A friend of mine told me the other day that he had run across a new symbol of affluency that has come into our midst. School District Seeks Automobile Donation

Due to the increasing costs of operating the Driver Education Program the Manchester Community Schools are seeking donations of driveable automobiles which may be used in the program. Such automobiles should be relatively in sound condition according to Superintendent Thompson. "We can repair vehicles in our transportation department", said Thompson, "however, we need to be certain that it is a cost efficient system." Area residents who are interested in donating a vehicle should contact the school district at 428-7300. All such donations are tax deductible. The school district will provide a letter describing the donation and indicating the blue book value of the vehicle.

The intention of this request is to reduce costs by maintaining a group of sound, used automobiles which will be used only for driver education. "The community has responded in the past to our requests for help", said Thompson, "we are hopeful that once again the help will be forthcoming".

Tornado Actions

The Manchester Township Fire Department and the Manchester Police Department advise the residents of Manchester that a 3 minute blast of the fire siren will be blown if a tornado has been sighted nearby and that you should go at once to a shelter area. If you see or hear the tornado coming, do not wait for the Warning Signal - go to your shelter area if there is time, if not, curl up on the floor and protect yourself as much as possible. The danger signs of a tornado are severe thunderstorms-thunder, lightning, heavy rains, and strong winds, hail-pellets of ice from dark-clouded skies, roaring noise-like a hundred railroad locomotives; a crashing thunderous sound, funnel-dark, spinning "rope" or column from the sky to the ground. When a tornado threatens you should:

- * Stay away from windows, doors, and outside walls. Protect your head.
- * In homes and small buildings, go to the basement or to an interior part on the lowest level. Get under something sturdy.
- * In schools, hospitals, and public places, move to pre-designated shelter areas. Interior hallways on lowest floors are best.

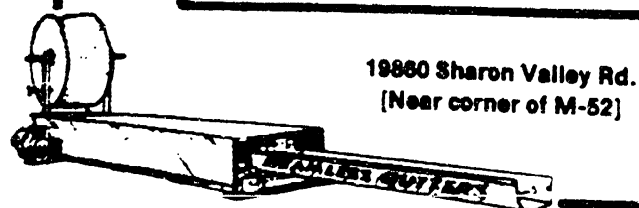

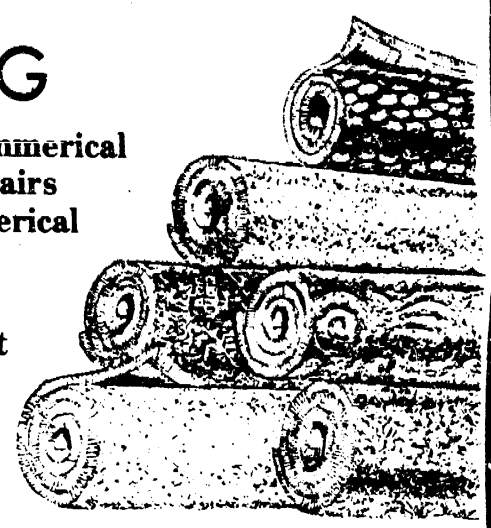

—vision screenings, by the Washtenaw County Health Department.

—hearing screenings, by the audiology department of St. Joseph Mercy Hospital, a unit of Catherine McCauley Health Center.

—height and weight measurements, by the Visiting Nurse Association (a United Way agency), in cooperation with the Washtenaw County Health Department.

—lung capacity checks, by the University of Michigan Center for Fitness and Cardiac Rehabilitation Program.

—oral disease detection screenings, con-

ducted by third and fourth-year dental students, University of Michigan Dental School, under faculty supervision.

—anemia screenings, by the American Red Cross.

Tests to be offered at Saline Hospital include: hypertension, blood screening, vision, glaucoma, hearing, height and weight, health hazard appraisal and individual counseling. Times for each test will be announced at a later date.

Briarwood Center and Saline Hospital are two of nearly 60 sites in the seven-county Project Health-O-Rama coverage area. Project Health-O-Rama is sponsored in Southeast Michigan by United Health Organization, Blue Cross/Blue Shield and WYX-TV, Channel 7. (For information on sites, dates, and tests offered in the seven-county area, call Project Health-O-Rama at 965-6900.)

Goals of the project are to increase health awareness and provide opportunities for health education as well as to point out potential problems before they become more serious. Basic Screenings at Project Health-O-Rama do not replace physicians' examinations.

Energy For The Future

Can the sun meet most of our energy needs? If this sci-fi dream comes true at the turn of the century, the American Lung Association of Michigan may be realizing its goal of clean energy for a clean environment.

Solar power satellites—sometimes called sunsats—are more than a glint in the eye of the space age dreamer. The Department of Energy, working with NASA, has produced a \$19.5 million study implying feasibility of sunsats. The current Congress will probably consider appropriations for further study.

Sunsats indeed are complicated. Their advocates describe them as giant arrays of solar cells above the earth, locked in orbit with the earth. Sunsats would convert the sun's energy into electricity, which would be beamed to earth as microwaves. On the ground, the microwaves would be turned back into electricity.

The satellites would be half the size of New York's Manhattan Island. Construction would have to be out in space, with approximately 600 workers involved, all living and working some 23,000 miles above the earth.

The problems and complexities of sunsats would be enormous, much in advance of the Space Shuttle now in the news. Scientists, however, are seriously considering sunsats, and the government is listening. The Christmas Seal people across the country are working for clean energy and clean air. Plainly, they're a matter of life and breath.

Low-Cost Rabies Clinic

Bubonic plague, typhoid fever, and rabies: diseases guaranteed to start a panic in any neighborhood. Thanks to vaccinations and sanitation, we rarely get to know these diseases first hand. But that doesn't mean they're not out there. You won't find the first two in Washtenaw County, but rabies is something of which

everyone who owns a pet (other than a goldfish) should be aware.

As the economic climate gets worse in this area, more people let their pets' vaccinations lapse. Eventually, this could lead to an outbreak of rabies. To help those finding it hard to pay for rabies shots this year, a low-cost rabies clinic will be sponsored by the Washtenaw Veterinary Academy, the Humane Society of Huron Valley, and the Ann Arbor Dog Training Club. The clinic will be held Monday, March 23, from 3-5 PM and 6-8 PM, at the Farm Council Grounds, 5055 Saline-Ann Arbor Road, just south of Pleasant Lake Road, in Saline. The cost will be \$2 per dog.

Stray pets—dogs and cats that are allowed to roam—can spread rabies quickly when there is an outbreak. Roaming pets not only come into contact with wild animals, but in their travels they may visit dozens of neighboring yards and interact with countless other pets.

We may not be able to wipe out rabies, the way small pox has been eradicated, but it can be controlled if pet owners 1) get their pets vaccinated; 2) keep them confined to the owners' property; and 3) support a vigorous animal control program, including licensing, which requires a rabies vaccination, and picking up of free-roaming dogs.

Dogs and cats must be regularly vaccinated. Cats need an annual rabies shot, dogs must be vaccinated at 6 months of age, at one year, and every three years thereafter.

The Humane Society of Huron Valley urges all dog and cat owners to have their pets vaccinated against rabies by their veterinarians. Prevention is much cheaper than cure!

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THE AMERICAN FARMER: NOBODY DOES IT BETTER

One way to judge just how productive and efficient American farmers are is by looking at just how many more persons are supplied with farm products each year by one farm worker. Back in 1957, one American farm worker supplied enough food and fiber for only about 23 persons. In 1964, this figure had risen to 34, and by 1978, it had jumped to 63.5.

The statistics for 1979 are in, and, again, a record has been set. For that year, one American farm worker provided enough food and fiber for 68 persons.

Now, some might say they used more machinery to do this, and spent longer hours. Not so, says USDA. They did it

with less machinery, and the total hours for farm work hit an all-time low.

Tractor numbers on farms in 1979 totaled 4,350,000 and that's the smallest number since 1955. The total tractor horsepower did hit a record, however, indicating that the tractors that are out there are larger. Total tractor horsepower was 243 million.

Total hours used for all farm work were 4.34 billion, and that's down from 4.45 billion in 1978 and the lowest on records that go back to 1910. It's half of 1963, one-third of 1955 and a fourth of what it was in 1948.

So, the American farmer is the best there is. He's producing so well, in spite of low prices and record high production costs, that he's feeding the nation well and a lot of the world.

It's too bad that the rest of American industry is not as efficient. If it were, we wouldn't have to worry about Japanese cars and cameras, or Korean shirts and shoes, or a lot of other materials that flood this country. There wouldn't be much of a problem of employment either.

SUCCESSFUL BLOODMOBILE

The very successful Bloodmobile in Manchester last week, with 216 pints donated, was the thirtieth anniversary of the first Manchester Red Cross Blood Club Bloodmobile visit to this area on March 19, 1951. There were other similar blood collecting clinics from 1942 to 1951 for military needs supervised by Michigan State Board of Health and the Red Cross combined.
