HIT OR MISS by farley

Columnist Eileen Kelley, a rather well known columnist recently devoted an entire column to sentimental discussion of her pots and pans. Not a very sentimental subject at first glance but understandable when she told of trying to dispose of them and replace them with shiny new ones. Each one of the old residents she found, had a sentimental value. Most of them it seems, she inherited from her mother with a few dating back to her grandmother's day.

When I thought about it a bit her reminiscences struck a sympathetic chord and they brought back memories of my collection of like utensils.

There is the huge cast iron skillet in which have been fried generations of pancakes and bacon, of steaks-when even us poor people ate steak now and then, of omelets and the many other goodies that mother produced with its help, and I'll wager that they all tasted better than those produced in the modern-day equipment.

Then too, we have a nest of three triangular kettles that she tells about. Ours were a part of the equipment belonging to the "fireless cooker" that for many years stood in the corner of the kitchen and which was in almost daily use for with it one could save a tidy sum producing most any type of delicious food, cooked just right with no loss of texture or flavor.

If you don't remember how one worked let us enlighten you. The square metal container stood some three feet across and some four feet high. In it surrounded by some eight inches of insulation was a round well about three feet deep into which fit nicely a variety of kettles of various sizes in which to cook or bake most anything. In connection with these were two discs of soapstone which fit the well and were a good two inches thick. These were heated for stipulated periods of time on the cookstove or gas range and then one was deposited, with a book which fit an eye in the stone, on the bottom of the well. The various products

Deadline For Mechanic Tests

Secretary of State Richard H. Austin reminded all Michigan motor vehicle mechanics of the August 26 deadline to apply to take the October state mechanic certification tests.

The tests will be given simultaneously at 26 statewide locations on four Saturdays - October 4, October 11, October 18 and October 25.

According to Austin, Michigan's Motor Vehicle Service and Repair Act now requires every repair facility to employ at least one state-certified mechanic in categories of major repair offered by the facility. Effective January 1, 1981 however, the Act will require all mechanics doing any major repair work to be certified.

The October tests may be the last opportunity to qualify for certification before the new requirement become effective on January 1, Austin said.

Mechanics wishing to take October tests may obtain registration forms from the Michigan Department of State, Bureau of Automotive Regulation, Lansing, Mich. 48918. Forms are also available at all Department of State branch offices and most Michigan Employment Security Commission offices. For further information call (517) 873-9460 in Lansing.

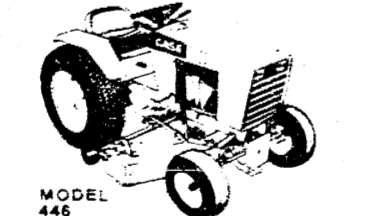

could be heated somewhat and taken to bed to take off the chill from the unheated bedroom for in those days one did not waste fuel heating a sleeping room and besides we were told that sleeping in a heated room was bad for one. So you undressed near the register in the living room or in some homes behind the hard coal heating stove in the living room then dashed madly into the bedroom, jumped into bed beneath the pile of blankets and quills and shivered until your body warmth, sometimes assisted by the soapstone, made life bearable again.

We too had a kettle whose bottom was bent out of flatness from having many, many portions of potatoes mashed therein and every time we looked at these dents we remembered the many holiday feasts that the whole family enjoyed in those days of yore with the many relatives present that have long ago disappeared from this world.

Instant mashed potatoes were, of course, unheard of as were instant rolled oats and other instants. Oats were a breakfast staple but most of them were steel cut oats, and then there was also corn meal mush and the usual method of preparation was to cook them for quite a while on the cook stove and then often-times put them in their kettle, and the mush, overnight in a cool place and then

the next morning slice and fry them, and they were very good that way, especially if they were browned and crisp around the edges of the slices.

Then too, as I remember it, the coffee was ground fresh from the bean every morning in the hand powered grinder attached to the kitchen wall and it was made in the old fashioned pot by boiling it. It had strength and character when made that way, especially when clarified with the white of an egg to clarify and settle it. When it was left to simmer on the back of the range, in time it became powered with the strength of its convictions and then I think was when coffee gained its reputation for keeping one awake for after a cup or two you found that it was strong enough to do just that.

And then too from this range came those baked goods that mother and grandma produced from an oven of the range that didn't even boast a thermometer but from which she produced those wonderful tasty bread and rolls and pies and cookies and now and then a fluff cake without all the modern gadgets hit even a temperature regulator.

After thinking about all these tamer items may I be excused to go rattle up a little snack and a cup of characterless coffee?

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Reduction In Fatalities

Sheriff Thomas R. Minick reported a 50% reduction in automobile fatalities in Washtenaw County so far this year to date. Twenty (20) persons have lost their lives this year as compared to forty (40) last year at this time. There have been seventeen (17) actual fatal collisions in 1980, dramatically down from thirty-five (35) fatal collisions occurring at this same time in 1979.

Sheriff Minick attributes the reduction to increasingly effective deployment patterns of law enforcement traffic personnel combined with a concerted effort on behalf of all law enforcement agencies in the county to remove the serious traffic violators from public roadways. The Sheriff also acknowledged the driving population's increasingly responsible attitude toward maintaining safe driving habits such as utilizing seat-belts and defensive driving practices as reasons for the overall reduction in motor vehicle accidents.

Sheriff Minick further noted that Washtenaw County Sheriff Department's traffic and safety presentations have been successful in promoting an aura of community awareness contributing to the public's safe driving practices. Sheriff Minick encouraged inquiries regarding community safety program presentations; interested groups are asked to contact Sgt. Carl Rinna at 971-8400 extension 577.

Local Buyers Support 4-H Sale

The 4-H Livestock Sale, held at the annual Washtenaw County 4-H Youth Show, received excellent support from the Manchester area.

Over 29 tons of livestock were sold; \$56,370.75 in proceeds to the 4-H members. John Bihlmeyer of Green Acres Dairy Farms paid \$1,786.20 for a pen of rabbits, 2 hogs, a lamb, and a steer. A steer, 2 hogs, and the Champion Pair of Lambs were purchased for \$1,502.75 by G.E. Wacker, Inc.

The Bridgewater Lumber Company paid \$1,102.45 for a steer and 2 lambs. The Champion Pen of Rabbits, 2 hogs, and 2 lambs were purchased for \$962.60 by E.G. Mann & Sons. The Michigan Livestock Exchange expended \$5,488.40 in purchasing 3 steers, and 2 hogs and adding to the original selling price of 8 lambs to assure each lamb exhibitor of receiving a minimum of \$1.20 a pound. Stan Post provided free trucking of livestock for the buyers.

The average prices paid at the sale were \$60.00 per pen of rabbits, \$1.20/lb. for lambs, \$1.07/lb. for hogs, and 86c/lb. for steers.

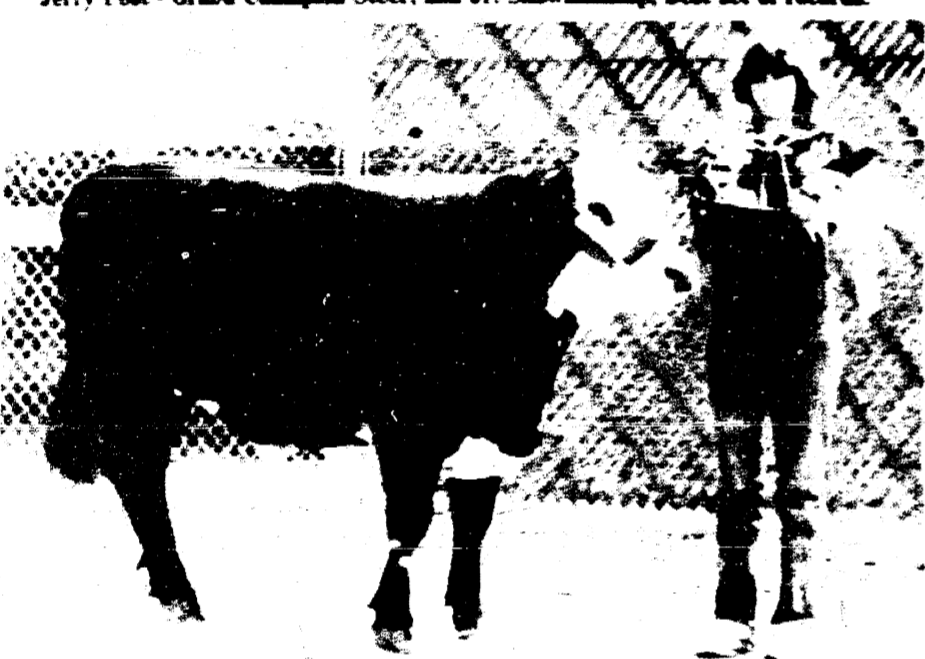

LETTERS TO THE EDITOR

Open Letter To The Citizens Of Manchester:

On August 18 from a total of 1,015 people (fewer voters than in the May election) 779 and 566 voted down Propositions II and III at the special school board election. For a matter of a few extra dollars a month, the voters totally destroyed the extra curricular programs of our school system which they have provided for many years.

What really astounded and frustrates me is the fact that many parents of children previously enrolled in the band program or active in sports, failed to show up at the polls and vote one way or the other! Where were these people when they had an opportunity to decide what will happen to the day-to-day quality of life for their children? They may have been responsible for the out-come of the vote by their absence.

The community of Manchester has re-

lied on their school system for much of their entertainment and culture. Who provides the music and floats at the fair parade? The students of course. Who provides the area sports fans with an opportunity to cheer for a team? Not the Detroit Lions! I could list many more examples.

So, Citizens of Manchester, we have challenges. First, we must restore the opportunities for cultural, physical and social growth and development, of the youth of our community, if not through our schools, than through other means. The Manchester Art Guild, the Optimist Club essay contest and sports contests are a few, but only a beginning and clearly not enough.

Another challenge is to encourage education leaders and legislators to devise methods of financing our schools in a manner that does not penalize or cause undue sacrifice to segments of the community such as farmers and people with fixed incomes and senior citizens.

We must restore the faith of youth in all of us. I refuse to accept the premise of "the good old days" as a valid stand. I live in 1980 and look to the future. You may call this a cliché, but I call it fact - the youth of today are the leaders of tomorrow. So let's get busy and show our youth that we truly do care. Let's face and meet the challenges before us - parents, grandparents, newly-weds, singles, senior citizens, professionals, farmers, clergy, government officials, students, laborers, union members, retirees, homemakers - all of us. It's our civic duty.

Soil Conservation District Plans Fall Tree Sale

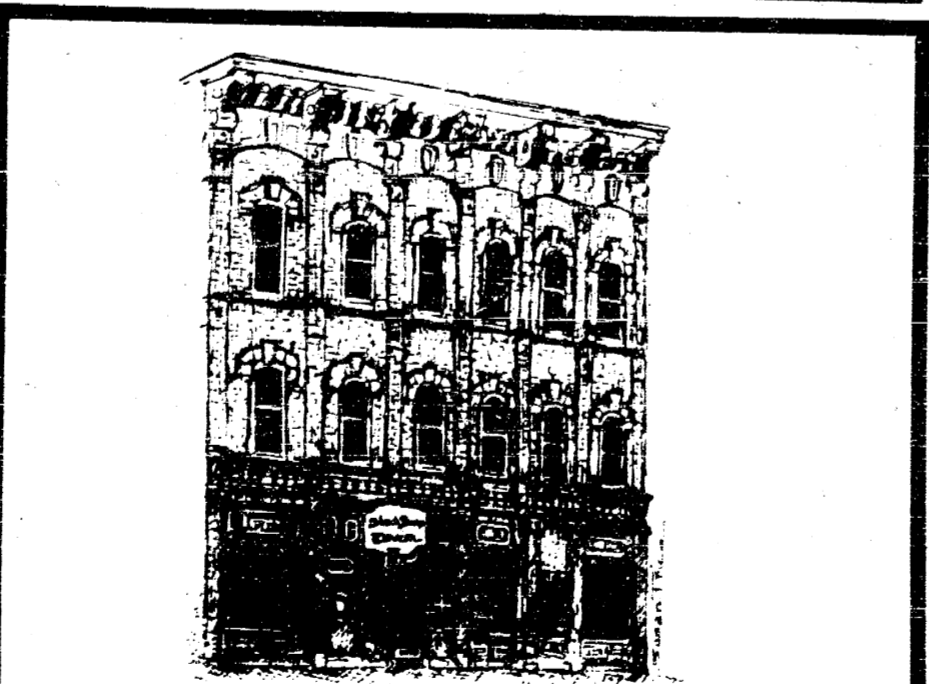

Start Of New School Year - Just Around The Corner

Labor Day-that special day honoring the American worker-also has a special meaning for most American school children.

Many children become excited and anxious this time of year because the Labor Day weekend signals the beginning of a new adventure, a time when they will meet new friends and learn new things.

The Tuesday after Labor Day marks the first day of school in most communities.

An estimated 1,860,000 children are expected to enroll in Michigan's nearly 3,800 public schools this fall, the State Board of Education reports.

State Superintendent of Public Instruction Phillip E. Runkel asks motorists to remember to drive with extra care and caution when school begins.

Runkel said about 14,000 yellow school buses will be taking to the roads again and that Michigan traffic laws require drivers to stop when a school bus has its alternating flashing red lights on.

About one million students-more than half the children and youth in Michigan's public schools-will ride school buses this year.

Last year school buses transported about 400 million passengers more than 180 million miles.

It costs an average of 60 cents a day to transport a student to and from school.

The cost has remained stable for the last two years because districts have eliminated duplications in routes and improved bus maintenance.

All school districts have trimmed transportation and other operating costs because of the state's serious economic problems.

Costs are expected to be reduced further during the 1980-81 school year because the state's budget is expected to provide less funds for education than last year.

"School districts throughout Michigan will be experiencing serious reductions in state school aid during the 1980-81 school year," Runkel said.

"Parents, students, teachers, administrators, private citizens and representatives of business and labor must work together to meet the challenges of the 80's as we move down the tight financial road ahead," Runkel said.

While elementary and secondary en-

rollments continue to decline because of the lower birth rate, the dire economic conditions are boosting college and university enrollments. The pool of college-age persons is continuing to furnish because of the poor state of the economy. Enrollments in the state's colleges and universities are expected to reach an all-time high of 631,950 this fall, Runkel said. The breakdown is:

-Public four-year colleges and universities, 244,500.

-Public two-year colleges, 211,550.

-Private colleges and universities, 65,900.

HIT OR MISS by farley

The third week in August marked the sixtieth anniversary of radio broadcasting - sixty years since WWJ in Detroit began a regular schedule for each day. In noting this fact a friend asked me just what effect I thought radio and television had had on our lives - what it had changed.

It would be easier to note what they had not changed than what they had. When one looks back on these sixty years it seems that most everything has changed. Our friend asked "Just what was life like without radio and TV anyhow?" And that question turned back the pages of memory to the days just after the close of World War I.

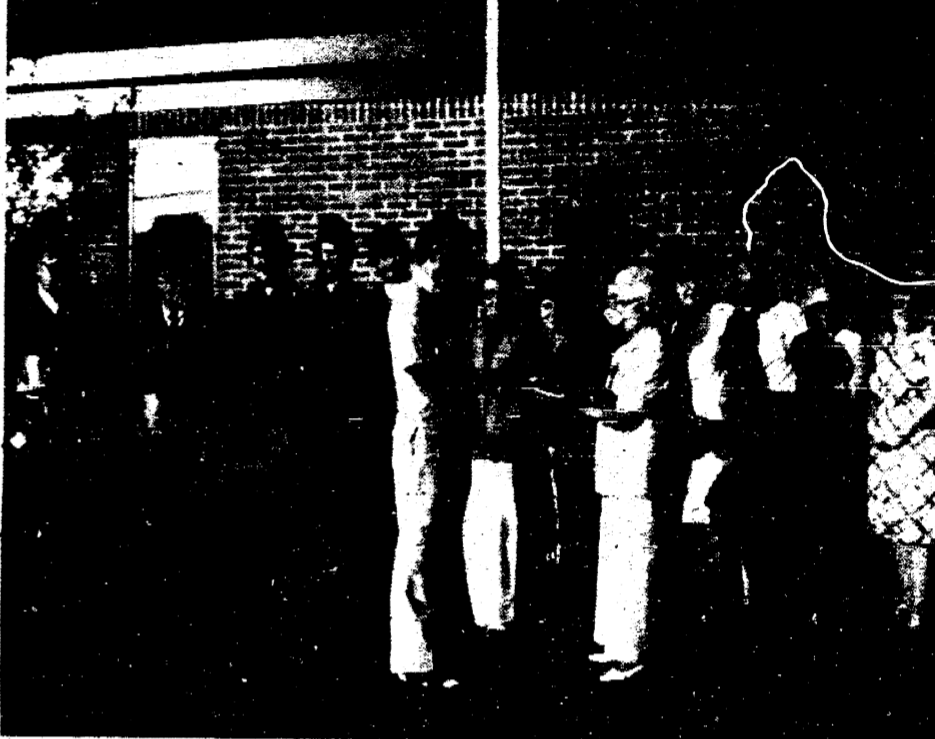
As I remember it, life was good in those days but perhaps a bit simpler. I don't remember that we had nor wanted as much or as many things as we hanker for nowadays. I was in my early teens and life seemed a bit slower then than now but our days were just as enjoyable - perhaps more so, and as we remembered those days we tried to put into perspective our memories of the days that now are remembered as the beginning of what is popularly called the "Roaring twenties".

Radio began to be an important part of our life at the beginning of that period, and as rapidly as later did television, it sneaked up on us and soon became important in many ways.

I remember our first radio. It was a metal box from Crosley with three tuning knobs besides the volume control which had to be balanced against each other to properly tune in a station. The power came from a six-volt storage battery which sat on the floor near the set and
