The Post Office Department sent to Congress the recommendation that a nine number zip code be adopted instead of the five number affair now in use, but Congress took a degree of pity on us and peons and ruled that it be postponed at least until next summer.

This enlarged zip code would enable the electronic mail sorters to put the mail, where it belongs, much faster than is now done manually. Of course, you are not obligated to use these nine number codes under penalty of the law or anything like that but the old fashioned fuddy duddy mail with the old fashioned six digit number will be hand-sorted if and when they find time to do so, and these letters will eventually find their way to where they are going, sooner or later.

This passion for numbers however, is nothing new. I guess that we are fairly free from this phobia until we take our first job and are assigned our Social Security number. This becomes a part of our life until death do us part.

From this time on we accumulate numbers as easily and as naturally as we breathe. And so you see life and the hereafter is just one darned number after another.

Now the numbers that we use today are designated as Arabic numbers. They are almost in universal use. However in days gone by there were also in use what were known as Roman numerals. They were quite different from the Arabic and, in comparison, quite cumbersome. For instance a Social Security number 386-20-18331 in the Arabic would be in Roman numerals CCCXXXVI-XX-MCCMXXXI.

All of which would be more than awkward in solving problems of arithmetic, history also tells us that the Arabic numbers are not Arabic. We can't even give them credit for that. The numerals used today, it is said, originated with the Hindus in India.

We live today in a world of numbers and as we pondered about the above situation we wondered why bother to name our offspring-just number 'em. It might be awkward to stand in the front yard and yell for "263-67-954" instead of "Johnny" but I guess we could get used to it.

The more we think about it the more confusing it becomes. We doubt it would speed up the mail even if it cost the \$887,000,000 another nine digit number.

For those who can't remember the nine digit numbers there is to be provided an "800" phone number by which mailers can call to get the nine-digit number they need and if you forget this number of nine digits you can call Dial 411 (information) to get the ten digit number to call to get the nine-digit number you need.

The more you get into this proposal the sillier it seems. Let's send it to the dead letter office where it belongs, and do something useful.

COUNCIL PROCEEDINGS

December 15, 1980
 Council met in regular session with the meeting called to order by President Schaffer at 7:00 P.M. Present were: Hinkley, Koebbe, Minick, Petsch, Reed, Smith and Zsenyuk.
 Minutes of the December 1, 1980 meeting were read, corrected and approved in a motion by Petsch, supported by Minick. All yeas, motion carried.
 Public Works activities as reported by Koebbe included: Worked on sewers; Changed filters and worked on equipment; Salted streets twice; Rodded public sewer; Worked at the landfill; Decorated tree in park; Worked on Union Street; Flushed hydrants; Dug and covered one grave; Picked up a load of cold patch; Cleaned catch basins; Cut down tree on East Main St.; Graded gravel streets; Repaired water service; Worked on equipment to be ready for tree trimmers; Worked at treatment plant and tree removal; Picked up new Stihl saw and smaller one for trimming small branches, also picked up supplies; Survey has been made of street signs that were missing.
 Council report of Water & Sewer Dept. was reviewed.
 Koebbe presented a letter from the State of Michigan Department of Public Health stating that Louis K. Leeson has passed the written examination for certification as a Water Distribution Plant Operator in Michigan in the S-3 classification.
 A letter was received from Rev. Figgins requesting permission to plant Pine trees on Village easement in Schaffer Court. Request was denied by Village Council as the trees would not conform to the landscape. Chief Zsenyuk to inform him of

the tree planting program in the spring of Hard Maple trees.
 It was reported the State was not sponsoring the Treatment Plant Training Program in the future. It was suggested that monies be placed in the 1981 budget to train another person for a Class D license in case the situation arises when extra help is needed.
 It was requested an ad be placed in the Manchester Enterprise to hire a CETA employee.
 Chief Zsenyuk reported he had met with the Manchester Township Board and made a presentation on Senior Citizens Funding in place of the Dial-A-Ride service.
 Reed reported the Village Attorney had mailed letters to pursue the collection of delinquent personal property taxes for the taxable year 1980.
 The Village Financial report for the month of November was reviewed by Reed. He reported 30 day certificates had been purchased with cash available of \$125,000.00 at an interest rate of 17% from Union Savings Bank.
 Hinkley presented the unapproved minutes of the Village Planning Commission meeting of Dec. 2, 1980. The January 6, 1981 meeting will be a working session on proposed changes to the Zoning Ordinance.
 Renovation of the Village Hall will begin on January 5, 1981.
 Moved by Minick, supported by Koebbe the following resolution be adopted: BE IT RESOLVED: that the portion of Mound Street from M-52 to Clarston is a designated Street in the Village of Manchester. All yeas, motion carried.
 Reed, Hinkley and Zsenyuk appointed

to meet with Mr. Gene Smith of Pinnacle Engineering.
 Discussion was held on compensation for added duties and what responsibilities Zsenyuk can take without clearing with Council on his new position as Village Administrator and Director of Public Safety. Job descriptions will be requested from the Michigan Municipal League and guidelines will be drawn up.
 Correspondence was presented and placed on file.
 Meeting adjourned at 8:55 P.M.

Tax Counseling and Home Heating Rebates For Seniors

A program to assist seniors, home owners or renters, to file for Michigan Property Tax Relief and home heating credit is offered by the Washtenaw County Council on Aging, Paul Serafin, project chairman announced today. This free service, available to county residents who are 65 years and over, will be given by volunteer tax counselors, who have received special training from the Michigan Department of the Treasury. Mr. Serafin pointed out that to obtain a speaker to acquaint seniors with the benefits of the Act of 1973, or other information, call 665-3625, the Council on Aging Office.
 It is necessary to file a claim to obtain a tax refund or home heating credit. It is

suggested that meetings be scheduled at senior centers, churches, public buildings and that a speaker be requested. If confined to their home, individual visits can usually be arranged. According to Serafin, during the last five years in Washtenaw County over 5000 individuals received tax refunds totaling approximately two million dollars.

News Of Good Things Growing

With the holiday rush over, and life slowing to a 'dull roar', now's the time to freeze meals ahead. This may give you some spare time for things you've wanted to get done all fall!

Combine the good things growing in Michigan and a good cookbook and many meals will be right at your fingertips. An easy basic ingredient to start with is Michigan beef.

Our state's farmers marketed about 474 million pounds of beef last year, worth \$284 million, according to the Michigan Department of Agriculture. Major producing counties are Jackson, Kent, Huron, Calhoun and Sanilac.

Many excellent recipes are available for preparing beef stronganoff, meatballs, and Swiss steak. Stored in your freezer, these are easy meals to pop in the oven and serve with noodles, hot rolls and creamy Michigan butter.

Frozen casseroles, such as Hungarian goulash and lasagna, or soups, chili and beef stew, are heated in minutes on cold wintery nights.

Freezing meals also has added incentives besides saving time each night: If you're making one batch, it's as easy to make two or three; when supplies are plentiful and there are bargains at the grocery, each meal costs less; and, of course, some recipes make larger amounts so it's practical to stock the freezer.

When freezing foods, cool them as quickly as possible, wrap in a protective, moisture-proof container, allowing one-half inch headspace for expansion, and freeze immediately. Remember to cut back on seasonings as they tend to get stronger.

Frozen cooked foods should be used within a short period of time and, once thawed, should never be refrozen.

Mary Keith Ballantine, 23rd District Rep. Michigan's long sought workers' compensation reform will eliminate the many abuses and contain escalating costs that threaten the state's economic stability, State Representative Mary Keith Ballantine (R-23rd District) said.

The measure, part of a two-bill package revising the outmoded workers' and unemployment compensation systems, passed the House unanimously just hours after the Senate approved it and just two days after the Governor and legislative leaders revealed the plan.

"Reform of workers' compensation has eluded us for more than a decade," Representative Ballantine said. "But I am confident that we have finally turned the corner. Our efforts can now be aimed at job development."

Representative Ballantine said the costly system, which forced employers to pay among the highest premiums in the nation while injured workers received among the lowest benefits, has "scared businesses out of Michigan and seriously hampered our ability to attract new ones—and that translates into hundreds of thousands of people out of work."

"This is a critical time in our state. Our unemployment is the highest in the nation and our sagging economy has cut into the very bone of state government," she continued. "We took a step towards

making Michigan economically healthy once again."

The package balances conflicting interests that have prevented progress for years by eliminating some abuses that have burdened business and answering labor's demand for higher benefits.

The House and Senate Thursday passed a companion bill hiking benefits for unemployed workers for the first time in five years while cracking down on people who voluntarily quit their jobs and seek compensation.

"Many years of hard work and negotiation have helped set the stage for this step in workers' compensation reform. We accomplished that today, and the positive effects will be felt as we begin to secure our economic base and put unemployed men and women back to work, Representative Ballantine said.

The Republican members of the House made a unified plea for workers compensation reform in the early fall, Representative Ballantine added, saying "Naturally, I'm delighted that we've achieved this major breakthrough."

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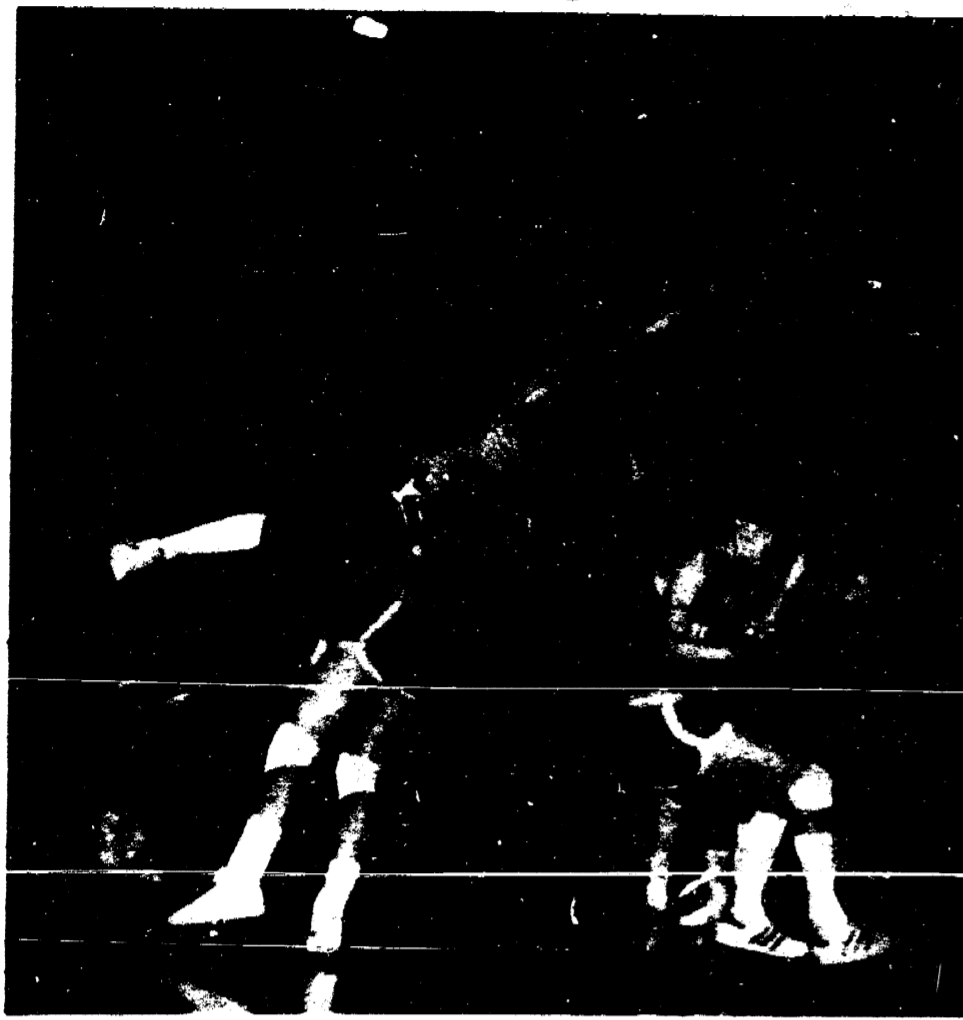

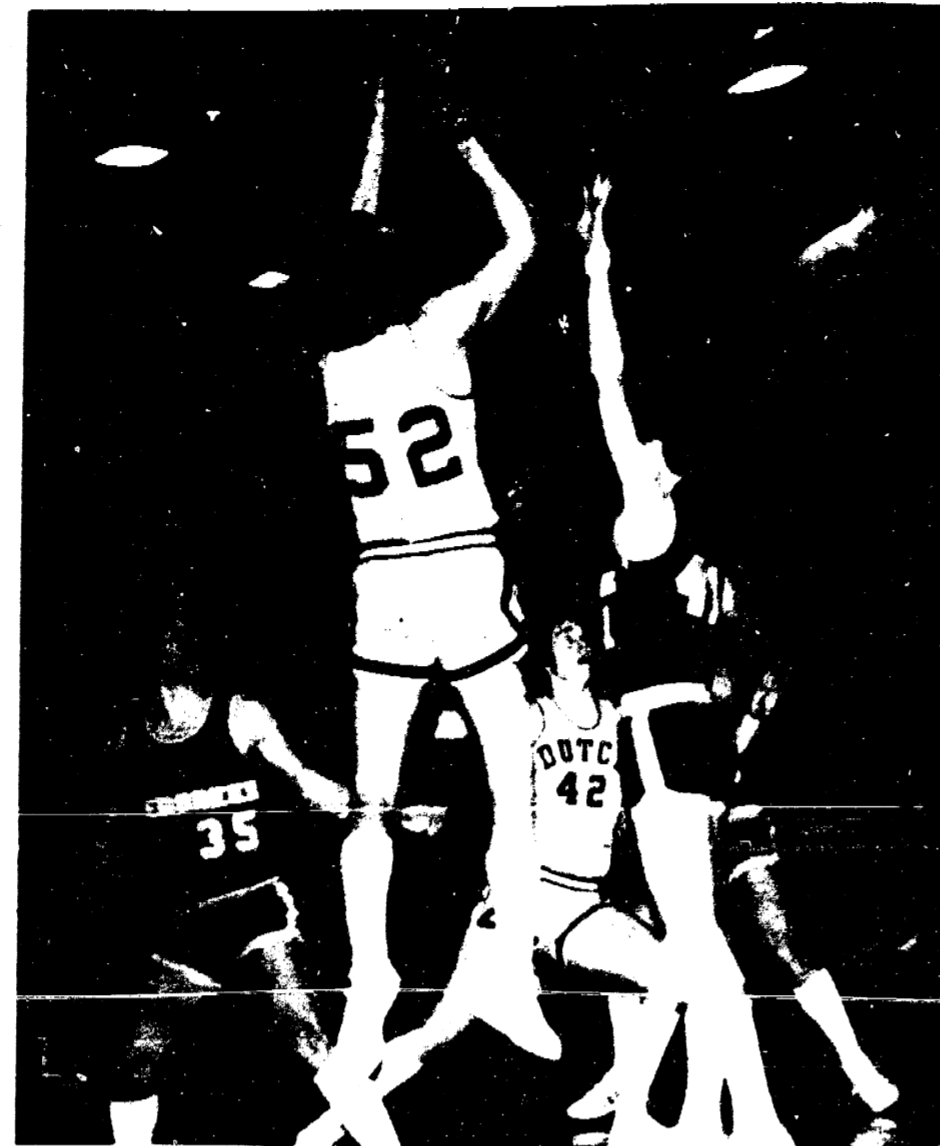
T.J. Thomas drives and gets fouled in Saturday's match.

In the first game Saturday, we had a

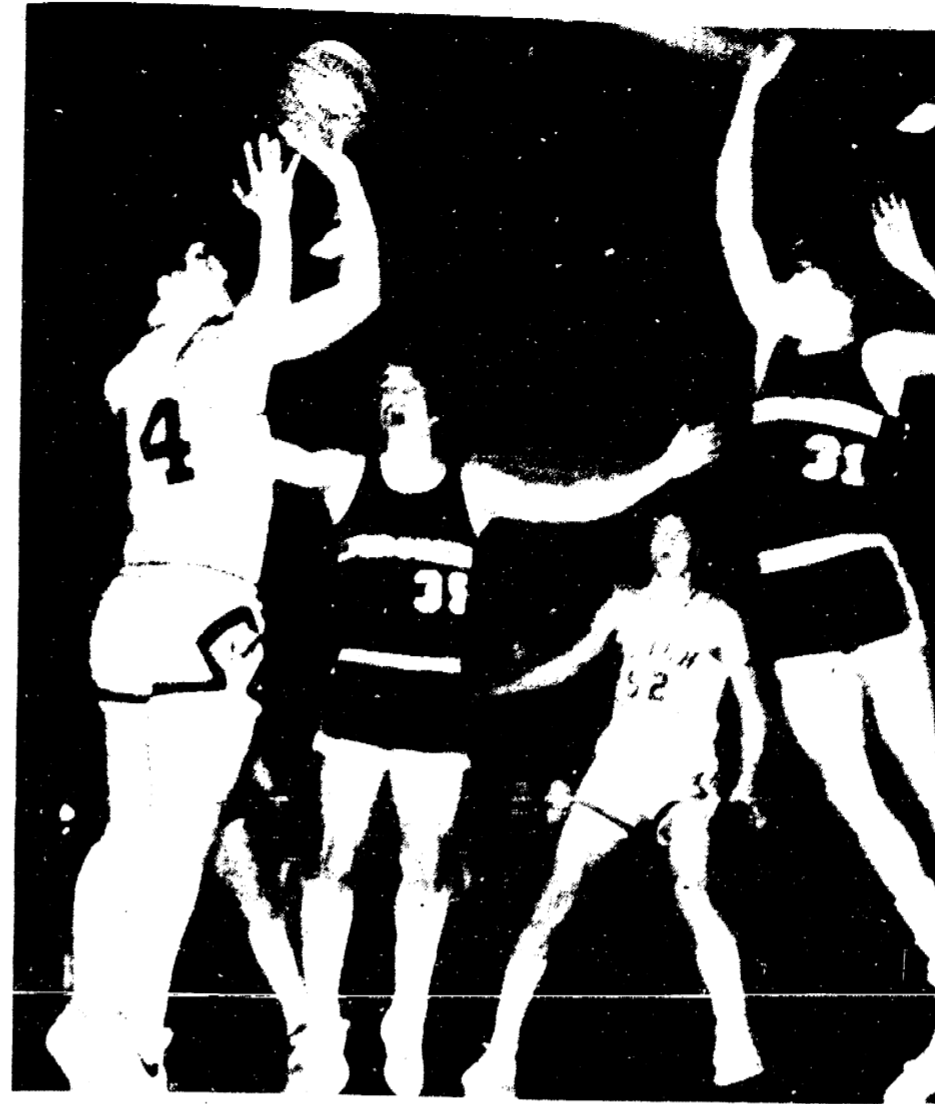


Paul hitting for 2 in tournament on Friday.

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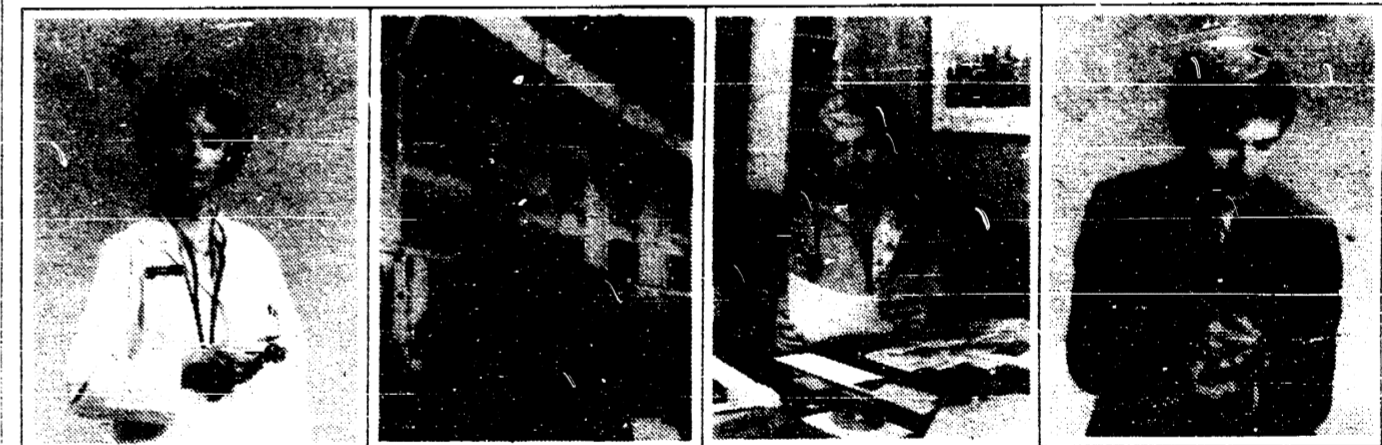
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DOCTOR

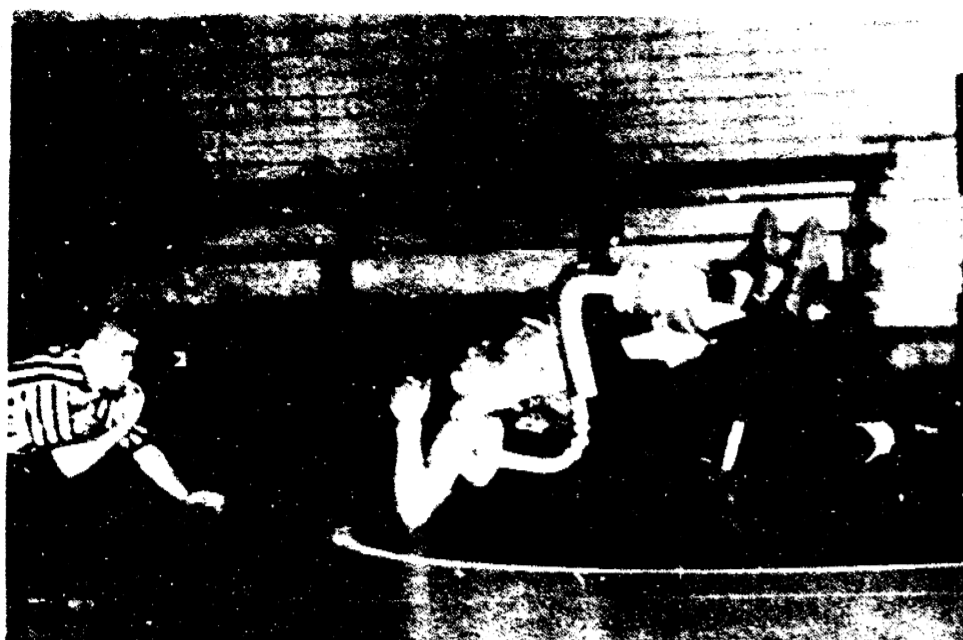

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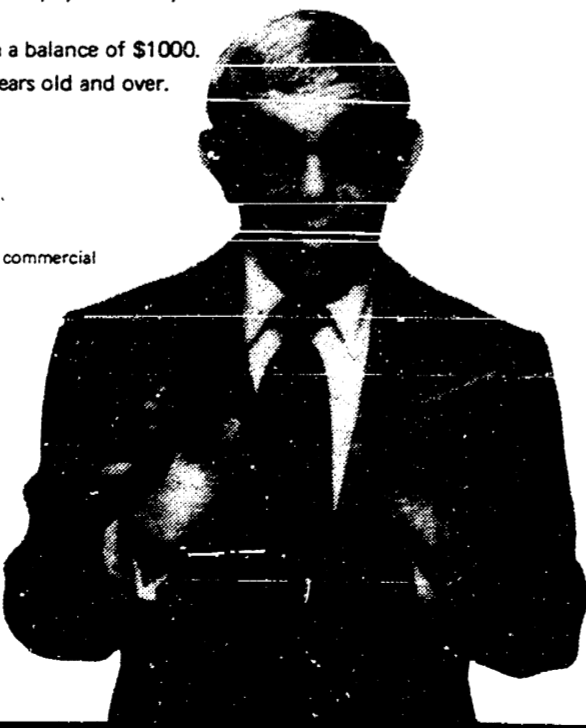

- 1 cup hot beef broth
- 1 teaspoon cornstarch
- 2 cups hot cooked rice

Combine meat, onions, bread crumbs, 1/2 teaspoon salt, and pepper; mix thoroughly. Form into 8 balls 1 1/2 inches in diameter. Brown on all sides in oil. Drain off fat. Combine remaining ingredients except cornstarch and rice; blend until smooth. Pour over meat balls, cover and simmer 15 minutes. Stir 2 tablespoons water into cornstarch. Pour into sauce; cook, stirring constantly, about 1 minute or until thickened. Serve over beds of fluffy rice. Makes 4 servings.

Dennis' new duties include the general administration and management of Extension education programs for agriculture, family living, 4-H youth, natural resources and public policy. He will maintain relationships with Washtenaw County Board of Commissioners and other groups and agencies to improve the quality of Extension programs.

Student Conduct Policy Adopted

Following a review of the recommendations at three monthly meetings the Manchester Board of Education recently adopted policies regarding student conduct. These policies are designed to clearly define unacceptable behavior for students in the school district. In addition the policies identify the legal rights and processes which are guaranteed to all students.

Section A of the student conduct policy defines students rights and responsibilities. Included in this section are items such as the right to express ideas, the right to use educational resources, and the right to limited locker privacy.

Section B defines prohibited behavior and specifies the administrative action to be taken in the event of such behavior.

Some changes have been made regarding previously accepted standards. For example, student smoking on school property will now be prohibited. Designated smoking areas will be discontinued. Similarly, inappropriate displays of affectionate behavior will be unacceptable. Cheating, theft, profanity and illegal drug use are also identified as prohibited behavior.

Administrative actions to be taken in the event of misbehavior will range from a contact with parents or possible suspension. Section C defines procedures for suspension and expulsion. Within this category appeal procedures are defined which give the student the right to legal representation at an expulsion hearing.

These policies will take effect with the beginning of the second semester of the current school year. Meetings are scheduled at Manchester High School to review all phases of the policy with the student body. In addition each student in the high school will be provided with a copy of the new student conduct code. A copy is also available at the Manchester Community Library on the reference shelf.

The intent of the Board of Education is to provide guidelines for administrators, teachers, students, and parents regarding
