High School Students Learn Banking Procedures

On March 5th, the Business Education Department of Manchester High School invited Dave Donaldson, a local bank official, to discuss the business of banking with the students. Mr. Donaldson, who serves as the Chief Operating Officer for Union Savings, spoke on the many services that banks offer and how we consumers should utilize them to our advantage. Also discussed were the banking procedures of the future.

Mr. Donaldson broke banking down into three categories: deposits, loans, and miscellaneous. Deposit services consist of the following programs: passbook savings, statement savings, certificates of deposit, and negotiable order of withdrawal (N.O.W.) accounts. Each of these programs pay the depositor interest for the use of their funds.

Mr. Donaldson explained that loans can be classified as either installment, mortgage or commercial. Installment loans are used by the consumer to finance new cars, boats, and trips. Mortgage type loans are used to finance the purchase of a home. Commercial loans are used by businesses for building expansion, product improvement and new machinery.

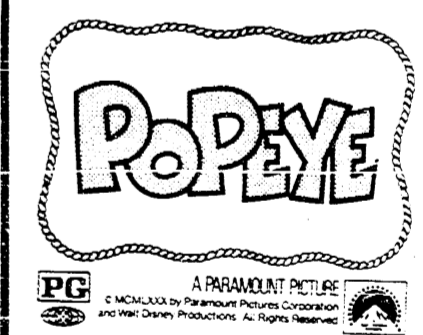

Research Study Seeks Heart Attack Victims

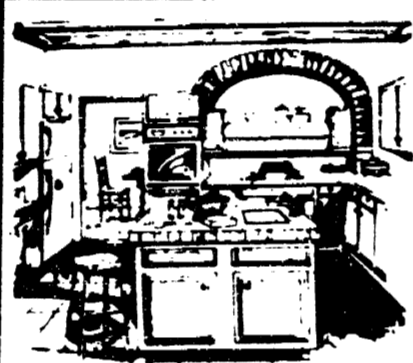
"Can heart attacks be prevented by lowering cholesterol?" is the question asked by a team of University of Minnesota researchers conducting a study of the relationship between heart disease and cholesterol. Most heart trouble results from atherosclerosis or hardening of the arteries. A clue to the cause of atherosclerosis may be that cholesterol, a fatty substance, if found in diseased arteries; it is, however, still uncertain whether lowering cholesterol can actually prevent heart attacks. The research team hopes to answer this question. The University is seeking persons aged 28 through 64 who have had only one heart attack and that attack was in the past 5 years. News Of Good Things Growing

There's more to mint than jelly, although that's nice with lamb chops. One of the many good things growing in Michigan, mint flavors our chewing gum and our toothpaste, our candy canes at Christmas, and decorates our frosty summer drinks.

Mint is making a comeback in Michigan, once the nation's leading producer, and the country's largest mint oil processor is headquartered in Kalamazoo.

According to the Michigan Department of Agriculture, 3,800 acres of spearmint were grown here last year and fewer acres of peppermint. About 118,000 pounds of oil were produced from the mint leaves, with farmers receiving \$1,475,000 for the crop.

Mint oil is extracted by a steam-distilling process, usually on the farm, then shipped to commercial firms for further refining. If you're driving through a region where mint is being harvested, roll down the car windows and enjoy the fragrance. Up close, it gets a bit overpowering, but good for the sinuses.

Fresh mint leaves are attractive for garnishes, or may be glazed with a sugar syrup and then dried. Use fresh mint leaves to provide refreshing new flavor in fruit cups, coleslaw, with peas or zucchini, in cream cheese, and with veal or lamb dishes.

Or you can chop fresh mint leaves, steep them in boiling water for a few minutes, then use the flavored water in fruit gelatins or in sherbets. Mint teams up well with chocolate in hot milk drinks, in sauce and desserts.

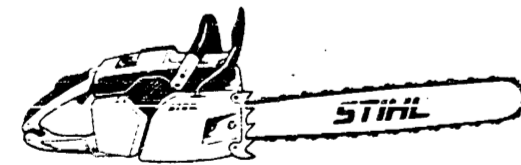
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Potato Sticks Bake With Tasty Cheese Coating



Crispy Parmesan Potato Sticks are the perfect partner to juicy hamburgers or steaks. Made with flavorful Washington Russets, these tasty potato treats are similar to French fried potatoes, but are oven-baked rather than deep fried.

The potatoes are cut into long strips and dipped first in melted butter, then in fine bread crumbs flavored with Parmesan cheese and garlic powder. The potato sticks bake until tender on the inside, crisp and golden on the outside.

Now while supply and quality are still at their peak, it's a good idea to buy enough Washington Russet potatoes to have on hand for all your family's favorite potato dishes. They keep well if stored in a cool, dry, dark area with good ventilation.

PARMESAN POTATO STICKS

- 2 pounds Washington Russet potatoes
- 1/2 cup butter or margarine, melted
- 1/2 cup each fine dry bread crumbs and grated Parmesan cheese
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1/8 teaspoon each garlic powder and pepper

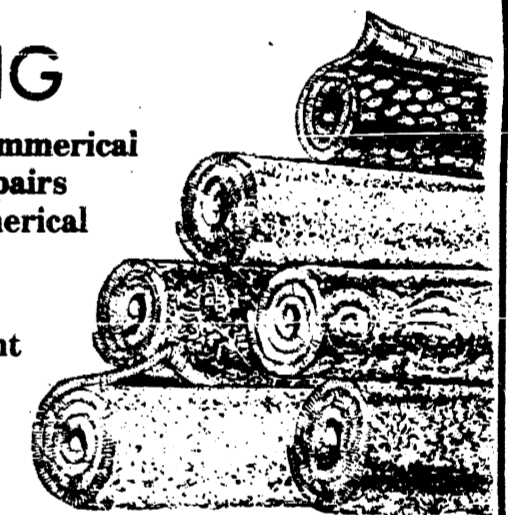
Peel potatoes; cut lengthwise into quarters. Cut each quarter into 3 strips. Roll in melted butter, then in mixture of crumbs, cheese, salt, garlic powder and pepper. Place in single layer in shallow baking dish. Pour any remaining butter over potatoes. Bake at 400°F. 30 to 35 minutes or until potatoes are tender. Makes 6 servings.

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In its 1980 "Family Issues Voting Index," the National Christian Action Coalition cites a biblical reference, Hosea 4:6, to say that in America are "destroyed for lack of knowledge." I, too, believe that ignorance is a large part of the problem facing this country but while the Coalition considers lack of knowledge to be not knowing which politicians oppose their opinions, I think that "lack of knowledge" also means not knowing exactly what an organization stands for.

Consider the term pro-family as it is used to describe the political philosophy of some conservative groups that have become an increasingly dominant feature of the American political landscape.

Pro-family conjures up images of valued individualism, humanism, and close-knit families. In reality, however, it is used as a code phrase for an ideology that extends far beyond the scope of family issues, seeking to enact legislation that violates many of the constitutional principles established by the Founding Fathers of this country, most notably separation of church and state. And, despite the humanistic images pro-family brings to mind, many of the organizations based on this philosophy actually support legislation that would infringe upon the civil liberties and rights of American citizens.

Some of the self-styled religious, pro-family political organizations have delved into issues having very little to do with either preserving the sanctity of the family or religion. For example, pro-family groups have, in the past, taken strong stands on foreign relations bills to oppose economic sanctions against Rhodesia and to support Taiwan, the SALT II and Panama Canal treaties, tax cut legislation, and defense issues such as the B-1 bomber and the MX missile. While I feel that these issues are very important, I do not think that sectarian religious principles necessarily offer specific answers to them.

In addition, these groups, who supposedly believe in the worth of an individual, support actions in the name of family protection that would infringe upon the rights of women, children, minorities, and others -- all American citizens, all human beings. If some of these organizations have their way, public-interest lawyers would be prohibited from handling desegregation cases and attempts to provide parental control over corporal punishment in schools and to tighten child abuse statutes would be thwarted. Such actions, coming from groups labeled pro-family, are often inconsistent with the humanistic ideals they ostensibly espouse.

So as not to allow this country's basic constitutional principles to be "destroyed for lack of knowledge," I urge our citizens to make sure that the self-styled pro-family groups they support are truly founded upon the humanistic ideals deserving of their religious and family label.

Weather Doctor

Anyone who ever has been depressed when it's gloomy, sluggish when it's humid or sniffling when pollution is heavy believes weather affects well-being.

Those with chronic lung diseases such as emphysema or asthma usually learn only through experience what sort of weather or pollution affects them adversely, according to the American Lung Association of Michigan. During some seasons they watch the evening news in hope of a change in the weather.

In Europe, a special weather forecasting service goes one step further. It predicts the effect of today's weather against tomorrow's physical and behavioral well being. In use throughout West Germany for nearly 20 years, the system includes animated television forecasts which indicate relative comfort values against "normal" or "caution" ranges for specific health problems. These include asthma, arthritis, cardiovascular disease, migraine, attention span and reaction time.

The system is being introduced in the U.S. and Canada this year.

Will the TV weatherman replace the doctor? Not likely, says the American Lung Association of Michigan. But discussing weather-related symptoms with the physician can help those with emphysema and asthma learn which pollutants, irritants or temperatures to avoid.

Outstanding Food Services Recognized

Sixty food service establishments including bars, cafeterias, restaurants, fast food outlets and meal preparation services in Washtenaw County were recognized with awards for their outstanding level of sanitation during the past year.

The Washtenaw County Board of Health presented the annual food service awards to establishments which have avoided repeat violations during at least two inspection reports spanning a period of one to two years and which had no documented cases of food related illness. They had also been under the same ownership throughout the year.

From over 600 bars and food establishments in Washtenaw County the County Sanitarians submitted nominations for establishments which maintained high standards of sanitation. Sanitarians based their nominations on several factors including healthfulness of food, proper food handling, proper food protection, good personal hygiene, proper construction and maintenance of food equipment and utensils, safe water and sewage facilities, proper plumbing, proper garbage and refuse disposal, proper insect and rodent control procedures, good cleanliness, adequate lighting and ventilation and miscellaneous other items.

The awards were issued for the first time in 1978. This year a review committee selected sixty (60) winners. Thirteen of the establishments have now won the award three years in a row, eighteen are recipients for a second time, and 29 are first-time winners.

Food establishments which have been recognized three years in a row from this area are the Palomino Inn, Manchester Dairy Queen and Village Pizza.

Tornado Actions

The Manchester Township Fire Department and the Manchester Police Department advise the residents of Manchester that a 3 minute blast of the fire siren will be blown if a tornado has been sighted nearby and that you should go at once to a shelter area. If you see or hear the tornado coming, do not wait for the Warning Signal - go to your shelter area if there is time, if not, curl up on the floor and protect yourself as much as possible. The danger signs of a tornado are severe thunderstorms-thunder, lightning, heavy rains, and strong winds, hail-pellets of ice from dark-clouded skies, roaring noise-like a hundred railroad locomotives; a crashing thunderous sound, funnel-dark, spinning "rope" or column from the sky to the ground.

When a tornado threatens you should:

- * Stay away from windows, doors, and outside walls. Protect your head.
- * In homes and small buildings, go to the basement or to an interior part on the lowest level. Get under something sturdy.
- * In schools, hospitals, and public places, move to pre-designated shelter areas. Interior hallways on lowest floors are best.
