Call-A-Ride Transportation For Senior Citizens

Manchester Senior Citizens Council, Inc., announces a new service, Call-A-Ride, opening this month to persons 55 years or over and residing in Manchester Village or Manchester Township. At present the service is limited to trips of medical nature to local facilities as well as to neighboring towns, and will operate Mondays through Friday. Requests for rides must be made three days in advance if at all possible.

There is no charge for the service as drivers are all volunteers. Call-A-Ride is a partial answer to Dial-A-Ride which was cancelled in the out-county areas at the end of January. Manchester Village and Manchester Township have both contributed to the Fund which will operate the new system, making transportation available to Senior residents of the two areas. Drivers will be reimbursed for the gasoline they use in making the trips on a flat rate according to their driving schedules.

For the month of March there are three places one may call for assistance and information - Mrs. Heien (LeRoy) Knickerbocker, 428-8455, Mrs. Beatrice (B.A.) Clark, 428-8649 and Ray Gonyer, president of Manchester Senior Council, Inc. 428-7613. Later in the spring a central number will be announced which will be available at the new police station where volunteers will man the phone for six hours a day, 9:00 through 3:00 on Monday through Friday.

If donations are made for trips the entire amount will go into the Transportation Fund to help maintain and broaden the service. Donations may be made to Senior Citizens Transportation Fund and mailed or given to Mr. Gonyer, Mrs. Knickerbocker, treasurer, or the driver.

Mr. Gonyer credits Manchester Village Administrator, William Zsenyuk for the major role in planning the new service. He commends Mr. Zsenyuk for his interest and assistance as well as Millard Uphaus, co-chairman, Mr. James Hendley, as advisor, Mrs. Terry Jose for secretarial work and the dedicated committee of senior citizens who have worked so diligently on the project.

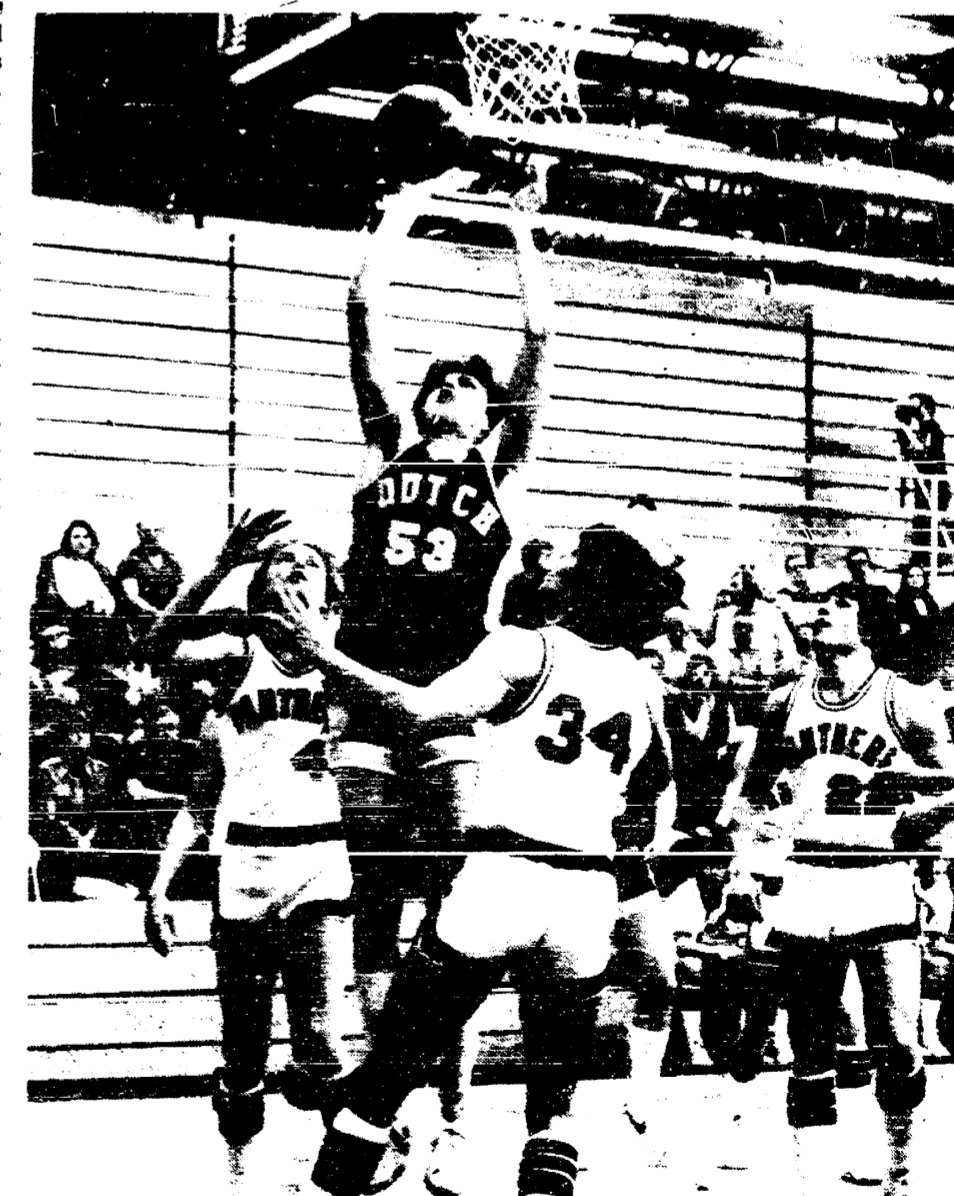

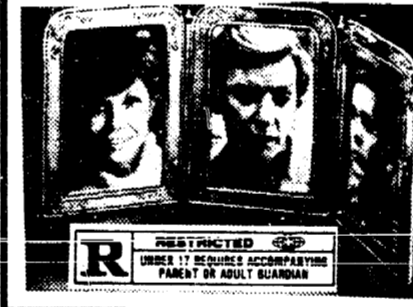

National Employ The Older Worker Week

Americans are generally very resource-conscious, but too often one of our greatest resources, the older worker, goes unnoticed.

March 8 marks the beginning of National Employ the Older Worker Week, and during that week Michigan Employment Security Commission (MESCC) Job Service offices will give special attention to the employment needs of Michigan's senior workers.

Employers can help spread the word that "ability is indeed ageless." Age has little impact on a worker's ability to perform on a job.

There are far too many myths about older workers that question their ability to perform on the job. Years of experience have made many older workers invaluable in terms of the kind of contributions an employer seeks from workers.

Older workers bring a certain amount of knowledge to a job because of many years of past work experience. They are certainly more mature in their approach to the job than many of their younger counterparts, and you can usually expect a high level of job performance from them.

The U.S. Department of Labor has defined older workers as those workers 40 years of age and older. Statistics have shown that usually at the age of 40 workers often begin to experience their first bitter taste of age discrimination. Older workers are not close-minded to new job techniques and responsibilities. In fact, they generally welcome a challenge with a great deal of enthusiasm. They may not be able to run as fast as younger people, but they can certainly work efficiently in most job situations. All they need is a second chance.

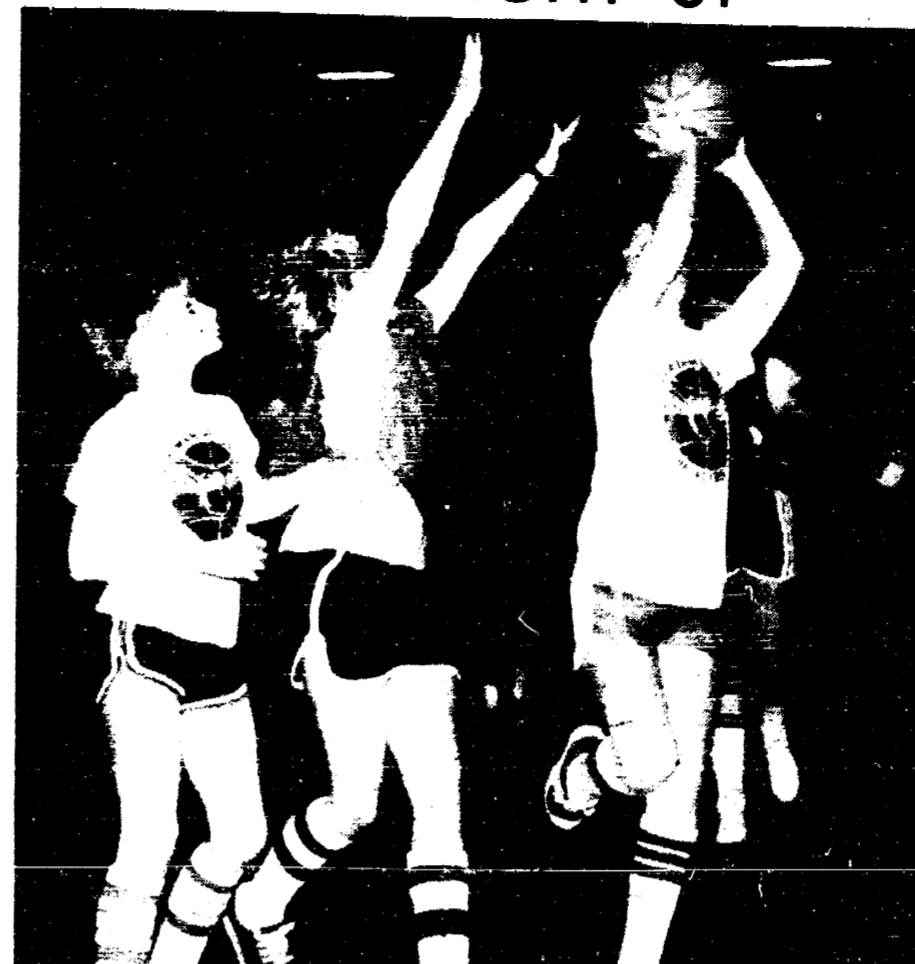

Papa Buggs, alias William Schlieff, died recently after a long fight with cancer.

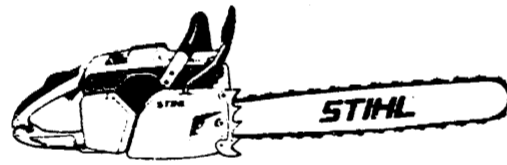

great deal of influence in rallying the voters to support his policies and to inflict it on Congress which gives a great deal of hope for the immediate future.

Perhaps the number of terms served by the Congressmen should be limited. There seem to be too many career Senators and members of the House of Representatives that are interested only in getting re-elected. Only 28 percent of the people approved or the way that they were doing but 94 percent of them were successful in being elected. It seemed before election that the average voter had come to the decision that there was nothing he could do to alter the course which was altering the course of their lives but the November election proved, to a great extent, that they believed they could, and they voted for change.

The principle goal of most Congressmen seems to be to get re-elected and limiting their number of terms would remove most of the advantage of being an incumbent and would eliminate to a great extent, the temptations to take unfair advantage of their positions.

Support for this reform is very scarce in Congress of course, only by freshman members. Most of those who are in leadership positions do not talk about it. So many Americans were frustrated last fall but they, in many cases, did not realize that it was in their power to vote out of office the Congressmen who were responsible for their mess, but the action

that they took to shift the control of the Senate showed that there is an increasing awareness of the responsibility for our present dilemma.

This is the most hopeful symptom that we have seen for to these many years immediately past, and we anxiously await what is going to happen during the next few months: how good a salesman Reagan is when selling his program to Congress and how much blame the folks back home are going to put where it belongs-on the doorstep of our legislators. Let's divest ourselves of many of our professional politicians.

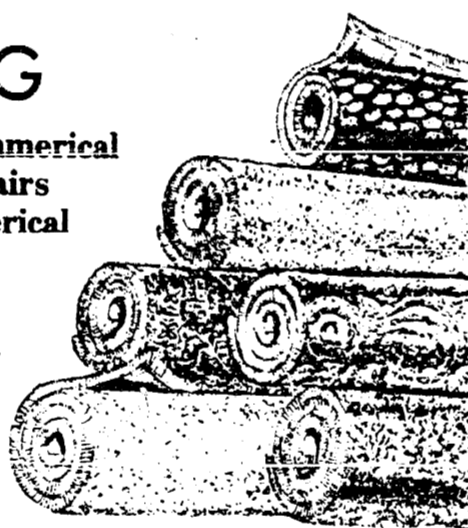

The Ides Of March - Beware!

The plague of the "common cold" occurs more often during cold weather, but March can be a risky month for persons exposed to colds, according to the American Lung Association of Michigan.

Extremes are the norm in March. Temperatures change quickly, and chilling rains oftentimes follow gentle breezes. Weather variety does not cause colds, but it can increase vulnerability to viruses which do cause colds. Viruses are minute infectious agents that can't even be seen with a microscope, but which enter body cells, multiply and then cause disease.

Many different kinds of viruses can cause a cold. Over a hundred have been identified, and that is why no vaccine has been successful. There is little anyone can do to avoid infection but hope for the best and stay away from people who have colds. Infants and young children are the most susceptible to colds because they have not yet built up immunity.

When a cold can't be thwarted, grandmother's advice is still good: aspirin, liquids and even chicken soup may relieve symptoms.

Protect others by covering your coughs and sneezes and keeping your distance from people. Germs escape from the mouth even when you speak. Use tissues and dispose of them in a closed paper bag.

Manchester Family Service Annual Meeting

Manchester Family Service, Inc. annual meeting reported 195 people served this past year and 8,410 miles of volunteer driving. People were served for emergency food, fuel and clothing needs and transported for all types of medical assistance as well as to other agencies such as Social Security, Washtenaw Community College, Legal Aid and the Department of Social Services.
As a furniture distribution center it placed approximately 70 articles with families in need. This form of assistance usually takes place through calls to the Chairman, Mrs. Franklin Reck, for either "needs" or "haves". The two lists are consulted to make for quick turn over in most cases.

The Christmas Project which was reported last January takes place each December as an arm of the Dept. of S.S. and the Salvation Army, covering the School District and all of Manchester Township. The Scavenger Hunt which was conducted by the Middle School Student Council, under the direction of Brian Schick, principal, and assisted by Klager and Pleasant Lake Elementary Schools was the basis for the food boxes for 89 families. Food or Clothing Orders were supplied on the basis of the Salvation Army's criteria for such donations. A free used-clothing shop with toys, dolls, household items and incidentals was part of the project which was assisted by dozens of families in the area and many church and civic groups.

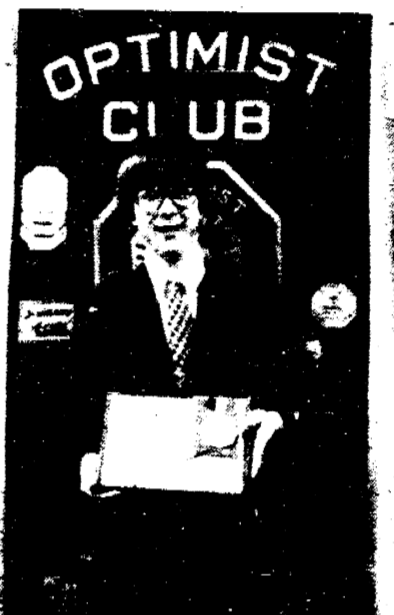

"HIT OR MISS" by farley

I grew up living in a rather small nearly new home on the south side of Jackson. A block or so away was one of the main arteries to downtown Jackson on which were a considerable number of large rather ornate homes built sometime around the turn of the century. In one of the larger ones lived Senator Townsend and his wife. My father worked for the railroad company and took, in his spare time, a minor interest in local Republican politics. He was, at that time, the head of the Soldiers and Sailors Relief Commission which then was a separate part of the "Superintendent of the Poor's" office and at that time there was a considerable number of problems to be settled for the ill and needy veterans of the Civil and Spanish American wars.

In these duties he came in contact with, and came to know, the Senator and his wife and Earl Michener of Adrian, long time Congressman who was one of the best known and influential members of the House of Representatives. I too, as a youngster, met and came to know both of these men and was proud to have them recognize me when we met here and there. They were both very well educated men, always meticulously dressed for any occasion and always seemed to carry out the definition of a gentleman at all times. We respected their knowledge and their judgements. Their wives and families too were models of decorum.

But these things too, in some cases at least, have changed. We hear that one Congressman's wife appears in various
