## Board of Education Reduces Millage Levy

At a special meeting following the Academic Awards Program on Wednesday, May 27 the Manchester Board of Education took action to indicate to the voters that the full millage tax levy on the ballot at the June 8 election will not be levied.

The Board noted that it had been necessary to adopt the millage proposal prior to the proposal A vote. It had been necessary to set the millage proposal according to the demands of Proposal A. Since the proposal was defeated it became possible for the Board to reduce the levy accordingly.

Proposal A provided for a 6% limitation on revenues. Since this limitation is not in effect the Board concluded that it would be possible to provide a "Full Educational Program" for approximately one mill less than the 4 additional mills which are part of the ballot proposal.

By official resolution the Board indicated to the voters the Board's intention of levying only approximately 3 mills of the 4 additional mills for operating purposes.

The Board has stated that this action is intended to indicate to the voters the serious attempts being made to contain property taxes while providing a full educational program.

## GIRL'S SOFTBALL TEAM 1981 L.C.A.A. CO-CHAMPIONS

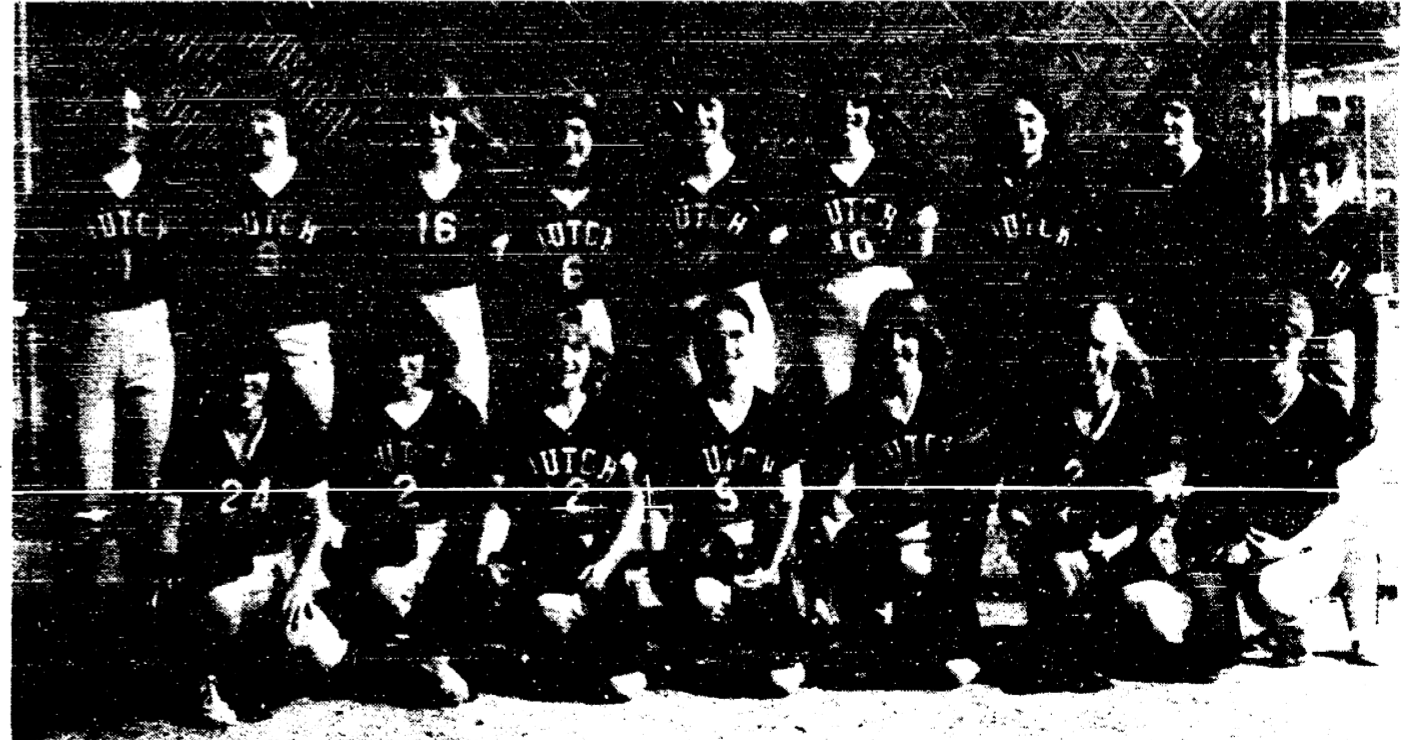

### Mushrooms Don't Wilt In Salads



With the increasing popularity of salads all year round, it's nice to know about raw mushrooms as a salad ingredient. They add wonderful flavor and texture, and joy of joys, they won't wilt. In fact, this Mushroom Spring Salad Platter should be refrigerated six hours or overnight to permit the mingling of flavors.

#### MUSHROOM SPRING SALAD PLATTER

- 1 pound fresh mushrooms
- 1 cup thinly sliced celery
- 1/2 cup coarsely chopped green pepper
- 1/2 cup finely chopped onion
- 1 cup olive or salad oil
- 1/4 cup dry red wine or wine vinegar
- 2 teaspoons basil leaves, crumbled
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 teaspoon finely minced garlic
- 1/2 teaspoon coarse ground black pepper
- 1/2 teaspoon sugar

Rinse, pat dry and halve mushrooms. In a large bowl combine mushrooms, celery, green pepper and onion; set aside. Mix remaining ingredients. Pour over mushroom mixture; toss well. Serve over salad greens with assorted sliced luncheon meats, if desired. Yield: 6 to 8 portions.

## School Board Minutes

REGULAR MEETING

April 20, 1981

The meeting was called to order by the President, Mr. William Broucek at 8:00 p.m.

Roll Call: Members present: DuFresne, Horning, Cole, Broucek, Mann, Bunney, Little. Members absent: None.

Communications: Secretary DuFresne advised that a letter had been received from the Washtenaw Intermediate School District requesting that a representative be appointed to their annual election.

It was moved by Bunney and supported by Little to appoint Paul DuFresne as the representative of the Manchester Community Schools to the Washtenaw Intermediate School District Board of Education election. All years.

It was moved by Little and supported by Mann to receive and file the communication from Dr. Roger Dixon, Superintendent of the Addison Community Schools on behalf of the Lenawee County Athletic Association.

Secretary DuFresne advised the Board that a letter had been received from Mr. and Mrs. John Leekley indicating their feeling regarding Pleasant Lake School. Since each member had received a copy of the letter and due to its length the letter was not read. The Superintendent was asked to send a thank you letter to the Leekley on behalf of the Board of Education.

Visitor Input: Yvonne Henry, Leonard Hastings, and Doyle Rodenbeck spoke to the Board of Education regarding program reductions which had previously been discussed.

Yvonne Henry, president of the MEA/WLEA also presented a proposal to the Board of Education regarding the establishment of a staff sick leave bank.

Minutes of previous meeting: It was moved by Little and supported by DuFresne to approve the minutes of March 16, 1981 as presented. All years.

It was moved by DuFresne and supported by Cole to approve the minutes of March 23, 1981 as presented. All years.

It was moved by Bunney and supported by Mann to approve the minutes of March 30, 1981 as presented. All years.

Financial Report: It was moved by Little and supported by Mann to accept the financial report indicating a balance of \$1,320,787.45 as of March 31, 1981. All years.

Bills Payable: It was moved by Horning, supported by Mann to approve bills payable totaling \$642,827.25. All years.

DISCUSSION ITEMS:  
MJK Architect Report: Dr. George Richards, Educational Consultant with MJK Architects, presented the completed school facility report. After a presentation of the major points in the reports the Board indicated that they would like to meet with Dr. Richards as a committee of the whole on Monday, May 4, 1981 at 7:00 P.M. to discuss in detail the results of the report.

Proposal A Endorsement: After discussion of property tax Proposal A it was moved by DuFresne and supported by Bunney to publicly endorse the proposal. (Full resolution on file at Board of Education.)

MJK Architect's Contract: After discussion it was moved by DuFresne to approve the contract between the Board of Education and MJK Architects of Lansing, Michigan as approved by the school district attorney in his letter of April 3, 1981. Supported by Mann. On a roll call vote all members voted in favor.

1981-82 School Calendar: Dr. Thompson presented a proposed calendar for 1981-82 which had been negotiated with the MEA/WLEA. The calendar calls for 180 days of instruction and 187 teacher work days. It was moved by DuFresne and supported by Horning to approve the 1981-82 school calendar as presented by the Superintendent. All Years.

Manchester Summer Recreation Program: Dr. Thompson recommended that the Board once again co-sponsor the summer recreation program with the Manchester Village Council. The only costs to the school district will be overhead items. Drivers, gasoline, etc., are provided by the recreation program. It was moved by Mann, supported by Cole to co-sponsor the summer recreation program with the Manchester Village Council. All Years. R. Mann agreed to be the Board Representative to the recreation program.

Opinion Survey Results: Dr. Thompson reviewed the results of the recently conducted opinion survey. It was pointed out that less than 10% of those who received the questionnaire had returned it to the school district. The results of this "straw vote" were widely mixed with considerable disagreement among those who responded on each of the questions. The conclusion was that little could be learned from these data.

Budget/Millage: After considerable discussion regarding whether or not the Board should offer the voters a full program of educational opportunities or make reductions in advance of the election consensus was reached to offer a full program. The effects of the May 19 property tax cut proposal weighed heavily in the discussion.

After a review of the budgets which had been presented previously it was concluded that a full program could be offered with a renewal of the existing millage plus 4 new mills. It was pointed out that if Proposal A is approved in May the net effect will be an increase of only 2 mills with all residential property taxes being reduced significantly from their present levels.

It was moved by Little and supported by Bunney to hold the annual school election on Monday, June 8, 1981 with the following being voted upon by the school electors: A. Election of Board Members, B. Increasing the tax rate limitation by 21.78 mills for a period of 1 year, 1981 to 1982 inclusive for operating purposes. On a roll call vote all members voted yes. The official resolution is contained in the permanent files of the Board of Education.

Proposal A Endorsement: After discussion of property tax Proposal A it was moved by DuFresne and supported by Bunney to publicly endorse the proposal. (Full resolution on file at Board of Education.)

### Red Cross Meeting

The Village of Manchester received two awards at the annual meeting of the Washtenaw County Chapter of the American Red Cross last Thursday at Romanoff's Hall on Pontiac Trail. Two hundred volunteer, board members, past and present and friends attended the meeting.

The top award went to Ernest Laetz of Ann Arbor, a 40 year volunteer in the Chapter, who was the first recipient of the Wilfred "Bill" de St. Aubin Memorial Award. This award was made in memory of "Bill" de St. Aubin, who was the director of the Washtenaw County Chapter of the Red Cross for 26 years. He died last November. "Bill" was affectionately known throughout the county as "Mister Red Cross".

The Village of Manchester received the Southeastern Michigan Region Blood Services Award for 30 years of consistent Bloodmobile participation, for the donation of over 5000 pints of blood by the people of the community and for a dedicated volunteerism which enabled the blood program to continue with increasing productivity over thirty years.

A. William Shafer, M.D., director of the Southeastern Michigan Region Blood Services is quoted from the April "Lifeline" (the month journal of the Region): "When a community (any group of people) understands the importance of their participation, they will and do perform in an exemplary way...One intent of this message is to say 'thank you' to all those who have participated in Manchester."

The second award which was for Community Service was presented to the Village of Manchester by the Washtenaw County Chapter. 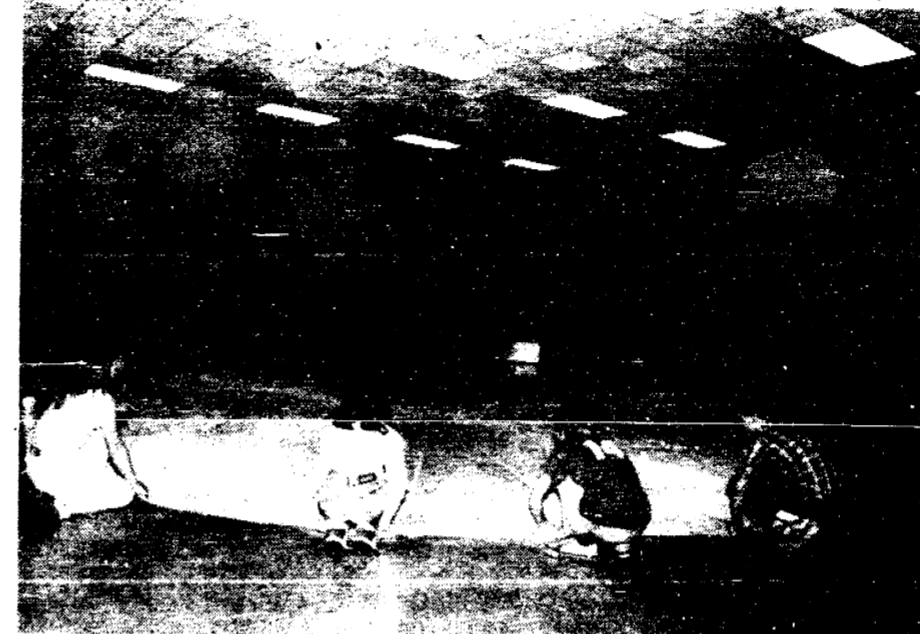
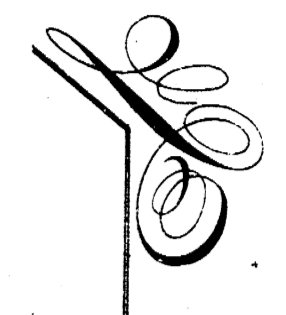
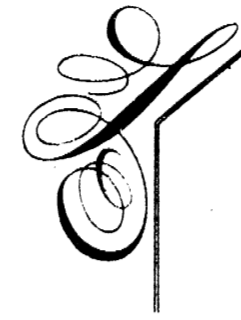

## WHY PHYSICAL EDUCATION IS IMPORTANT TO OUR STUDENTS

No one can look at the world today with its rushing, tensions, competitive living and physical demands and say that the physical body can be ignored. All people need strength, endurance, and the other components of physical fitness.

It must be remembered that the physical and the mental are closely related. The purpose of the body is not just to carry around the mind. The development of physical fitness will contribute to more effective use of the mind. Even the Greeks realized the importance of the "sound mind in a sound body", and established the Olympic games to encourage their citizens to engage in physical activity.

Below are major reasons we feel that no portion of K-12 Physical Education program should be eliminated from our students' educational program:

1. Studies indicate that a child's reading and writing ability are enhanced through

motor development.

2. Before the age of 12, qualities of movement such as speed, agility, balance, and co-ordination are reasonably well developed due to quality elementary physical education programs.

3. The prime activity ages are 9-13. In this school district students in this age group already have received the greatest reduction of time for physical activity.

4. Elementary physical education should provide a firm foundation for future student physical education experiences.

5. Physical education is one of the most important subjects due to the activity drive in children. If the child is to develop physical skills for future use, there is a genuine need in the 9-13 year old range for big muscle activity and a broad foundation of physical skills for future use.

6. A sound foundation of physical skills in early years will help to guarantee the pursuit of physical activity in the later

years and will motivate individuals into activity on their own initiative.

7. Students that cannot do well in the classroom can experience success in physical education classes.

8. There is evidence to prove that physical activity promotes longevity. Thus where a proper attitude can be developed through physical education classes, longer and healthier life may be the result.

9. The American Health Association has seen significant increases in high cholesterol, high blood pressure and obesity in American youth today. Physical Education is a means to alleviate these problem areas.

10. Due to the release of frustration through vigorous activities provided by physical education programs students are better able to handle stress.

11. Many life situations, such as driving and how one reacts in emergency situations, are developed through

competitive physical education and timing. 12. By nature, elementary, and middle school students have a lot of energy to expend. If physical education programs are not available to release this, often difficulties arise in the classroom, i.e. discipline problems.

We believe if one is going to be mentally and physically fit to carry on routine daily tasks at home, at school, or at work, it is imperative that he/she have enough stamina, strength, and skill to accomplish these duties without undue fatigue.

These characteristics are developed through physical activity that cannot be developed by being a spectator, reading a book, or watching television.

Manchester's physical education program needs your support. This program, K-8, may be eliminated due to budget cuts. Allow our youngsters the opportunity to participate in this type or school program.

Attached is a letter which was presented to the Board of Education members and Superintendent of Manchester Community Schools in March. It was compiled after careful study of numerous budgets, paper releases of board minutes and the study of the ballot from our last millage election, by an attorney representing me.

Also, you will see an original copy of the "ballot explanation", which was presented to the voters last August, after the defeat of the millage renewal in June.

This was sent to the Manchester Community School voters; compiled by the Board members and Superintendent, so we, the voters, would better understand the "Special Election" propositions facing us in August.

In reply to my letter from the Board, it is stated, "In our OPINION, the Board of Education is authorized to continue to pay for such athletic and extra-curricular programs from such funds. Section 1211 of the School Code of 1976 authorizes a board of a school district to levy taxes necessary for the school operating purposes, in order TO CONDUCT THE EDUCATIONAL PROGRAMS AUTHORIZED BY THE BOARD."

BUT, I ask you, the voters, when are extra-curricular activities priority over the fundamentals? We have children using 1968 editions of books, a shop and business education class with limited and outdated equipment, inadequate heating in the high school, and a roof which still has not been repaired.

There are four board members still seated on the Board who are responsible for this explanation! And if nothing else, they have a "moral obligation" to this ENTIRE community for the contents of this proposition.

Are we going to sit by and be misled again? Told we misinterpreted their meaning? It is before you in black and white. You decide.

Call a Board member: let them know how you feel. They say that only a few people are dissatisfied and being misled by "false facts" and misinformation.

Are there really so few of us who have enough back bone to stand up and be heard???

Let them know exactly how you feel. VOTE - June 8th.

Re: School millage for Athletic Purposes

Dear Dr. Thompson, Mr. Brevock and Members of the School Board:

The Manchester Community Schools held an election on Monday, August 18, 1980. At that time there were three proposals on the ballot. This letter is with reference to Proposal II, entitled "Additional Millage Proposition". A copy of the proposals as published in the Manchester Enterprise of August 14, 1980, is enclosed. Proposal II provides in substance as follows: "shall the limitation on the amount of taxes which may be assessed against all property...be increased by 1.3 mills on state equalized valuation for the year 1980, for the purpose of providing additional funds for operating purposes to be used for an athletic director, coaches, athletic fund, athletic travel, band director, band instruments...other extra curricula: staff, and associated miscellaneous costs [this being a separate proposal in addition to the increases submitted in Propositions I and III at this same election]?"

THIS PROPOSAL II WAS SOUNDLY DEFEATED AND REJECTED BY THE VOTERS. I have determined, by review of the minutes and records, that you are using millage funds to continue these programs. I realize that some funds have been raised by voluntary donations. BUT TO CARRY ON THE PROGRAMS, YOU HAVE USED A SUBSTANTIAL AMOUNT OF SCHOOL FUNDS WHICH WERE NOT VOTED FOR THE PURPOSE OF ATHLETICS AND SO FORTH, IN ORDER TO CARRY ON THE PROGRAM.

My question to you is, do you have any authority and right to use the funds which have been voted for school purposes and educational purposes, and not voted on by the electorate to carry on the athletic program? It is my understanding that this is illegal and unauthorized use of millage, being diverted to the athletic program and so forth.

This letter is written for the purpose of bringing this to your attention that either (1) you discontinue diverting millage funds to such uses and that you give an accounting of the same to the electorate, by publication thereof, or (2) you present me with proper legal authority that can not be questioned, showing the right of such diversion of such funds.

I will expect an answer from you of receipt of this letter and your proposal to answer the same within two weeks. Your attention will be greatly appreciated.

Dear Dr. Thompson:

I am writing with regard to your letter dated March 16, 1981, sent to Mr. Mosier and the March 10, 1981 letter from Mr. George Macomber, enclosed therewith.

As I understand the factual situation, the voters defeated a proposal whereby 1.3 mills were sought for the purpose of providing additional funds for operating purposes, to be used for specified athletic and extra-curricular purposes. Although that proposal was defeated, the school district, nonetheless, continued the athletic and extra-curricular programs and paid for them with the general fund monies used for school operating purposes. Mr. Macomber has questioned whether the school district is authorized to use funds as such, in view of the defeat of the aforementioned proposal.

IN OUR OPINION, the Board of Education is authorized to continue to pay for such athletic and extra-curricular programs from such funds. Section 1211 of The School Code of 1976 authorizes a board of a school district to levy taxes necessary for school operating purposes, in order TO CONDUCT THE EDUCATIONAL PROGRAMS AUTHORIZED BY THE BOARD. It is common for school districts to finance athletic and extra-curricular programs with funds from the same source used to finance other educational programs authorized by the board. THE FACT THAT THE VOTERS DEFEATED A PROPOSAL SEEKING ADDITIONAL MILLAGE TO BE USED SPECIFICALLY FOR THE PURPOSE OF PROVIDING ADDITIONAL FUNDS FOR ATHLETIC AND EXTRA-CURRICULAR ACTIVITIES IS IRRELEVANT.

We believe Mr. Macomber's confusion is caused by section 1216 of The School Code of 1976. That section provides as follows: "Money raised by tax shall not be used for a purpose other than that for which it was raised without the consent of a majority of the school electors, of the district voting on the question at an annual or special meeting or election."

This, if monies are raised for a specific purpose, it is illegal to use those monies for other purposes. FOR EXAMPLE, HAD THE MILLAGE PROPOSAL PASSED, IT WOULD HAVE BEEN ILLEGAL FOR THE BOARD OF EDUCATION TO USE THE MONIES FOR PURPOSES OTHER THAN THE ATHLETIC AND EXTRA-CURRICULAR PROGRAMS SPECIFIED IN THE PROPOSAL. This does not, however, mean that the school district cannot continue to use so-called "general fund" monies for those purposes.

MANCHESTER COMMUNITY SCHOOLS SPECIAL ELECTION

WHEN IS THE SPECIAL ELECTION?

The election will be held on MONDAY, AUGUST 18, in the HIGH SCHOOL LIBRARY from 7:00 A.M. to 8:00 P.M.

WHAT ARE THE PROPOSITIONS?

There will be Three propositions on the ballot. They are as follows:

I. Shall the limitation on the amount of taxes which may be assessed against all property in Manchester Community Schools, Washtenaw and Jackson Counties, Michigan, be increased by 17.78 mills (\$17.78 on each \$1,000.00) on state equalized valuation for the year, 1980 for the purpose of providing additional funds for operating purposes [this being a renewal of 17.78 mills for operation purposes which expired with the 1979 tax levy]?

WHAT DOES THIS MEAN?

The Board is asking for a renewal of the 17.78 mills previously approved by the voters. This village will operate a very basic educational program while providing for some new elementary school textbooks and some critical roof repairs. The cost of the extra-curriculum program [i.e. athletics] is not included in this proposition.

II. ADDITIONAL MILLAGE PROPOSITION

Shall the limitation on the amount of taxes which may be assessed against all property in Manchester Community Schools, Washtenaw and Jackson Counties, Mich. be increased by 1.3 mills (\$1.30 on each \$1,000.00) on state equalized valuation for the year 1980, for the purpose of providing additional funds for operating purposes to be used for an athletic director, coaches athletic fund, athletic travel, band director, band instruments, instrument repair, other extra-curricular staff, and associated miscellaneous costs [this being a separate proposal in addition to the increases submitted in Propositions I & III at this same election]?

WHAT DOES THIS MEAN?

On a separate proposition the Board is indicating that the cost of the extra curriculum program is 1.3 mills. Included are the costs of the athletic program, cheerleaders, band program, class sponsors, student council, drama, yearbook, National Honor Society chorus, Operetta, and Field & Stream Club. These costs include staff salaries, equipment and transportation.

III ADDITION MILLAGE PROPOSITION

Shall the limitation on the amount of taxes which may be assessed against all property in Manchester Community Schools, Washtenaw and Jackson counties, Michigan, be increased by .9 mill (\$0.90 on each \$1,000.00) on State equalized valuation for the year 1980, for the purpose of providing additional funds for operating purposes to be used for miscellaneous maintenance, high school intercom, middle school furniture, shades, equipment, bus emergency radios, library aides, and new equipment [this being a separate proposal in addition to the increases submitted in Propositions I and II at this same election]?

WHAT DOES THIS MEAN?

Our schools are in need of many maintenance items which have been long overlooked. The Board is asking for .9 mill to meet these needs plus make purchase of several equipment items.

Maintenance needs under this proposition would include sidewalk, roof, boiler and driveway repair, drain repair, painting, exterior door replacement, water fountains, gravel and grading, etc. Equipment items would include a high school intercom, middle school furniture, shades, equipment, bus emergency radios, etc. In addition, library aides would continue to be hired at all schools using these funds.

Information on contractors who can do the work, details on financing, tax credits and Home Weatherization Grants for low income persons also will be provided. After the work is completed, you may have it inspected by your utility.

Some of the recommendations may cost very little or nothing at all. Some you may be able to do yourself. Others will require the services of a contractor. In any case, the Home Energy Analysis puts you under no obligation to carry out any of the recommendations. However, you probably will want to do at least some of these, because now you will know a great deal more about how to make your home energy efficient.

Whether or not you decide to have a Home Energy Analysis, please read

the booklet that comes with your June bill or by a separate mailing. It lists many things you can start doing right now to save energy and money. The booklet also tells you about assistance you can get from your utility to help you make your home more energy efficient—with or without the Home Energy Analysis. Lists of contractors and lenders, as well as do-it-yourself information also are available from your utility.

You can sign up for your Home Energy Analysis by returning the postcard in the booklet or by getting in touch with your utility. The sooner
