South-East Asian Family En Route

Mary Kirk, chairperson of Manchester's Refugee Resettlement Project, has received word from the Lansing Office of Indo-Chinese Refugee Services that a family of five people has been assigned to Manchester Church Women United, the local sponsoring agent.

Resettlement Project volunteers have thus far included Church Women United; the pastors and many church members of Bethel, Emanuel, St. Mary's, Sharon Methodist and the United Methodist Churches; business people; townspeople; and representatives of several local organizations. This broadly-based group hopes that all Manchester-area residents will feel a part of this project, and help to welcome and resettle this homeless family.

Mr. Pham Van Nhon, his wife, their two sons ages 2 and 4, and their 17-year-old nephew are expected to arrive in Manchester within the next two months. Both Mr. Pham Van Nhon and his wife were teachers in their native country, and both speak some English.

They will be arriving at Lansing Airport, where they will be met by relatives who presently live in Lansing, as well as by some representatives of the Manchester Resettlement Project.

The Resettlement Committee's first priority now is to find a home for the family. A 2 or 3 bedroom house, or apartment, is needed. Anyone knowing of appropriate available housing is asked to call Claire Reck at 428-8852, or Elvira Vogel at 428-8436.

Some household goods are still needed, too. Especially wanted are a kitchen or dining table and chairs, and several chests of drawers. Donations of kitchen items and linens would also be appreciated.

Mary Munson and Mildred Gunther are in charge of collecting clothing and toys for the little boys of the family. Anyone who can donate such items should call Mrs. Munson at 428-8885.

Also needed, of course, are cash donations to help meet the family's immediate financial needs. Checks should be made payable to "Church Women United" and designated for The Refugee Resettlement Project. Donations can be made at any area bank, or in care of Mary Sue Moore, Financial Chairperson of the project.

School Board Minutes
 June 16, 1980

The meeting was called to order at 8:00 P.M. by the President Mr. William Bunney in the High School Library.

Board Members present: William Bunney, Paul DuFresne, George Macomber, Earl Horning, Harold Walkowe. Absent: None.

Before beginning the meeting, Mr. Macomber requested he be allowed to say a prayer inasmuch as it was his last board meeting. Pres. Bunney and all members of the board were in agreement. Mr. Macomber opened the meeting with a prayer.

Mr. Bunney requested that F, G, & H be added to the agenda under New Business.

F - Post Approval of Checks; G - Grievance Committee; H - Organizational Meeting date to be set. Mr. Walkowe so moved items F, G, & H be added to the agenda. Supported by Mr. Macomber. Vote: Ayes: Mr. Macomber, Mr. DuFresne, Mr. Horning, Mr. Walkowe, Mr. Bunney. Nays: None - motion carried.

Communications: Secretary DuFresne indicated there were none other than the communications presented in the board package. #1 - from Gross & Ludwig, Certified Public Accounts for the District to confirm the understanding of arrangements for the audit with the district. The

accountants were appointed at the organizational meeting in July, 1979. # 2 - Communication from Lenawee Intermediate School District written on behalf of the Walkowaw & Lenawee ISD Boards to request the Clinton and Manchester Boards of Education to suggest possible solutions to the property transfer requests between the school districts. A lengthy discussion was held between the board and various citizens of the community. # 3-Communication was from the County Clerks Office rejecting our request for an alternate election date. Supt. Thompson advised the Board as of this time we do not have an alternate official election date. Pres. Bunney addressed the board to look over the communication received from Lenawee School District regarding property transfers will be placed on some future agenda for consideration, or as the last sentence of the letter read, "Any input from the Clinton and Manchester Boards of Education would be most helpful."

Visitor Input: Pres. Bunney asked if anyone would like to address the board concerning agenda items? Mr. Richard Fabey and wife addressed the board in reference to expressing their concern over the proposed property transfer without proper notification from the Manchester Community Schools to the Clinton School District. They were informed by the Board and by Supt. Thompson that no property transfer would take place without their knowledge.

Sue Bond spoke to the Board representing the Steering Committee of the PTO - Klager School. They are concerned that since the millage defeat cuts will be made into the elementary level.

John Korican spoke in behalf of Marian Kime and the benefit party being held for her on June 20.

Minutes of the May 19, 1980 Regular Meeting: Mr. Horning made the motion to accept the minutes - Supported by Mr. Walkowe. Vote: Ayes: Bunney, DuFresne, Macomber, Horning, Walkowe, Nays: None. Motion carried.

Financial Report: Read by Mr. John McGuire: Balance April 30, 1980 \$534,470.43, May Receipts \$33,424.21; May disbursements \$257,644.17 Balance as of May 31, 1980, \$310,250.47. Moved by Mr. DuFresne to accept the Financial Report as read - Supported by Mr. Walkowe. Vote: Ayes: Bunney, DuFresne, Macomber, Horning, Walkowe, Nays: None - Motion carried.

Bills Payable: Read by John McGuire, Bills payable \$405,069.73 June Checks

\$57,674.93 total of \$462,744.66. Mr. Horning made the motion to accept Bills Payable as read - Supported by Mr. Walkowe. Vote: Ayes: Walkowe, Macomber, DuFresne, Horning, Bunney. Nays: None - Motion Carried.

Discussions Items: Superintendent Thompson explained the California Achievement Test Data (CAT). Generally speaking the CAT is a norm referenced instrument which measures student learning in several basic skill areas. Basic skills which are measured are reading vocabulary, reading comprehension, spelling, language mechanics, language expression, math computation, math concepts and applications and reference skills. In reviewing the data the Manchester students scored at or above grade level on every skill tested at each grade level.

Second discussion item: The proposed graduation policy developed by Superintendent Thompson and Mr. Kappler was reviewed. The policy was discussed at length and was tabled to be placed on the July agenda for further review.

Third Discussion Item: The Agricultural Program Placement. Recommendation was made by Supt. Thompson that we retain the Ag program in Manchester rather than send it to Saline. The program would add approximately \$10,000 to the expenses of the district. A discussion continued among the Board members. No proposal was made at this time due to the fact the vote would come up later on the agenda under New Business.

Fourth Discussion Item: Special Millage Election. Supt. Thompson reviewed with the Board the fact that the initial request for an alternative election date was rejected. Mr. Horning proposed August 11 for the special millage election with an alternate date of August 18 or as soon as possible excluding August 12. Supported by Mr. Walkowe - Vote: Ayes: Horning, Walkowe, DuFresne, Bunney. Nays: Macomber - Motion Carried.

Mr. Bunney directed the superintendent to have as much data as possible regarding the financial structure of the district for the Organizational meeting on July 7th. Trustees were encouraged to request any specific information they felt they might need.

Superintendent Thompson advised the Board of our Transportation problem. Mr. Benedict is ill again and will soon be scheduled for an operation and Dr. Thompson would like to find some type of substitute solution until Mr. Benedict is able to report to us of his condition and future work ability. Mr. McGuire ex-

plained to the Board the summer maintenance of the fleet of buses is going to have to be done and that is a full time all summer job. The decision comes to two alternatives, we either get a sub or sublet the work. The decision was made to run an ad in the paper for an experienced mechanic on a temporary basis.

Superintendent Thompson read the names of the teachers who were to be transferred within the schools. They are as follows: Marge Scully to Klager Title I; Yvonne Henry to Klager 1st grade; Theodora Groeb to Klager Kindergarten; Melinda Trout to High School Art; Steve Halchishak to H.S. Phys Ed; Wes Gall to Middle 8th Grade; Mary Kuyda to Klager 4th Grade.

Old Business: Mr. DuFresne made the motion to accept the recommendation of the S. Halchishak Grievance Subcommittee (3-80) denying the grievance. Supported by Mr. Horning. Vote: Ayes: DuFresne, Macomber, Walkowe, Horning, Bunney. Nays: None - Carried.

Moved by Mr. Horning. Supported by Macomber to pay D. Smith Mileage as per the subcommittee recommendation. Vote: Ayes: DuFresne, Macomber, Walkowe, Horning, Bunney. Nays: None - Carried.

New Business: (A) Teacher Recall: Motion made by Horning, supported by Macomber to recall Karen Ellsworth. Mrs. Ellsworth has requested and been approved for a parental leave for 1980-81 school year. She will be recalled and assigned to leave status. Vote: Ayes: DuFresne, Macomber, Horning, Walkowe, Bunney. Nays: None - Motion Carried.

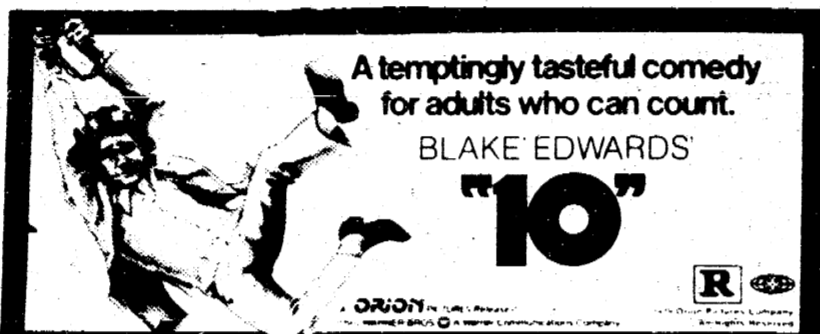

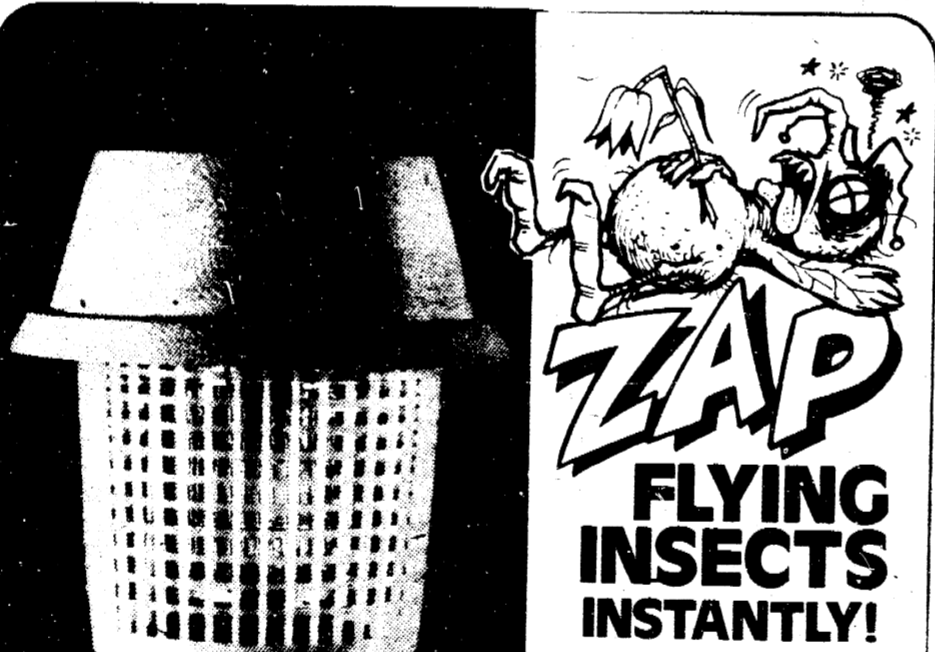

June 16, 1980

Council met in regular session with the meeting called to order by President Schaffer at 7:00 P.M. Present were: Hinkley, Koebbe, Minick, Reed, Daniels and Zsenyuk.

Minutes of the June 2, 1980 meeting were read, corrected and approved in a motion by Hinkley, supported by Minick. All yeas, motion carried.

Public Works as reported by Koebbe included: The water pond on Riverside Dr. was pumped out twice because of heavy rains. Washtenaw County Road Commission was called in to help. The county engineer will look at the pond to see what can be done; The Chapin home on Riverside Dr. had problems with water seeping into their basement. W. Chapin asked what could be done. At this point we don't have any overflows to take the run off; Village lawns have been mowed as weather permitted; Two graves were dug at Oak Grove Cemetery; Mailed Mr. S. Robert Scott his final filling (which included the second quarter) on his apartments on June 12, 1980; Past due notices will be mailed on June 20th, turn off date will be July 2, 1980; Water meters are scheduled to be read the week of June 23, for this quarter; The back stop at Carr Park is being completely rebuilt. Request was made to install a post fence near the bathrooms to keep people from parking on the grass; On June 11, 1980 Daniels met

with Thomas Knueve and Terry Walkington at the Wastewater Treatment Plant and they checked our plant facilities. A meeting was held later at McNamee, Porter and Seeley offices to answer any questions that Mr. Walkington had. One question the Village will need to answer is septage program: Checked with Robinson Asphalt Co. concerning the repairs on the streets that were layed last summer and was told they would start on it sometime in the last part of July.

It was moved by Koebbe, supported by Reed and unanimously carried the following resolution be adopted: Resolved that the Village decide not to include a septage program in their Sewage Facility Plant.

Village Council approved the request of installing the post fence at Carr Park. The 1980 Final Budget Hearing for the Village of Manchester was held to accept the following decisions made in a motion by Reed, supported by Koebbe. All yeas, motion carried. General Fund Millage .0094 \$172,709.96. General Highway .0035 \$64,306.90. Bridge Bond .008 \$14,698.72. Sewer & Water .0013 \$23,885.42. Total .0150 \$275,601.00.

Chief Zsenyuk reported Mr. Douglas Parr had requested permission for the Jaycees to hold a 4th of July Parade plus Fireworks at Carr Park in the evening. Moved by Minick, supported by Hinkley permission be granted to the Jaycees to hold a 4th of July Parade, plus Fireworks. All yeas, carried.

Moved by Minick, supported by Koebbe to authorize Chief Zsenyuk to proceed with purchase of a new police car from Chrysler Corp. to replace the one which was wrecked with no added cost to the Village after receiving payment from Insurance Co.

Chief Zsenyuk reported the Art Fair had requested the closing of Adrian St. to Duncan St., in addition to the closing of Main St. from M-52 to Clinton, plus additional parking for exhibitors. He has asked the Art Fair to come before Council with the request.

Hinkley presented the unapproved minutes of the Manchester Village Planning Commission for review. He also reported he had made tentative plans to meet with Norman Walz, Contractor this week on the remodeling of the lower level of the Village Hall.

Permission was granted the Girl Scouts to hold a Girl Scout Day Camp at Carr Park July 8, thru July 11.

Correspondence was received from Gisting & Gisting, Village Attorneys and Glen Lehr, Village Health Officer and placed on file.

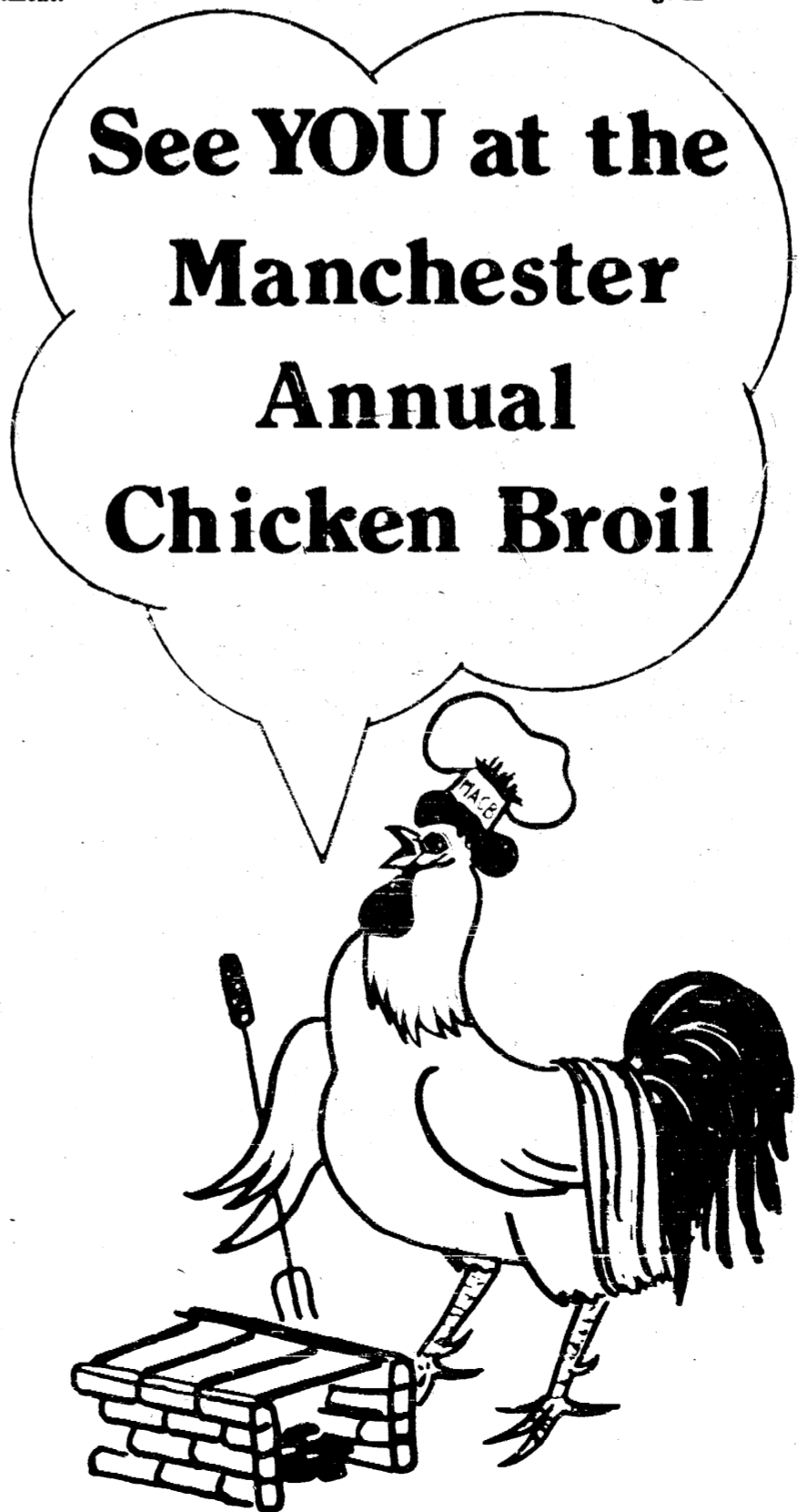
