Various Christmas projects, now underway, were discussed such as the homemade candy sale and our third annual Lunch with Santa.

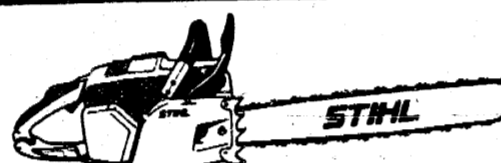

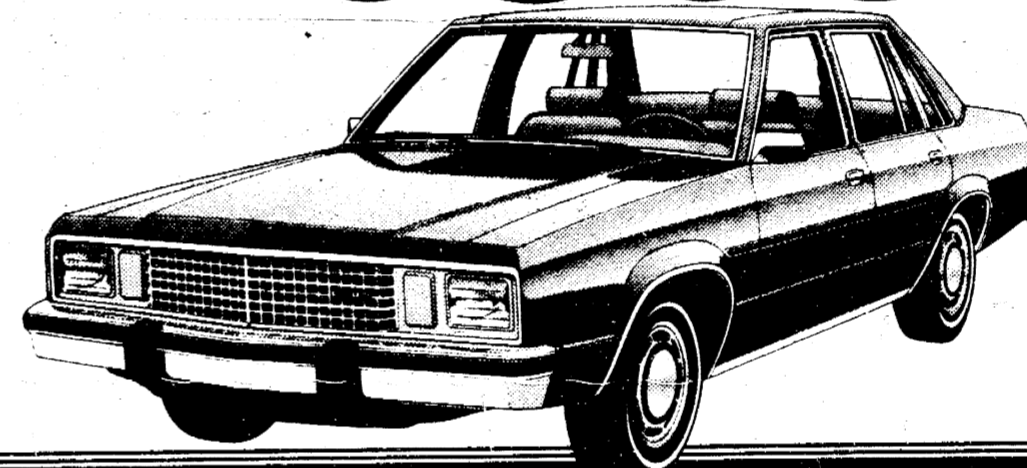

The Manchester Village Planning Com-  
mission held its October meeting on  
October 21, 1980. The meeting was called  
to order by Chairman Hinkley at 7:30 p.m.  
with the following members present:  
Hinkley, Bond, Smith, Tracy, and Gross-  
man. Also present was Claran Knauss  
Village Zoning Inspector.

Mr. Fred Barkley, from the Washtenaw  
County Metropolitan Planning Commis-  
sion, presented a report on changes that  
must be made in the Village Zoning  
Ordinance to bring it into compliance with  
Public Act 207. The following areas re-  
quire revision:

1. There is to be only one public hearing  
for zoning changes. It can be held by  
either the Planning Commission or the  
Legislative body. It was suggested that  
the Planning Commission conduct the  
hearing then make their recommendation  
to the legislative body for their enact-  
ment.

2. The category of land use called  
"Special Land Use" must now be included  
in the ordinance rather than Conditioned  
Land Uses. In order for these Special  
Land Uses to be granted it must be  
demonstrated that they are harmonious  
with conditions of 50.06 and it is necessary  
to document this. All special Uses must  
have site plan review. All property own-  
ers within 300 feet of a proposed Special  
Land Use must be notified of a public  
hearing in not less than 5 days but within  
15 days.

3. P.U.D.s must be either a separate  
district or treated as a Special Land Use.  
The village retains more control over  
development with a P.U.D. District and  
therefore this alternative was recom-  
mended.

4. Site Plan Review must now be  
required for all P.U.D.s and Special Uses.  
The State also allows communities to  
require developers to purchase security  
bonds to cover protection of natural  
resources, roadways, screening, lighting,  
etc. as demonstrated on the approved site  
plan.

5. Changes in the Board of Appeals  
must be made to make the composition of  
that body either the legislative body or 5  
appointed community members. There is  
also an option of making P.U.D. approval  
appealable to the Board of Appeals. It was  
suggested that some communities may  
prefer not to do this.

6. There can now be different classifica-  
tions of Non-Conformities with different  
guidelines. It was suggested that res-  
idential non-Conformities be differentiated  
from Commercial and Industrial. Commu-  
nities now have the option to purchase  
and demolish Non-Conformities at their  
discretion.



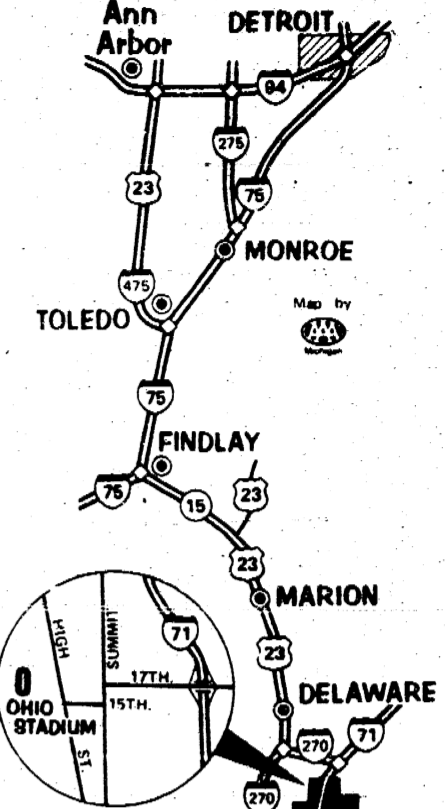

### Coffee Break News

**Dangerous Driving**—Michigan drivers are entering the peak season for deer car accidents and the number of accidents is soaring each year. In 1979 the 16,148 deer-car accidents left three people dead, 870 injured and cost \$19.2 million in damage. They took a toll on the deer too. Some 99 percent of the deer involved were killed. Precautions? Stay alert and remember, deer travel in small groups.

**Hunting Season**—About 70,000 hunters will go afield this fall to bag 110,000 to 150,000 of Michigan's herd of a million white-tail deer. The hunters will leave behind an average of \$200 to \$300 each in purchases of gas, groceries, taxes on private hunting lands, licenses, guns, ammunition and dozens of other items.

**Lake Authority**—The Michigan Department of Transportation wants a Lake Michigan Transportation Authority established to oversee future water transportation on the lake and put new life into the industry, rather than short-term subsidies for crosslake car ferry service. It's up to the Legislature now.

**Budget Woes**—Lame duck legislators face more severe budget cuts in order to balance the 1981 budget by January 1. The Governor has recommended additional budget cuts of \$288 billion, bringing the total to \$1 billion, insisting that a hike in taxes is unwise. The new round of cuts will result in the layoffs of 1000 more state employees. Hard hit are education, mental health and state police under the Governor's latest plan.

**Jobs Program**—Michigan, in the worst economic slump in 40 years, has launched a \$75 million job and training program aimed at getting 36,000 people back to work and reducing the welfare caseload demands. The U.S. Department of Labor awarded a \$10 million grant to supplement the program and target some 6,000 general assistance recipients in counties most in need of help.

### Volunteers Receive Special Thanks

November is traditionally a time of thanksgiving, and the Wolverine Council, Boy Scouts of America, wants to take the opportunity to extend a special expression of thanks to the many volunteers who make the Scouting program come alive for the youth in Monroe, Lenawee, Livingston and Washtenaw Counties.

"Our young people would not receive the many benefits of the Scouting program were it not for the continuing efforts of the 2,714 adults in our area who give unselfishly of their time and talents," said Benjamin P. Koerber, Council President. "Since its very beginnings in this country, Scouting has recognized the importance of the involvement of men and women in the activity programs of our young people."

Volunteer service takes many forms, Koerber pointed out. Many adults serve as Scoutmasters, Cubmasters, Explorer Advisors, and unit committee personnel, key leaders of the three phases of Scouting. Others serve as den leaders, guiding small groups of Cub Scouts. Many others give of their time by serving as merit badge counselors in more than 110 career and hobby fields. Supporting the units and chartered organizations are district and council committee members.

Other volunteers work to bring Scouting to handicapped or disadvantaged persons. Still others work with young men and women, helping them to explore career choices and special interests.

"We are fortunate to have volunteers who continue to believe that Scouting gives our young people a strong foundation on which to build their lives as responsible citizens," Koerber said.

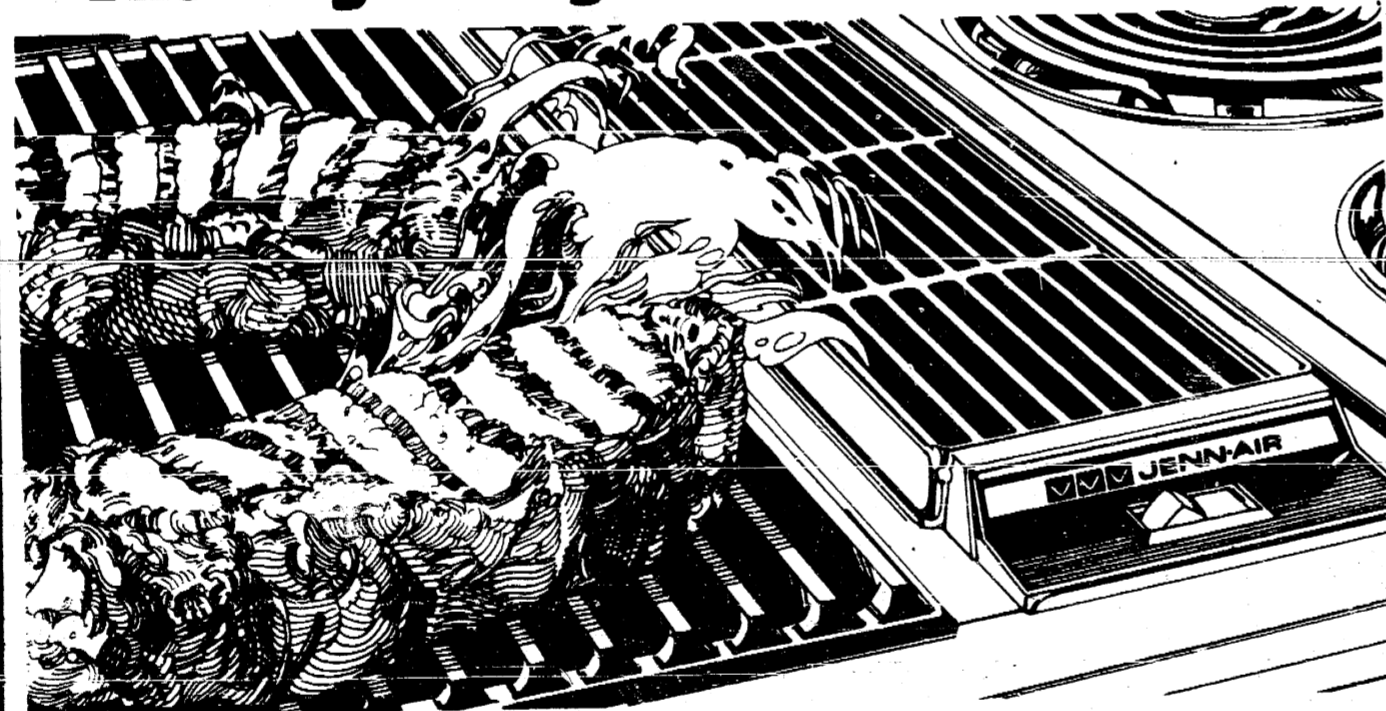

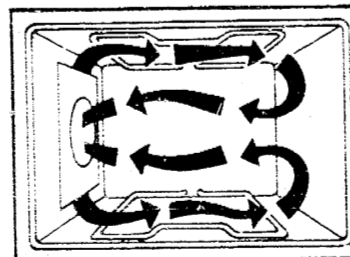

### FOOD POISONING

Have you ever been ambushed by a bad chicken? It's not pleasant. The common term for it is food poisoning.

We mention food poisoning, because you're like history repeating itself, reviving the custom of picnics and potlucks, sharing food with other people, carrying it in our cars or on bikes to a central meeting place.

But, if that chicken—or meat, fish and eggs—has not been refrigerated and properly cooked, the picnic can turn into a fester.

Salmonella bacteria thrive in warm food, especially unrefrigerated meat, fish, poultry and eggs. When it's there, lurking in the potato salad yellow with eggs, or hanging in wait in the undercooked chicken, beware! You could get food poisoning.

The symptoms don't appear for 12 to 36 hours after you've eaten the contaminated food, but when they do, you know you've been attacked. There is sudden abdominal pain, severe diarrhea, nausea and vomiting; and if babies get it, they become dehydrated. No matter what our age, we need medical attention immediately. After the major attack is over, diarrhea and loss of appetite continue for a few more days. The salmonella has struck again.

Another suggestion is to keep your hands clean when preparing food and eating. It's not always easy outdoors, but play it safe, because the bacteria can take its toll there, too.

Food poisoning is one of the diseases that is reportable by law. When the local and State Health Departments know where the outbreaks are, they can detect the culprit food (especially in restaurants or wherever large numbers of people gather to eat), and inspect the premises against recurrence.

If you don't want to play cops and robbers with salmonella, make sure it doesn't appear. Don't be tempted by that drumstick warming in the sun. Keep cold food cold, and hot food hot. Wash your hands, cook the food well, and keep it refrigerated. Remember the password: keep it cool.

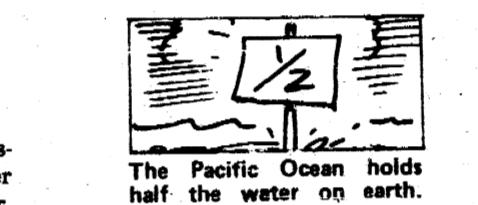

### News Of Good Things Growing

Although you can't see butter, milk and cheese growing in the fields and being harvested, these products are also good things growing in Michigan!

About 400,000 dairy cows on 8,000 Michigan dairy farms supplied consumers with almost five billion pounds of milk in 1979 (about 563 million gallons), according to the Michigan Department of Agriculture. Output per cow was a record 12,166 pounds last year, and that's enough milk to furnish eight families with a half gallon of milk each day for a year.

About one-third of the milk production was used in making 32 million pounds of butter, 46 million gallons of ice cream, ice milk and sherbet, and 80 million pounds of cheese.

Milk is the largest single item sold from Michigan farms, accounting for about a quarter of farmers' cash receipts, or \$582,498,000 last year. With processing, packaging, transportation and marketing costs added, this represents \$2.9 billion to the state's economy.

Michigan consumers are assured quality milk and manufactured dairy products. Trained MDA inspectors routinely check parlors where cows are milked and milk house equipment on farms for sanitation. Only farms issued a state permit with sanitation approval may supply Grade A milk to dairies.

Out state was the first in the nation to adopt Grade A fluid milk laws, in 1965, which require all fluid milk bottled here to meet strict Grade A standards.

Dairy plants processing milk and manufacturing butter, and cheese processing plants are also routinely inspected by MDA for sanitation and quality.

The contest is limited to amateur photographers only. All sizes and formats of photographs will be accepted in both black and white and color.

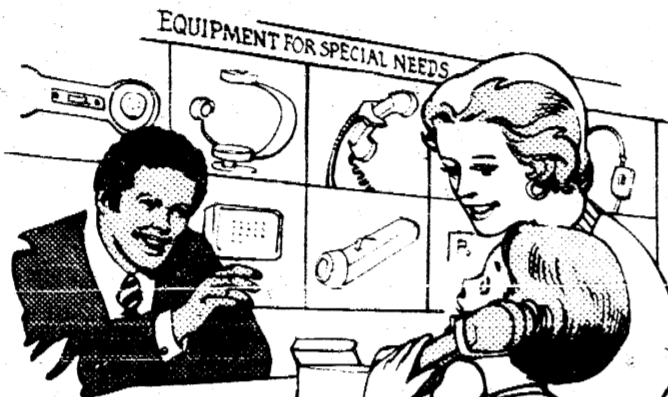

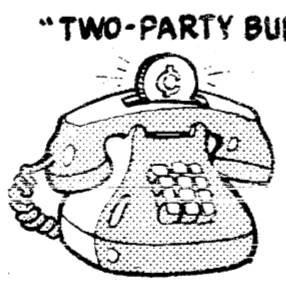

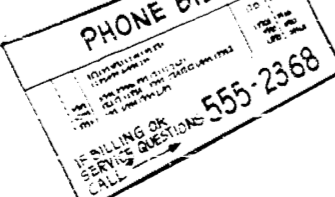

## "HIT OR MISS" by farley

There exists, we have recently found, one phase of the energy crisis which we didn't even know existed. Recently several inventors have been working long and diligently on this problem but Senator Proxmire, as usual, has objected to the spending of some \$1,500 appropriated to aid a Missouri inventor perfect an above ground aerobic, solar assisted composting toilet. It certainly will keep the ground water from being contaminated, it is said. It's said that we use 45 percent of all the water we use to flush away a small amount of solid waste and after we thusly pollute it we spent billions of dollars to make it pure again. Many other inventors are coming up with various solutions to the problem—there are waterless toilets that separate and freeze the wastes, and there are those that use the same water over and over again and some that use only .9 of a gallon of water. There are portables that can be used anywhere. And by the way, those that freeze the wastes, it is said, didn't work out because it was impossible to keep the seat comfortably warm. Our cities are trying to keep up with our pollution problems and are spending stupendous amounts to keep up with the pollution problem. It is said that the waste problem costs us more than any other problem except our schools. In the late 1950's a Swede invented a self-contained waterless toilet because of the pollution of the Baltic Sea and it worked by compounding even when kitchen wastes were added to its burden. The waste was stored in a container and once a year or so it was removed and used for fertilizer. There are now about 1,800 of them now in use in the United States. The outfits cost about \$1500.00 but the do-it-yourself parts can be bought for about \$10.00 from the company in Deer Island, Maine. An incineration toilet is also on the

## A Message From The Manchester Fire Department

- Let's all have a safe winter heating season - We would like to give a special word of caution for people who heat with wood burning devices.
1. Make sure you have the proper chimney for a wood or coal heater (and keep it clean).
  2. Make sure the heating device has been installed properly.
  3. Make sure the firewood is dry - green (wet) wood doesn't give off as much heat. Green wood causes the build up of creosote in the chimney.
  4. Keep a fire extinguisher that works and a water hose available at all times.
