LETTERS TO THE EDITOR

TOO MUCH FAT IN STATE GOVERNMENT TISCH TISCH TISCH

It is that time of year. He frightened the politicians in 1979. TISCH was and they considered him dead and did nothing about taxation problems until TISCH was BORN AGAIN in 1986. Now the politicians have come up with proposals A and C for our ballot along with TISCH proposal D. At least TISCH has the ability to get politicians out of their spacy and tax them accordingly to get something out of the state. Since we do not have any REPRESENTATIVES to represent us, the over paid politicians do as little as they can for the taxpayers. They understand how to keep their compensation and fringe benefits up. Michigan legislators are the second highest paid in the fifty states.

Why all the waste tactics and use of big advertising to be paid? The Governor has stopped himself, along with the legislators, from the signals on TV and radio. They are Disaster. Disastrous State Government. Unhappy Public Services. TISCH Radical State Tax Plan Devastating. May be Young and healthy. Governor Milliken is peeing and covering the cuts to push us to be getting at the fat and waste. We need to have some input in these decisions. They fear we might have a return of a little government of the people, by the people and for the people, not just for a few.

Let me ask the question: What is the State doing with all the extra money? In 1987, the State budget was about \$2 billion. If it had risen only as much as inflation, it would have gone to \$4.4 billion in 1979 but in fact it went \$4.4 billion beyond that to almost \$9 billion. Where are those \$4.4 billion beyond inflation going? TISCH says it's \$2 billion. Even state schools are not gone from \$632 million to \$1,226 million. \$613 million beyond inflation with fewer children now. Why with all our high taxes, does Michigan chronically have fiscal problems?

The Governor proposes to give us a slashed and austerity program. What services does he propose to cut? Assistance to education, mental health, police officers, closing State Parks, closing schools for the deaf and blind, Medicaid and DNR? This is to strike the public where it hurts most. Is this getting at the FAT? You look at the budget figures for MILLIKEN's tenure and to the judge for yourself. The top executives have grabbed all the extra income and used it for their programs, disregarding local needs and relief to property taxpayers. Consequently, the state budget helped out of proportion to our economy and needs. It should have never risen to such heights and for excessive inflation and expansion of our economy. Then our over-fat State Government would not have found itself in this position.

The Michigan Out of Debt report in the November, 1988 issue. The Director of the Department of Natural Resources has an assistant director for the first time and Michigan's Governor has a new advisor for environmental affairs. This represents a continuing and expanding bureaucracy. How many times has it happened in the last decade? Too much government. Who wants all the government we are paying for? The politicians that make the decisions of how to spend our money.

What does TISCH mean to our money grabbing politicians? Headline-Politicians Gang Up To Fight TISCH.

1. A cut in wasteful spending.
2. A cut in unresponsive bureaucracy.
3. TISCH means they must be accountable to us and seek approval of the voters for funds beyond a set limitation.
4. We are paying TOO MUCH to TOO MANY. The ranks of bureaucracy need to be thinned out.
5. A cut in taxes for property taxpayers.
6. Shake off the whistles and worry of our financially failing public school system.
7. This will remove the fat out of the budget and be increased without voter approval. Politicians do not want to face accountability.

The lottery funds have increased steadily but has any been used to lessen the burden of the property tax payer? No. Aid for education has been decreased and they have gone ahead and dined the use of all the extra funds. The Governor states

in his speech, if the legislature does not relieve the burdens, he will. TISCH has pushed him into this corner. He has been Governor a long time and has not previously offered any relief. Why now?

Our state officials belatedly and tentatively suddenly realize property owners have been carrying a heavy load and have had little or nothing to say on state tax increases. TISCH is not looking for a tax shift as set forth in 2 state proposals in the November 4 ballot. Voters now have a choice to make.

More will follow next week about our budget, for Government.

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THE JUDGE WHO KEEPS HIS PROMISES

In 1974, before his election, Kenneth Bronson was quoted in the *Ann Arbor News* as saying, "The biggest problem facing individuals in courts is the delay to defendants, witnesses, police and other parties involved."

Bronson's 1974 campaign statements also evoked this opinion in an *Ypsilanti Press* editorial:

"We're convinced Bronson means it when he says today's court system punishes the innocent almost as much as it punishes the guilty. He favors speedy trials and the delayed sentence approach for young and old people who make that 'one mistake'."

Five years later, under the headline "BRONSON SPEEDS THE WHEELS", the *Saline Reporter* described how Judge Bronson lengthened the work hours of his court, cut red tape and speeded up hearings so that the list of criminal jury cases awaiting trial was reduced from 114 to fewer than ten.

Other Washtenaw County newspapers have noted that Judge Bron-

son, true to his promises, has:

- Saved the taxpayers' money through prompt and speedy trials.
- Instituted the deferred sentencing program which allows first offenders, after suitable community service and rehabilitative acts, to have charges against them expunged from the court records. This has saved the careers of many people who might be barred from employment opportunities by a conviction record. (*Ypsilanti Press*, 1976)
- Created a work program as an alternative to jail sentences in selected cases. This program has also provided an alternative for those unable to pay fines and costs due to economic hardship. (*Ypsilanti Press*, 1976)

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

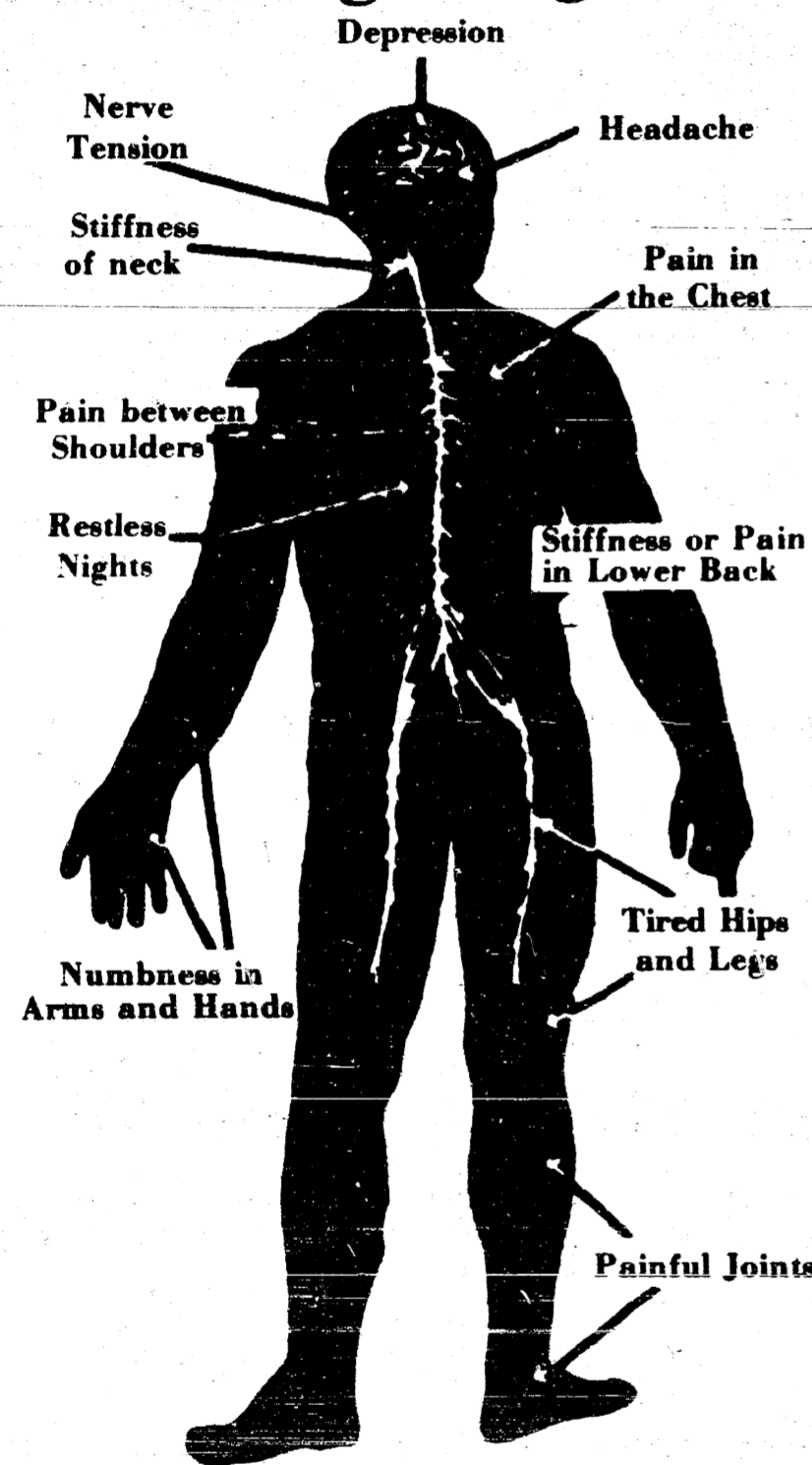
