### Letters To The Editor

#### LETTER TO THE EDITOR

An inequality in assessing is the 5 different methods of finding "true cash value" depending on the type of property. These methods are mandated by the state tax commission, a bureaucratic body set up to implement the State Constitution's provision to assess at "50% of true cash value".

The method used for trailer parks is, to tax the park owner on the improved value of the lot. For most of your homes the assessment on the lot by itself would be far less than \$10,000. The mobile home occupant pays a specific tax of \$36 per year on his trailer in lieu of property tax. This would be equal to an assessment of about \$600. Nice!

The method used for apartments is based on how much profit they should have made. If the tax rate goes up, or if interest rates increase, or if vacancies increase, their assessment goes down. When has a home been decreased for any of these reasons?

If a home were assessed by the apartment method and if the home would rent for \$500 per month, for example, it

would be assessed at about \$16,000, including the lot. Any other rental rate would give a proportionate assessment.

The tax commission could decide to apply any of the methods if it wished to. The one now used for homes is: "what your neighbor sold his for", gives the highest of any of them. I believe the legislature could direct the tax commission to use a different method, but they seem to be interested only in raising some other tax by more than they cut off the property tax.

My assessment increase for 2 years exceeds the total price I paid in 1950. At the present rate, the 1981 tax will be over ten times the tax I paid in 1951. I voted for Tish - don't you wish you had.

#### Letter To The Editor

An open letter to members of The Manchester School Board:

I am writing to express my concern over the possible closing of Pleasant Lake School. In strictly monetary terms, it has not been conclusively shown to me that closing Pleasant Lake School would in fact save any money. It may turn out to be a costly move in the long run; transporting the Pleasant Lake children into Manchester may require an additional bus and teacher overload. In addition to this, all of us have recently had our tax assessments raised and we here in Freedom Township will generate the additional funds necessary for the school. The physical structure already exists, the teachers cannot be let go, so what happens to our tax dollar? Those of us who live at the edge of the district and many miles from town feel that it would be detrimental to our young children to ride so long on a bus everyday. Furthermore, the intimate and caring qualities of Pleasant Lake School, due to its size and proximity, are something on which we cannot put a price tag. These are qualities that are fast disappearing from American Life and they are fully embodied at Pleasant Lake School.

I sincerely urge the school board to be responsive to the wishes of the taxpayers. Over 500 people have signed a petition stating their desire to see the school remain open. We, too, as taxpayers would like to have our community school continue functioning as such as this is in fact the benefit of our tax dollars. Let us work together to increase our educational opportunities and this begins by not closing neighborhood schools.

### Annual Report Due April 15

Annual reports of 1980 earnings must be filed by April 15 by people receiving social security benefits who earned more than the annual exempt amount in 1980. Jose B. Vidaurri, social security district manager in Ann Arbor said.

The 1980 annual exempt amounts were \$5,000 for people 65 and over and \$3,720 for people under 65 of last year.

People who received some benefits in 1980 who earned more than the exempt amount are required to file a report of those earnings by April 15.

Those who received no benefits in 1980 are not required to file a report, but, Vidaurri said, those people should file a report to make sure that any benefits that might be due for the year are paid.

A person who earned less than anticipated, for example, may be due some benefits. Vidaurri said the only way these benefits can be paid is if the person files an

annual report.

The general rule is that \$1 in benefits is withheld for each \$2 of earnings above the exempt amount. A person can have substantial yearly earnings before all benefits are withheld. For example, a 65 year old person whose monthly benefit rate is \$360 could earn \$13,400 before all benefits for 1980 are withheld, Vidaurri said.

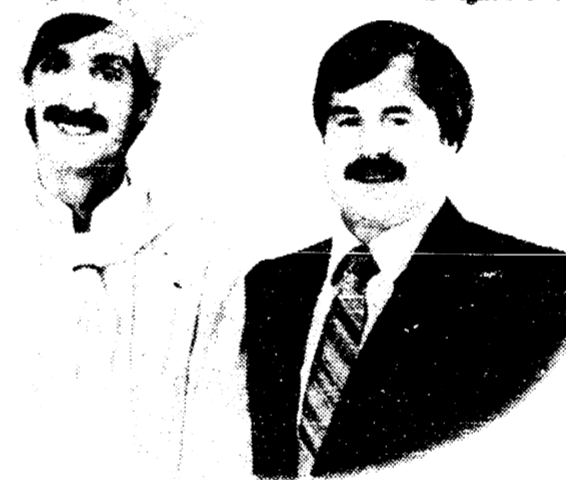
People who are required to file an annual report should have received a copy in the mail. If they have not, they should contact the nearest social security office to obtain a copy. Those not required to file, but who wish to do so, can also get a copy of the form at any social security office.

The 1981 annual exempt amounts are \$5,500 for people 65 or older any part of 1981 and \$4,080 for people under 65 all of 1981.

More information about annual reports and the annual earnings test can be obtained at the Ann Arbor social security office, located at 200 E. Liberty St. The teleservice number is 994-3310.

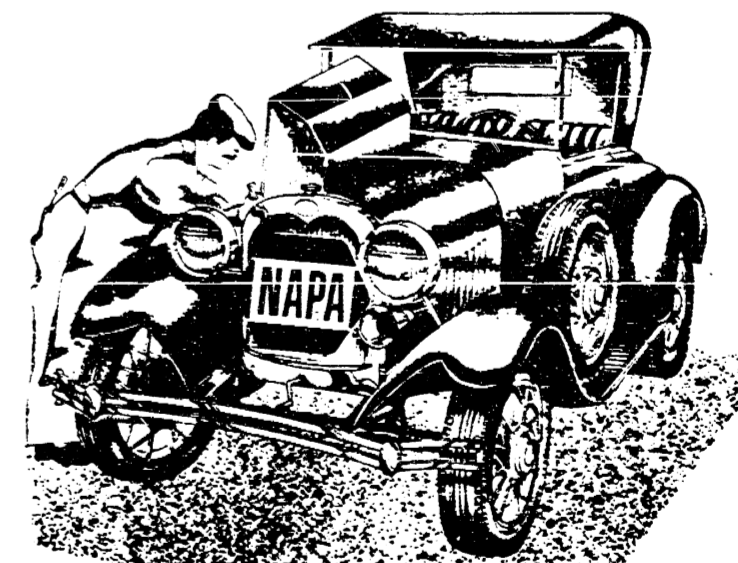
