### HIT OR MISS by farley

A recent issue of the Michigan Journal-  
ist, the newspaper published by the  
journalism students at the U of M  
recently published a very comprehensive  
article, or group of articles about a major  
industry in these United States that has  
escaped notice, except in a very casual  
way, by most of us-an industry that is  
greater than either our steel or textile  
production for a year. This is the pack-  
aging industry.

We mentioned in a column of rem-  
iniscences some time ago that in days  
gone by when we shopped at the grocery  
the cheeses, for example rested beneath a  
large glass bell. Two or three kinds nested  
there accompanied by a large cheese knife  
and when you purchased some, the  
counterweighted bell was raised and when  
you indicated how much you wanted the  
clerk cut a piece, picked it up with a piece  
of waxed paper and weighed it on the  
scales to see just how much you should  
pay for it. These clerks became very  
skillful in cutting off the indicated amount.

Then he would wrap it in a piece of  
so-called butcher's wrapping paper and  
place it on the counter with your other  
items. When you ordered a pound of  
cookies which were displayed in a rack of  
tins which held ten to fifteen pounds of  
each, the clerk would grab a brown paper  
sack in one hand and a handful of cookies  
in the other, placing what he thought was  
the right amount in the sack while he took  
a handful in his other hand and going to  
the scales, either added or subtracted a  
sufficient number to fill your request. He  
then twisted shut the top of the sack and  
it joined your other items on the counter.  
But not so nowadays.

The cookies are displayed sealed in  
beautifully printed plastic wrapped pack-  
ages and that's the way you buy 'em.  
Many of them are packed in odd number

er's report was read and filed.

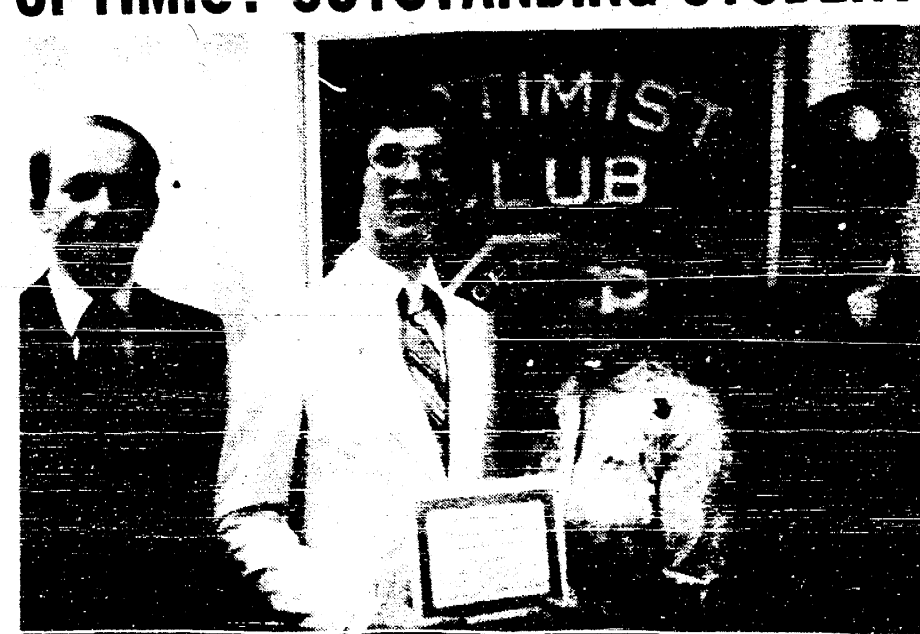
Mary Munson and Marie Garlick, Man-

His main complaint was that it was not a well prepared budget but merely the old budget multiplied by some number which would take care of inflation, higher prices, and change in student body. On the other hand it did not take into consideration of dropping a lousy program but merely to add more money to it and throw that down the drain too. I have also heard that in some room a new rug was laid but the roof which leaked was never fixed. Interesting.

Undoubtedly there is something wrong in the way that the school is being operated. If there are members on the board which feel that such actions are detrimental then such members must realize that such action cannot be corrected by resignation, nor can they help the members of the community by doing so.

Another thought which bothers us is that a couple of weeks ago mention was made in the Enterprise that the school is trying to form a citizens committee to help in their decision making. Baloney. They have tried this process many times over the last twenty years or so and yet never has there been given any consider-

The nominating committee will present a slate of officers to be voted upon at the June meeting.

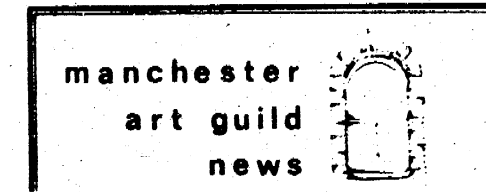

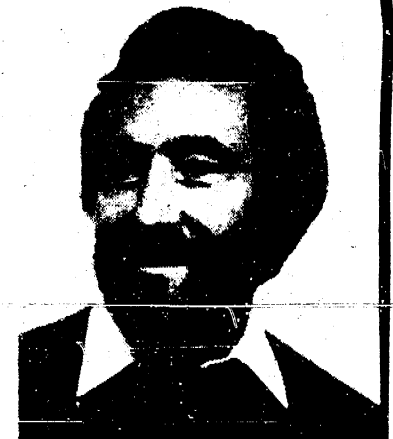

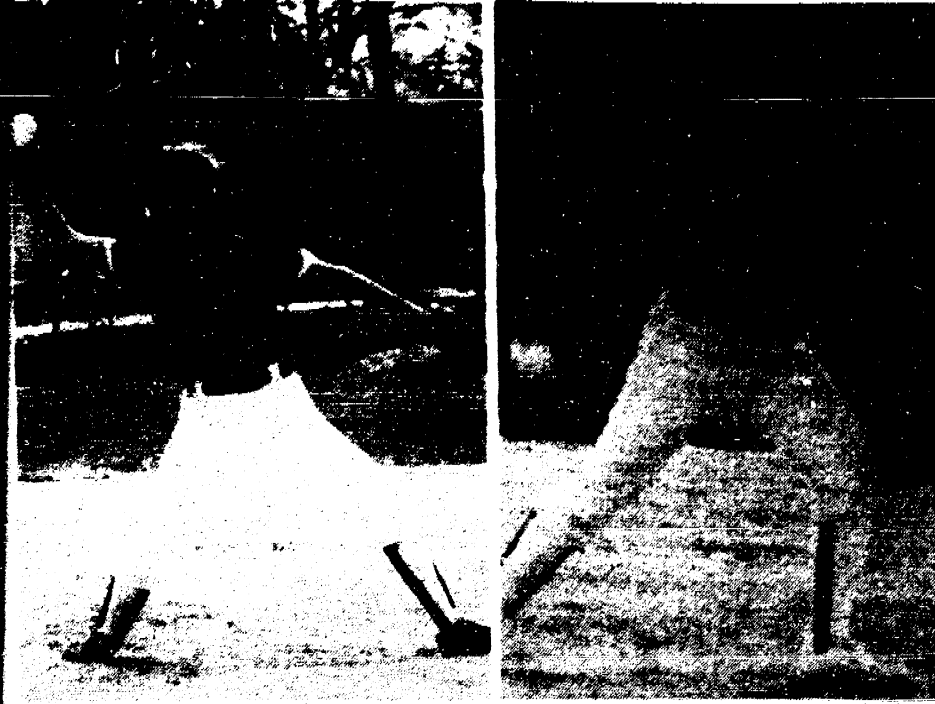

of ounce units, but that's immaterial. The cheeses are cut, rined, and packed in sterile plastic packages, plainly priced, and unlike the good old days, you get no chance to sniff nor taste them before you buy. You accept them at their stated markings on the packages and if they aren't just what you thought they would be, you don't have to buy that kind again. I suppose that all this packaging protects us from stray microbes and to some extent preserved their freshness, but I still maintain that a grocery store no longer smells like a grocery store. Our food consumption has gone up some two percent a year in the last twenty years but the amount of material in which it has been wrapped has gone up thirty-three percent, and three percent of our personal expense budget has gone to pay for this wrapping. And that is only a part of the story. Packaging accounts for almost all the litter that is such a problem in our nation. Ninety percent of all packages we use end up as solid waste. Most everything but houses and automobiles gets wrapped. Last year it is said that sixty-eight million tons of metal, paper and wood were used by the packaging industry plus all the energy used to convert these materials into usable products. Why not replace the packaging with the quality of the product inside? We are said to pay \$170.00 per year for packaging or some two pounds of packaging material per day. In extreme cases, according to a Michigan State packaging professor, items like toothpaste cost some 98 percent of the retail price for the tubes, cartons, etc. used in the packaging of the item. There is no quick solution to the packaging problem. One group wants less of it for recycling and the other, more efficient and saleable packages. It is said that if we would cut our packaging as little as 10 percent we could save \$54 million dollars a year, but experts also claim that the packaging of an item rather than the product inside sells the product. The packaging experts will tell you that a package should be so well designed when you see it, it almost jumps off the shelf and into your grocery cart. For instance one brand of soup or soap is no different than another but the packaging not the product sells it. Gone are the salespeople who used to stand behind the counter. The packages try to "second guess" the customer instead. As you all note there have been of late, plain packages of various products in the "economy section" of our food stores and these items are in many cases, considerably cheaper than the attractively packaged and highly publicized product. This I think answers a question. Which do you want, quantity or an attractively packaged product?

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
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

Students at Klager were treated to a sheep shearing demonstration on May 1st. Mr. and Mrs. Charlie Schiel brought equipment and two Suffolk ewes for the demonstration.

Charlie, who is currently president of the Michigan Sheep Shearers Association, gave informative comments throughout the shearing and baling. In his 20 year career as a shearer, Charlie has lost count of the thousands of sheep he has trimmed up. His equipment was purchased at the beginning of his career and is still in top running order.

When shearing was his full time job, Charlie traveled all over the state of Michigan. As costs have increased shearing has changed from a profession to a hobby. Recently he has been a judge for the Michigan State Shearing Championships.

Most fleeces are now bagged rather than baled. The removal of the paper twine from the fleece adds to the cost of processing. The individual fleeces weigh between 4 and 5 pounds before cleaning. Many fleeces from this area find their way to Ohio Wool Buyers, according to Charlie.

A balled fleece is held up for students to see.

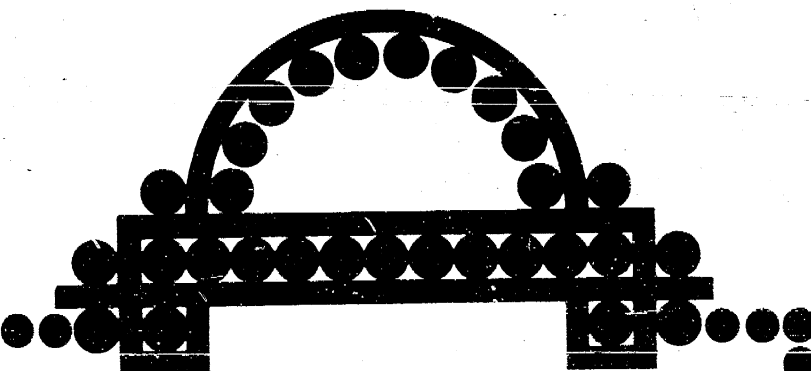

## Board of Education Minutes

These are the proposed minutes of the April 21 and May 5, 1980 Board of Education meetings. They are not official until approved or corrected at the next regular meeting of the Board of Education.

April 21, 1980

The meeting was called to order at 8:00 p.m. by President Corliss Mick in the High School Library.

Board members present: Mick, Macomber, Bunney, Curley, Horning, and DuFresne. Absent: Walkowe.

Secretary Curley indicated that there were no communications other than those already received and placed on the Agenda.

Member Walkowe entered at 8:03 p.m. The Board moved to the Study Auditorium for a short performance by the High School Band.

The Board reconvened in the High School Library at 8:25 p.m.

Visitor Input: Pres. Mick indicated she had received a letter from Wm. R. Hare from the Romeo School District regarding the funding and taxation amendment petition that could be circulated in our

Community. Literature is available if anyone is interested.

Mrs. Kathy Hagerman clarified some of the statements she had written in a letter to the Board of Education regarding the non-renewal of Mr. Bill Scaletta's administrative contract.

Mrs. Pam Post, Mrs. Diane Schwab and Mrs. Mary Munson indicated their concern over the teaching methods of Mr. Steve Halchishak. They indicated that letters had been written to previous Superintendent's relative to this issue and had apparently not been placed in his personnel file.

After a discussion Mrs. Post asked if a sub-committee of the Board could be appointed to review Mr. Halchishak's personnel file to see if these letters were indeed there and she indicated she would like a response to her request that any letters of this nature be kept to build a case against Mr. Halchishak.

President Mick asked for 2 volunteers to serve on the sub-committee along with herself to view Mr. Halchishak's personnel file.

Mr. Curley and Mr. Walkowe volunteered.

Moved by Bunney that a committee established by the President be allowed to review the personnel file of Mr. Halchishak as requested. Supported by Horn-

ing, Yeas: Mick, Macomber, Walkowe, Bunney, Curley and Horning. Nays 0. Abstain: DuFresne. Motion carried.

Mr. Savage asked that the High School Band be commended. Mr. Rodenbeck is doing a fine job.

Mr. David Sweet requested to be placed on the Agenda to give the Board some Background information on the Kinship Homes, Inc. that he has established in the area. Mr. DuFresne asked that Mr. Sweet be placed on the May agenda to give a formal presentation to the Board of Education regarding the operation of the Kinship Homes within the School District.

The Student Government Representative reported that Dr. Thompson had spoke to each High School Class and answered some 135 questions. Copies will be sent to the Board of Education members.

Ms. Barbara Lund briefly discussed the reasons for submitting her letter of resignation.

Minutes Of Previous Meetings: Mr. Bunney asked that Paragraph 6 on page 4 be deleted as it appears as if it had been typed twice.

Moved by Horning to accept the minutes as corrected. Supported by Walkowe. Yeas: Walkowe, Curley, Horning, Mick, DuFresne and Macomber. Nays 0. Abstain Bunney. Motion carried.

Financial Report: Moved by Curley to accept the Financial Report showing a balance of \$1,578,139.77. Supported by Horning. All yeas. Motion carried.

Bills Payable: Moved by Horning to accept bills payable in the amount of \$200,954.20. Supported by Bunney. All yeas. Motion carried.

REPORTS:  
Controlled Temperature: Mr. Tom Blair, of Controlled Temperature, indicated that about 1/3 of the work has been completed. He detailed some areas of change that would save the district some money in the future. He will give a full report to the Board of Education upon completion of the

project.  
Citizen's Advisory Committee: Dr. Thompson reported that the response to the Citizen's Advisory Committee has not been good. Some feedback indicated that perhaps members of the community were offended by the term "screening" by the Ad Hoc Committee. Dr. Thompson apologized if this was the case and said that he didn't mean anyone who volunteered would be denied.

Alternative Millage Date: Members of the Board indicated their desire to make this decision after the Millage Hearing.

Graduation Procedures: It was the general consensus of the Board that graduation procedures would continue to be arranged by the Superintendent and the high school principal with diplomas being distributed alphabetically and if there was special requests a Board member could notify the Superintendent.

Employee Group Negotiations: Dr. Thompson will negotiate the contracts of Custodians and Bus Drivers with the Board negotiation committee to assist if necessary.

Preliminary Budget - Millage Amount: A discussion took place regarding the 1980-81 preliminary budget. Questions were asked about 1) specific line items, 2) concern of a minimal fund equity balance, 3) the effect of the Headlee Amendment, 4) request for written information to community if requested millage passes what we will have and if the millage fails what we have to cut.

Millage Campaign Organization: Mr. DuFresne and Mr. Bunney volunteered to be on an AD HOC Committee to manage the millage campaign.

Moved by DuFresne that an AD HOC Committee be established to promote a millage campaign to fund the school program. Supported by Bunney. All yeas. Motion carried.

Staff Utilization: Dr. Thompson asked for direction from the Board regarding the

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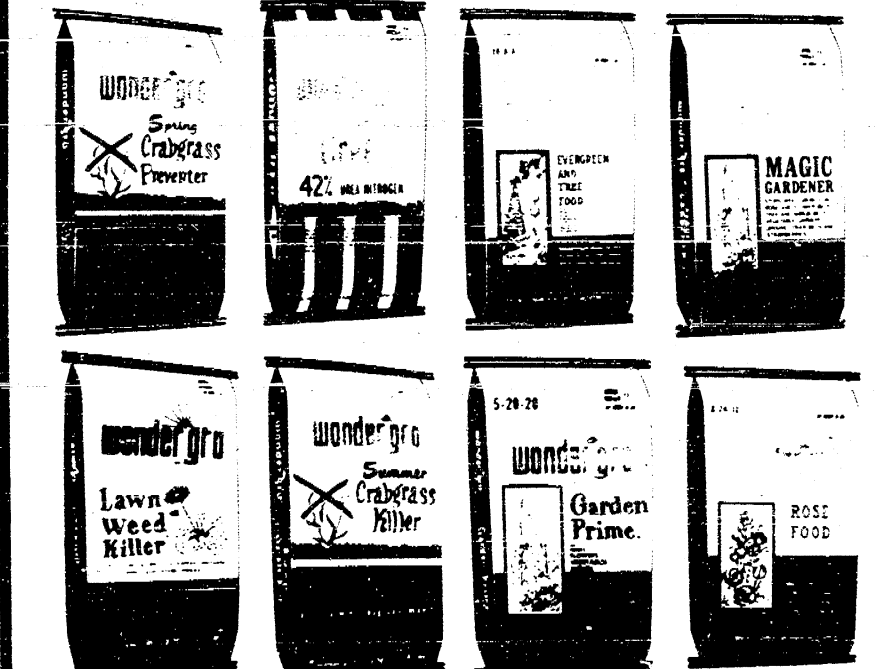

## HIT OR MISS by farley

After I had finished last week's column about the packaging industry I did a bit more research and found that the wonderful world of packaging was a fascinating place. It is indeed a very interesting part of our everyday life.

Figures show that packaging is to blame for half of the litter that we accumulate. Ninety percent of the packages we use end up as solid waste, and most of that ends up in landfills. A recent news item notes that Washtenaw County has purchased 110 acres of land on which to dump their waste at a cost of \$660,000.

Then too, we find that many packages contain a smaller amount of a product than heretofore, but the weight of the contents, which by law has to be printed on the package, is in type too small to be easily read, and in other cases some products are packaged in boxes larger than necessary and they are not filled to the brim, but they certainly look larger on the store's shelves. There are also other packages that are made with recessed bottoms and partitioned interiors. Then there are the lipsticks and the razor blades and other small articles to make them too large to be easily shoplifted.

There are other ways of packaging which seem to confuse the public. For instance there is such a mundane product as toilet paper which is in many instances packed in four or six roll packages with a brightly colored wrapper. These packages on inspection will be found to contain rolls of from 400 to 800 sheets per roll but they are priced per package within a few cents of each other. Then there is a so-called commercial roll of 1,000 sheets wrapped simply in paper and priced per roll at but a few cents more than the others.

The canned goods shelves can be as confusing. There are 15 oz. 15 1/2 oz. and 16 oz. cans for instance priced nearly the same, and crackers and cookies in 12, 14 and 16 ounce packages priced likewise.

With the invention of aluminum foil and cellophane between 1900 and 1930 the whole packaging industry took off and now is said to employ some 216,000 with 103,000 making corrugated boxes and 67,600 in the production of glass containers.

Even the hens have been influenced by the modern trends of the packaging industry. I'll bet that many of today's children never saw a brown egg in the stores-from where nowadays come all eggs. We never get a chance to meet the hens-there are only white ones. There used to be a lot of brown eggs laid by the Rhode Island hens of yesteryear but as time went by people came to demand only white ones and so today only the white ones are on sale. They are no better than the brown ones, but they are white and that is all that seems to matter.

But we like our packages and are willing to pay for them so I suppose they are with us to stay for tis said that the customer is always right.

Michigan Week, the grassroots Up with Michigan program, has developed numerous sturdy offshoots.

In its 25 years, the Michigan Sports Hall of Fame has made 102 presentations, honoring sports figures whose achievements have brought honor to Michigan. The banquet to install 1980 nominees in the Hall of Fame took place May 12 at Cobo Hall, Detroit.

The yearly Exchange of Mayors owes its existence to the first Michigan Week. On Government Day, Monday, May 19, mayors and village presidents again traded places for the day and viewed local problems in different settings. The Michigan Week state office handles the yearly drawing and program through which several hundred officials exchange ideas each spring.
