## Indian Artifact Found

One day in mid-October Derek Whitaker and Kai Northrup were walking in a cornfield on Gieske Road and found an unusual stone. The stone was almost four inches long with deep grooves on one end. There was also a hole through the stone near the grooves.

The next day Derek took the stone to school to show it to his class and Mr. Boyce, his Science teacher. Mr. Boyce took the stone to Eastern Michigan University and obtained information about

the stone from Dr. Turner, a geologist, and Dr. Johnson, an archaeologist. Dr. Turner identified the stone as Aggrillite which is a sedimentary rock. Dr. Johnson believed that the stone came from the Memphis, Tennessee area. He said that the Shawnee or the Chickaw Indians in that part of the country probably designed the stone as a religious or status symbol that was meant to be worn around the neck on a leather thong. The stone was probably traded to the Potawatami Indians who lived in the Manchester Area.

We told you last year the story of "Bill" Cramer and the tale of his playing Santa Claus to the children of route one, Manchester for many years and there are many local folks who remember his day before Christmas visits when they were kids and lived on that rural route.

However, we ran across a couple of incidents concerning the U.S. Post Office Department lately that makes us thankful that no one of the top echelon in the Post Office Department evidently were aware of the many transgressions that Mr. Cramer committed, or he would have been sentenced to prison for his sins.

Last year we read a tale of the city mail carrier in New Jersey who became imbued with the Christmas spirit and so the day before Christmas donned a Santa Claus suit and chanting Christmas carols and exuding Good Will To Man, started out on his route. ### School Board Minutes

SPECIAL MEETING

December 6, 1980

The meeting was called to order by the President, William Broucek, at 9:00 A.M. Members present: Broucek, Little, Mann, Cole, Bunney, Horning, and DuFresne.

The purpose of the meeting was to develop and then use a process for evaluation of the Superintendent, and to develop plans for beginning a program of renovation of the district physical facilities.

The Board reviewed evaluation systems that had been developed by joint committee of the American Association of School Administrators and the National School Boards Association. A system that evaluated responsibility criteria was selected, and after some modification the Board went through the process of evaluation. In addition, the Board reviewed the 1979-80 Superintendent's M.B.O. contract.

The results of the evaluation, and review were noted, and a report of these results was requested of the Board Secretary. This report will be reviewed by the Board Members and then presented to the Superintendent by the Board President and Secretary, after which it will become part of the Superintendent's personnel file. The Board also directed the President to review the Superintendents

current contract in preparation for negotiation of an extension.

The Board adjourned for lunch at about 12:30, and reconvened at about 1:30 P.M. The Superintendent reported on his efforts to develop a list of architectural firms which the Board may consider engaging to present possible plans for the major renovation of the districts physical facilities. He felt that this list could be prepared for the January Board meeting.

The Board discussed the report of the Citizen's Advisory Committee on Physical Facilities, and asked that the completed report and written reports from each of the building principals be prepared so that as a firm of architects and planners were selected to work could be begun. The Superintendent noted that at this time, work for many firms was scant, and that many of the firms he had contacted were very willing to begin work with the understanding that fees would be contingent on a later passage of a bond issue by the voters of the district.

After some discussion of the above items, it was moved by Horning that the meeting be adjourned at 3:00 P.M. Supported by Little, All yeas. Meeting adjourned.

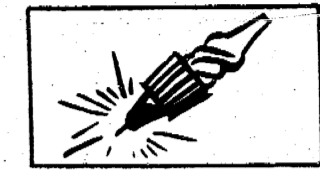

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## DUTCHMEN IN TAILSPIN



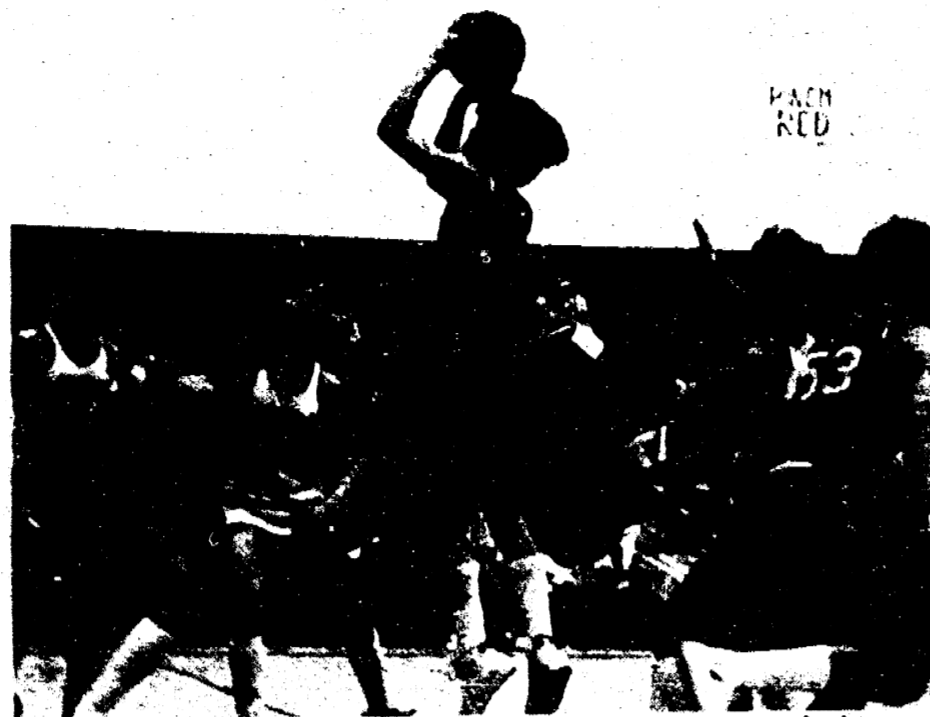

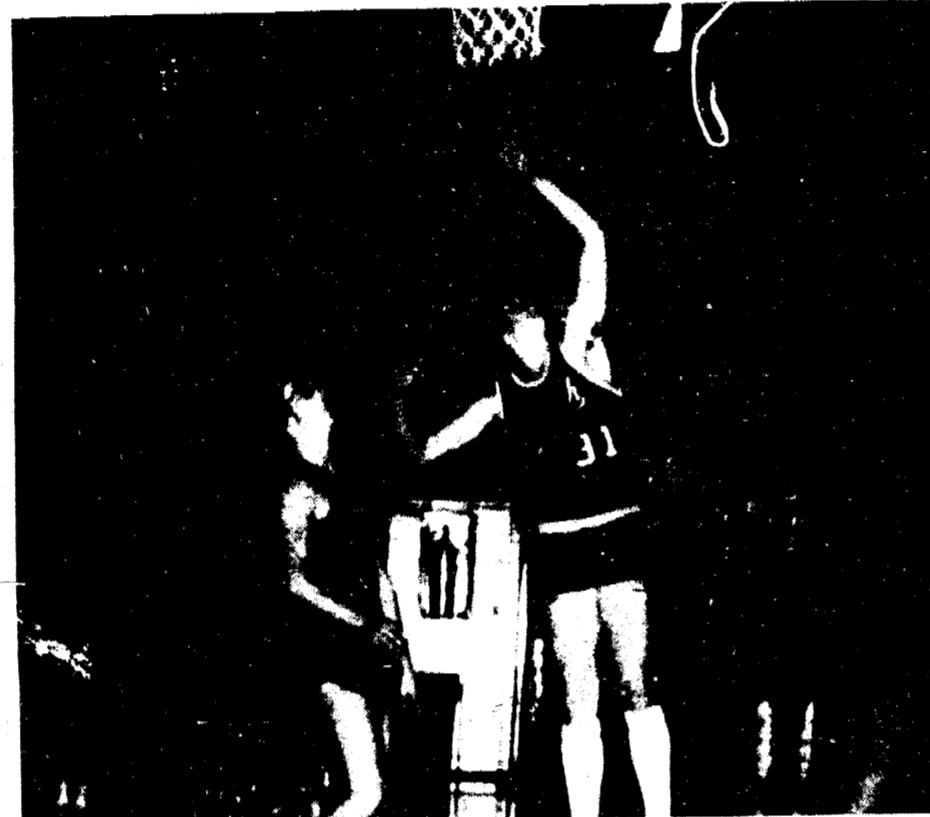

## Christmas Tree Ship Awaits

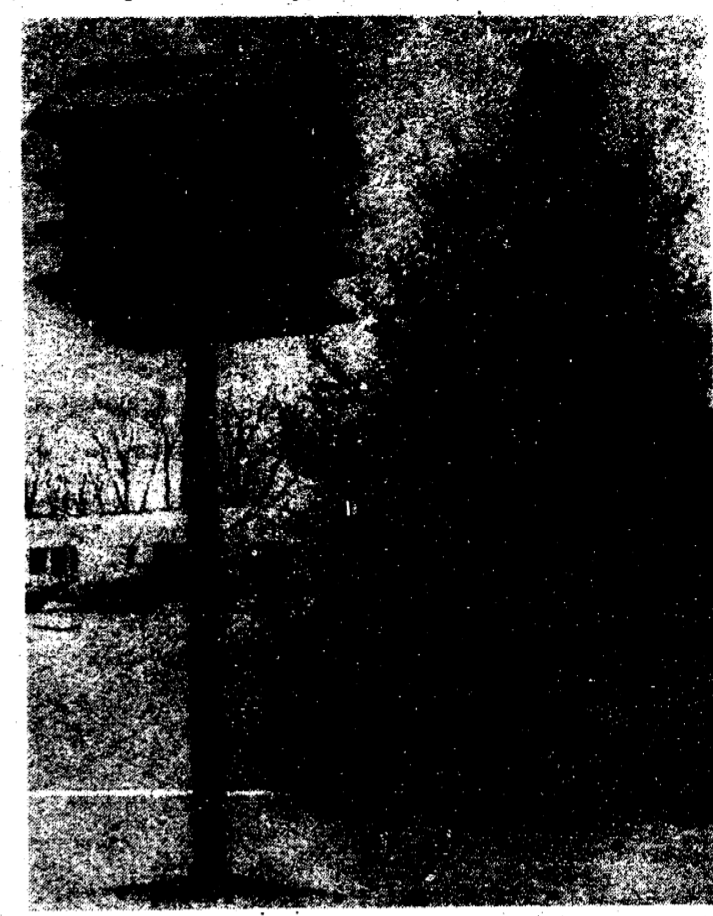

### Hanukkah Festive Jewish Celebration Of Victory

Hanukkah is the festive winter celebration of the Jewish religion. It is an eight day festival that celebrates a victory of a small group of Jewish men over 2,000 years ago.

In Palestine, one hundred and sixty five years before the birth of Christ, Antiochus, "the madman", was determined to make all the people in that land stick to the Greek idol worship. The Jews rebelled under the leadership of a priest, Mattathias. One of his sons, Judas Maccabeus, led a small group which was finally successful in driving out the soldiers of Antiochus and bringing peace. Judas and the Maccabees entered the temple and found they needed oil to light the holy candelabra, the menorah. They could find only a tiny container of oil, but it burned for eight days. For this reason, Hanukkah is called "The Festival of Lights".

In Jewish homes, Hanukkah is celebrated by lighting one of the eight candles of the menorah every night, along with a sham-mash, or "servant" candle. On the eighth night, all the candles will be burning. Games are played and gifts are exchanged each night. It is traditional for children to receive little gifts of money, called Hanukkah gelt, on each of the eight nights. Families recite blessings of thanks to God for the great miracle that happened so long ago.

The word Hanukkah means dedication. The celebrants rededicate themselves to the ethical and spiritual teachings of Judaism and to the resistance of tyranny and immorality. Hanukkah is a time for personal rededication, too.

The most traditional food during the eight day festival is LATKES, golden potato pancakes.

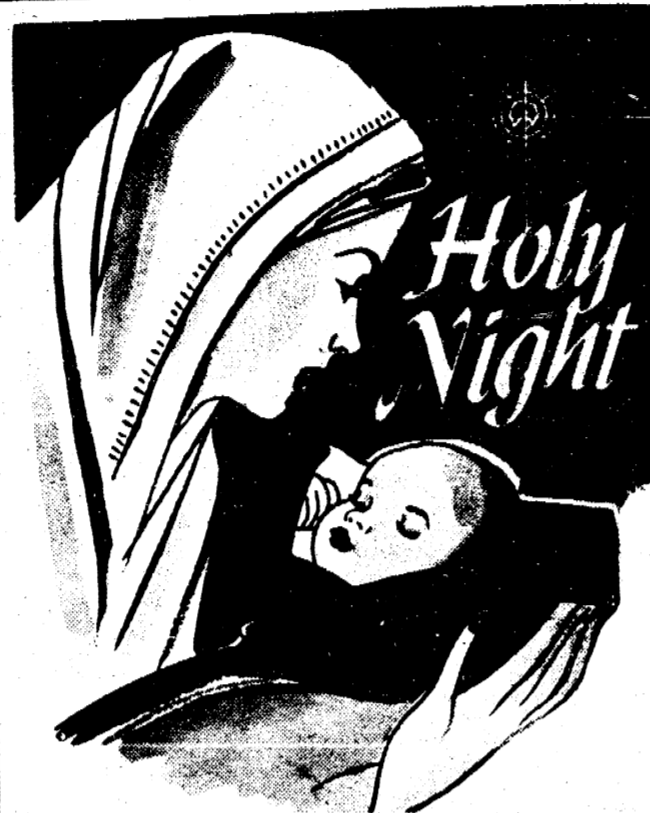

### What To Do With Christmas Plant

Now that you have a beautiful Christmas poinsettia, begonia or azalea — how are you going to care for it?

Unwrap the plant and be sure there is a drain hole in the bottom of the pot. Put the potted plant in a saucer that will hold water. Place the plant in a draft-free place where it will get plenty of light. Water the plant when the soil feels dry, with room temperature water. Let the water stand in the saucer no more than a half hour before emptying it.

If possible, the plant should be in a cooler place, 60 degrees at night, and at room temperature (70 to 75 degrees) during the day. The south or southwest window away from radiators or any source of heat is the best place for the plant in the winter.

### Let's Talk Turkey

#### Turkey Crepes En Casserole

Pancakes: Beat 1 egg just enough to blend; add 1 cup milk, 1 tablespoon melted butter, and 1 cup sifted all-purpose flour; beat smooth. Lightly grease a small skillet (about 6 inches in diameter); heat. Pour 2 tablespoons batter into skillet; lift pan and tilt from side to side till batter covers bottom. Return to

heat; brown cake on one side only. Repeat with remaining pancakes (12 total). Filling: Mix 1 cup finely diced cooked turkey or chicken, 1/2 cup canned or cooked spinach (well drained), 1/4 can condensed cream of chicken soup, 1/4 cup each medium cracker crumbs, grated Parmesan cheese, and chopped onion. Spoon a heaping tablespoon filling on unbrowned side of each pancake; roll up. Arrange, seam side down, in greased shallow baking dish. Sauce: Combine remaining 1/4 can soup with 1 cup milk; pour over pancakes. Sprinkle with 1/3 cup toasted sliced almonds. Bake

in 350 degrees oven 30 minutes or till hot. Drizzle with melted butter. Makes 6 servings.

#### How About Giblet Gravy?

4 chicken bouillon cubes  
4 cups boiling water  
Giblets  
Turkey neck  
1 stalk celery, cut into chunks  
1 small whole onion  
About 3 tablespoons all-purpose flour

Dissolve bouillon cubes in boiling water; add giblets, neck, celery, and onion. Cover and simmer about 2 hours or until giblets are tender; strain, reserving giblets. (Do not add seasonings; the bouillon will have yielded enough.)

To thicken gravy, combine flour and a small amount of cold water; add to broth. Cook, stirring constantly, until slightly thickened. Dice giblets, and stir into gravy before serving. Yield: about 3 cups.

#### Holiday Turkey Chow Mein

Cut 1 green pepper in thin strips; cook with 1 cup celery slices in 2 tablespoons butter or margarine for 2 minutes; add 1 1/2 cups turkey or chicken broth. Blend 2 tablespoons cornstarch with 1/4 cup cold water and 2 tablespoons soy sauce; gradually stir into the broth. Add 1/2 envelope or 1/2 can dry onion-soup mix. Cook and stir

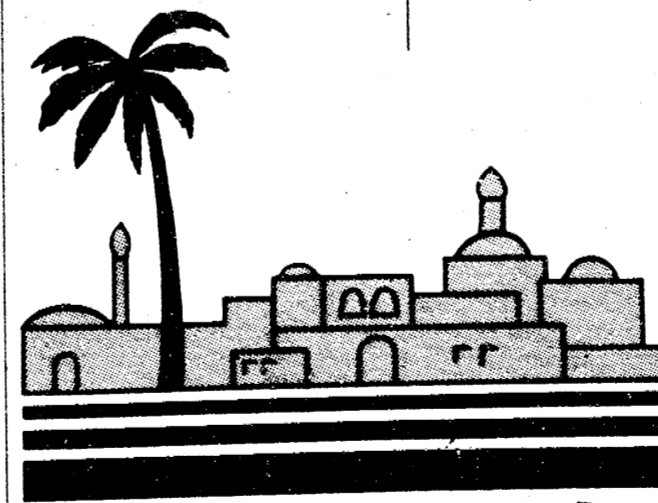

## Don't Let Those Christmas Blues Ruin Holiday

A common seasonal syndrome is characterized by feelings of grumpiness, depression and unhappiness before, during and particularly after the holiday season. Psychologists say there can be many reasons for the "Christmas blues".

One simple explanation is that people are just busier at Christmastime and the increased activity causes stress. Another theory holds that Christmas is traditionally the major family gathering time.

We are together more and there are more opportunities for conflict as much as there are opportunities for relationships to improve. The family gathering reactivates not only old pleasant memories but old unpleasant memories as well.

There is also reactivation of griefs, losses and broken attachments. A recent divorce, for example, disturbs established rituals. Memories of deceased loved ones are rekindled. This can make Christmas a time of sadness.

People often unrealistically expect the holiday season to change things in their lives and when the expectations don't materialize there is disappointment and depression.

To combat the Christmas blues and let-down feelings we

basically have to recognize reality and realize that things don't change that much because of the season of the year.

## Cranberry Chains, Popcorn Chains

To make these chains you need a good strong string, as long as you want the chain to be, and a darning needle. Remember that chains are prettier if they are long enough to make loops. For a very very long chain, make several short ones and tie them together. The kind of string the grocer uses is good. Besides the string and the darning needle, you will need cranberries and popped popcorn. Be sure you

don't put any butter on the popcorn.

Thread the darning needle with the string, and tie a big knot on the other end. Then poke the popcorn or a cranberry. Pull it to the end of the string, and poke it through the next piece of popcorn or cranberry. The popcorn or cranberry should be very close so the string won't show through. When the chain is long enough tie a big knot so that the chain cannot come apart.

A chain of just popcorn is pretty; so is a chain of just cranberries. Another nice chain is one with a piece of popcorn and then a cranberry, another piece of popcorn, and so on.

**Test A Tree**  
The base of the stump should be wet and sticky with sap. Bend the needles gently; they should not break. Tap the stump end sharply on the ground a few times; the needles should not drop off. To keep the tree fresh at home, make a new diagonal cut in the stump end and be sure water in the tree stand stays above this cut. Adding a preservative to the water will increase the keeping time of a cut Christmas tree.

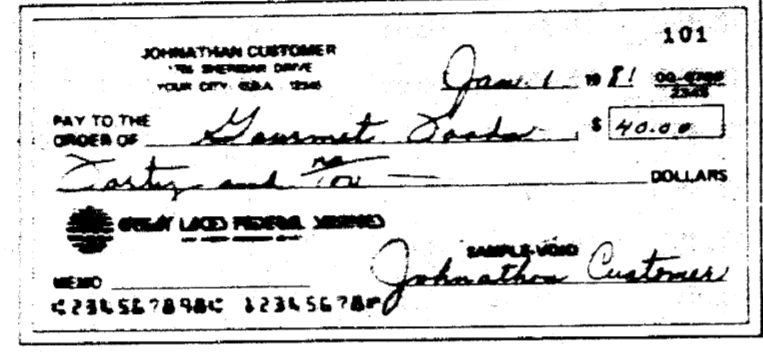

### FROM MANY LANDS: Christmas Around The Globe

People from all cultures give this greatest of Holy Days its meaning in rich traditions. Christmas around the world is similar in one respect — it is the celebration of the birth of Christ.

One of the most beautiful celebrations of Christmas is offered in Poland. When the first star is sighted in the evening on December 24, the Fast Day is ended and the family gathers around the table for Christmas supper. Barn straw is placed under the table, dishes, and table cloth, and one chair is left for the Christ Child. A "Peace Wafer", received from a priest and given to the head of the family to break and share with the family, symbolizes peace on earth. While eating the wafer, the family and guests exchange wishes for the coming year.

A very old custom, called "The Five Piles of Grain", takes place at midnight in Russia. A sleeping hen is quickly taken from its roost and brought to the kitchen. On the floor are five separate piles of grain, each representing the five fates: Wealth, Poverty, Death, Marriage and a life of Single Blessedness. The hen is still sleepy when put on the floor in the five piles of grain, and its

drowsiness causes great laughter. The hen eventually awakens, and begins to eat, pecking at the piles one by one to determine the fate of the family. It has been difficult for Russia to keep many of its Christmas traditions, but the family reunions for the children still remain.

Christmas in Syria is spent in worship and prayer, in each church a bonfire of vine stems is made in memory of the Magi who were cold from their journey. The children, masked and dressed in costumes, sing from door to door in hopes of receiving coins, candy and eggs in return.

Philippine children deck themselves with wreaths and chains made from tropical flowers and partake in an after-mass parade led by a band. Following the parade there is a feast, with dancing and music provided for the remainder of the day. They do not have Christmas trees, but their homes are decorated lavishly with flags, bunting, palms and many flowers. A candle is also left burning all night, and on Christmas Day the celebrations are brought to a close with the last chime of the church bells.

The miracle of the holidays is everywhere — in the faces of bedazzled children, in the flame of a candle, the beauty of a wreath and in the streets that glitter with festive light.

We are reminded again and again that this is the season of love and compassion, of good will and friendship and also a time to hope and to pray, to savor life and give thanks that we are living in it.

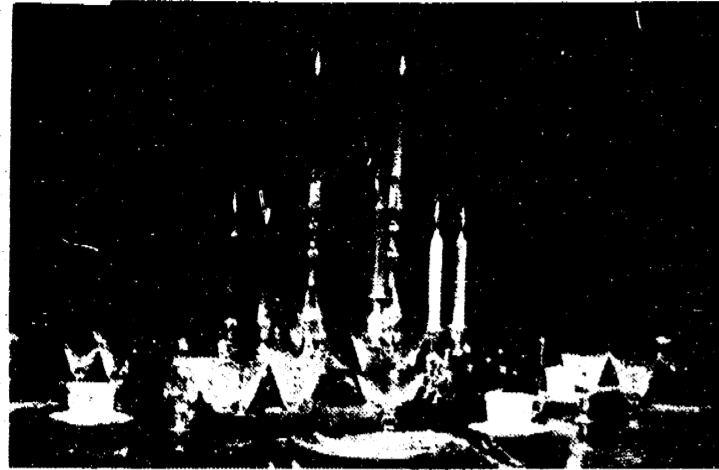

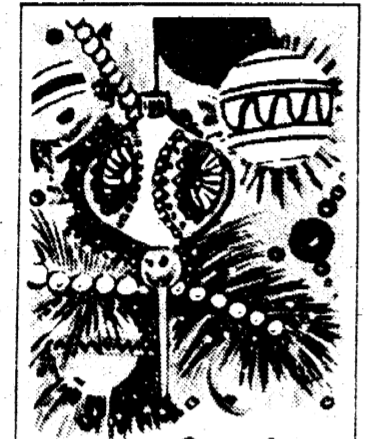

### Try A Different Decorating Idea This Christmas

Some families like to try a new theme, to depart from the traditional Christmas tree decorating, or let the children make the ornaments.

For a victorian looking tree, miniature packages wrapped in velvet or brocade and tied with brightly colored ribbon can be a tree theme. Use traditional lights and other trimmings with it.

### YULETIME CANDY RECIPES

**Holiday Chocolate Fudge**  
 2 pkg (6-oz size) semisweet chocolate pieces or 1 pkg (12 oz) semisweet-chocolate-flavor pieces  
 1 can (14 oz) sweetened condensed milk  
 1 cup walnuts, coarsely chopped  
 ¼ cup candied cherries, coarsely chopped

1. Line a 9-by-5-by-3-inch loaf pan with waxed paper. Let paper hang over sides slightly; butter lightly.

2. In top of double boiler, over hot, not boiling, water, melt chocolate. Add condensed milk, nuts and cherries; mix well.

3. Turn into prepared pan. Refrigerate several hours, or until firm. To turn out of pan, grasp paper and remove fudge in one block. Cut into squares.  
 Makes 2 pounds.

### Old-Fashioned Hard Candy

2 cups granulated sugar  
 ¾ cup light corn syrup  
 Red and green food colors  
 1½ teaspoons anise extract  
 1½ teaspoons peppermint extract  
 Confectioners' sugar

1. In a heavy, 2-quart saucepan, combine granulated sugar, 1 cup water and the corn syrup. Cook, stirring, until sugar is dissolved.  
 2. Cook, uncovered and without

stirring, to 300F on candy thermometer, or until a few drops of syrup tested in cold water form hard, brittle threads.

3. Remove from heat; divide in half. To one half add 2 drops green color and 1½ teaspoons anise extract. To other half add 2 drops red color and 1½ teaspoons peppermint extract.

4. Pour each into a well-greased pan (about 8 by 8 by 2 inches). Just as soon as candy is cool, working quickly, cut into ½-inch strips with scissors; then cut strips into 1-inch pieces (you may need two people to do this).

5. Place candies in single layer on greased cookie sheet. When and brittle, sprinkle lightly with confectioners' sugar.  
 Makes 1 pound; about 60 pieces.

### Two-Tone Fudge Is A Sure Winner

2 cups sugar  
 1 5-1/3 ounce can (¾ cup) evaporated milk  
 ¼ teaspoon salt

1 6-ounce package (1 cup) semisweet chocolate pieces  
 ¼ of 7-ounce jar marshmallow creme

¼ cup chopped walnuts  
 6 ounces confectioners' coating, coarsely chopped (1 cup) easpon vanilla

Butter an 8x8x2-inch baking pan and side of a 1½-quart saucepan. In the saucepan, combine sugar, milk, and salt. Bring to boiling; cook, stirring frequently, till mixture reaches 230 degrees F on candy ther-

mometer. Working quickly, pour half into bowl; add semisweet chocolate. Stir till smooth. Stir in half (¼ jar) of marshmallow creme and the nuts; spread in prepared pan. Pat evenly. To remaining milk mixture, add coating, till smooth. Blend in remaining (¼ jar) marshmallow creme and vanilla. Spread over layer in pan. Chill. Makes 2 pounds.

### Vanilla Caramels

2 cups sugar  
 A cup light corn syrup  
 A cup heavy cream  
 A tablespoon vanilla

Place sugar, corn syrup and cream in a saucepan and stir as it comes to a boil. Continue cooking to 240 degrees on a candy thermometer. Add vanilla and continue cooking to 248 degrees. Pour onto oiled marble slab or metal pan. When cold, mark and cut into squares. Wrap each caramel in wax paper.

### Cakes Take The Spotlight

#### MELT-IN-YOUR-MOUTH CAKE

1½ cups butter or margarine, softened  
 ¾ cups powdered sugar  
 6 eggs  
 ¾ cups sifted cake flour  
 1 teaspoon almond extract

Cream butter until smooth. Add sugar gradually, and beat until light and fluffy. Add eggs, one at a time, beating well after each addition. Add cake flour and almond extract; beat well.

Spoon batter into a greased 10-inch tube pan. Bake at 350 degrees for 45 minutes. Cool. Frost as desired. Yield: one 10-inch cake.

#### APPLESAUCE CAKE

¼ cup shortening  
 1 cup sugar  
 1 egg  
 1 cup thick strained unsweetened applesauce  
 2 cups sifted cake flour  
 1 tsp. salt  
 1 tsp. soda  
 1 tsp. baking powder  
 1 tsp. cinnamon  
 ½ tsp. allspice  
 ½ tsp. nutmeg  
 ¼ tsp. cloves

1 cup light or dark raisins  
 ¾ cup chopped nuts  
 Whipped cream  
 Grated orange rind

Cream the shortening and sugar together thoroughly. Add egg, and beat well. Blend in applesauce. Sift together cake flour, salt, soda, baking powder, cinnamon, allspice, nutmeg, and cloves. Blend dry ingredients into the creamed mixture gradually. Stir in raisins and chopped nuts. Turn batter into a greased 8-inch square pan. 1 can flaked coconut  
 1 small can crushed pineapple  
 4 ounces candied red cherries  
 4 ounces candied orange peel  
 4 ounces candied lemon peel  
 1 (1-pound) box light raisins

Mix 1 cup flour with nuts and raisins. Set aside. Cream butter

together thoroughly. Add egg, and beat well. Blend in applesauce. Sift together cake flour, salt, soda, baking powder, cinnamon, allspice, nutmeg, and cloves. ## Great Songs of Christmas And How They Came To Us

O Come, All Ye Faithful (Adeste Fideles):

This is one of the oldest hymns in the Christmas service, the first manuscript known to scholars dating from 1751, although the melody is in fact much older. The translation of the Latin words now used in English-speaking countries was made in 1852.

The First Noel:

This carol is believed to be of French origin, probably about 1500, although no one is really certain. Sometimes "Noel" is used, sometimes "Nowell" in the old English usage. Europe knew the song in the seventeenth century, but it made its first known appearance in print in 1883.

Joy To The World:

Lowell Mason arranged the music for this carol in 1830, using a theme from the "Antioch" portion of Handel's Messiah. The words were written in 1719 by Isaac Watts, who did not intend them to apply to any special part of the church calendar.

### Christmas Cookie Jar Recipes

#### OATMEAL 'FRIDGE COOKY

1/2 cup soft shortening  
1/2 cup sugar  
1/2 cup brown sugar (packed)  
1 egg  
1/2 Tbsp. grated lemon rind  
1 1/2 Tbsp. molasses  
1/2 tsp. vanilla  
1/2 cup (3/4 cup plus 2 Tbsp.) sifted enriched flour  
1/2 tsp. soda  
1/2 tsp. salt  
1 1/2 cups rolled oats, quick or regular (uncooked)

Combine shortening, sugar, brown sugar, egg, grated lemon rind, molasses, and vanilla, and mix together thoroughly. Sift together and stir in flour, soda, and salt; then stir in rolled oats. Shape mixture into a roll about 5

inches long and 2 1/2 inches thick. Chill thoroughly for several hours or over night. Slice thin (about 1/8-inch), using a sharp knife, and arrange on lightly-greased baking sheets. Bake in a moderately hot oven (400 degrees F.) for 8 to 10 minutes. Makes 2 1/2 to 3 dozen.

#### Fruitcake Cookies

1/2 cup butter or margarine, softened  
1/2 cup light brown sugar, firmly packed  
2 eggs, well beaten  
2 1/2 cups unsifted all-purpose flour  
1/2 teaspoon baking soda  
1/2 teaspoon cinnamon  
1/2 cup dark rum  
1 1/2 cups (8 oz.) golden seedless raisins  
1/2 cup (4 oz.) pitted, chopped dates  
3 slices candied pineapple (1 each of red, yellow

and green), chopped  
3 cups chopped pecans  
1/4 cup (4 oz.) candied cherries, halved

Preheat oven to 300 degrees F. Grease 2 large cookie sheets; set aside. In large mixer bowl with electric mixer at medium speed, cream butter or margarine and sugar. Mix in beaten eggs until light and fluffy. In medium bowl combine 2 cups flour, baking soda and cinnamon. Add to creamed mixture alternately with rum and mix well. Mix remaining 1/2 cup flour with fruits and nuts (except cherries). Fold into dough. Form into 1 tablespoon mounds; place on cookie sheet. Top each with cherry half. Bake about 15 minutes or until barely set. Makes about 6 1/2 dozen cookies. About 95 calories each.

#### Advent Begins German Season

It is with Advent that Christmas begins in Germany. The colorful German Advent calendars with little windows to open for each day of the season are a delight to children everywhere. The evergreen wreath with four candles is of German origin too. These are displayed in many houses, and every Sunday until Christmas Eve one candle is lighted.

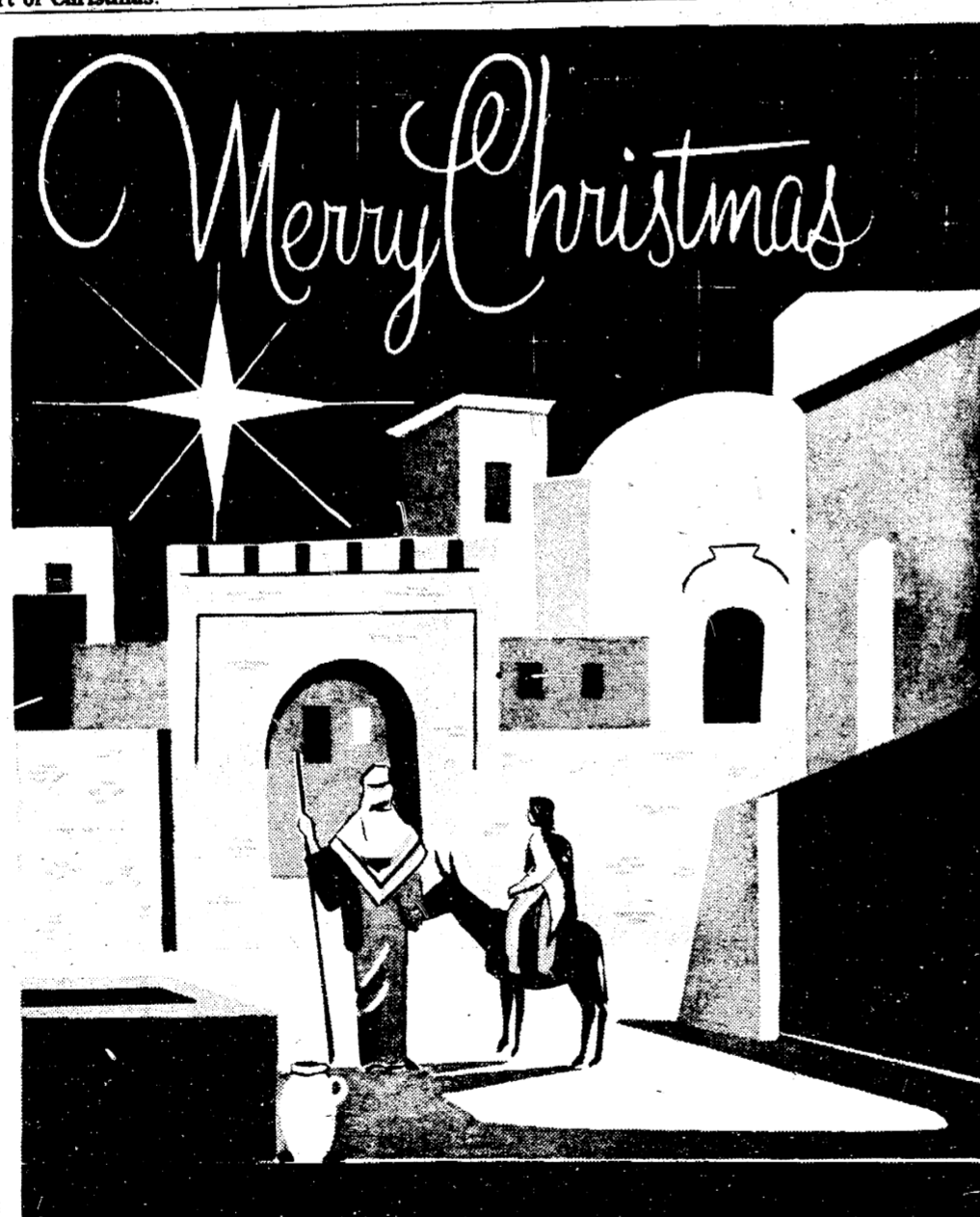
