I have read and heard many times that there were two basic kinds of the genus homo sapiens in this world of ours—day people and night people and they even have a scientific name for them. The format of the various stations is almost the same. The fellows who conduct the shows are, to their loyal fans, as well known as any famous person. Among them is Larry Glick from Boston and Jim White of St. Louis just to name a couple.

Maybe my conscience is what has been keeping me awake now and then, but whatever it is, it soothes me greatly to grab the small radio that I keep handy and listen to these fellows (there is even a member of the fair sex who emcees the show on WOWO at Fort Wayne).

The format of the programs are similar. The one in charge gives his phone number between interviews or questions from various individuals and when the listener calls they are asked to comment on a subject that has been discussed or to ask a question that requires an answer that has puzzled them, or which has been brought up by previous callers.

You're A Sportsman

You're a sportsman when:

-You respect the rights of landowners by asking permission every time you hunt, by keeping safety away from livestock and buildings, by following instructions on where to hunt, and by reporting those who break the law or damage property.

-You use a dog when hunting birds to find downed or wounded game to avoid wasting a valuable resource and to increase your enjoyment of the sport.

-You know your gun and what it can do by checking your sights before you hunt, by practicing to improve your shooting skills, and by understanding the gun's limitations, and your own.

-You match your ammunition to the game by selecting the proper bullet or shot charge, using an appropriate caliber or gauge to insure clean and humane harvesting.

-You shoot only when absolutely certain of your target to eliminate all chance of an accident, to make sure the target is in fact legal game, and to cut down on poor shooting and the loss of wounded game.

-You pick up spent shells and other litter because leaving an area better than the way you found it is a sign of thanks for the privilege of hunting and because it's just good manners.

-You clean and care for your game

property, taking only what you can use, making sure that valuable food is not wasted, avoiding unnecessary public displays of dead game, and treating game birds and animals with the respect they deserve.

-You can have a great day without taking the limit because you know the challenge of the hunt, the pleasures of life in the open, the companionship of good friends, and the simple rewards of trying to do a thing well.

-You know that just being out there is really what it's all about.

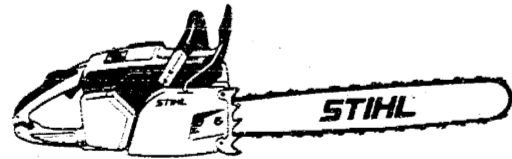

"We hope many people take this opportunity to visit the wineries and get acquainted with this expanding industry and the quality Michigan wines available," said Dean M. Pridgen, director of the Michigan Department of Agriculture.

"Our viticulture industry has taken great strides in recent years and has captured many prestigious awards. The wine industry is a definite asset to the state's agricultural economy."

Michigan's wineries developed at the close of Prohibition, when it was determined weather and soil conditions along Lake Michigan provide excellent growing conditions for wine grapes. French hybrid grapes and vinifera, classic wine grapes, have been grown increasingly in the state, enabling winemakers to produce inter-

nationally competitive wines. Fifteen wineries now sell products throughout the state and half the nation. If the word "Michigan" appears on the label, a minimum of 75 percent of the grapes must be grown here.

Free winery tours are available to visitors at many of the state's wineries year-round, seven days a week, and most have tasting rooms.

"This is an excellent time of year to visit one of the wineries. Grapes are being harvested now and visitors are able to see the grape crushing, and winemaking process," Pridgen said.

COUNCIL PROCEEDINGS

September 15, 1980

Council met in regular session with the meeting called to order at 7:00 P.M. by President Schaffer. Present were: Koebe, Minick, Petch, Reed, Zesnyuk and Smith.

Minutes of the September 8, 1980 meeting were read, corrected and approved in a motion by Reed, supported by Petch. All yeas, motion carried.

A letter was read which had been sent to Mr. & Mrs. Robert Paul concerning extended hours at the Back Door Party Store. (copy on file)

Due to severe storm damage in the Village of Manchester on July 16, 1980 it was moved by Koebe, supported by Minick to pass the following resolution: **BE IT RESOLVED BY COUNCIL OF VILLAGE OF MANCHESTER** that William Zesnyuk, Chief of Police, 120 S. Clinton, Manchester, Michigan 48158, is hereby authorized to execute for and in behalf of Village of Manchester, a public entity established under the laws of the State of Michigan this application and to file it in the appropriate State office for the purpose of obtaining certain Federal financial assistance under the Disaster Relief Act (Public Law 288, 98th Congress) or otherwise available from the President's Disaster Relief Fund. That Village of Manchester, a public entity established under the laws of the State of Michigan, hereby authorizes its agent to provide to the State and to the Federal Disaster Assistance Administration (FDAA), Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) for all matters pertaining to such Federal disaster assistance the assurances and agreements printed on the reverse side hereof. Passed and approved this 15 day of September, 1980.

Koebe reported he had called Michigan Dept. of Labor for report on alleged violations on equipment. A report will be made available.

A report was presented from the Water & Sewer Dept. concerning Circuit Boards. Smith reported Manchester Electric would be doing repair work at the Dept. of Public Works Building and transformer at landfill had been repaired. Athletic Boosters will be using Carr Park for a pig roast, lawns will be mowed and lights will be turned on.

Mr. Robert Rhee was present to question what could be done about a storm sewer near his house which causes flooding during a rain storm. Dept. of Public Works to check cause of problem.

Reed reported past due notices had been sent for Accounts Receivable. He also reported the Village Accountant is reviewing cash accounts.

Petch reported Tom Walton will grade Kirk Park. Dave Kirk will haul in dirt for fill and grade. Bart Bartel will get specifications on baseball diamonds.

It was requested that D.E. Limpert be asked to come to a Council meeting to discuss water billings.

Waterloo Area Farm Museum

The Waterloo Area Farm Museum, located three miles west of Waterloo, on 9996 Waterloo-Munich Road, is the only one of its kind in Michigan and is on the National Register of Historic Places. From Ann Arbor the museum is a delightful forty minute drive through the country to the northwest. Seventeen years ago a group of enthusiastic citizens formed the Waterloo Area Historical Society. The Society has restored and furnished a farm house and outbuildings as a tribute to the Michigan Pioneer Farmer between the years 1844 and 1866. Volunteers started the museum and now maintain it. The artifacts have been lovingly donated by area residents. For the one-time visitor the museum provides a unique look into our pioneering past. A person interested in greater involvement can guide, work on restoration, clean, or take classes in early American arts and crafts.

On the second Sunday in October the Waterloo Area Historical Society hosts a "Pioneer Day". Pioneer Day is a celebration of pioneer life and the major fund raising activity of the society. In addition to a tour of the house the visitor can talk with a soldier in the Civil War encampment. Listen to old time fiddlers, take a wagon ride, and visit with craft demonstrators. Demonstrations include: sheep shearing, spinning and natural dyeing, soapmaking, chair caning, basket making,

rug braiding, rug hooking, forge work, whitening, the preparing of asserkraut, molasses cookies, apple butter and butter. Crafts and baked goods are for sale.

By restoring the farm buildings, volunteers see, touch, and experience history. Most of the maintenance work on the farm house and outbuildings takes place during the summer months when the museum is open to the public. Volunteers gather on Monday evenings to share a potluck dinner in the farm house and then tackle whatever cleaning and restoration work needs to be done for the week. Newcomers are welcome. 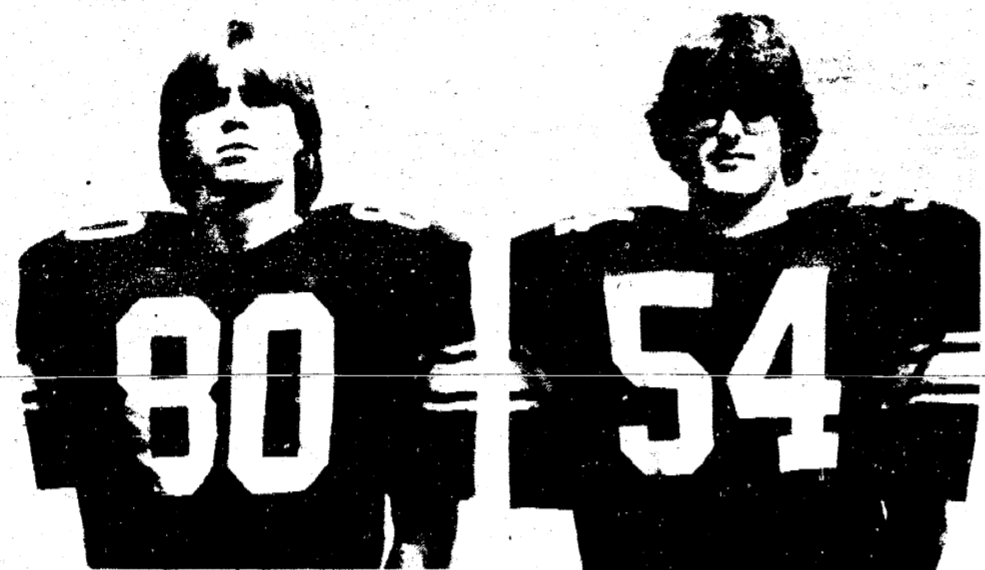
