Community Education Nominations For Boundary Commission

The Winter schedule of Community Education classes will be mailed out the last week in December. One important change in registration is with the Washtenaw Community College classes. There will be a one night registration for all Washtenaw Community College classes on Tuesday, January 6 from 8:30 to 9:30 p.m. at Manchester High School. If you cannot attend this session please call the Community Education Office at 428-7804 on or before the 6th. Classes will then start the following Monday, January 12.

Registration for the remainder of the Community Education classes will be from January 5 thru Friday, January 16. Among the new classes is a class on how to collect, save and make money on coupons. Several community members have expressed interest in a class in sign language which will also be offered. For the singers in the community there will be a free class offered to start a community choir.

Rodney E. Hutchinson, Chief Probate Judge, invites the public to nominate persons for appointment to the State Boundary Commission.

The State Boundary Commission rules on petitions for municipal incorporation and petitions for changes in municipal boundaries through annexation or consolidation. The Boundary Commission was created by a Michigan law enacted in 1968, being public act 191 of 1968. The law requires the presiding probate judge in each county to appoint two county residents to serve on the commission. The law dictates that one of the appointees shall reside in a township and one within a city.

Judge Hutchinson stated that while residence is the only eligibility standard set by law, he encourages the nomination of persons who have demonstrated their interest in public affairs by active participation in community or civic organizations. The Judge indicated that nominations may be submitted by individuals, organizations and units of government.

As there are only two positions, Judge Hutchinson indicated no nominee may be assured of appointment; however, nominees may be considered for current or future vacancies as they occur. Nominations will be received until January 15, 1981, and should be addressed to Rodney E. Hutchinson, Chief Probate Judge, P.O. Box 8645, Ann Arbor, Michigan 48107.

Any person or organization wishing to nominate a person for consideration should include the nominee's name, address, telephone number, occupation and

News Of Good Things Growing

If you're looking for a different idea for celebrating New Year's Eve with friends, look to the good things growing in Michigan and plan a cheese tasting party.

Michigan dairies produce an estimated 32 million pounds of natural cheese each year, according to the Michigan Department of Agriculture. Many of the more than 400 varieties of cheese, including cheddar, Colby, Monterey, Italian, Muenster, and brick, are produced in our cheese factories, located primarily in Wayne, Oscola, Clinton, Menominee and Bay counties.

For a cheese tasting party, you will need to purchase three to ten different types of cheeses, depending on the number of guests; French or Italian bread, assorted crackers, fruit or crisp vegetables and dip.

Bread and crackers are necessary because they help to 'clear the palate' when tasting different varieties.

If you're planning on a party of ten people, about five pounds of cheese will be needed. It's a good idea to have familiar types of cheeses as well as new ones you want to introduce to friends.

Select cheeses that offer a range of flavors, from mild to sharp; and a range of textures, from creamy to firm. Serve mildest cheeses first, progressing to the more sharp-flavored ones. Label cheeses to help guests identify their favorites.

While you're making introductions, offer guests some fine Michigan wines. Wine is the traditional beverage to serve with cheese. As they say in the Michigan wine industry, "We don't make all of the wine in the world, but we do make some of the best!"

Learn How Your Woodlot Can Earn You Money

Are you losing money on your woodlot? Or are you paying too many taxes? Learn how your woodlot can earn you money as well as provide a beautiful retreat for wildlife and yourself.

The Washtenaw County Cooperative Extension Service is sponsoring a seminar, "Managing the Small Woodlot," to be held Saturday, January 17 from 10:00 A.M. to 4:00 P.M. The seminar will meet at the Cooperative Extension Service office at 4133 Washtenaw Avenue in the County Service Center (red square on corner of building symbolizes the office). There is a \$1.00 cost to cover materials supplied. Dress warmly as part of the afternoon session will be conducted outdoors.

Morning topics include the options, goals and methods of timber stand improvement. Contractual agreements covering cutting methods and bidding, as well as, taxes will also be discussed. In the afternoon, topics include planting trees for woodlot use and introducing and defining the roles of various government agencies. Tree identification and defects will be covered in the woodlot. Throughout the seminar, emphasis will be placed on fuelwood production as well as other wood products.



INFLUENZA

This winter some Michigan residents will come down with influenza. Although there is not much you can do to avoid being exposed to influenza, you can take some precautions to try to prevent others from getting it from you if you do come down with it.

The first thing to do is to recognize "the flu". It usually starts with fever, chills, headache and muscle aches, followed shortly thereafter by a cough, a runny nose, and a sore throat. You may not have all of these symptoms, but you will know you are ill. The usual treatment is aimed solely at making you feel better. We still cannot cure influenza once symptoms start. Rest, keep warm, take fluids, and try to eat a light diet. Your symptoms should begin to subside in two to four days. Contact your doctor if your illness lasts longer or is particularly severe.

When you suspect you are coming down with influenza, try to isolate yourself from your family, friends, and co-workers as is reasonably possible. Stay home if you can, especially while you are coughing. Do this both for your own protection and to prevent spreading influenza to others. Remember that when you are ill with "the flu" you are more susceptible to other perhaps more serious infections that you could pick up from others.

The strain of influenza virus that we are more likely to have in Michigan this winter is called Influenza A/Bangkok/1/79. It has already been isolated from an ill Cass County, Michigan resident, and other ill persons from Illinois, California, Colorado, New Mexico, Texas, and Washington. A strain of influenza virus similar to this one circulated in 1976 and 1977, so, although we do expect to have a considerable amount of influenza in the state, we don't expect to have what is called a major epidemic year for influenza. In other strains of influenza virus that have circulated in the past three years may also be going around this season. We are on the lookout for them.

One effective way to prevent influenza is vaccination. Since people 65 years of age or older and those with chronic diseases that lower the body's resistance are more likely to develop serious complications, we recommend that these people get immunized. This year's vaccine

should protect against all three strains of influenza virus.

We hope you don't get "the flu" this winter, but if you do, we hope we've helped you to cope with it and to prevent passing it on to others.

Ask Before You Mix Medications

Whenever two or more people get together they interact. This interaction is either good, bad or indifferent. The same is true when medications, prescription or non-prescription, or foods mix.

Why is this so important to you? Whatever reaction occurs, occurs in YOUR body. After all, you are the one putting chemicals into your body whether these be medications prescribed by your physician, over-the-counter medications you take, or foods you eat.

Gerald E. Bodendistel, president of the Michigan Pharmacists Association, gives some invaluable advice on how you can help prevent potentially harmful medication reactions.

-Make a list of all the medications you take. Include all prescription medications from all physicians you see, and all the non-prescription medications you take, such as cough and cold remedies, laxatives, pain relievers, antacids and alcohol.

-Take this list to your pharmacist and have the pharmacist check it for possible harmful combinations.

-Ask your pharmacist if there are any foods that should not be eaten with the medications you take.

-Whenever you get a new prescription, be sure to ask your pharmacist if there are any non-prescription medications or food that should not be taken or eaten with this new medication.

-Leave an up-to-date listing of all your medications and any long-term illnesses, such as diabetes, high blood pressure, asthma or allergies, both in your wallet and in the refrigerator. In the event of any illness or emergency, this information is then available to the health professionals who will care for you.

-Choose one pharmacist to have a list of all the medications you take when you are under the care of more than one physician. It is very important that one health care professional has all your medication history to prevent potentially harmful medication reactions.

Bodendistel also warns that all drug interactions are not harmful. Some drug interactions are very useful. One of the most common useful drug interactions is that of APC, PAC, Empirin Compound or Anacin. In these medications a combination of pain relievers is used to increase the pain relieving side effect and to lower the individual dose of each ingredient. The net effect is to give better

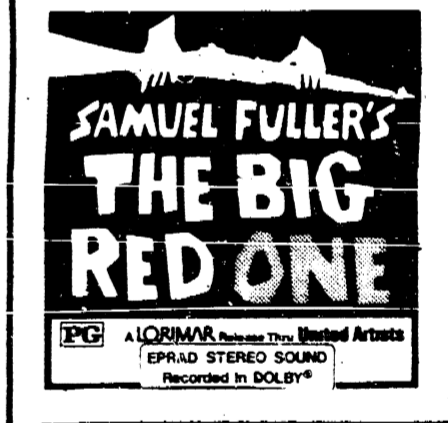

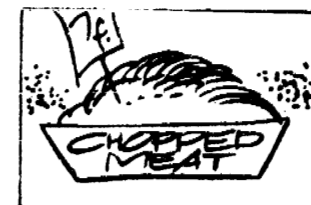

Eight Sides To Everything
It's about 900 miles from the north of Scotland to the south of England, and when people make the trek on foot they usually start at the northernmost tip, in the village of John o' Groats.

John o' Groats was not always just the name of a place. It started off as the name of a person. His real name was John de Groot, and he was a Dutchman who settled in the north of Scotland. He had seven sons who quarreled over precedence.



So John de Groot had a house built in octagonal shape. On each of the eight sides he had a door put in so that he and his seven sons could each have a personal entrance. There was also an eight-sided dining room—and an eight-sided table.

EPIPHANY AFTER THE NEW YEAR



Christmas really ends after the New Year has arrived. Twelfth Night or Epiphany—January 6—is the traditional end of the Christmas season.

Long before Christmas was observed on December 25, Epiphany was widely recognized as the time to observe the memory of the baptism of Jesus. Epiphany was mentioned as early as A.D. 194, was widely observed by the 4th century.

England's King Alfred decreed in the 9th century that the Christmas season would include Christmas and the 12 days thereafter. Charles II promoted the customs of the Twelfth Night cake and the burning of Christmas greenery.

In Syria
Some legends, like one from

Syria, hold that wild animals remain in their caves on Epiphany Eve, that trees kneel in adoration at midnight.

Latin peoples consider Epiphany a solemn religious festival and the beginning of the pre-Lenten carnival season. In Mexico, Epiphany marks a pilgrimage of the devout to the shrine of the miraculous Lord of Chalma near Mexico City.

For many Christians, Epiphany has a threefold meaning: the visit of the Three Wise Men to Jesus; his baptism; and Jesus's changing of water to wine, the first miracle at Cana. Supposedly, the events occurred on the same date, though in different years.

The Greek meaning of Epiphany is "appearance."

The eggnog party is especially traditional for New Year's Day, and a welcome treat all through the winter season. One thing about an eggnog party — you don't have to worry about what to have to drink. Cake With A Personal Touch

| 4 eggs | 2 drops green food coloring (optional) |

Combine cake mix, pudding mix, eggs, orange juice, oil and coloring in large mixer bowl. Blend; then beat at medium speed of electric mixer for 4 minutes. Stir in wafers. Pour into greased and floured 10-inch fluted tube or tube pan. Bake at 350° for 50 to 55 minutes or until cake tester inserted in center comes out clean and cake begins to pull away from sides of pan. Do not underbake. Cool in pan about 15 minutes. Remove from pan and finish cooling on rack. Sprinkle with confectioners sugar, if desired.

In high altitude areas, use large eggs, add 2/3 cup all-purpose flour and 1/3 cup water; reduce oil to 1 tablespoon, bake at 375° for 50 minutes. (With pudding-included cake mix, add 3 tablespoons water.)

Festive Day In Scotland

The most elaborate festivities in Scotland are saved for HOGMANAY, or NEW YEAR'S. In some parts of Angus the old year is burned out with enormous bonfires around which the people dance. And at Stovehaven processions are held in which balls of flaming rope are swung about the ends of long cords. In Edinburgh, outside the Tron church crowds gather to wait for midnight. When the hour strikes, those in Highland dresses toss their bonnets into the air and dance reels to the wild music of bagpipes.

Iceland Celebrates

Gala balls, bonfires and fireworks... all a part of a cold country's warm welcome to the New Year.

New Year's Eve is a time for family togetherness and the accent is on food rather than drink, although there is some toasting to the New Year.

Lamb is plentiful in Iceland, and is the main feature of the dinner. Smoked leg of lamb is very special for the holidays. The usual accompaniments to the meat are sweet-sour red cabbage, boiled potatoes with cream sauce, peas and carrots, hard rolls or plain bread and butter. Not exotic foods but hearty.

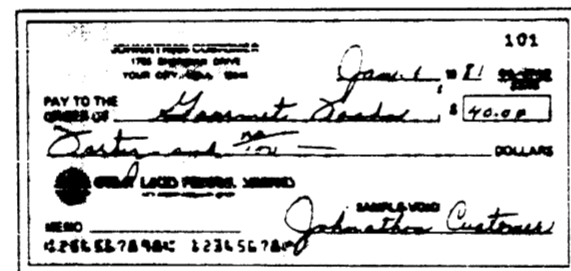

Chilling And Serving Wine

If wine is on your menu for holiday entertaining remember that:

White wines should be chilled three to four hours before serving; champagne needs four to five hours. Still or sparkling wines can be chilled in an ice bucket filled with ice and water; allow 45 minutes per bottle and rotate the bottles several times to chill evenly.

Figure on six 4-ounce servings per 4-5 quart bottle of dry table wines, slightly more servings from dessert and appetizer wines, for which a single serving is 2 1/2 to 3 ounces.

A 9-ounce capacity all purpose wine glass is appropriate for all kinds of still or sparkling wines. It should have a thin stem and a tulip-shaped bowl. Fill just over the halfway mark with table and sparkling wines; just under half with appetizer and dessert wines.

Leftover wines should be stored in the refrigerator and used within a few days, either for drinking or cooking. Keep a wine rack out of direct sunlight, away from heat and sharp temperature changes. Store corked bottles on their sides to keep the corks moist. Capped bottles can stand upright.

Spiced Milk Punch

4 cups milk
 2 inches stick cinnamon
 4 whole cloves
 Dash ground mace
 Dash ground saffron (optional)
 1/3 cup sugar
 1 tablespoon cornstarch

In medium saucepan, combine milk, cinnamon, cloves, mace, and saffron. Bring almost to boiling. Reduce heat. Cover and simmer on very low heat 15 minutes; remove cinnamon and cloves with slotted spoon. Combine sugar and cornstarch; stir into milk mixture. Heat and stir till bubbly; cook 2 minutes more. If desired, beat with rotary beater till foamy. Ladle into mugs. Serve with cinnamon stick stirrers, if desired. Makes 4 cups.

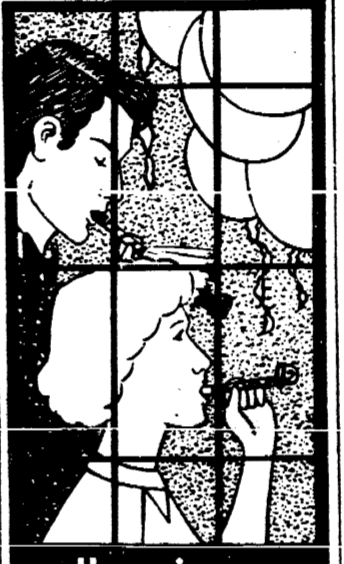
Japan's Biggest Holiday Is First
