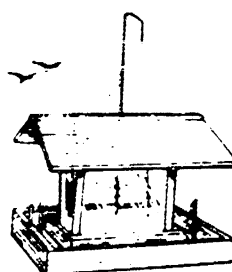

## Manchester Day Care Center

Dinosaurs, fossils and the art of weaving have highlighted the pre-schoolers activities for the month of January at the Manchester Day Care Center, Inc.

A brisk walk across the street to Mrs. Boatwright's opened the world of weaving. The children saw finished projects and those in process on the loom.

After observing real fossils with magnifying glasses the children created their own fossil prints in clay to take home and share with their families.

The story of "Daddy and the Dinosaur" brought much delight and stimulated a discussion on prehistoric animals.

## Understand Plant Hardiness Zones

"The catalog listed it as able to grow in Zone 5. I thought if I planted it close to the house and covered it well each winter it would grow here in Michigan. Do you think it will come back?"

Each spring I can count on several dozen phone calls from gardeners whose struggling exotics didn't struggle through the winter. Most of Michigan is considered plant hardiness Zone 4, indicating lower minimum temperatures than Zone 5. Consumers are advised to pay close attention to hardiness zones, especially when ordering through mail order nurseries outside of their own zone.

The map of plant hardiness zones of the United States and Canada appears in all USDA horticultural publications, nursery and garden catalogs and most good gardening books. The map was originally drawn in 1938, based on 40 years data on average minimum temperatures. Slight revisions were made in 1967.

Placing plants in the correct zone is not as simple or as accurate a process as drawing the "weather" map. Plant hardiness takes into account a number of factors in addition to the average minimum temperatures represented on the map. Key among these are the length of the growing season and the average number of frost-free days. The annual rainfall is important for all plants. For perennials, the average snow cover becomes another critical factor in winter survival. In most cases, placement of plants in one or another hardiness group is based on at least several years of field trials in various parts of the country.

Next time you're tempted to order a plant that is listed as suitable for use in a zone or two south of us, think again. Planting it near a warm foundation or out of the wind might help in terms of minimum temperatures, but you also have to consider the conditions that promote healthy growth, flower bud formation and hardening off in the fall. It's doubtful that we in Michigan can meet the conditions present even one hardiness zone south of us.



### Ask The Governor

**Question: Is there ever going to be any property tax relief for homeowners and senior citizens?**  
**Answer:** Property tax relief is a critically important issue that must be addressed by the Legislature this session. I have recently proposed a \$1.1 billion property tax reduction plan which includes an across-the-board 36 percent cut in homestead property taxes. If quick action is taken, the proposal could affect 1981 July tax bills.  
The plan I have proposed provides for a substantial decrease in property taxes while at the same time providing adequate revenues for the funding of essential services. It is a program consistent with the principle of defined limits to government spending because it proposes a reduction in state and local government spending by a quarter of a billion dollars.  
Under the proposal, all property taxes for operating millage on homesteads in Michigan would be cut by 35 percent. Also, senior citizens would be exempt from the first \$1,400 of all property taxes on residential property which means that more than 90 percent of Michigan senior citizens would pay no property tax at all.  
My proposal would also cut state and local spending by a quarter of a billion dollars.  
A portion of the cost of the proposal would be met with a one-cent increase in the state sales tax. This increase would require a constitutional amendment which would have to be approved by the voters. It is my hope that this issue can be placed on a ballot in June.  
In addition:  
-As property values increase, local millages would be rolled back so that the local unit could receive no increase in revenues unless the local governing board held a public hearing and then voted to allow the inflationary increase.  
-Renters would be able to increase from 17 to 25 percent the proportion of rent they would count as property tax in computing their "circuit breaker" credits.  
-Local governments would be substantially reimbursed for the revenues lost through individual tax bill reductions. The reimbursement would cover about 89 percent of the revenue loss, leaving about \$125 million to be absorbed by local budget reductions.  
-The state would absorb the same amount of cuts in its budget as local units of government, roughly \$125 million. This, combined with the reduction in revenues to local units, would mean a total cut in government spending of a quarter of a billion dollars.  
-In keeping with the desires of many citizens, all Lottery revenues would be earmarked for education only.

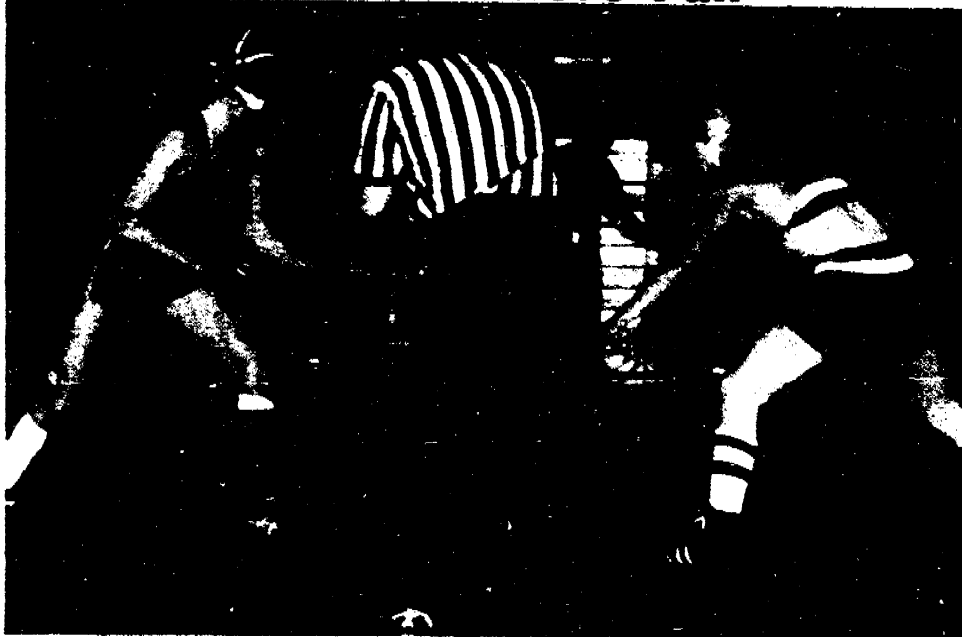

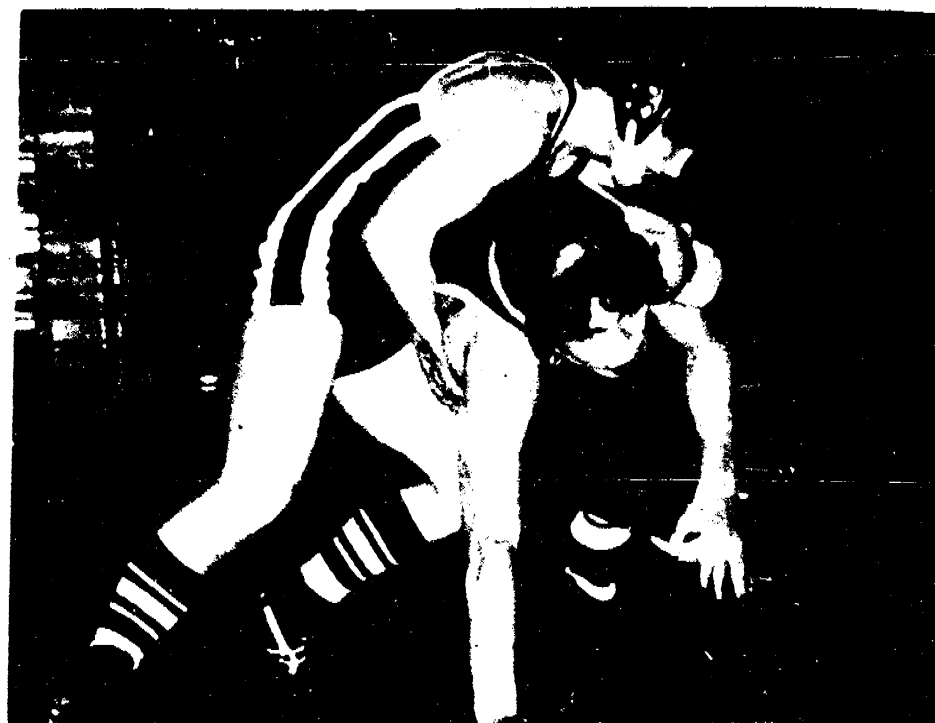

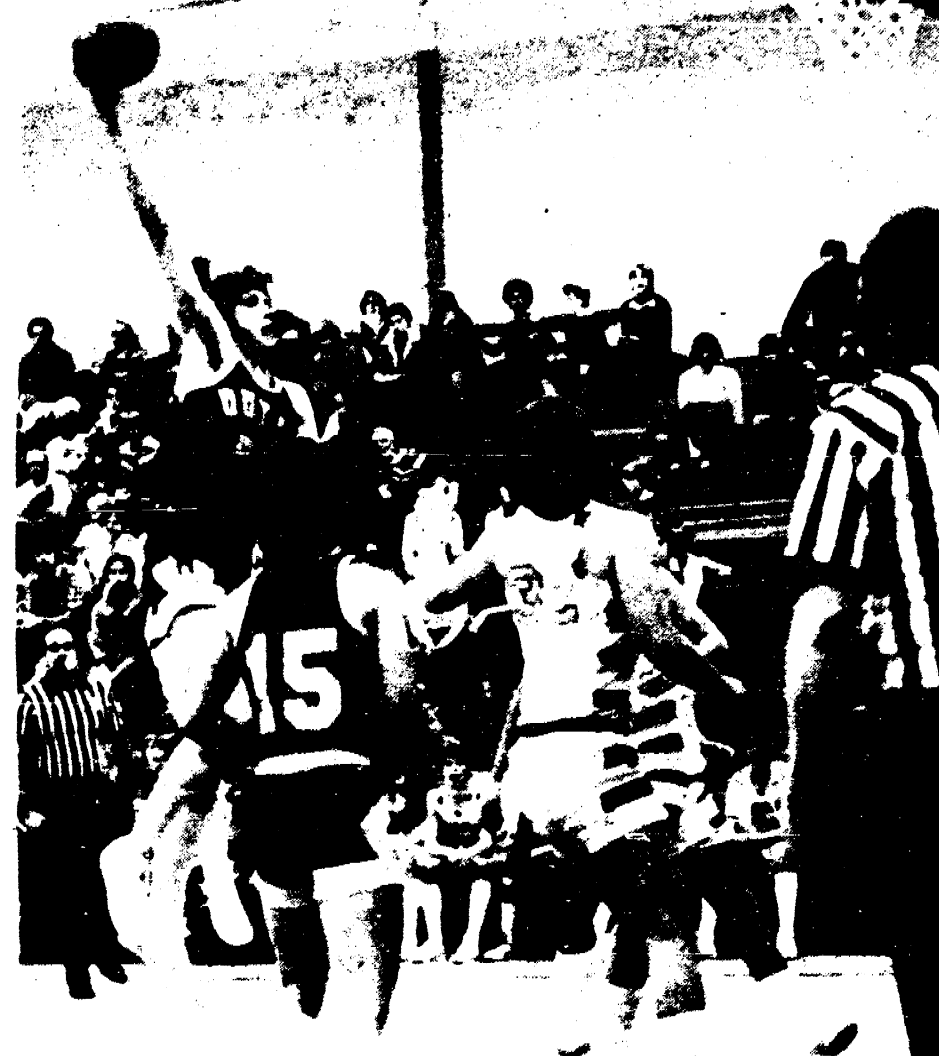

**Nuclear Power** - Governor Milliken has announced that emergency preparedness plans for all three of Michigan's operating nuclear power plants have been tested and approved. Michigan was the second state in the nation to prove its ability to respond to a nuclear power plant accident last June when the Consumers Power Company Big Rock Point near Charlevoix was tested.

**Drunk Drivers** - The Legislature has approved a major overhaul of the state's drunk driving statute for the first time since the law went into effect 31 years ago. The legislation will clarify language in laws related to drunk driving, stiffen penalties for offenders, broaden enforcement officers' authority to make warrantless arrests at the scene of a traffic accident and allow a new form of evidence to be used in court to help juries determine whether a person was operating a vehicle while intoxicated. The Governor is expected to sign the bills soon.

**School Calendar Option** - During the course of a two-year session, many good bills are overlooked or time simply runs out on their chances of being signed into law. Such was the case involving a bill introduced in October which would have allowed Michigan school districts broad discretion in setting their school calendars.

I believe the proposal, which would mandate that the school year consist of 180 days - the present law - or 900 hours, is an outstanding one, and I look for it to come up again in 1981.

This plan would give districts the option of going to a four-day school week, or adopting a year-round calendar, or some other different system that would help them meet escalating costs while maintaining a high standard of education.

Presently, there are no alternatives available to Boards of Education, yet in many instances our public school requirements are not realistically meeting the needs of all our schools or all our pupils.

By expanding the alternatives, districts with disproportionately high transportation and operational costs could run more economically.

For instance, transportation costs could be reduced by one-fifth if a four-day week were instituted and the longer block of time could very well enhance learning.

Community approval has gone hand in hand with the measured success of the students.

Right now, there are some very compelling reasons to take a close look at this proposal. The costs of oil, gas, heat, electricity and labor are rising every day, but these costs are unrelated to what our children learn. By implementing a creative educational calendar we might be able to close school during the coldest months of January and February and make considerable savings.

At the same time, we would be instructing our students in true energy conservation and the need to respond to a changing economic climate.

The times are unusual and they require innovative and creative thinking. This plan could be of benefit to us all.

The bill received strong bi-partisan support, and I believe it has a good chance of passing in 1981.

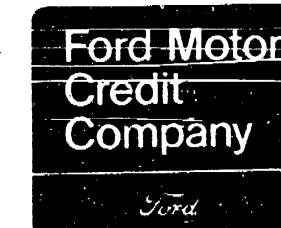

**CARBON MONOXIDE**

Webster's Dictionary defines "accident" as an "unpleasant and unintended happening, sometimes resulting from negligence that results in injury, loss, or damage. A quality that is not essential."

Ask everyone who's had an accident, and they'll agree that it's not essential; yet each winter some of the most tragic happenings are injury or loss of life from carbon monoxide poisoning.

We all know that carbon monoxide poisoning is a threat to life, but it's easy to be careless, thinking that just a few minutes of breathing carbon monoxide fumes won't make any difference. Wrong. A few minutes often makes the difference between life and death.

If winter lives up to its name, we must be on the alert to the threat of idling our automobile engine with the windows closed. Even slightly opened car windows are no guarantee against build-up of this silent killer. If your car is mired in snowdrifts on the highway during a blizzard, don't keep the engine idling for heat (carry a blanket in the car). If you back into a snowbank and clog the tailpipe, don't run the engine with closed windows. And never repair your car with the engine running in a closed garage.

Aside from exhaust pipes clogged with snow and garages filling with carbon monoxide, be alert to subtle odors of exhaust fumes as you drive your car in any season. Although carbon monoxide is odorless, you can smell the exhaust fumes. The fumes you smell may not be from the car ahead, but in the car you drive, and their presence will mean that carbon monoxide is present. Have your mechanic check out the muffler system for rusting spots and loose connections.

Carbon monoxide poisoning is so insidious that the victim usually is unaware of the slow drowsiness that leads to unconsciousness and death. Last year, 227 people in Michigan died of carbon monoxide poisoning, although not all in motor vehicles. Some were overcome by carbon monoxide from fire places, furnaces, piped gas, and unspecified sources. Of that number, however, 37 people died by accident from carbon monoxide in motor vehicles.

Accidents lie in wait to happen to us all, but with a little care we can be sure that carbon monoxide poisoning is not one of them. Be alert to exhaust fumes, and clear the air at the first whiff of trouble. That simple act could make you a victor, not a victim, of an unintended happening.

**News Of Good Things Growing**

Next time you're scooping a spoonful of sugar onto your cereal, biting into a delicious sugar cookie, drenching biscuits with honey, or topping pancakes with maple syrup, thank Michigan farmers! Good things growing in Michigan include our "sweet trio" - sugar, honey and maple syrup.

About 1.7 million tons of sugar beets are harvested here each year, according to the Michigan Department of Agriculture. Processing factories located in the Thumb and Saginaw valley beet growing region produce more than three million pounds of sugar each day.

Honey and maple syrup are two of our oldest agricultural crops. Bees have produced honey for thousands of years and historians say Native Americans were tapping trees when the colonists arrived.

Honey was the principal sweetener when sugar was a rarity, and is the sweetest of the three - one-fifth sweeter than granulated sugar.

When driving through Michigan's countryside, watch for our honey factories. About 106,000 bee colonies produced 6.5 million pounds of honey last year, MDA reports. Bees are also responsible for pollinating millions of dollars worth of crops including blueberries, cucumbers

Trees are tapped in early spring when the days start getting warmer and sap begins to run. About 40 gallons of sap are boiled down to make one gallon of pure Michigan maple syrup.

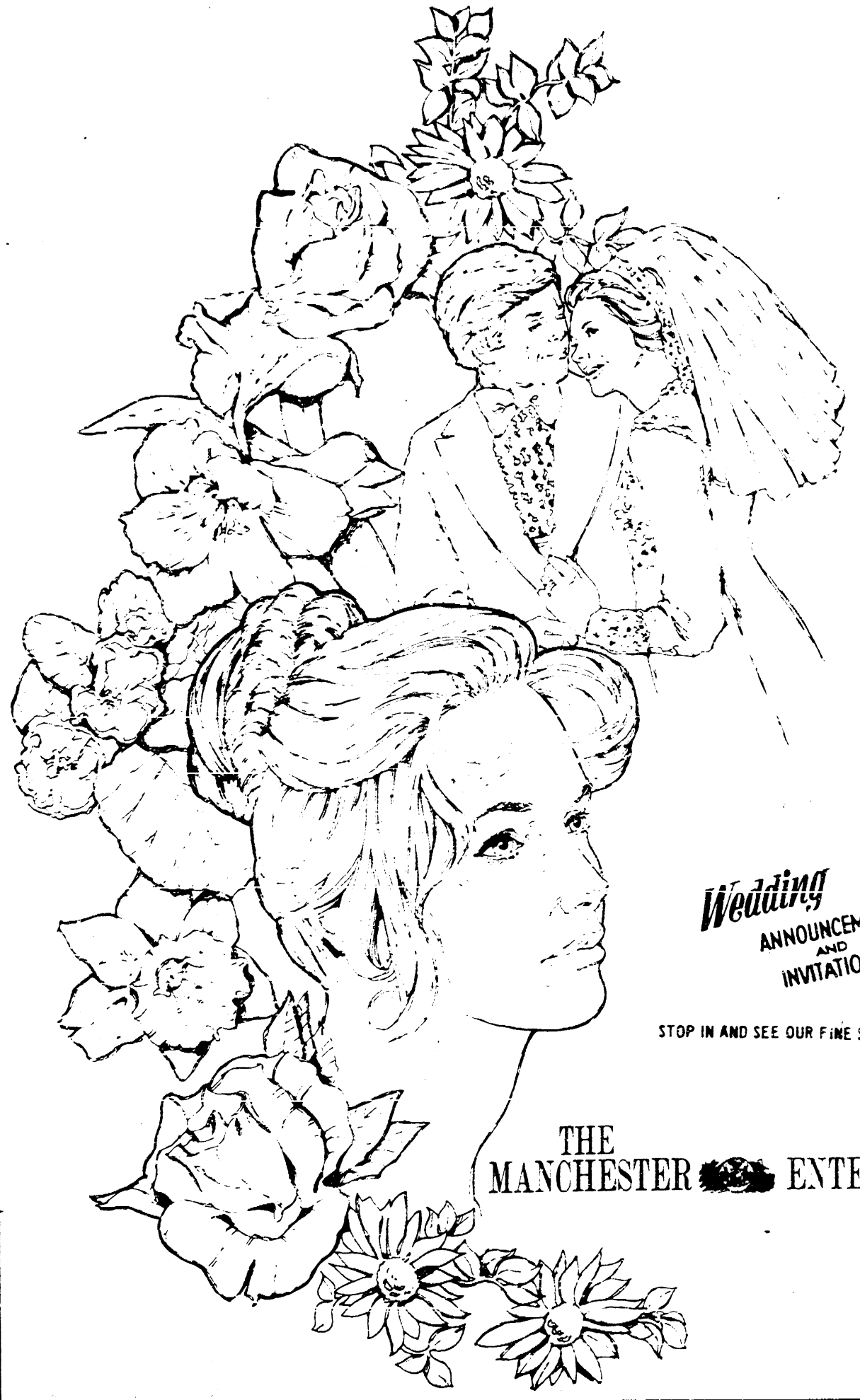

## William L. Philip, Elected Chairman of The Board



The photo, above, is of William L. Philip, newly elected Chairman of the Board and Chief Executive Officer of the Union Savings Bank of Manchester. Mr. Philip fills the vacancy created by the resignation of Stanton G. Roesch as Chairman, this past week.

Mr. Philip, formerly Vice Chairman of the Board, joined the staff of the Union Savings Bank as a consultant and Vice Chairman in December of 1979 and assumed the responsibilities of the Chief Executive Officer in March of 1980, upon the resignation of Richard A. Wolf. Previously, Mr. Philip served as President of the Mason State Bank for ten years and was associated with Manufacturers National Bank of Detroit and the State Savings Bank of Owosso.

Mr. Roesch, former Chairman, continues as a member of the Board of Directors and stated, upon submitting his resignation, "I am pleased with the merger agreement that has been negotiated between The National Bank of Jackson and the Union Savings Bank of Manchester. Steps for the accomplishment of the merger are progressing satisfactorily and, thus, I feel I can relinquish the Chairman's responsibility at this time."

Mr. Philip stated that the application for merger has been filed with the Comptroller of the Currency and a special meeting of the shareholders to consider and ratify the agreement between the two banks is scheduled for Tuesday, March 31, 1981. Shareholders will receive their proxy material early in March. Set forth in the proxy material is the nature of the merger, including the provision for exchange of 1,9730 shares of NBJ stock for each share of Union Savings Bank stock. The current NBJ quarterly dividend is 45¢ per share. Mr. Philip further stated that the merger is expected to be completed by June of this year.

David E. Donaldson, left of Mr. Philip, has acted as Chief Operating Officer of the Union Savings Bank since November 17, 1980, a position he will continue to fill, reporting to Mr. Philip. Mr. Donaldson's services are being provided under an agreement by both banks. He is a Vice President of NBJ and a Group Office Administrator and will have the responsibility of the Union Savings Bank offices after the merger. Mr. Donaldson, in addition to managing several of NBJ's larger offices, in the past, had the responsibility of running the day-to-day operations of the Farmer's State Bank of Concord when it merged with NBJ in 1974.

Mr. Philip stated that, "The Board is pleased that Ron Avery, NBJ Senior Vice President and Controller, has coordinated extensive management support from NBJ's accounting, loan administration and marketing functions to assist the Union Savings Bank of Manchester in this transition period. In summary, all Board members are looking forward to the proposed merger with NBJ."
