HIT OR MISS by farley

For all you folks who say that they spend all of their money for taxes we have assembled the facts to prove that that is not quite correct but at the present rate of progress it won't be long until such is the case. Michigan State College offers an update of these facts and figures. Michigan's tax burden reached a new peak during 1979 when the combined federal, state and local levies of \$31 billion were 37.2 percent. The 1978 figures were 34.8 percent and in these United States 35.5 percent. Local tax burdens increased by small amounts in the state and nation and nationally state taxes as a portion of the personal income were a bit less but in Michigan they rose slightly. In 1974 and 1975 however the state tax burden declined. Local taxes have always been inelastic because the property tax is a major component. A not inconsiderable portion of taxes is levied on business and not on households. As much as possible businessmen pass their taxes on to the consumer but the tax also is to blame for reduced earnings by stockholders, management and labor. The federal tax burden is about double that of the combined state and local levies but some of this comes back to us as federal aid to state and local units. In 1979 some one out of six federal tax dollars was returned to Michigan this way. In 1976, a year of low taxation compared to others in this decade, more than 20 percent of our taxes paid the federal government were returned to the state. In Michigan a percentage of the personal income tax, cigarette tax, alcoholic beverage tax sales tax, inheritance tax and intangibles tax are earmarked for the schools, cities, villages, townships and counties and are returned to them. During this decade there has been a rapid rise in federal revenue sharing and a small gain in state sharing. Federal direct expenditure from trust funds grew more rapidly than income from 1968 to 1976 and this trend continues. Social Security is the major trust fund. The combined burden on taxpayers of public welfare, health and veterans programs increased rapidly between 1968 and 1976. Since then these programs have declined relatively. The '70's were known as the years of enormous pressures on state governments particularly in Michigan where between 1970 and 1975 the number of people drawing welfare checks more than tripled. Highway spending and state aid for schools kept pace with the general growth of Michigan's economy. By 1978 the welfare crunch had abated and highway spending had declined, enabling the state to shift resources to public schools. Meanwhile local support of public schools had while local and state aid for providing high school degrees has diminished since 1976 in both this state and the nation. And so there you are. You now know for whom you are working and what proportion of your income you must contribute for taxes. In other words, if you adore figures you are working 1257.78 days or 17.96 weeks or 4.2 months out of every year, on the average, to pay your taxes, but then again, with all this, I don't know of a better place to live in, do you? Parents please, if a youngster has been drinking, and you feel his or her ability is impaired, please see to it that someone drives them home, or make he or she spend the night. Gifted/Talented Roundtable Meeting

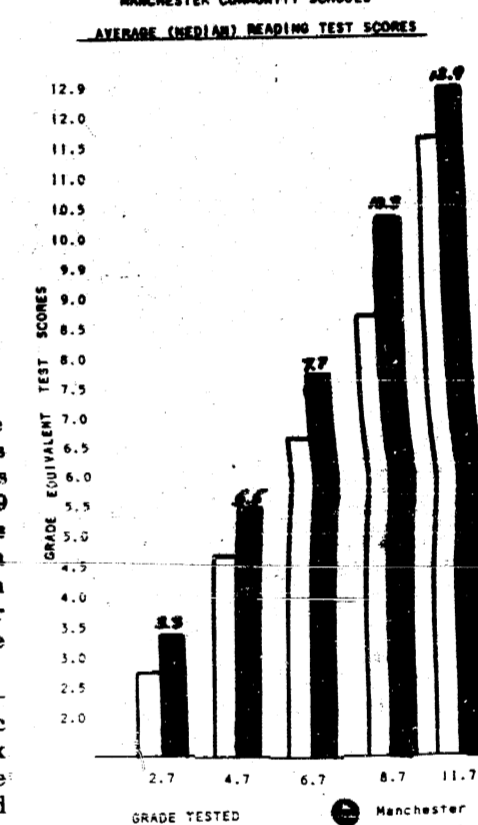

Chief Urges Safe Graduations

Manchester Students Read Above Grade Level

Manchester Schools Superintendent Eugene Thompson has reported that the results of the California Achievement Tests taken by Manchester students in April have been returned to the district. Students in grades 2, 4, 6, 8 and 11 were tested in basic skills. These skills included reading, spelling, language and math. Test results for the Manchester students were compared to students in the same grades across the country.



"Without a question our students score better on basic skills than those in the rest of the country," said Thompson. "Reading is the single most important skill to be mastered in school," continued the superintendent, "our students read above grade level at every grade. In fact, the longer students are in the Manchester schools the better they do." At the second grade level the average student reads over a half year above grade level. By the time students take the test in the sixth grade the average is a full year above grade level. The average eleventh grade students reads as high as these tests will measure with a grade equivalent score of 12.5.

"These scores are a clear indication that Manchester teachers are doing an outstanding job," said Thompson. "I like to think of myself as a data-based school administrator, these facts confirm for me that Manchester is an outstanding place to live, work, and go to school. We have problems, but nothing we can't overcome by working together. We must also keep in mind that these scores are averages. The data also tell us that perhaps ten percent of our students have serious reading problems. We need to keep working to meet the needs of all kids." Spelling scores, too, were above grade level. Second graders scored three months above the norm; fourth grades three months above; sixth graders four months above; eighth graders one year and eight months above grade level; and eleventh graders eight months above.

Receives Music Award

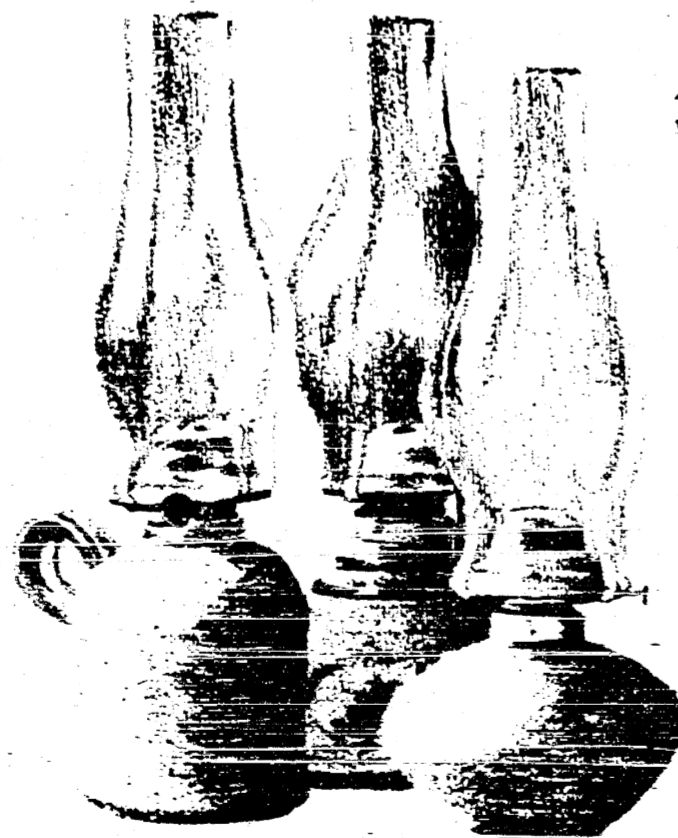
Clayton G. Parr, an Albion College May graduate from Manchester, received this year's Stephen Wheeler Choir Cup for Men awarded by the music department.

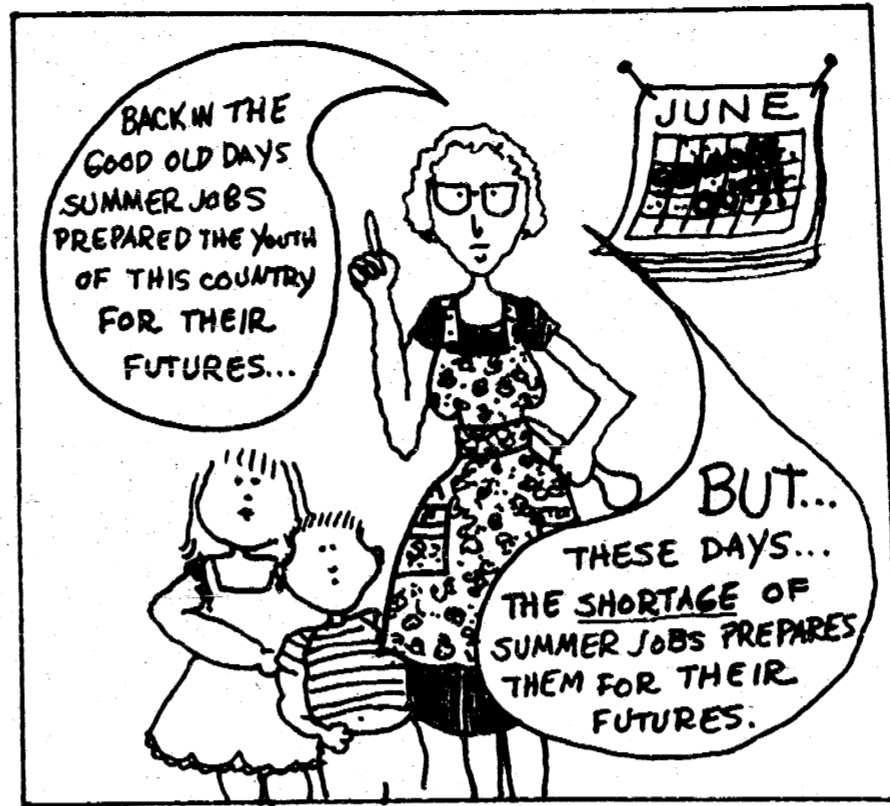

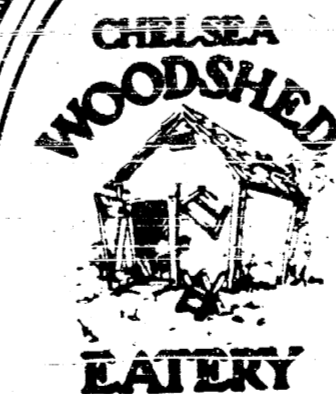

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Hall Of Honor Inductee



The man who developed the nation's first systematic road-marking system, the state highway commissioner who directed construction of the famed Detroit Industrial and Willow Run expressways in World War II and two leading county highway engineers were inducted Wednesday (May 14) in the Michigan Transportation Hall of Honor. They are: the late William B. Bachman Sr., G. Donald Kennedy, James M. Davey and the late Frank K. "Tex" Evans.

James M. Davey, a former resident of Manchester, now living in Honolulu, Hawaii, served from 1948 to 1975 with the Board of Wayne County Road Commissioners, most of the time as commission director and manager of Detroit Metropolitan Wayne County Airport. The commission's programs in various public service areas—roads, airports, parks and sew-

age treatment—expanded greatly under his leadership. As an attorney, he co-authored Michigan's basic highway law, Act 51 of 1961, and much important aeronautics legislation as well.

Davey served as president of numerous organizations, including the American Public Works Association, the County Road Association of Michigan, Airport Operators Council-International and the Transportation Institute. He is now executive director of the Honolulu Airlines Committee, an organization of airlines serving Hawaii.

The four Hall of Honor members join 36 others elected previously by an all-industry committee to the Hall of Honor. It is a permanent facility in the State Transportation Building, established in 1971 to recognize some of the individuals who made outstanding contributions to the development of Michigan's transportation systems.

Riad Yammine, marketing operations manager for Marathon Oil Co., Findlay, Ohio, was the main speaker at the ceremony. He talked about "Energy and Transportation's Future".

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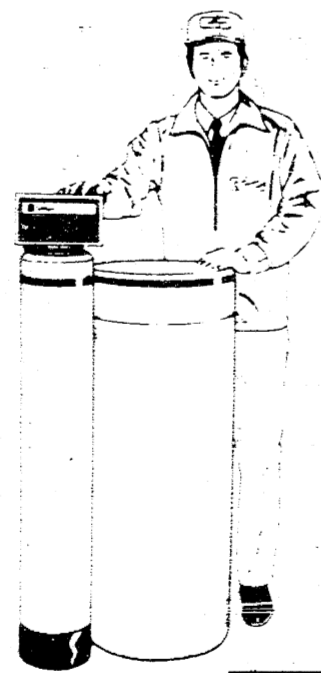
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CONGRATULATIONS, YOU'VE PAID OFF UNCLE SAM

grade the average grammar score is over one year above grade level. This trend is also true for grades six, eight, and eleven.

Math scores too report averages which are all above grade level. Especially notable are the scores reported for the eighth grade. The average eighth grader demonstrated math skills almost 2.5 years above grade level.

"Sometimes its easy to get discouraged and begin to feel that the Manchester School District is the only one with problems," says Thompson. "We need to keep in mind that not only are we not the only district with problems but that

overall we're doing a pretty good job. I've worked in many school districts in the last twenty years, this is the first time I've seen students continue to read better and better the longer they're in school. I think that perhaps Manchester teachers have borne some of the community frustrations in the past. These test data leave no question that our teachers are getting the job done in the classroom where it really counts."

HIT OR MISS by farley

Television is again being investigated, and seems to end up being somewhat of a villain for our youngsters.

Research, they say proves that Michael flips on the television as he pours his breakfast cereal and it's on after school until bedtime. Weekends are launched with a five hour blitz of cartoons. By the time he is twelve he will have logged more than 12,000 hours of television. It is estimated that one out of five school children now watch more than 40 hours a week and that their number is increasing, say researchers at the U of M.

Concerns about children and television have been rampant since television was introduced thirty years ago say the professors. Does it keep them from more worthwhile activities? Does it make them passive and dull witted? Does it turn them toward a life of crime and violence?

Many researchers however, say that television enlarges a child's views of world culture, increases their vocabularies and teaches them about world events.

And so the debate continues but to date, hundreds of studies produce more evidence of its detriments than of its benefits.

When children spend as much as five or six hours a day watching television they must be missing something else. Comic books, radios and movies are even neglected. Outdoor play seems to decline and other organized activities are somewhat neglected.

An experiment was made in leisure habits of eight to twelve year olds in three Australian towns: one with no television, one with one channel introduced a year ago and one having had two channels for the past five years.

Television at first is very disruptive but it soon ceases to have its novelty effect and many of them go back to their former activities. The children soon spend more time outside the home with their friends.
