Dr. Eugene Thompson, Superintendent of the Manchester Schools has advised that the deadline for filing nominating petitions for the Manchester Board of Education will be April 6 at 4:00 P.M. at the Board of Education Office, 710 East Main.

Nominating petitions may be obtained during working hours at the Board of Education Office.

Two positions on the Board of Education will be on the ballot at the annual school election on June 8. One position will be for a 4 year term. A second position will be to fill the remaining two years of the unexpired term which resulted upon the resignation of a Board Member approximately one year ago.

Mr. Ronald Mann of Austin Road and Mrs. Susan Cole of Pleasant Lake Road were appointed in July, 1990 to fill these positions until the next annual election.

Manchester Family Service Annual Meeting

Manchester Family Service, Inc. annual meeting reported 195 people served this past year and 8,410 miles of volunteer driving. People were served for emergency food, fuel and clothing needs and transported for all types of medical assistance as well as to other agencies such as Social Security, Washtenaw Community College, Legal Aid and the Department of Social Services.

As a furniture distribution center it placed approximately 70 articles with families in need. This form of assistance usually takes place through calls to the Chairman, Mrs. Franklin Reck, for either "needs" or "haves". The two lists are consulted to make for quick turn over in most cases.

The Christmas Project which was reported last January takes place each December as an arm of the Dept. of S.S. and the Salvation Army, covering the School District and all of Manchester Township. The Scavenger Hunt which was conducted by the Middle School Student Council, under the direction of Brian Schick, principal, and assisted by Klager and Pleasant Lake Elementary Schools was the basis for the food boxes for 89 families. Food or Clothing Orders were supplied on the basis of the Salvation Army's criteria for such donations. A free used-clothing shop with toys, dolls, household items and incidentals was part of the project which was assisted by dozens of families in the area and many church and civic groups.

There are two other clothing shops during the year for families on assistance. Clean usable clothing is collected for these shops at the time of the shops. In the spring a summer clothing shop is held and in the fall a winter clothing shop.

Other requests for home aides and assistance of all types are cleared by the agency. Referral to professional agencies is

Thirty years ago this month, Manchester held its first American Red Cross Bloodmobile. There had been other clinics here to donate blood for the military in the 40's but Blood Clubs for specific areas began in 1961.

On Monday, March 30, the Knights of Columbus (Hall next to Post Office) will host the spring Bloodmobile for the School District and Township. The hours are 12:00 to 6:00 p.m. as usual.

It is wise to be registered for this clinic for two reasons. One to avoid having to take an undo amount of time at the Hall. Second, to be sure the committee will have the right amount of equipment and a large enough staff here to meet the needs of the community's generosity.

Church bulletins have already announced the clinic. Each church in the area has a recruiter who is signing up members. The industries in Manchester will start their registrations around the 20th. In the meantime anyone can register at locations in Union Savings Bank, Great Lakes Federal Savings and the IGA Market.

I grew up living in a rather small nearly new home on the south side of Jackson. A block or so away was one of the main arteries to downtown Jackson on which were a considerable number of large rather ornate homes built sometime around the turn of the century. In one of the larger ones lived Senator Townsend and his wife. My father worked for the railroad company and took, in his spare time, a minor interest in local Republican politics. He was, at that time, the head of the Soldiers and Sailors Relief Commission which then was a separate part of the "Superintendent of the Poor's" office and at that time there was a considerable number of problems to be settled for the ill and needy veterans of the Civil and Spanish American wars.

I too, as a youngster, met and came to know both of these men and was proud to have them recognize me when we met here and there. They were both very well educated men, always meticulously dressed for any occasion and always seemed to carry out the definition of a gentleman at all times. We respected their knowledge and their judgements. Their wives and families too were models of decorum.

Annual reports will be read from all the agencies that are represented in the United Way Budget, and representatives will be present to answer questions concerning their organizations and activities.

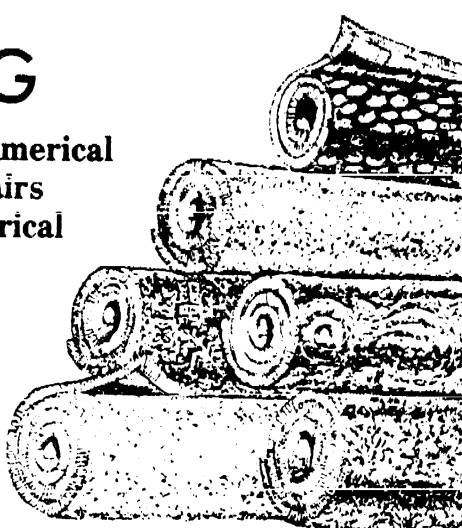

Manchester Village Planning Commission

January 6, 1981

The regular meeting of the Manchester Village Planning Commission was held at the Village Hall, with members present: Hinkley, Leeson, Bond, Smith, Grossman, Alber, Krauss, and Tracy.

The meeting was called to order at 7:30 p.m. by Chairman Hinkley.

Minutes of the meeting of December 2 were read, and corrections made. A motion for approval was made by Smith, seconded by Krauss, and unanimously approved.

The agenda for this meeting was

primarily to consider changes to the Zoning Ordinance. However, Mr. Barkley of the Washtenaw County Metropolitan Planning Commission was unable to be here, so this matter was postponed until the meeting of February 3.

Mr. Davison has requested rezoning from AG (Agricultural District) to R1A (Single-Family Semi-urban Residential District) of his property consisting of the former railroad right-of-way from Territorial Street to Adrian Street. He is to provide a complete description of the property. It was suggested that Mr. Davison be consulted as to revising his request such that it be for change to R1B (Single-Family Urban Residential District) rather than R1A, in order to be consistent with the residential districts in this area.

Further, it appears that to rezone his property, consideration should also be given to the properties between the former railroad right-of-way and Territorial/Adrian Streets, belonging to Consumers Power Co. and two other owners. It was likewise felt that at the same time a similar rezoning should be investigated for the

adjacent area bounded on the north by the rear property lines of lots on the south side of Grove Street, thence along the east river bank to the south side of the former railroad right-of-way, then along this line westerly to Adrian Street at the eastern extent of Mr. Davison's property. All of these areas are presently zoned AG.

With regard to the old bus parked in front of 320 Riverside Drive, the situation is static pending further investigation and more discussion with Mr. Roberts, the owner.

Plans are in process for further meetings relative to establishment of an "Industrial Park".

The review of street names as shown on the current village map (and street signs) is still being undertaken by the Senior Citizens and other concerned persons.

Adjournment was moved by Tracy, seconded by Bond. The meeting was declared adjourned at about 9:00 P.M.

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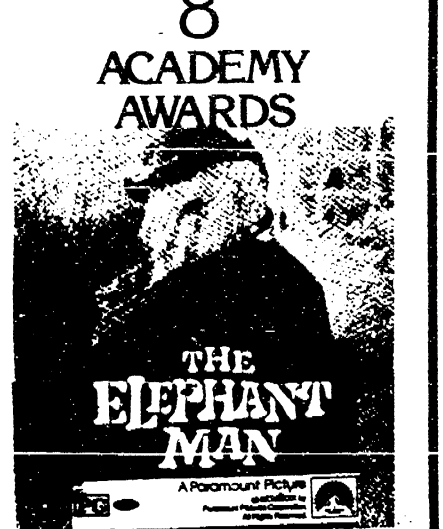
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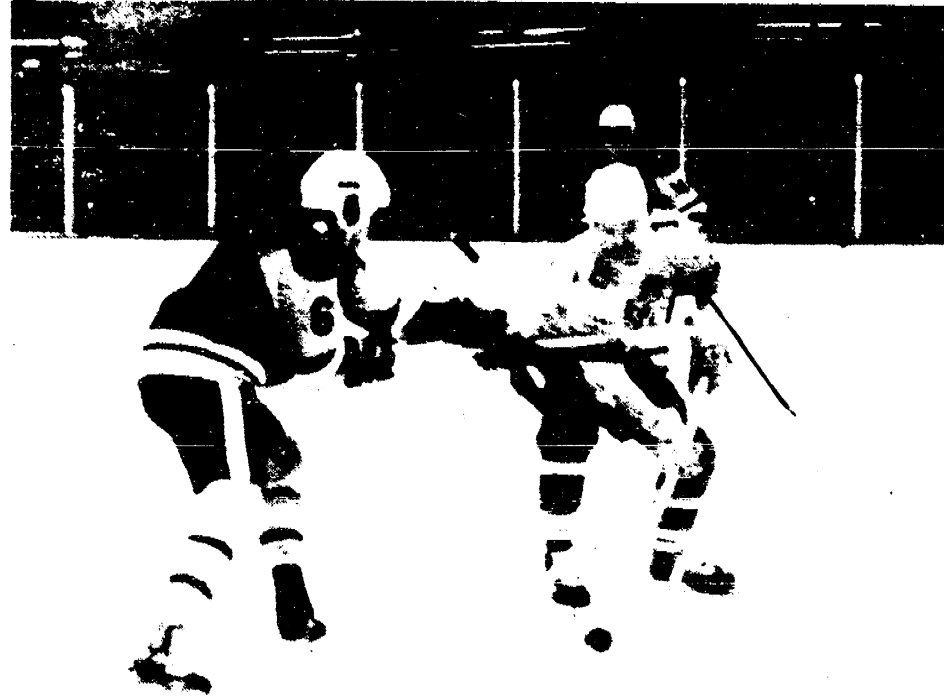
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Keeping Up With Sports

Shawn Dresch breaks loose and scores.

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
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Hot Lunch Program

Among the questions that parents ask about the lunch program are "Can I visit the lunch line or eat lunch at the school?" Parents are invited and encouraged to visit the school lunch program and eat lunch with their children. If you would like to eat lunch please call the individual school office to have your lunch included in the daily count, this should be done the day before your visit. The cost for an adult lunch is \$1.50 and the cost for the salad bar at the high school is \$1.00. The salad bar at the high school has proven to be successful with the students and adults. In the 23 days since it started over 1,000 salads have been served, averaging approximately 50 a day. The people who work in the school lunch program do an outstanding job at seeing the students get a good meal served in a fast and orderly manner. Since the start of school in September thru February 48,832 meals have been served to students and adults. Many studies on school lunch programs have shown that the cost of a hot lunch is still "one of the best deals in town."

One final note, in the near future the students at Klager will return to buying the weekly milk and meal tickets on Thursday mornings only. This is being done to cut down on the time students wait in line to buy tickets and eat lunch. Notices will be sent home explaining how this is to be done before this system is started.

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
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Board of Education Minutes

REGULAR

February 16, 1981

The meeting was called to order by the President William Broucek at 8:05 P.M.

Roll Call Of Officers: Members present; DuFresne, Horning, Cole, Broucek, Mann, Little (arrived at 8:20 P.M.) Members absent: Bunney.

Communications: Secretary DuFresne read communication from the WISD School Officers Association pointing out that a meeting of the Michigan Association of School Boards legislative committee will be held at the WISD Building at 7:00 P.M. on Thursday, February 19. Mr. DuFresne indicated that he will attempt to attend. Mr. Broucek asked the superintendent if he would also plan to attend. Dr. Thompson indicated that he would be out of town that evening but will attempt to have a staff member present.

Mr. DuFresne also pointed out that according to the story in the February 16 Ann Arbor News, Ms. Laurie Fitzgerald has been named a DAR candidate for citizen of the year award. Mr. Broucek asked the Superintendent to communicate the congratulations of the Board of Education to Ms Fitzgerald.

Visitor Input: There were no speakers during the visitor input category.

Minutes of Previous Meeting: After discussion it was moved by Horning supported by DuFresne to approve the minutes of the January 19 regular meeting as corrected. The correction to include at Cole's request the notation that information was also requested regarding transportation costs and building use data during the discussion regarding Pleasant Lake School. All Yeas.

It was moved by Mann supported by Horning to approve the minutes of the February 2, 1981 special meeting as

presented. All yeas.
Financial Report: It was moved by Horning supported by Mann to approve the financial report showing a balance of \$504,535.16 as of January 31, 1981. All Yeas.

Bills Payable: It was moved by DuFresne, supported by Horning to approve the bills payable in the amount of \$283,201.27. All yeas.

Discussion Items:
A. Principals Kappler, McGuire and Shick reported to the Board regarding their in-service training session on teacher evaluation and the process which is used to evaluate teachers in the Manchester schools. Dr. Thompson also briefly reported regarding the directions he is taking in the development of a new process for evaluation. Board members and administrators shared information and perceptions regarding the evaluation process as currently conducted.

B. Millage Election Date: Dr. Thompson outlined the problems of attempting to schedule a millage election prior to June 1 and recommended that the millage date be scheduled to coincide with the general school election on June 8, 1981. After discussion during which Board members noted that school will still be in session on that date and that the added time will allow for more accurate budget data. It was moved by DuFresne, supported by Horning to set June 8, 1981 as the date for the Manchester Community Schools Millage Election. Vote: All yeas.

C. March Special Meeting Schedule: After discussion the Board agreed to schedule special policy work sessions on March 2 and March 23.

D. Finance Committee Report: Mr. Little reported that the Finance Committee Meeting had been cancelled due to severe weather the previous week. Dr. Thompson reported that the only new piece of financial information was the

apparent certainty of an additional executive order reduction in state categorical aid. It is anticipated that the reduction will be 1% and will appear in the final state aid payment to the district. It was also indicated that since the district has already received all state aid monies due for the current fiscal year the reduction will have virtually no meaning.

E. Superintendent's Report: After apologizing for the need to deliver additional negative information Dr. Thompson reported that continued problems in the transportation department had resulted in the loss of an engine in a spare bus and a temporary breakdown in the rear axle of another vehicle. Key staff illnesses were also indicated as a source of difficulty in meeting maintenance and transportation repair time lines. The Superintendent also reported that he had represented the Board of Education at the funeral of the husband of Middle School teacher Phyllis Hamilton.

Old Business:
A. Grievance Committee: Dr. Thompson reported that through an apparent misunderstanding the meeting of the grievance committee had not taken place. Attempt will be made to reschedule the meeting. It was moved by DuFresne and supported by Mann to table item A of Old Business.

New Business:
A. Appointment of Architectural Firm: After a lengthy discussion involving the characteristics, skills, and work of the firms under consideration it was moved by DuFresne, supported by Broucek to hire

the architectural firm of MJK of Lansing, Michigan to conduct an option study of the school district facilities. On a roll call vote: yeas: Little, Mann, Broucek, Horning, DuFresne, Cole, Nays: None.

It was moved by Horning, supported by DuFresne to adjourn the meeting at 10:05 P.M. All Yeas.

Pleasant Lake School

21. The amount necessary to keep P.L. open is a small percentage of the total budget.

22. What are the differences in test scores between P.L. & Klarger?

23. Property values would go down if the students are bused.

24. The 10 acre residential limitation in the township tends to limit the number of children. If this changes the area could grow.
