## HIT OR MISS by farley

After I had finished last week's column about the packaging industry I did a bit more research and found that the wonderful world of packaging was a fascinating place. It is indeed a very interesting part of our everyday life.

Figures show that packaging is to blame for half of the litter that we accumulate. Ninety percent of the packages we use end up as solid waste, and most of that ends up in landfills. A recent news item notes that Washtenaw County has purchased 110 acres of land on which to dump their waste at a cost of \$660,000.

Then too, we find that many packages contain a smaller amount of a product than heretofore, but the weight of the contents, which by law has to be printed on the package, is in type too small to be easily read, and in other cases some products are packaged in boxes larger than necessary and they are not filled to the brim, but they certainly look larger on the store's shelves. There are also other packages that are made with recessed bottoms and partitioned interiors. Then there are the lipsticks and the razor blades and other small articles to make them too large to be easily shoplifted.

There are other ways of packaging which seem to confuse the public. For instance there is such a mundane product as toilet paper which is in many instances packed in four or six roll packages with a brightly colored wrapper. These packages on inspection will be found to contain rolls of from 400 to 800 sheets per roll but they are priced per package within a few cents of each other. Then there is a so-called commercial roll of 1,000 sheets wrapped simply in paper and priced per roll at but a few cents more than the others.

The canned goods shelves can be as confusing. There are 15 oz. 15 1/2 oz. and 16 oz. cans for instance priced nearly the same, and crackers and cookies in 12, 14 and 16 ounce packages priced likewise.

With the invention of aluminum foil and cellophane between 1900 and 1930 the whole packaging industry took off and now is said to employ some 216,000 with 103,000 making corrugated boxes and 67,600 in the production of glass containers.

Even the hens have been influenced by the modern trends of the packaging industry. I'll bet that many of today's children never saw a brown egg in the stores-from where nowadays come all eggs. We never get a chance to meet the hens-there are only white ones. There used to be a lot of brown eggs laid by the Rhode Island hens of yesteryear but as time went by people came to demand only white ones and so today only the white ones are on sale. They are no better than the brown ones, but they are white and that is all that seems to matter.

But we like our packages and are willing to pay for them so I suppose they are with us to stay for tis said that the customer is always right.

**LETTERS TO THE EDITOR**



To the editor:

Every year many dogs fall victim to canine heartworm disease. If undetected, this disease can lead to heart and lung damage and even death.

The American Heartworm Society (AHS) reports that heartworm has now spread almost nationwide. Originally, the Eastern Seaboard and Gulf State regions were the primary reservoirs.

Long white worms, called *Dirofilaria immitis*, cause canine heartworm disease. Mosquitoes spread the infective larvae

from dog to dog. Unfortunately, a great deal of damage can result before signs are apparent to the owner.

This disease can be detected by a blood test. Sometimes a veterinarian uses x-rays, repeated blood tests, and other laboratory procedures to confirm the presence of the worms.

Veterinarians can successfully treat more infected dogs. While there is some risk involved in treatment, fatal reactions are rare in otherwise healthy dogs. Prevention is the best medicine. The AHS recommends that dogs be regularly examined and started on a preventive program.

Because of the incidence of heartworm in southeastern Michigan, we would like to urge all dog owners to have their dog tested this spring by your veterinarian, and discuss a preventive program at that time with your veterinarian.

## Florida Evangelist To Conduct Crusade



Evangelist Hugh F. Pyle of Panama City, Florida, will be here for a revival crusade in the North Sharon Bible Church beginning May 18th and lasting through May the 23rd. Dr. Pyle, who received his Doctor of Divinity degree from Tennessee Temple University, has had more than 35 years preaching experience both in the pastorate and in evangelistic work. He pastored the Central Baptist Church of Panama City, Fla., for over 15 years and served as founder and president of Panama City Christian Schools. When he resigned in July of 1973 to enter evangelism, the church had 1600 members and

Before entering evangelism, Dr. Pyle was a popular radio speaker for 14 years in his home town and still enjoys radio work in his meetings. He is a past-moderator of the Southwide Baptist Fellowship and has served both as host pastor and on a number of the committees.

### HIT OR MISS by farley

For all you folks who say that they spend all of their money for taxes we have assembled the facts to prove that that is not quite correct but at the present rate of progress it won't be long until such is the case. Michigan State College offers an update of these facts and figures. Michigan's tax burden reached a new peak during 1979 when the combined federal, state and local levies of \$31 billion were 37.2 percent. The 1978 figures were 34.8 percent and in these United States 35.5 percent. Local tax burdens increased by small amounts in the state and nation and nationally state taxes as a portion of the personal income were a bit less but in Michigan they rose slightly. In 1974 and 1975 however the state tax burden declined. Local taxes have always been inelastic because the property tax is a major component. A not inconsiderable portion of taxes is levied on business and not on households. As much as possible businessmen pass their taxes on to the consumer but the tax also is to blame for reduced earnings by stockholders, management and labor. The federal tax burden is about double that of the combined state and local levies but some of this comes back to us as federal aid to state and local units. In 1979 some one out of six federal tax dollars was returned to Michigan this way. In 1976, a year of low taxation compared to others in this decade, more than 20 percent of our taxes paid the federal government were returned to the state. In Michigan a percentage of the personal income tax, cigarette tax, alcoholic beverage tax sales tax, inheritance tax and intangibles tax are earmarked for the schools, cities, villages, townships and counties and are returned to them. During this decade there has been a rapid rise in federal revenue sharing and a small gain in state sharing. Federal direct expenditure from trust funds grew more rapidly than income from 1968 to 1976 and this trend continues. Social Security is the major trust fund. The combined burden on taxpayers of public welfare, health and veterans programs increased rapidly between 1968 and 1976. Since then these programs have declined relatively. The '70's were known as the years of enormous pressures on state governments particularly in Michigan where between 1970 and 1975 the number of people drawing welfare checks more than tripled. Highway spending and state aid for schools kept pace with the general growth of Michigan's economy. By 1978 the welfare crunch had abated and highway spending had declined, enabling the state to shift resources to public schools. Meanwhile local support of public schools had while local and state aid for providing high school degrees has diminished since 1976 in both this state and the nation. And so there you are. You now know for whom you are working and what proportion of your income you must contribute for taxes. In other words, if you adore figures you are working 1257.78 days or 17.96 weeks or 4.2 months out of every year, on the average, to pay your taxes, but then again, with all this, I don't know of a better place to live in, do you? Parents please, if a youngster has been drinking, and you feel his or her ability is impaired, please see to it that someone drives them home, or make he or she spend the night. ### Gifted/Talented Roundtable Meeting

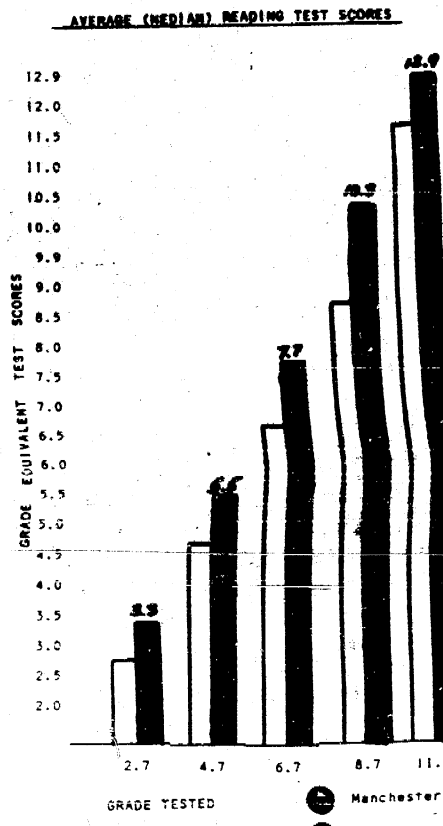

## Manchester Students Read Above Grade Level

Manchester Schools Superintendent Eugene Thompson has reported that the results of the California Achievement Tests taken by Manchester students in April have been returned to the district. Students in grades 2, 4, 6, 8 and 11 were tested in basic skills. These skills included reading, spelling, language and math. Test results for the Manchester students were compared to students in the same grades across the country.



"Without a question our students score better on basic skills than those in the rest of the country," said Thompson. "Reading is the single most important skill to be mastered in school," continued the superintendent, "our students read above grade level at every grade. In fact, the longer students are in the Manchester schools the better they do." At the second grade level the average student reads over a half year above grade level. By the time students take the test in the sixth grade the average is a full year above grade level. The average eleventh grade students reads as high as these tests will measure with a grade equivalent score of 12.5.

"These scores are a clear indication that Manchester teachers are doing an outstanding job," said Thompson. "I like to think of myself as a data-based school administrator, these facts confirm for me that Manchester is an outstanding place to live, work, and go to school. We have problems, but nothing we can't overcome by working together. We must also keep in mind that these scores are averages. The data also tell us that perhaps ten percent of our students have serious reading problems. We need to keep working to meet the needs of all kids." Spelling scores, too, were above grade level. Second graders scored three months above the norm; fourth grades three months above; sixth graders four months above; eighth graders one year and eight months above grade level; and eleventh graders eight months above. By the time students are in the fourth
