What Happens To Chicken Broil Profits?

Since 1954, the year of Manchester's first Chicken Broil, profits totaling \$88,815.21 have been expended for local projects and improvements, including the acquisition or purchase of two park properties. All primarily for the benefit of youth.

The amount of profit has varied from year to year. In 1968 the profit was \$177.78. Last year \$8,928.15 was realized. The following schedule itemizes profits and how the funds were expended over the past twenty seven years.

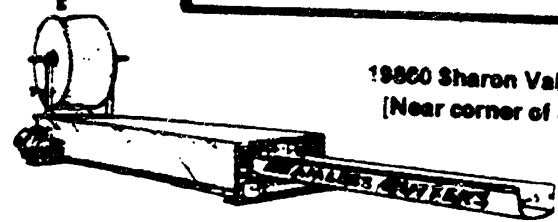

Third Graders Make Ukrainian Eggs



Easter's resurrection has been symbolized for centuries by coloring eggs, which represents the newness of life. Early Christians were the first to begin the custom. In the 1600's, elaborate candy eggs were made with tiny scenes visible through a window at one end. But no where has the custom taken on such an intricately, hand designed flair as in the Ukraine of Southern Russia.

The eggs shown here, with their artists, were not made there but the Ukrainian method was used. The very capable teacher of this art was Mrs. John Sauter and the young artists are Mrs. Blossom's third graders at Klager School.

Mrs. Sauter related some stories told by the Ukrainians as part of their cultural traditions. "Pysanky is writing on eggs", said Mrs. Sauter. The writing is done with a kistka, a brass cone mounted on a stick, heated in a candle flame and dipped in beeswax. After being dipped in dye, the eggs take on the color except for the portion under the beeswax. After the egg is blotted and the wax is removed a beautiful egg emerges. The finishing touch is to coat them with varnish for preservation.

March 16, 1981

The meeting was called to order at 8:00 P.M. by president William Broucek.

It was decided to place the SMOG letter on the agenda as a discussion item. Dr. Thompson responded to Mr. Macomber's letter advising that there were no legal restrictions on the Board of Education regarding the use of monies approved for general fund purposes. He indicated that a letter would be forthcoming for publication from the school district legal office.

Visitor Input: The letter from the Pleasant Lake P.T.O. Board was read to the Board.

Minutes of Previous Meetings: It was moved by Little, supported by DuFresne to approve the minutes of February 16, 1981 meeting as presented. All Yeas.

It was moved by Horning, supported by DuFresne to approve the minutes of the February 23, 1981 meeting as presented. All Yeas.

It was moved by Little, supported by Mann to approve the minutes of the March 2, 1981 meeting as presented. All Yeas.

Financial Report: It was moved by Little, supported by Horning to approve the financial report showing a balance of \$804,253.22 as of February 28, 1981. All Yeas.

Bills Payable: It was moved by Mann, supported by Horning to approve the bills payable in the amount of \$181,388.74. All Yeas.

Discussion Items: A. Dr. George Richards from the architectural firm of MJK was present to present to the Board a

proposed timeline for the renovation project. Along with the discussion of the timeline Dr. Richards presented population study data for the school district. Dr. Richards responded to several questions from Board Members and the audience.

B. Mr. Broucek indicated to those present that the Pleasant Lake topic had been placed on the agenda strictly for discussion purposes. Several Board members indicated their general feelings and concerns regarding the recommendations. Mr. Horning indicated that he would need the offsetting costs prior to making a decision. Several members of the audience had questions and/or comments regarding the topic. C. Mr. Little asked if it would be possible to prepare data illustrating the effects of the Governors tax proposal upon the average homeowner. Dr. Thompson indicated that such a data would be made available.

The regular meeting of the Manchester Village Planning Commission was held at the Village Hall, with members present: Hinkley, Leeson, Grossman, Alber, Tracy, and Krauss.

The meeting was called to order at 7:30 PM, by Chairman Hinkley.

The February meeting having been cancelled due to extreme weather and lack of time-critical business, Minutes of the January meeting were read, and approved.

Mr. Leo I. Stein, of Oak Park, representing Manchester Village Apartments, Inc., had previously asked to make a presentation for a proposed multi-family housing project to be constructed at the Park Land Co. site between East Main and East Duncan Streets. Mr. James Hendley,

was also in attendance. Basically, the development would be subsidized, and consist of four groupings of townhouses (2-story), totaling 35 dwelling units on approximately 5.8 acres. The project would meet all local zoning and building regulations. Mr. Stein has previous developments at Homer, Mariette, and Bad Axe, Michigan, but in the concept of larger dwelling units. In studying the drawings it was noted that the individual units are rather compact, do not have rear openings, and have or omit some other features which need clarification. No definitive recommendation was made, pending further preliminary studies of topographical layouts and architectural details.

Consideration of proposed revisions to the Zoning Ordinance, as recommended by Mr. Frederick Barkley of the Washtenaw County Metropolitan Planning Commission, was again postponed, due to Mr. Barkley having a conflicting engagement which prevented his being here.

Students Score Well On Tests

According to data recently released by Dr. Eugene Thompson, Superintendent of the Manchester Community Schools students in grades 4, 7, and 10 scored very well on tests of basic skills in reading and math. The Michigan Educational Assessment Program tests were administered to all students in these three grade levels during the first semester. The MEAP tests are designed to assess student ability on very specific skills. Data released by the Michigan Department of Education indicate that Manchester students tend to have mastered the skills at a higher rate than students in other Washtenaw County and neighboring school districts.

"While I am not totally satisfied with the results of the test data", said Thompson, "I do feel that very positive trends have been indicated." "Our students scored well above the State level in every case. In most categories we were in the top five of all districts in the area."

The following tables indicate the percentage of students in each school district who have mastered at least 75% of the skills being measured. For example, in grade four 80% of the Manchester students had mastered at least 75% of the reading skills.

It is the intent of the school district to examine the curriculum at all levels to determine appropriate means of increasing the numbers of students who have mastered these basic skills.
