LETTERS TO THE EDITOR



The Editor Manchester Enterprise

It was Tuesday, August 19th when an out of town visitor asked me to describe what kind of a town Manchester was. I responded as follows:

"It's the kind of a town that can put on an annual Chicken Broil and turn out over 12,000 people, put on an annual Fair with thousands of visitors and hundreds of exhibitors and workers but can't find it in its heart to support its schools."

"It's the kind of town where a farmer will step off his \$75,000 tractor at noon on a beautiful day in August, drive to town and vote not to give his offspring the benefit of a school bond, a yearbook, a school dance or a sports program."

"It's the kind of a town where a young man who has spent his summer evenings playing softball on a school owned facility

provided at no cost to him will leave a beer parlor at 7:00 p.m. to vote not to give his nephews and nieces the benefit of a drama program, an Opera or the National Honor Society."

It's the kind of a town where an esteemed member of the Fair Board, the same Fair Board that has been using the school owned property for years at no cost, will laughingly remark about voting not to provide his offspring the opportunity to share the experience of competitive sports, the opportunity to sing in a Chorus or participate in Student Council."

It's the kind of a town where the school has given far more to the community than the community is willing to give to the school."

My out of town visitor sat speechless in front of me in complete disbelief. On Friday, August 22nd another out of town visitor asked me the same question - what kind of a town is Manchester and my response was as follows:

"It's the kind of a town where some people care a great deal about their children and grandchildren."

"It's the kind of a town where a farmer will rise early to work in his fields so that he will have time later in the day to raise funds so that the young people of the community will have the opportunity to experience competitive sports."

"It's the kind of a town where a group of interested people will raise funds so that the junior and senior high school boys and girls might have the opportunity to play in a band and learn the joys of music."

"It's the kind of a town where a basketball coach will offer to coach young men at no salary so that they might experience the thrill of competitive sports."

"It's the kind of a town where hundreds of Mothers and Fathers will volunteer their time and their money so that the young people of the community can participate in music and in sports."

"It's the kind of a town where the depth and intensity of the feeling of some for their children can offset the shallow and negative feeling of others for their children."

I thank God that I live in a community where there are some people that can look in a mirror and be proud of the reflection that they see."

Hot Lunch Schedule And Changes

The Hot Lunch Program will follow basically the same schedule as last year. The Hot Lunch Program will begin Thursday, September 4th. Students should bring a lunch on Wednesday, September 3. Klager - 1st Lunch 11:55 - 12:40; 2nd lunch 12:30 - 1:15. Pleasant Lake - 12:00 - 12:40. Middle School - 1st Lunch 12:10 - 12:45; 2nd Lunch 12:45 - 1:15. High School - 1st Lunch 11:30 - 12:00; 2nd Lunch 12:00 - 12:30.

Due to increased cost of food, supplies and personnel, food prices for the Hot Lunch Program have been raised 10c per meal to the following rates. Extracurricular Activities Returned To Schools

Following the defeat of the millage proposals two and three on Monday and the subsequent school board meeting on Tuesday, over seventy concerned parents met on Wednesday, August 20 to discuss the alternatives available. A commitment was made by those present that an unbalanced school program was unacceptable.

Subsequently, at the special school board meeting on August 21, this group of concerned parents and students pledged to raise the necessary funds to continue almost all of the extracurricular activities which were deleted, for the 1980-1981 school year. The total of required funds to be raised is about \$26,000. To demonstrate their concern and support, the first two installments of \$7,000 each are pledged for October 1 and November 1 of this year. This proposal was accepted by the board, with the understanding that a failure in the fund-raising effort would result in termination of the additional programs.

Following the board meeting pledges and checks totaling \$6,400 were donated by those present, and chairpersons were recruited for various fund-raising activities. These chairpersons, and any other interested citizens who are willing to help with the fund-raising activities, are to meet Wednesday, August 27 at Jack Kennedy's, 404 E. Main St., at 8:00 p.m. to organize a full-scale fund raising program. In addition a general meeting will be held of The Athletic Boosters on Wednesday, September 3, at 8:00 p.m. at the high school. All concerned citizens are invited to attend.

A separate account has been established for sports and other extracurricular activities to maintain and disburse the collected funds. Contributions may be earmarked for a particular activity if the donor wishes. All contributions are tax-deductible.

Citizens unite to preserve the extracurricular programs of your schools. Your help, enthusiasm, and donations are needed in order to make this program a success. If you were a YES voter on the proposals, you should be willing to contribute at least what passage of the millage would have cost you. If, for reasons of your own, you were a NO voter, your consideration of the community spirit is important. Remember, if the community were not supportive of its schools, it would probably not be a place where you would want to live. Your friends, neighbors, and family are already on the bandwagon, but we need your help to overcome the formidable task ahead. Progress on the fund-raising drive will be reported bi-weekly in the Enterprise. To Honor New Pastor

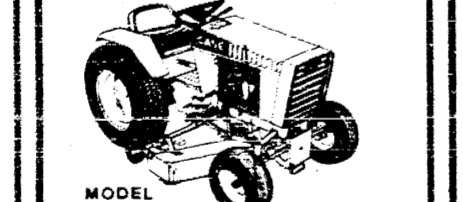

SSI Food Stamp Notice

Starting August 1, 1980, you may be able to apply for food stamps at your local Social Security Administration (SSA) Office instead of your local Department of Social Services (DSS) Office.

You can apply for food stamps at your SSA office if you and everyone who lives and eats with you are: (1) applying for Supplemental Security Income (SSI) benefits, or (2) receiving SSI Benefits. Your SSA office will send your application to your DSS office. That office will tell you, within 30 days, whether you can get food stamps. This service is intended to make it easier for you to get food stamp benefits. If you wish, you may still apply at your DSS office.

NOTE: If you are now getting food stamps, you must reapply at your DSS office when your certification period ends. If you have questions about this change, or would like more information, call your local DSS or SSA office.

Questions & Answers Michigan Education

Q. Is education in Michigan's elementary and secondary schools available free to all children?
A. Free elementary and secondary education is available to pupils in Michigan through a publicly supported school system financed by local property taxes and state aid to schools. Parents wishing to send their children to non-public schools must pay any tuition and fees charged by such schools.
Q. How do I enroll my child in school?
A. Most school districts in Michigan hold a registration day, or "kindergarten roundup" for youngsters entering school for the first time. The date for such registration is usually announced in local newspapers or could be obtained by calling your school board office. If you miss registration day, or if you have just arrived in the school district, contact your local board of education office immediately for information regarding the enrollment of your child.

Q. What proof of age and other documentation are required when registering a child for school?
A. Local school boards set their own requirements for proof of age or other documentation needed when registering children, but in most cases a birth certificate will be required. Birth certificates can be obtained from the State Department of Public Health, in the state where your child was born, by filing a written application for such certificate and paying a nominal fee.
Q. Who evaluates the experience of students who have attended school in another state or school district to determine at which grade level they should be enrolled?
A. Local schools in Michigan are authorized to determine the grade level at which a child should be placed and the subjects which each child should be taught. Local schools have the authority to set reasonable rules regarding the management of the schools, and have total control over grades and report cards.
Q. Must my child have a physical examination prior to school entry?
A. While state law does not require a physical examination, many schools require that children undergo physical examinations before entering school for the first time.
Q. State law does require all children enrolling in Michigan schools for the first time to submit either a statement signed by a physician that the child has been immunized against childhood diseases; a statement signed by a parent or guardian that a child has not been immunized because of religious or other objections; or a physician's statement saying that a specific immunization is or may be detrimental to the child's health.
Q. Prior to school entry, parents or guardians of each child must also submit a statement signed by a district, county or city health department director stating that the child has passed the Department of Health preschool vision and hearing screening tests; or a statement signed by a physician or optometrist indicating that the child's eyes and ears have been examined during the preschool years. Vision and hearing tests are not required if there is a statement signed by a parent or guardian objecting to such tests because of religious convictions.
Q. Is there anything I can do to help my children when they begin school or transfer to a new school?
A. As a parent you are the most important influence in your child's life! Your positive feelings about school will help to alleviate your child's fears and anxieties. By helping your child to regard school as a challenge and a happy experience, adjustments will be made more smoothly. Parents that take an interest in their youngster's educational and social activities in school make a genuine and positive contribution to the child's development.

Q. When must a child start school in Michigan?
A. If you have a child who will be five years of age on December 1, your child is entitled to enroll in school. Your child must begin school this fall if the child will be six years of age before December 1.

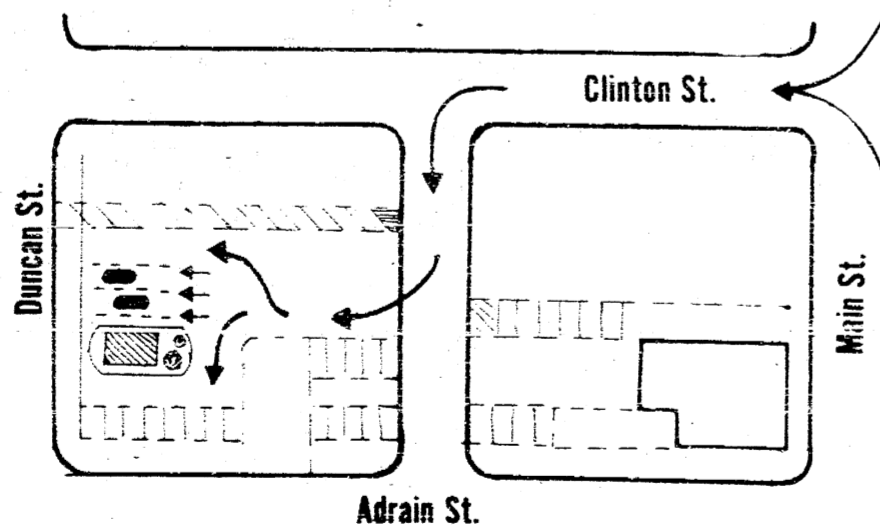

In order to receive distant stations one had to have a 50 to 75 foot reception variety in different locations. Each set too its headphones and also a speaker which was separate from the radio which usually sat atop the set but which could be moved about somewhat. During the two or three years following the advent of WWJ, KDKA, KFI and other pioneer stations who had regular programs for their programming, hunting for stations became a popular pastime among the radio bugs, and they argued about the far away reception that they had tuned in on after sitting in front of the set late at night after the local stations had signed off. If you wanted to use your prowess you could send to the radio stations and ask for a card verifying the fact that you had heard such a program from there. What did you do for entertainment? Today's youngsters. Well, the oldsters politicians discovered that those who had the ability to project their personalities or had a charismatic voice could sway the public with no other great abilities. This was the day of what is now known as the "big bands" and their rhythmic dance music became familiar to us all. They broadcast "live" from the big hotels and dance halls and Rudy Vallee, Henry Busse, Clyde McCoy, Ted Lewis, Eddie Howard and so many, many others and their individual styles became familiar to us all and when they came to our area on their one-night stands, they packed 'em in at each stop. Those were dancing days for most of us. Then too radio brought us the best of opera and classical music and we became acquainted with the ballet and game shows and a host of novelty forms of entertainment and we stayed home and listened and quit going to the occasional vaudeville or minstrel or "tab" show and radio sounded a death knell for these forms of entertainment, but radio changed and broadened and enriched our lives and made our whole country just a neighborhood and soon many of our provincial prejudices and accents had vanished and we lived in a whole new world. Radio became as much a part of our lives as eating or sleeping, and so it remained until television appeared on the scene. It's impossible, without writing a book, to tell what influence, good or bad, radio had on the generation that is now composed of the folks who are beginning to be called "gramma" and "grandpaw".
