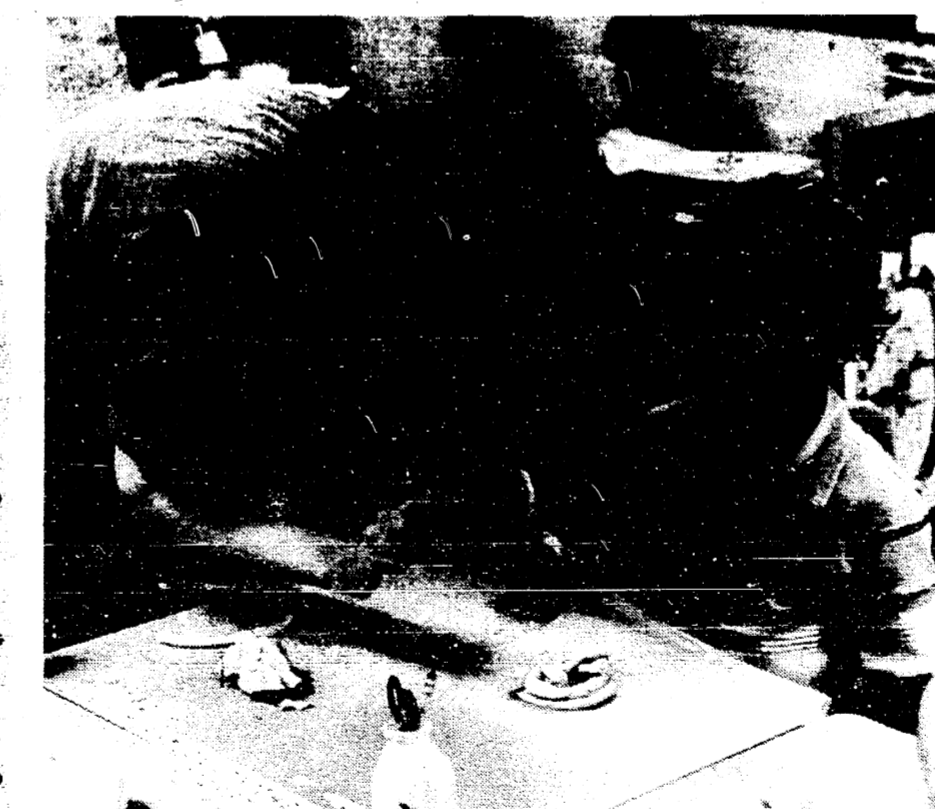
Spring Clean-Up

HIT OR MISS by farley

We're losing our freedom in these United States and its time we did something about it before it's too late. The truth of this statement is evident in so many ways. Many of the legislators (that we elected to serve us in Lansing and Washington) seem to have forgotten why and how they got there, and proceed to pass legislation that restricts us in so many ways.

For instance, as we reported in an article some time ago, during the depression days of the 1930's, our welfare problem was handled by the township supervisor who knew his people personally and who gave those who needed it help and who prevented a lot of chiseling by some that didn't. Now however, the supervisor has been stripped of his powers and the welfare problems are handled on a county, state and national basis by people who don't know the real needs of their applicants, and although those administrators are trying to do a good job they cannot judge each case, they must do so by the "book" and that just doesn't work in many cases. So nowadays we read of many, many cases of people who have received food stamps, for instance, who are in no way eligible. The administrators cannot individually investigate all applicants. This didn't happen in the 30's.

Another minor incident which, however indicates the trend of affairs is that in 1975 the national, state and county ballots were combined on one sheet. Prior to this time each branch of the government issued separate ballots and handled their own election procedures which were, of course, handled by a law which covered them all. This 'twas said was done to "save money", a favorite expression used casually when new laws are passed, but 'tisn't always true. This combined ballot was to be under the jurisdiction of the County Clerk, and it eliminated the townships from the picture.

They must have forgotten at this time, about villages and cities, for they weren't included, and so they continued to hold elections under their former status; with the village elections held under the jurisdiction of the village clerks.

At this time our village clerk brought to us, as usual, copy for the village ballots and told us to print them as we had done for many years previously in their proper form, according to the law in those cases. This we did but by the time we had done so, back came the clerk who said he had had a call from the County Clerk who said she wanted to have the copy for the village ballots. He told her what he had done with it and she insisted that she wanted to be certain that they were okay before they were printed so took a proof of them and he departed to show her what had been done.

In the meantime we contacted the village attorney and asked if there had been any changes in the election law and he said no that the County Clerk had nothing to do with village affairs, so we printed the ballots and things went as before.

Shortly thereafter we sold the printery and proceeded to forget about such matters, but as time went on quite a number of people kept calling us and asking if we could get for them printed matter of various kinds, that they could not get them locally anymore. So we finally succumbed and found sources for printing.
